Albert-Daly Field One Year Away!

The College of William and Mary received a \$500,000 challenge grant from Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ukrop of Richmond, Virginia, to build a proposed \$1 million dollar natural grass field adjacent to W&M's baseball stadium, Plumeri Park, located at the College's Dillard complex.

The new facility, to be called Albert-Daly Field, will be used by both the men's and women's soccer programs and the lacrosse team. The field is named after current William and Mary men's and women's head soccer coaches, Al Albert and John Daly. The William and Mary Athletic Department is currently working on raising the additional \$500,000 necessary to reach the \$1 million dollar goal with construction tentatively scheduled to begin this fall with competition slated for the fall of 2003.

"Jim and Bobbie Ukrop's gift gesture is just tremendous," said Daly. "It's going to help in every way from scheduling and recruiting to the perception of the program."

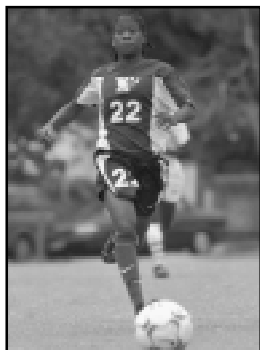

Directions To William and Mary Soccer Fields

From Richmond and points west **TO BUSCH FIELD:** Head east on Interstate -64. Take exit #234 (Rt. 199 South). Follow Rt. 199 East to Monticello Ave., exit; stay left on exit ramp. Take left onto Monticello Avenue. After the first light on Monticello, make the first right on to Compton Drive. (street sign may not be present; Compton Dr. is a heavily wooded road). At the stop sign, make a right onto Brooks Street and the field is on the right.

From Norfolk and points east: Head west on Interstate 64. Take exit #242A (Rt. 199 North). Follow Rt. 199 North to Monticello Ave. exit; stay right on exit ramp. Follow same directions from above to get to the hall.

From Richmond and points west **TO BARKSDALE FIELD:** Head east on Interstate 64. Take exit #234 (Rt. 199 South.) Follow Rt. 199 East until the intersection of Rt. 199 and Jamestown Road (second stoplight on Rt. 199). Take a left onto Jamestown Road. Barksdale Field is located on the left side of the road approximately two miles down the road (adjacent to Phi Beta Kappa Hall and across from Cary Street.

From Norfolk and points east: Head west on Interstate 64. Take exit 242A (Rt. 199 North. Follow Rt. 199 North until the intersection of Rt. 199 and Jamestown Rd. (second stoplight on Rt. 199). Follow directions from above.



W&M: Into The Fourth Century

For more than 300 years, the College of William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was chartered February 8, 1693, by King William III and Queen Mary II of England to bring education to a growing number of British colonists and Christianity to the Native Americans. Today, William and Mary is a public, four-year, co-educational residential university, with a nationally recognized liberal arts program. Although it has retained the college name in its title, William and Mary is now a modern university.

Many of America's early leaders were educated at William and Mary, including U.S. Presidents Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler, and renowned U.S. Chief Justice John Marshall. George Washington served as the college's first American chancellor from 1788 until his death in 1799.

William and Mary students founded Phi Beta Kappa, the premier academic honor society in America, in 1776. The College was the first to offer elective courses and to use the honor code system of conduct. The first chair of law in America was established at William and Mary in 1779. In addition, the College awarded the first degree in law in 1793.

The College's historic campus includes the Sir Christopher Wren Building (1695), the oldest college building in the nation where classes are still conducted. This and other 18th-century structures of William and Mary were restored to their original appearance through grants from philanthropist John D. Rockefeller during the restoration of Colonial Williamsburg in the late 1920s.

Although polls, rankings and guidebooks cannot fully capture the character of any educational institution, they do provide useful indications of the quality that students can expect. For years, the academic excellence of the College of William and Mary has been widely recognized by the growing raft of magazines and guidebooks that annually rank American colleges and universities. From *U.S. News and World Report* to *The Princeton Review*, William and Mary and its programs are listed among the nation's strongest.

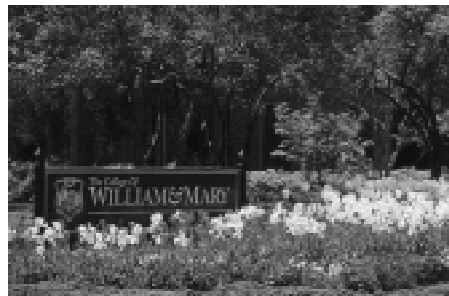

- W&M's 12-1 student-faculty ratio is among the lowest of national public universities.

William and Mary Soccer

Over the last 300 years, William and Mary has developed a sterling national reputation for its academic standard of success. And for the last century, the Tribe athletics program has been working just as diligently to maintain its position as one of the top athletics departments in the nation ...

When the College's stringent academic standards are taken into consideration, the accomplishments of W&M's athletic programs are even more amazing. Over 500 student-athletes participate in 23 intercollegiate sports, and last year, those teams won over 57 percent of their competitions en route to a combined record of 205-154-2.

The 2001-02 athletic year was a typically strong one for the Tribe. Five Colonial Athletic Association titles, one East Coast Athletic Conference championship, a share of the Atlantic 10 football crown and a first place showing at the USA Collegiate Gymnastics meet are examples of William and Mary's strong season.

The women's tennis team captured its 16th CAA Championship, while the women's soccer squad qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the 10th straight season. Perennial powerhouses like the cross country and track and field squads didn't disappoint, either, challenging for conference titles yet again in 2001.

The success isn't limited to just those programs. The volleyball and men's gymnastics teams earned their first berths in NCAA postseason action, while the men's golf team earned a bid to the NCAA East Regional, showing that improvement is occurring across the board.

Since the merger of the men's and women's athletics departments in 1986, William and Mary has seen more than its fair share of success on and off the field. With graduates of the program running major corporations or running down the opposition in a National Football League game, a degree from W&M has proven to be a stepping-stone to a successful future.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are

also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Continuity is emphasized in the W&M athletics department. As the shaded box below shows, William and Mary has a history of stability with its head coaches. The current head coaches at W&M have been with the program for an average of 12.5 years. This retention rate leads to better performances on the field and a better overall experience for the student-athlete.

From the administration to the training staff to the coaches, the Tribe sports family is committed to providing each student-athlete at the College with the best possible experience, both academically and athletically, for his or her collegiate career.

Student-Athlete Support



Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned a faculty academic advisor through the Academic Advising Office, directed by Dr. Randolph Coleman. Students remain with this advisor until they declare a major at which time they select a faculty advisor in their major field of concentration. The Academic Advising Office provides support and guidance to students as they plan their academic progress to graduation.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building

skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.



Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, six fulltime certified athletic trainers, graduate and undergraduate student trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The College is also in the process of evaluating and pursuing CAAHEP accreditation of its entry-level athletic training education program. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.



W&M Athletic Venues

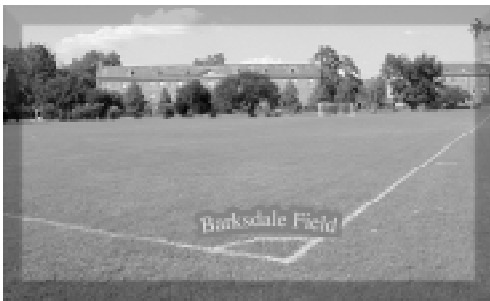

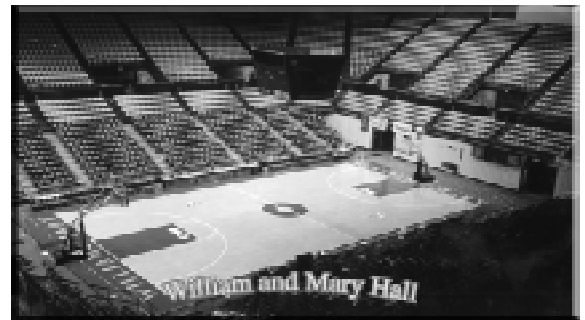

With a strong personal commitment to the concept of the scholar-athlete and to competitive success, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll, Jr. enters his seventh year as athletics director at the College.

"In the athletic world, William and Mary is well recognized for a rare combination of two attributes: its academic strength in the classroom and its competitive strength on the field," said Driscoll. "I look forward to the challenge of continuing the tradition of academic and athletic

achievement."

A basketball All-America selection and an Academic All-America honoree at Boston College, Driscoll is an exemplary leader. Since his collegiate days, Driscoll has filled a variety of executive posts in the sporting goods industry, as well as completing an 11-year stint as a player in the National Basketball Association and as a player and coach in the Italian professional basketball league.

Driscoll has supervised the marketing of athletic products in national and international markets, enhanced the television exposure of a variety of NCAA events (including the Final Four basketball tournament) and organized and directed such internationally recognized events as the World Cup soccer games in Boston and the women's World Volleyball Grand Prix in Hawaii. The athletic program Driscoll directs fields a total of 23 men's and women's teams which boast strong records in NCAA, Colonial Athletic Association and Atlantic 10 competition. Last year, W&M posted a .571 overall winning percentage with five teams finishing in the nation's top-25 polls. Tribe athletes also earned seven All-America certificates and 16 national academic citations during the year.

Driscoll, who graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from Boston College in 1969, began his post-graduate career as a first-round draft pick of the Detroit Pistons. Before joining the Pistons, however, Driscoll opted for a year of professional basketball in Italy where

he fulfilled his dream of living abroad and learning a second language.

He rejoined the Pistons in 1970 and played with the Bullets and Bucks before returning to Italy in the fall of 1975, where he was named Outstanding Foreign Player of the Year. He played three years before an injury forced his retirement in 1978. He then coached his former team to two Italian League Championships before returning to the United States.

Driscoll began his post-playing career as an athletic sales promotion agent in 1980 and quickly moved up the corporate ladder. With the purchase of Bike Athletic by Kazmaier Associates in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the Sporting Goods Industry. Driscoll was named president of KSG Inc. in 1987 and expanded the agency from 24 to 50 states by 1989. With the domestic sales agency in place, Driscoll expanded to international marketing and sales from 1989-93.

In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International. Also in 1993-94, Driscoll assisted with the 1994 World Cup Organizing Committee as Venue Executive Director, and his Boston venue was cited for its operational success. In September of 1994, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife Susan. The couple has two children, Keith, 27, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross, and Leslie, 23, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.

Associate Athletics Director Barbara Blosser



Barbara Blosser comes into her 11th year as the College's Associate Athletics Director. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach, and saw immediate success, as her first team finished the 1978 season by winning the VAIAW crown with a then-school-record win total (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William & Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I.

Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During her two seasons at the school, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OAISW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a bachelor of science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978. In 1993, she was selected as a member of the first class of women inducted to the Ohio State University Athletic Hall of Fame.



Coaching Staff

Head Coach John Daly



With the tradition of William and Mary as one of the elite academic institutions in the nation year-after-year, head coach John Daly injects similar excellence into the College's women's soccer program.

Entering his 16th year at the helm of the W&M program, Daly prides himself in keeping the Tribe as one of the top soccer programs in the nation and a threat for the sport's elusive prize - the national championship.

Daly is one of the most successful coaches in America, ranking in the top-10 in victories (216) and winning percentage (.719) among his Division I peers. He has also directed W&M to the NCAA post-season 14 times, including the last 10 seasons in a row.

On Oct. 11, 2000, Daly achieved his 200th career victory with an exciting, 1-0, overtime win against Richmond.

The Tribe has also been ranked for 19 consecutive seasons among the country's top-20 programs, including a program-high No. 3 ranking during the 1994 campaign. W&M is one of three colleges (along with Connecticut and North Carolina) to hold the nation's record of 20-straight winning seasons since 1982.

On the field during Daly's tutelage, 11 W&M soccer players have garnered a total of 24 All-America honors, including two National Players of the Year in Megan McCarthy (1987) and four-time All-American Natalie Neaton (1995). In addition, three Tribe players have earned Academic All-America recognition, including Robin Lotze, a three-time selection, and Janet Sury, who earned second-team honors in 2001.

Daly has earned three CAA Coach of the Year (1993, 1994, 1999) and VaSID Coach of the Year (1994, 1998, 1999) honors. His 1994 team set eight school records, including goals in a season (87) and most goals in a single match (15). During the 1999 season, with nine freshmen on the roster, the Tribe turned in a school-record .826 winning percentage (19-4) and earned a trip to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen.

Daly has also earned Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year honors four times (1989, 1990, 1992, 1997). In addition to the NCAA appearances, Daly led the Tribe to the prestigious WAGS (Washington Area Girls' Soccer) title in 1987 when it defeated North Carolina in a shootout (4-3).

Daly added another honor to his resume during the 2000 season when he was named the 1999-2000 William and Mary Society of the Alumni Coach of the Year.

A key figure in the W&M soccer scene long before taking over as head women's coach in

1987, Daly was an assistant coach of the then-women's club team on a guest basis back in 1979. In 1986, he was a full-time assistant before ascending to his present position.

Active at many levels of soccer, Daly served as coach of the Region I (East) team that traveled to Holland and Italy in March 1989. In addition, he is a Region I Olympic Development coach with the United States Youth Soccer Association and has coached the Virginia under-19 girls' soccer team. Currently, Daly is the under-17 Region I Assistant Coach.

In April of 2000, Daly, a native of London, England, recited the Oath of Allegiance, becoming a United States citizen after residing in America for the last 20 years.



Assistant Coach Angela Napoli



Angela Napoli begins her second season with the Tribe after spending one year at Colorado University in Boulder.

Napoli, a 2000 graduate of the University of Massachusetts, guided the Tribe netminders to a 0.760 save percentage and 79 saves in 2001, helping the Tribe to its sixth-straight CAA Championship.

Napoli earned a sport management degree from UMass, where she was a four-year letterwinner in the nets for the Minutewomen. There she played in 35 career games, starting 27. She finished her career at UMass with a 1.38 goals against average, allowing 42 goals while notching 159 saves. She ranks

fifth on UMass' all-time saves chart and sixth in career shutouts with six.

Napoli, 24, comes from a long line of strong UMass goalkeepers, including 1994 Final Four goalkeeper Skye Eddy and 1999 Women's World Cup keeper Briana Scurry, who is currently with the U.S. Women's National Team.

A native of Longmeadow, Massachusetts, Napoli was a three-sport standout at Longmeadow High School where she graduated in 1996. She lettered in soccer, basketball and softball, earning all-state and all-Western Massachusetts honors as the netminder for the Lancers.

Assistant Coach Kevin Denson



Kevin Denson begins his second season with the Tribe bringing a wealth of coaching experience from a number of soccer affiliations.

Denson currently serves as the Kempsville (Va.) High School boys soccer head coach, where he has led the team to four state championships since his initial season in 1985.

In addition to those championships, Kempsville earned a national number one ranking in 1992 and 1997.

Denson also served as the USYSA Region I Girls ODP Head Coach, Director of Player Development for Beach FC Travel team,

and is a member of the Virginia Youth Soccer coaching staff since 1989.

In addition, Denson was the Virginia Wesleyan College women's coach from 1985 through 1987.

Denson is an eight-time Coach of the Year recipient including NSCAA National Coach of the Year in 1997.

Denson is a graduate of Virginia Wesleyan College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in recreation and leisure studies.

2002 Season Outlook



The 2002 William and Mary soccer squad is eager to hit the field for the start of the season, which brings eight new faces to the program.

The College should be ready though, as long time head coach John Daly welcomes back a solid nucleus of veterans who advanced to the second round of the 2001 NCAA Tournament.

Despite losing four starters, including outstanding goalkeeper, Courtney Owen, William and Mary returns an experienced and versatile squad for 2002, its twenty-first year as a varsity sport.

"Courtney, Janet (Sury), Jordan (Krieger) and Avery (Willis) will all be greatly missed, as will Erin Dixon who was one of two backup goalkeepers to Owen last season," says Daly.

"Leadership will be a key factor this fall and captains Catherine Pacilio and Franny Swajkoski, along with fellow seniors Lara Pawlow and Joanne Elston, will provide tremendous leadership," says Daly. "We will also have a deep and experienced junior class, one that includes reigning CAA Player of the Year Tara Flint and Lindsey Vanderspiegel, who was the MVP of the CAA Tournament last season after scoring the game winning goal in the championship game," says the Tribe mentor.

Nikki Villott, who started the final three matches last season after Owen was injured, will assume the role of number one goalkeeper after two years of being a backup. As a junior with big match experience, Villott is ready to step in at the number one spot in the net for the College. "Nikki has the composure and experience to be an excellent last line of defense," says Daly. "She had a very good spring, turning in some fine performances against the likes of the WUSA's New York Power, the University of Florida and Penn State,

while Pawlow, a tough defender, continues to be one of Daly's most consistent performers and will be a fixture in the back four. Elston should be the final cog in the machine with Susanne Huntington, Gibby Eppler and freshman Brennan Marsallo all in challenging positions. Mary Platz recovered well from knee surgery and a sophomore transfer from the College of New Jersey, Shannon Mosier, will also challenge for time.

The Tribe will have its strongest midfield in years with the likely combination of Flint, Swajkoski, Vanderspiegel, and Emily Davis, a quick and tenacious midfielder. Challenging them will be Kristen Wolfer, Ali West, Rebecca Sowden, Kim Stokes and Anna Pawlow, the younger sister of the Tribe's senior defender.

Up front, the Tribe must replace its entire attack, which was lost due to graduation. However, through recruiting and a key transfer, the Tribe should be very dangerous, having landed a prized goal scorer, Taline Tahmassian, from Langley, Virginia. Tahmassian won a national championship last fall with Santa Clara, but decided to transfer, choosing the Tribe over a host of interested schools. Tahmassian scored eight goals for Santa Clara last season, two of which went for game winners.

A member of the U.S. under-17 squad last summer, Tahmassian is a brilliant finisher. She will join Erica Cooper, who had an outstanding spring, Colleen Knight and freshmen Andrea Barschdorf and Lydia Sturgis in supplying the goal power for the Tribe. Barschdorf is recovering from knee surgery, while Sturgis is coming off a state championship-winning season with her Nease (Jacksonville, Florida) high school team. Sturgis recorded 42 goals and 51 assists as Nease won its first state championship.

The College's 2002 schedule is one of the strongest in years, thanks to the four new

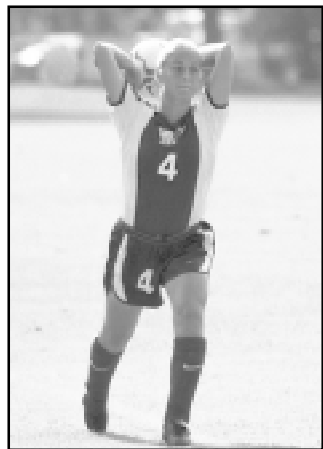
schools who joined the Colonial Athletic Association schedule this season. The CAA welcomes Delaware, Drexel, Hostra and Towson to the fold with Hostra and Drexel visiting Williamsburg this fall. Other home conference matchups are with George Mason, Old Dominion and James Madison. The road games are against UNC Wilmington, VCU, Delaware and Towson.

The non-conference schedule is challenging, with Virginia and Pepperdine supplying the opposition in the Nike/Tribe Invitational. The Tribe will open the season at Georgetown before taking on Virginia Tech at Busch Field. The Tribe will then welcome Alabama to Busch Field. Next will be UNC Greensboro and Illinois at the George Mason Tournament before a tough road trip to play against West Virginia and Maryland.

Former Tribe standout Julie Cunningham-Shackford will bring her Princeton Tigers to Busch Field for an October matchup. Of its ten games out of conference seven will be against teams that participated in the 2001 NCAA tournament.

"I think we will be respectable again this fall" says Daly.

With a returning cast of solid and experienced veterans combined with a group of talented newcomers, the Tribe should be a major force in the CAA and in the NCAA's this season.

A pair of former William & Mary players are participating in the Women's United Soccer Association (WUSA), which is currently in its second year of existence.

Ann Cook, Carrie Moore and a third player, Missy Wycinsky, were among the 120 women selected by the eight teams making up the WUSA inaugural season that began play in April of 2001. Wycinsky opted to pursue a master's degree and is not on a WUSA roster in 2002.

Cook, a three-time All-American and four-time Colonial Athletic Association first team selection from 1993-1997, was the fourth pick by the Bay Area CyberRays, and now plays for the Washington Freedom.

She also helped the Tribe to three CAA championships. "Cookie" joined the Freedom in an offseason trade from the Cyber Rays, where she played in 14 matches in 2001, starting five, and took six shots in 580 minutes of action.

She made an appearance with the

coach at Drury University (Missouri) for two seasons.

Moore, a four-year standout from 1996-1999, was selected by the Washington Freedom as their 14th selection overall. Moore was a two-time NSCAA All-Region honoree and three-time All-CAA midfielder for the Tribe. She also helped W&M to four consecutive Colonial Athletic Association championships and to a NCAA Final Eight appearance in 1997.

A mainstay in the Tribe lineup for all her 90 matches (88 starts), Moore was one of 40 college women to participate in the Umbro Select College All-Star game in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. She also tallied six game-winning goals, with her last one eliminating Duke in the 1999 NCAA Tournament.

Wycinsky was drafted by the San Diego Spirit in the eighth round, is the all-

time William and Mary scoring leader with 202 points from 1996-1999 and ranks as the school's career assists leader with 52.

A four-time All-CAA first team selection, Wycinsky is a three-time NSCAA All-American, a two-time Hermann Trophy Finalist and a three-time first team NSCAA All-Mid-Atlantic Region selection. Both Cook (1997) and Wycinsky (1998 & 1999) were CAA Player of the Year award winners.

A scoring threat for all 90 minutes, Wycinsky's career numbers reflect William and Mary's success during the 1996-99 seasons. With a school record 92 career starts, Wycinsky recorded 20 game-winning goals, 16 game-winning assists and four career hat-tricks. She once tallied three assists in one game along with 19 multi-goal games and 12 multi-assist games.

The trio of Cook, Moore and Wycinsky combined for a 113-37-4 (.734) record, seven conference titles, seven NCAA Tournaments and a Final Eight appearance in 1997.

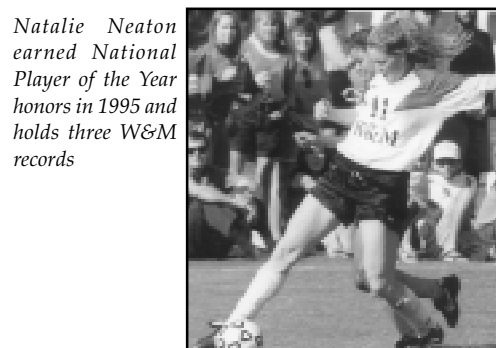
