Resolved, second: that a committee of five be appointed by the Virginia Alpha of the Phi Beta Kappa Society, to bring this matter before the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities, and

that this Committee, by appeals to the other Chapters, and in any other way deemed advisable, assist in raising the necessary funds to accomplish the work. On amendment, the number of the committee was increased to seven.

These resolutions were unanimously adopted by Virginia Alpha, and, as the proposed committee of ~~five~~ ^{seven}, the Vice-President named:

Hon. R. M. Hughes offered the following amendments

to Art. II of the constitution (to be read ^{at} ^{regular meeting} ^{next} ^{meeting})
Members.

This chapter may elect and receive into its membership three classes to be designated as follows:

1. Members in Course - elected from among the students in the college. Not more than one-sixth of the membership shall be eligible. In determining this number an inferior fraction shall be disregarded. But a superior fraction shall count as a unit. Four students may be chosen on Junior standing, but they shall not be initiated until the beginning of the Senior year ^{next year}.

2. Alumni members, - elected from the graduates of the college whose postgraduate work shall be deemed such as will entitle them to election. Except in cases of unusual distinction, no alumnus shall be elected within ten years after leaving college. But this requirement may be dispensed with at any regular meeting by unanimous consent.

3. Honorary members - elected because of distinguished services in the faculty of the college or in other walks of life. Honorary members shall be entitled to a certificate of membership provided by the United Chapters. Alumni members or members in Course shall be entitled to a certificate provided by the chapter itself.

The chapter may invite into its fellowship members of other chapters who may be connected with the faculty, or be living in the vicinity. Those who accept the invitation shall be termed Associate Members.

All these classes of members shall be accorded equal rights and privileges not only in the chapter but also in the Phi Beta Kappa Fraternity.

No member-elect shall be registered as a full member until he has been initiated into the chapter by its properly constituted officers or by some other chapter acting on their invitation and in their behalf.

The treasurer of the chapter shall pay to the treasurer of the United Chapters as a registration fee one dollar for each person received into its membership of any type except Associate Members.

Electives.

Alumni and Honorary Members.

There shall be a standing committee on membership consisting of three members, two of whom shall be members of the faculty. All nominations to Alumni and Honorary membership shall be referred to this committee.

Nominations must be handed to the committee in writing.

Electives shall be by ballot, and two negatives will suffice for rejection. Those thus chosen shall be notified of their election, and invited to appear for initiation at the first convenient meeting.

the daughter of William Galt of Norfolk, died in

3. That this Chapter will cooperate in making such celebration a success, and leave to the better judgment of the Senate whether to make such meeting a council to be composed of delegates from the different chapters as invited guests, or a mass meeting of the Society.

4. That this Chapter will appoint committees to cooperate with committees of the Senate in making all necessary arrangements.

Resolved

1. That the President or Vice-President of this Chapter be authorized to appoint such committees as may be deemed proper for the purpose of making all arrangements looking to the proper celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Society's foundation, and with the idea that such committees will cooperate with the Senate of the Society in the arrangements necessary for making such celebration.

2. That the committee of this Chapter consist of not less than three nor more than nine in the discretion of the appointing officer, that said committee shall elect a secretary, who shall ^{have} charge of all correspondence connected with the celebration, and shall keep a careful record of the same and of all proceedings of the committee.

being pushed by the Senate to raise an endowment of \$1,000,000 to erect the Phi Beta Memorial Hall here, to honor a permanent headquarters in New York, and to promote the cause of learning in general as fostered here by "The Fathers" and taken up with new enthusiasm by the Senate and Triennial Council.
