2004 Outlook

With the loss of seven seniors from last season's CAA Championship season, most people would call 2004 a rebuilding year.

Tribe Coach John Daly, who will begin his 17th year directing one of the most successful women's soccer programs in the country, disagrees with that assessment, but says he knows that he and his team have their work cut out for them if the Tribe are to repeat as CAA Champions in 2004.

"Any time you lose seniors of such quality, you know that you need people to step up and fill their shoes, and we have players that are capable of doing that," the Tribe mentor said. With strength sprinkled throughout all four classes, the Tribe has the talent to again challenge for top honors.

Those key seniors (Lindsey Vanderspiegel, Tara Flint, Nikki Villott, Erica Cooper, Kim Stokes, Kristen Wolfer and Rebecca Sowden) left quite a legacy, leading the College to three Colonial Athletic Association championships and four NCAA Tournament appearances. Those seven women combined for two CAA Players of the Year, two CAA Tournament Most Valuable Players and five first-team All-CAA selections.

Despite the losses due to graduation, the Tribe returns a solid nucleus of talent that has experience, starting with the front line, which has the potential to be very dangerous. As the 2004 season dawns, a season in which the Tribe will begin play in its new facility, Albert-Daly Field, W&M returns three of its top five scorers from last year's 14-6-3 unit that won its ninth CAA title.

The strength of this year's team will be the dangerous trio of forwards, where senior Taline Tahmassian, junior Lydia Sturgis and sophomore Katie Hogwood combined to score 27 of the Tribe's 46 goals.

Tahmassian led the CAA in goals (15) last season, and the Tribe was a perfect 10-0-0 when she scored a goal and 14-1-1 in matches the past two seasons. The first-team All-CAA selection will headline the Tribe attack, alongside Sturgis and Hogwood. Sturgis scored three goals and recorded six assists, with four of those coming in one match, tying a school record. She is a good ball striker and strong around the net, while Hogwood was the CAA Co-Rookie of the Year after finishing the season with nine goals. She scored a goal in the first four matches of the season, becoming the first freshman in school history to accomplish the feat. She also became the first Tribe player since 1999 (Avery Willis) to find the back of the net in four consecutive matches. Her quickness creates problems for opposing defenses.

All have a nose for scoring goals, as does sophomore Andrea Barschdorf, who will also see time up front. Barschdorf is a heady player around the net who is difficult to contain and will be a solid contributor.

The midfield was hit the hardest by graduation, as Vanderspiegel and Flint ended their careers as two of top players in school and league history. Vanderspiegel graduated as the only player in CAA history to be named Rookie of the Year, Player of the Year and CAA Tournament MVP. Flint was the 2001 Player of the Year.

Senior Ali West, along with junior Anna Pawlow, sophomores Tiffany Chudoba and Rianna Barrett and a host of talented freshmen will all look to fill the void left by their departures.

West has been rock-steady in her three years, and possesses a strong leg that is valuable on free kicks. Pawlow is very smooth on the ball and has good technique while Chudoba had a solid freshman year, scoring two goals, including

one that sealed the CAA Championship win against Virginia Commonwealth. She is a solid on-the-ball defender. Barrett is tactically smart and reads the game well.

Defensively, seniors Keri Gordon, Shannon Mosier and Susanne Huntington are back for one final season as the Tribe's leaders in the last line of defense, which is a role they have served with solid ability in their careers. Gordon is a hard defender who tackles very well, while Huntington has a good tactical sense and is a valuable defender. Mosier, in addition to being a superb defender, is also a legitimate scoring threat. She tallied three goals last season, including the game winner against James Madison in the opening round of the CAA Tournament.

Sophomores Lauren Bowers and Anna Young also saw significant playing time as freshmen, with Young tallying one goal while anchoring the defense. Bowers is a finesse player who marks well, while Young is the leader in the back who communicates well and keeps the defense organized.

Daly must find a replacement in goal for Villott, who started the final 46 matches of her career, taking over in the 2001 CAA Championship Match. Juniors Jenna Sommer, Kathleen Belk and Oral Roberts transfer Kellie Fenton will all battle for time between the posts. Sommer and Belk both have seen limited time in their careers, with Sommer posting just 76 minutes and Belk just 19. Belk did not see any action last season due to an injury, while Fenton, the more experienced of the three, was a two-time Mid-Continent conference selection and is ranked in the top-10 in various Oral Roberts single-season school records.

Daly and his staff have added to the solid corps of returnees by bringing in a talented group of freshmen with an emphasis on in-state players. Chrissy Papageorge, Liana Kleeman, Mary MacKenzie Grier, Anne Sprinkel, Emily Kittleton and Jenny Purser all come from solid high school and club programs. Britany Bode, from Scottsdale, Arizona and Amanda Brodeur, from Auburn, Massachusetts, also have vast regional and state experience in addition to being from strong high school programs, round out what Daly considers a strong and deep

freshman class.

The schedule, as in years past, is a taxing one with some very strong out of region opposition. The Tribe kicks off with a home match against Loyola in the first match on Albert-Daly Field, followed by a trip to Maryland to face the Terrapins. The Cowgirls of Oklahoma State and the Auburn Tigers are next before the Tribe takes on Georgetown and Harvard at the George Mason tournament. Texas Christian and Virginia will face off against George Mason and the Tribe the following weekend in the Nike/Tribe Invitational.

W&M then begins its conference schedule on the road at Delaware and Towson before returning to Albert-Daly Field for the next six matches, stretching the entire month of October, to face George Mason and James Madison. Travel partner Old Dominion is next followed by Longwood, in its first year as a Division I program. The Lancers visit over Homecoming weekend before the Tribe resumes its conference schedule. Hofstra and Drexel come to town next before the regular season draws to a close with road trips to UNC Wilmington and Virginia Commonwealth.

With the talent and experience in place, the Tribe should overcome the key losses to graduation. Some may think 2004 is a rebuilding year, but if this year is like any of the previous years, the Tribe will simply reload rather than rebuild.

Head Coach John Daly



The name John Daly has become synonymous with success in women's college soccer circles since taking over the William and Mary program as head coach in 1987. Entering his 18th year directing one of the most successful programs in America, Daly sports a career record of 243-99-17 and has led the Tribe to nine Colonial Athletic Association Championships in 11 years, including a six-year consecutive stretch from 1996-2001. After falling to James Madison in the 2002 CAA Tournament, Daly led his charges to the 2003 CAA title despite being the fourth seed in the tournament, its lowest ever. The Tribe did not allow a goal in the three tournament matches, outscoring its opponents 6-0.

During his career in Williamsburg, Daly has led W&M to the NCAA post-season 16 times, including the last 12 seasons in a row. Overall, the College has sponsored women's soccer for 23 years with the team advancing to the NCAA Tournament 19 times, where the Tribe has at least reached the second round three of the past seven seasons.

The Tribe has been nationally ranked among the country's top-20 programs for 21 consecutive seasons, including a program-high No. 3 ranking during the 1994 campaign. W&M is one of three colleges (with Connecticut and North Carolina) to hold the nation's record of 22-straight winning seasons since 1982.

On the field during Daly's tutelage, 11 W&M soccer players have garnered a total of 24 All-America honors, including two National Players of the Year in Megan McCarthy (1987) and four-time All-American Natalie Neaton (1995). Along with the success on the pitch, Daly's players have also succeeded in the classroom, as seven Tribe players have earned Academic All-America recognition under Daly's watch. Robin Lotze, was a three-time honoree from 1988-90, and Kris Fisher was recognized in 1992. Janet Sury was selected in 2001 while Franny Swajkoski and Tara Flint were each honored for their success in the classroom and on the field in 2002. Flint and goalkeeper Nikki Villott were recognized last season.

Daly has been named CAA Coach of the Year (1993, 1994, 1999) and VaSID Coach of the Year (1994, 1998, 1999) three times each, and his 1994 team set eight school records, including goals in a season (87) and most goals in a single match (15). During the 1999 season, with nine freshmen on the roster, the Tribe set a school record with an .826 winning percentage (19-4-0) and earned a trip to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen.

In 1997, Daly led the Tribe to its finest season in school history, setting school records with 20 wins and a 13-match unbeaten streak as the College came within one match of advancing to the Final Four after a pair of exciting one-goal wins over Virginia and Penn State.

Daly has also been recognized on the regional level, as he earned Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year honors four times (1989, 1990, 1992, 1997). In addition to the NCAA appearances, Daly led the Tribe to the prestigious WAGS (Washington Area Girls' Soccer) title in 1987 when it defeated North Carolina in a shootout (4-3).

The 2000 season was a memorable one for Daly, as he achieved his 200th career victory with an exciting, 1-0 overtime win against Richmond. Daly added another honor to his resume later in the season when he was named the 1999-2000 William and Mary Society of the Alumni Coach of the Year.

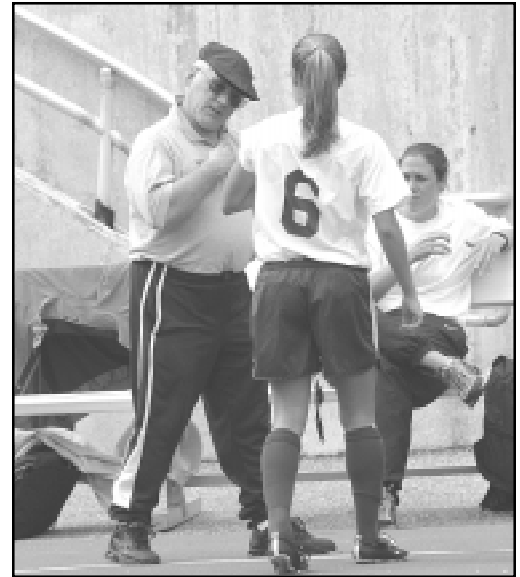
A key figure in the W&M soccer scene long before taking over as head women's coach in 1987, Daly was an assistant coach of the then-women's club team back in 1979, and also assisted with the men's program. In 1986, he was a full-time assistant before ascending to his present position.

Active at many levels of soccer, Daly served as assistant coach of the Region I (East) team that traveled to Holland and Italy in March 1989. In addition, he is a Region I Olympic Development coach with the United States Youth Soccer Association and has coached the Virginia under-19 girls' soccer team. Currently, Daly is the head coach of the Region I under-16 team, and served as an assistant coach for the under-17 team in 2001 and 2002.

In April of 2000, Daly recited the Oath of Allegiance, becoming a United States citizen after residing in America for the last 20 years since moving from his native London, England, where he was born to Irish parents. He enjoys his annual return visits to London and the southwest of Ireland.

An avid golfer, he also enjoys the performing arts, Irish traditional music, travel and anything to do with William and Mary.

He cites the naming of the new Albert-Daly soccer field in his and men's coach Al Albert's honor as the ultimate accolade in a storied coaching career.



Assistant Coach Lydia Bienias



Lydia Bienias begins her first season as an assistant coach at William and Mary after a stellar playing career and successful coaching stints at the scholastic and collegiate levels.

Bienias joins the Tribe after serving as an assistant coach at Farleigh Dickinson University, in Teaneck, New Jersey, for the past two seasons. At FDU, she was responsible for scouting, recruiting and goalkeeper training as the team reached its first ever Northeast Conference Tournament in 2002, and won the 2003 ECAC Championship.

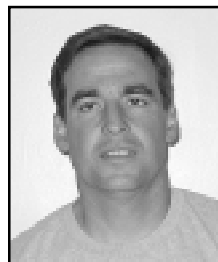
Prior to her stint at Farleigh Dickinson, Bienias served as the head women's coach at Dreher High School, located in Columbia, South Carolina, where she guided the Blue Devils to the 2002 State Championship, the first in the program's history.

As a player, the Gig Harbor, Washington native was a four-year starter as a defender at the University of South Carolina, where she was a two-time captain. As a freshman in 1998, Bienias was named an All-American by Soccer Buzz, as well as first-team All-Region and second-team All-SEC. Prior to her senior year at South Carolina, Bienias played for the Boston Renegades of the W-League, guiding the team to the 2001 championship.

Bienias graduated Cum Laude from South Carolina in 2002 with a double major in marketing and management. An outstanding student, she was named to the Dean's List and the SEC Academic Honor Roll three times each. She earned a master's degree in Business Administration from Farleigh Dickinson last May.

She holds Goalkeeper Level I and II Licenses and an NSCAA "D" Coaching License.

Assistant Coach Kevin Denson



A highly successful boys' high school coach in the state of Virginia, Kevin Denson begins his fourth season with the William and Mary women's program, bringing a wealth of coaching experience from a number of soccer affiliations.

Denson currently serves as the Kempsville (VA) High School boys' soccer head coach, where he has led the school to five state championships since the program's initial season in 1985. In addition to those championships, Kempsville earned a national number one ranking in 1992 and 1997.

Denson also served as the USYSA Region I Girls ODP Head Coach, Director of Player Development for the Beach FC Travel team, and has been a member of the Virginia Youth Soccer coaching staff since 1989.

In addition, Denson was the Virginia Wesleyan College women's coach from 1985 through 1987.

Denson is an eight-time Coach of the Year recipient including NSCAA National Coach of the Year in 1997.

Denson is a graduate of Virginia Wesleyan College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in recreation and leisure studies.

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Director of Athletics Terry Driscoll



With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his eighth year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize

excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$6 million in facilities, including the new Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 70 CAA Championships coming into the 2003-04 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 28, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 24, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.

Senior Executive Associate Athletics Director Barbara Blosser



After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior executive associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIWA crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIWA runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and

Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASW Small College title.

A former three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978. In 1993, she was selected as a member of the first class of women inducted to the Ohio State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

The current chancellor of the College is former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, and he took over the post from former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks 15th among the best regional business schools.

William and Mary Athletics

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

Athletic Excellence

The 2003-04 season was one of the best in W&M history, as the Tribe captured six CAA titles to push its total to a dominant 76, 26 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Tournaments, highlighted by Ramon Jackson's national championship on the parallel bars. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Tournament each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top-100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. Punctuating this run is the College's 58th-place ranking for the 2002-03 campaign, marking the eighth time in the last 10 years that the Tribe finished in the top-four in Virginia and first or second in the Colonial Athletic Association.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities. 83% of all athletes earn a degree while a formidable 36 athletes have been selected Academic All-America since 1992.

In 2002-03 the CAA began a Scholar-Athlete of the Year award for each of the league's 21 sports. Not surprisingly, W&M set the pace with five athletes winning the honor, more than any other school. The College continued to set the standard in 2003-04 with another five athletes claiming the honor: Ali Henderson (women's cross country), Adam Otstot (men's cross country), Adam Hess (men's basketball), Chris Parsons (men's track and field) and Ann Schnell (women's golf).



The 2003 women's soccer team captured its ninth CAA Championship in 11 years after defeating Virginia Commonwealth 2-0 in Hempstead, NY.

Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.

Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.
