W&M Earns School-Record Winning Percentage

With an impressive 16-1-4 record in 2006, the William and Mary women's soccer team registered a school-record .857 winning percentage. The team's lone loss came at then-No. 16 Auburn, 2-1, in double overtime. En route to posting the incredible mark, W&M finished the season on a school-record 17-match unbeaten streak.

Tribe Earns NCAA Tournament Bid

After an outstanding regular season, the College earned a NCAA Tournament at-large bid in 2006. It marked the 21st time the Tribe has competed in the tournament, which ranks behind only North Carolina and Connecticut in all-time appearances.

W&M Wins CAA Regular-Season Title

With 10-0-1 record in conference play, the Tribe claimed the 2006 CAA regular-season title. The team's lone tie was a 2-2 decision against Northeastern on Oct. 1. In addition to posting the impressive record, W&M outscored its conference foes by an average of 2.6 to 0.8 while recording six shutouts.

Tribe No. 8 in Final RPI Rankings

On the strength of its 16-1-4 overall record and a 17-match unbeaten streak, the Green and Gold were eighth in the final RPI rankings released by the NCAA. Additionally, the Tribe ranked among the nation's best according to a number of other organizations: *Soccer Buzz*, 13th; *Top Drawer Soccer*, 20th; *Soccer Times*, T-25th.

Zimmeck Honored as an All-American

Claire Zimmeck became the 12th William and Mary player to earn All-America status when *Soccer Buzz* selected her as a fourth-team honoree. The Fairfax, Va., native ranked 15th nationally in goals per match (0.74) and 18th in points per match (1.68).

Young Named an Academic All-American

Having excelled both on the pitch and in the classroom, senior defender

Anna Young was selected to the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America Third Team. With the honor, Young became the seventh Tribe player to earn Academic All-America accolades since 1988.

All-CAA Honorees

William and Mary was well represented at the CAA Awards Banquet, as six players and Head Coach John Daly were honored by the conference. After her stellar season, Claire Zimmeck was chosen as the Player of the Year, while Daly was named the Co-Head Coach of the Year. Danielle Collins was also tabbed to the All-CAA First Team, while Katie Hogwood, Anna Young and Meghan Walker were named second-team all-conference. Krissy Vornadore was chosen to the CAA All-Rookie Team.

Daly Honored by the NSCAA

In addition to earning CAA Coach of the Year accolades, Daly was selected as the Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year by the NSCAA. The honor marked the fifth time during his 20-year career that he has garnered the award, previously earning the distinction in 1997, 1992, 1990 and 1989.

All-Region Honorees

The Tribe had a number of players selected to all-region teams by the NSCAA and *Soccer Buzz*. Claire Zimmeck was a first-team honoree by both organizations, while Danielle Collins was named to the first team by the NSCAA and the second team by *Soccer Buzz*. Katie Hog-

wood was a tabbed to the *Soccer Buzz* second team, while Krissy Vornadore made its All-Freshman Team.

VaSID All-State Honorees

As was the case with the conference awards, six W&M players were named to VaSID all-state teams while Head Coach John Daly was selected as the Coach of the Year. Claire Zimmeck earned Player of the Year honors, as Danielle Collins and Meghan Walker joined her on the all-state first team. Donna Mataya, Anna Young and Abby Lauer were second-team honorees.

Collins Joins U.S. U-21 National Team

During the off-season, Danielle Collins joined the U.S. U-21 Women's National Team for a pair of events. In February, she joined 23 of the nation's top players at the national team training camp in Carson, Calif. As part of the week-long event, the team competed against the U.S. National team twice. In April, she joined the team again when she was invited to compete in the 2007 Futbol Internacional Tournament.

Walker Posts 10 Shutouts

While it was just her first season as the College's primary goalkeeper, Meghan Walker played like a seasoned veteran in 2006. Her goals against average of 0.68 led the conference, while her 10 shutouts were tops in the CAA and rank second on W&M's single-season list.
