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Directions to W&M

Take exit 238 off I-64 and head toward Williamsburg. At second light, turn right on route 132. Cross over 60-Bypass at light, and continue on toward business district of Williamsburg. After the railroad tracks, go straight over Lafayette Street (at light) and take your first right onto Scotland Street. Scotland T's onto Richmond Road at Zable Stadium (football).

To Busch Field: Turn right and go four short blocks. Turn left onto Brooks Street and follow to the backside of W&M Hall. Busch Field will be on your right. To Barksdale Field: At W&M Hall, follow Campus Drive to a T. Turn right and follow for 1000M to T at Jamestown Road. Go left on Jamestown and Barksdale is on left approximately 1000M from turn.



Coaching Staff





Tribe mentor Tara Brown brings her unmatched competitive passion to the team's sidelines for a fifth season in 2004. She and her staff have focused thier efforts this offseason and dedicated themselves to the task of bringing the squad back into national prominence. The positive influences of her strong leadership, preparation and attention to detail are witnessed by the team's continued progress towards restoring the Tribe's tradition-rich lacrosse legacy.

Brown, who emphasizes aggressive defense and an up tempo offensive style of play, came to the Williamsburg campus after spending two seasons (1998-99) at the University of Connecticut, where she gained a wealth of experience as the top assistant. Prior to working at UConn, Brown held similar positions at Cornell University (1996 - 97) and The College of New Jersey (1994 - 96).

Brown was named Virginia's State Coach of the Year (by the Virginia Sports Information Directors) in 2001 by leading the Tribe to its first winning record and NCAA post-season appearance in three years (1998). The squad ended post-season play with a final national ranking of 10th and a 9-7 overall record (5-2 in the always-competitive Colonial Athletic Association). Faced with a schedule that featured 10 teams ranked in the national top 20, the College rang up victories over traditional powers such as Virginia and James Madison.

"I am very excited to be a part of a program that has such a strong winning tradition," said Brown. "I'm especially excited about this season, where I feel we have all the ingredients assembled to meet our established goals. William and Mary has an established reputation nationally in both academic and athletic circles and is an institution which prides itself on producing well rounded student-athletes. This philosophy matches my own."

A 1993 graduate of the University of Virginia, Brown was a varsity athlete in both field hockey and lacrosse for four seasons while in Charlottesville. She played defense wing on UVa's national championship lacrosse squads in the 1991 and 1993 seasons and earned second team All-America honors in 1993. Brown spent two seasons as a member of the United States National Lacrosse Team (1993-95) and was an Academic All-America as well. Also a standout in field hockey, she served as captain of the squad for her junior and senior seasons.

After receiving her BA in history from Virginia, Brown went on to work on her Master of Arts degree in teaching at the College of New Jersey, which she completed in 1996.

Brown, a native of Villanova, PA and graduate of Radnor High School, is married to Tim Brown and lives in the Williamsburg area. The couple has two daughters, Kelly (2) and Alexis (1).



Kristin Hagert comes into her second year as the College's top assistant. The 2001 graduate of Loyola College brings the Tribe staff a wealth of diverse playing and coaching experiences.

Hagert is responsible for assisting Brown with recruiting, academics and on-field instruction. She also help oversee the off-season conditioning program and the day-to-day office management duties. Hagert also is in charge of writing and editing the team newsletter as part of her role in maintaining alumni relations for the program.

Hagert gained valuable coaching experience by spending the past year (2001-02) coaching and teaching in Wantage, England at St. Mary's School, one of the country's premiere boarding schools. In this position, she was a full-time physical education teacher and the resident lacrosse coach.

During her playing career at Loyola, Hagert was a pivotal defender for the Greyhounds. Loyola made appearances in the NCAAs in each of her four seasons (1998-2001) and appeared in the Final Four after both her junior and senior years (2000 and 2001). Hagert served as co-caption her senior season and was named to the NCAA Division I Final Four All-Tournament team and First-Team All-CAA in 2001.

Along with her athletics grant-in-aid, she received a Presidential Academic Scholarship to Loyola. Graduating with Summa Cum Laude honors and a journalism degree, Hagert was a member of the Communications National Honor Society in 2001. She was awarded for her leadership and service by being inducted into the Alpha Sigma Nu Jesuit Honor Society in 2000. Hagert also was honored with Loyola's Gravtis award for distinguished student service. Currently, she is continuing her education by taking graduate classes at W&M in Policy and Planning for Higher Education

A native from Annapolis, MD, Hagert graduated from St. Mary's High School in 1997 as her class' salutatorian.

King, who is currently enrolled in the College's law school, has come in and made an immediate impact in his first collegiate coaching position, working with the College's field players.



2004 Season Preview



A spirited fall practice session has resulted in the team adopting the slogan "Never Back Down" for the coming season, and W&M Head Coach Tara Brown will rely on the determined leadership of a fivemember senior class to head the team's return to the national stage. With a roster that evenly distributes youthful enthusiasm with seasoned talent, the Tribe should have little problem living up to the spirit of the statement.

With the departure of just three starters from last year's squad, the College returns a wealth of talent to the field for 2004, including five of the team's top seven point scorers. Also returning to the fold are three all-conference honorees, senior team tri-captains Lauren Work and Nicole Lewis and junior Morgan Watkins. Work heads the list of returnees as she is coming off a 2003 season which saw her earn first team All-CAA honors by scoring a team-high 40 goals. Lewis had an impact on both ends as a midfielder, while Watkins was the team's third-leading point scorer in '03 with 40 total points.

A coach who prefers an aggressive style of play, Brown has gathered a roster that has speed as its primary attribute. In addition to focusing the preseason on improving overall techniques and fundamentals, the squad has implemented a more aggressive transition attack to take advantage of the squad's overall athleticism. Early returns during the fall scrimmage season showed flashes of great potential, and the challenge of the spring will be to build on those positives and continue to increase the overall confidence level.

As previously mentioned, the five-member senior class of tri-captains Work, Lewis and Laurice Rutledge have teamed with Kelly McQuade and Aimee Duffy to serve at the forefront of Brown's efforts in getting, and keeping, the program focused on improving with each practice session.

This veteran leadership will be essential as the team embarks on its annual nationally-challenging schedule. Of the 17 regular season games slated for the 2004 season, seven of the teams currently hold a place in the *Lacrosse Magazine's* preseason top 20. Four of these seven teams are ranked in the top 10, including second-ranked Virginia and fifth-ranked Georgetown.

The following is a closer look at the 2004 Tribe Lacrosse squad, by position.

Attack

The team has tinkered with some new schemes with the hopes of creating a more cohesive and aggressive attack this spring. Coming off a break-out season a year ago, Work will look to challenge for a place among the league's elite scorers in 2004 and be a cornerstone in the Tribe's attack. The returning first-team All-CAA selection hit on 40 of her 73 shot attempts (.548%), while coming up with 28 draw controls.

Returning second-team all-conference selection Morgan Watkins also should figure largely in the offensive end for the College, as her speed and playmaking ability will be crucial to the team's overall success. Perhaps the team's top distributor, Watkins handed out a team-high 17 assists while also collecting 23 goals in 2003. Not just a scoring threat, she also finished among the team's leaders in groundballs with 40 on the year.

The team will also look to get a major contribution from returning senior starter Kelly McQuade, who comes into the spring after having earned first team All-CAA honors in field hockey in the fall. An extremely fit player, McQuade has the uncanny ability to raise the level of play of her teammates with her attitude and approach to the game. Look for her to build on the confidence and momentum acquired during the breakout field hockey season, and improve on her 2003 lax season that saw her score six goals and hand out eight assists.

Senior team tri-captain Laurice Rutledge and sophomore Colleen Dalon also return with significant playing experience in the attack. One of the team's best leaders, Rutledge spent the off-season honing her shoot and will be counted on to be a finisher in the offensive end. Dalon had a strong showing during her freshman season (six goals and three assists) and should be a force



this season as she has improved both her fitness level and stick skills over last year.

Junior Alison Ritz and sophomore Laura Nolan saw limited action game action in 2003, but both were standouts in the fall and enter the season looking to have an expanded role. Ritz moves the ball extremely well through the midfield and has a good grasp of the offensive scheme. A tenacious competitor who brings a relentless work ethic to the practice and playing field, Nolan's strong stick skills and outstanding field vision brings yet another weapon to the Tribe attack.

A pair of freshmen, Krysta Hardiman and Jamie Fitzgerald, also figures to add depth and talent to the offense. Hardiman, who blends outstanding stick skills with good speed, has already displayed an outstanding feel for the college game. Fitzgerald, a good athlete with size and strength, will spend the first part of the spring getting up to speed on the College's schemes and systems, as she missed the fall practice season playing field hockey.

Midfield

Senior team tri-captain Nicole Lewis, who brings three seasons of playing experience to the position, leads the midfield. Lewis is coming off a 2003 season which saw her earn All-CAA recognition by setting career-highs in points (18), goals (15) and draw controls. A consistent performer on both ends of the field, her outstanding speed and stick skills make her a prime catalyst for the Tribe's transition attack.

Sophomore Morgan Lang is another returning starter that is an outstanding full field player. Perhaps the team's fastest player, Lang is another one of the team's top options in getting the transition attack running. She turned in a very productive freshman season that saw her notch 19 points (16 goals), register 37 ground balls and 19 draw controls.

At no other position will the talented freshman class have more of an impact than in the midfield as two newcomers, Emily Vitrano and Kristen Wong, will look to secure starting positions this

spring. Vitrano has stepped in and immediately displayed a high level of confidence and an ability to be a top scor-

ing threat. Wong will have more of a presence on the defensive end of the field, as she blends great speed with outstanding stick checks. While primarily a defensiveminded midfielder, her speed will also make her a threat in the transition attack.

A trio of freshman, Lizzy Bayly, Kara Parker and Anne Harrington, come into the program loaded with raw potential. Parker is an aggressive player with outstanding speed, while Harrington is very athletic and strong with a good feel for the game. Bayly is a competitive defensive midfielder with outstanding height who will also look to make contributions this spring.

Two returning starters, juniors Becca Hall and Katie Knarr, and game-tested senior Aimee Duffy will form the foundation of the team's defensive line.

Hall is a versatile defender who brings experience, field vision and consistency to the Tribe's back line. Her vision and experience also makes her a key component sparking the team's transition attack and a potential seventh attacker.

Knarr was converted from attacker to defender last spring and her athleticism and competitive fire made an immediate positive impact. She enters the season as one of the team's top marking defenders.

Duffy turned in one of the team's strongest showings this fall and will enter the spring looking to be one

of the team's top performers. Much like Lewis, she possesses the speed to key the team's transition attack, but she also excels at making plays on interceptions and ground balls.

A pair of upperclassmen, sophomore Larissa Blick and junior Car-

rie Stirt, will be counted on to add valuable depth, as will freshman Kat Klopf. Stirt is an intense competitor who will bring her speed and aggressiveness to the Tribe's line defense this spring. Blick, a converted attacker, comes into the spring looking to continue to develop her overall team defensive skills and earn playing time. Klopf is a hardworking freshman that will use the spring to continue to adjust to the collegiate game. **Keeper** The Tribe comes into the 2004 season looking to turn

The Tribe comes into the 2004 season looking to turn over the cage minding duties to athletic sophomore Debby Petracca. Petracca has impressed the College's staff after joining the program this fall after spending time as a member of the Tribe's golf squad. Petracca, who didn't play

lacrosse as a freshman, has adjusted to the collegiate game's pace very quickly. She blends outstanding quickness in the cage with strong fundamentals. Petracca has proven to be adept in controlling her clears and will only improve as she gains more game experience.



Tribe Athletics



"Exercise and recreation ... are as necessary as reading; I will say rather more necessary, because health is worth more than learning. A strong body makes the mind strong." —Thomas Jefferson, W&M Class of 1762

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

Athletic Excellence

The 2002-03 season was one of the best in W&M history, as the Tribe had a schoolrecord 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference championships, while six teams ended the season nationally ranked in the top-25. Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top-100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and this season W&M far exceeded that standard, ending the 2002-03 campaign ranked 58th. It marked the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tribe finished in the top-four in Virginia and first or second in the Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Overall, the College has proven dominant in the CAA, leading the league with 73 conference titles, 21 more than the next closest school. In recent years, it has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Tournament each season.

Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities. In the 2002-03 season, W&M student-athletes, who make up close to 10% of the entire student body, compiled a 3.03 grade point average.

In 2002-03 the CAA began a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for each of the league's 21 sports. Not surprisingly, W&M set the pace with five athletes winning the honor—Tara Flint (women's soccer), Ali Henderson (women's cross country), Adam Hess (men's basketball), Chris Parsons (men's track and field) and Ann Schnell (women's golf)—more than any other school.

For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler. The current chancellor of the College is former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, and he took over the post from former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

Student-Athlete Support



Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

- 1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
- 2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
- 3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in a chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Con-

sultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatced in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.
