# The College of

# William & Mary

The first honorary degree from the College, a Master of Arts, was conferred upon Benjamin Franklin on April 2, 1756.

Chartered in 1693, the College was founded nearly four decades before Georgia, the last of the original 13 American colonies, was chartered by King George II in 1732.

## Facts About The College

- W&M was founded in 1693 and is the second-oldest educational institution in the United States.
- W&M was the highest ranked small public university in the country according to U.S. News and World Report.
- W&M ranked 16th in graduation rates for national universities.
- W&M was given the highest rating of academics, five stars, by the Fiske Guide to Colleges.
- W&M has a student/faculty ratio of 12/1.
- More W&M graduates go on to earn doctorates than any other university in Virginia.
- W&M students founded Phi Beta Kappa, the premier academic honor society in American, in 1776.
- In the inaugural NCAA Academic Progress Report, W&M boasted the fourth-best APR score (992) among 328 active and provisional institutions, and W&M leads all programs that offer performance-based grants and financial aid to scholar-athletes.

The Sunken Gardens' design was based on the gardens behind Chelsea Hospital in London, England. During the Revolutionary War, Patrick Henry selected the site as a place for the encampment of militia destined to join Washington's Continental Army in the North and later served as a bivouac area for many soldiers preparing to fight the British at Yorktown.

The "F.H.C." society was formed at the College on November 11, 1750. This was the first student secret society in America and the forerunner of the American fraternity system.

When the capitol of Virginia was moved from Jamestown to Williamsburg in 1699, the Wren Building served as temporary headquarters of the colonial government from 1700 until 1704.

Constructed between 1695 and 1699, the Wren Building is the oldest academic building in the United States. The building was originally designed to be the whole college, including a dining hall, dorm rooms and classrooms.

The Crim Dell was a gift from the class of 1964 to preserve the natural beauty of the area and is a memorial to John W.H. Crim, a nationally known attorney who was a benefactor to the College of William and Mary.

# Season Outlook

William and Mary continued its standard of excellence in women's tennis last season, with accomplishments that can only be dreamed of by most of the programs in the nation. For the 18th time in the last 21 seasons, the Tribe won the Colonial Athletic Association championship. For the 10th time in the last 11 seasons, the Green and Gold advanced to the NCAA Tournament, reaching the second round for the eighth time in the last 11 campaigns. The College ended the season ranked 20th in the nation and was as high as sixth in the country after a 10-1 start to the season—the program's best in 25 years. Included in that run was a 4-3 road win over No. 5 Duke—the team's first win over a top five team in over five years—along with victories over No. 14 Tulane and No. 16 Clemson. A W&M doubles team earned All-America honors, and a Tribe player was selected CAA Player of the Year and CAA Tournament MVP, all for the second straight season, while W&M's coach was picked as the CAA Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive year.

All this in spite of a second straight year of frustrating injuries that kept the team from reaching its full potential, leaving both coaches and players unsatisfied and looking for greater success in 2006.

The stage appears to be set for that to happen, with the Green and Gold returning a solid corps of four upperclassmen that includes the two highest ranked players on the team from last season. They will combine with an outstanding five-player freshman class, who have each been ranked among their nation's top 25 juniors.

"We are very excited about the 2005-06 season," said head coach **Kevin Epley**, who has

earned four straight conference coach of the year trophies. "I am confident that the five freshmen will quickly respond to the leadership of the four returning players and will maintain the Tribe's reputation as a national powerhouse. This will be an exciting year, and with two All-Americans leading the charge, we shouldn't miss a beat, despite the big transition."

## Returning Players

One of those returning All-Americans is senior **Megan Muth**, who reached the quarterfinals in doubles at the 2004 NCAA Tournament and has been a first team all-conference pick in both singles and doubles all three years of her career. Muth fought through a chronic back injury all of last season, yet still posted 25 singles and 26 doubles victories. She began the fall by reaching the singles finals of the W&M and Kentucky invitational, two of the top college tournaments in the nation. The 2003 CAA and ITA East Region Rookie of the Year and 2004 CAA Co-Player of the Year, she also has both a singles and doubles ITA regional title already in her possession and is prepared to make her senior season the best of her career.

W&M's other senior is **Lingda Yang**, the Tribe's most improved player in 2005 who has proven to be a dependable performer in clutch situations for the Green and Gold. She turned the corner midway through the spring season, coming back from a 4-0 first-set deficit to win 12 of the next 15 games, gutting out a straight-set singles win that clinched the Tribe's road victory over 30th-ranked UNLV. That win began a streak in which Yang won seven of eight singles matches. It wasn't long before she proved herself again in a big situation, this time bouncing back from dropping the first set to win her singles match and clinch the Tribe's come-from-behind victory in the CAA championship match.

Junior walk-on **Alexandra de Guzman** recorded five singles wins and eight doubles victories in limited action last season, but is another player who has made steady progress during her career. She posted a 7-4 doubles record in the fall, finishing second and third, respectively, in her flights at the Hampton Roads and W&M Invitational. She recorded three singles wins in the spring, including a dramatic three-set comeback win that completed the team's 6-1 upset over No. 16 Clemson in the regular season.

Rounding out the list of returning players is junior **Megan Moulton-Levy**, who had one of the finest rookie seasons in school history last year. An All-American in doubles after reaching the doubles quarterfinals at the NCAA Championships, she was also selected to compete in

the singles tournament. Moulton-Levy quickly burst onto the college tennis season with her first collegiate singles match, defeating the nation's 19th-ranked player, 6-3, 6-1, in the first round of the W&M Invitational. Ending the season ranked 17th in the nation in doubles and 40th in singles, Moulton-Levy had 28 singles wins and 30 doubles victories, with the combined total of 58 putting her just one away from breaking into the top 10 in school history. The first player in W&M history to be named CAA Player of the Year, CAA Tournament MVP and ITA East Region Rookie of the Year in the same season, she also won the regional doubles title in the fall. Moulton-Levy recorded 11 singles wins and seven doubles victories over nationally ranked opponents, incredibly losing just one singles match to an unranked player all season.

## Freshmen

Joining the four returning players are five freshmen who all could break into the lineup and play significant roles for the Tribe this season. **Lauren Cash**, from Allendale, New Jersey finished fourth in singles and won the doubles title at the USTA National Open Tournament in November of 2004 and went 7-2 in singles at the 2004 National Clay Court Tournament. She ended her high school career with a 95-1 record and finished 2004 67th in singles and 57th in doubles in the USTA Girls 18-and-under national rankings.

The team's only player from the state of Virginia, **Emmy Fritz-Krockow** has enjoyed tremendous success on the United States junior circuit. Ranked as high as 156th in the ITF World Junior combined rankings, she ended 2004 25th in singles and 83rd in doubles in the USTA Girls 18s. She advanced to the quarterfinals in singles

and the finals in doubles at the 2004 Prince Cup, before reaching the round of 16 in singles at the 2005 Easter Bowl. Earlier this year, Fritz-Krockow advanced to the semifinals of doubles tournaments in Colombia and Venezuela, and she finished in the top four in doubles at the Chanda Rubin Classic and the U.S. Junior International Hard Court Championship in 2004.

The first of two foreign-born rookies for the College this season, **Klaudyna Kasztelaniec** comes to Williamsburg from her home in Krakow, Poland. She has been ranked as high as 259th in the ITF World Junior rankings and was the 169th-ranked junior doubles player in the world at one point in her career. Ranked as high as 25th in Europe in the under-16 age group, she has reached at least the quarterfinals of 23 ITF doubles tournaments in her career. Kasztelaniec was the runner-up in doubles at the 2003 Under-21 Poland National Championship and won the doubles title at the ITF Corfu Junior Tournament in Greece in 2004.

From Orland Park, Illinois, **Barbara Zidek** was a member of the nation's eighth-ranked doubles team during her career in juniors, ending 2004 ranked 56th in singles and 15th in doubles in the USTA Girls 18s. That year she had a 3-1 doubles record at the USTA Junior Federation Cup and reached the quarterfinals of the doubles championship at the National Clay Courts.

The Tribe's most heralded recruit is Canadian **Katarina Zoricic**, from Etobicoke, Ontario. Ranked as high as 41st in singles and 32nd in doubles in the ITF World Junior rankings, she has also been as high as 675th in singles and 618th in doubles in the WTA world rankings. Another exceptional doubles player, Zoricic

partnered with current W&M junior Moulton-Levy before she came to Williamsburg. In the spring of 2003, they won the doubles title at the Argentina Bowl, before finishing second at the Banana Bowl in Brazil. In singles, Zoricic reached the quarterfinals of the Banana Bowl and the semifinals of the Argentina Bowl that same year. A member of the second place Canadian Junior Fed Cup team in 2003, she played in all four junior grand slam events in 2003 and 2004, and has competed three times for the Canadian Open Rogers Cup.

## Schedule

In what has now become commonplace for the Tribe, Epley and second-year assistant **Erica Perkins** will lead the team against one of the toughest schedules in the nation, pitting the Green and Gold against some of the country's other top teams.

The College opens the fall individual season by hosting the 13th Annual W&M Invitational, one of the East Coast's top women's tournaments every year. Next up is the Cissie Leary Invitational in Philadelphia, to be followed by the first of three college grand slam events, the ITA All-American Championships. The Tribe will play another local tournament in Newport News, before ending the fall with the ITA East Region Championship and the ITA National Indoor Championship.

In the spring W&M is scheduled to face 13 teams that competed in the 2005 NCAA Tournament. Eighteen of the 23 regular season opponents ended the season in the national rankings, including nine teams that joined the Tribe in the

top 25. The Green and Gold open the season at Georgia, before returning to Williamsburg for five straight home matches, ending with a contest against Illinois. Four of the next five matches are against ACC opponents, including a home contest against Duke and road trips to Virginia, Maryland and 2005 NCAA Tournament semi-finalist Clemson. After trips to Florida and Las Vegas the last two years, this season the team will fly to California for spring break. The College will play three matches there, taking on Fresno State, California and two-time defending national champion Stanford.

Even though the Tribe returns home for its next four matches, its task will not get easier, as the team's first four outdoor home matches will be against opponents that ended last season ranked 26th or better in the nation. First up is a meeting with Texas, another 2005 NCAA Final Four participant, followed by back-to-back-to-back matches against Texas Christian, Wake Forest and Harvard. W&M hits the road again for one last time in the regular season, with matches against Marshall, Tulane and local rival Old Dominion, before ending up at home against Rice and Virginia Commonwealth.

W&M will look to continue its dominance of the CAA at the conference tournament in nearby Newport News in late April, where the Tribe will be aiming for its third straight league title and 19th overall. The first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament will be hosted by 16 schools around the nation in the middle of May, with the remainder of the team tournament and the entirety of the individual championships to be hosted by Stanford.

# Head Coach Kevin Epley



## Kevin Epley Head Coach (Third season) Southern Methodist (1996)

The 2004 and 2005 Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year, Kevin Epley is in his third season as the head coach at William and Mary. With a career record of 95-38 (.714), Epley came to Williamsburg from Fresno State, where he coached women's tennis for three years.

Despite a variety of injuries that have plagued the Tribe for the last two seasons, Epley has been named the conference coach of the year and led W&M to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in both of his years in Williamsburg. The Tribe ended 2005 ranked 20th in the nation after reaching a high of No. 6 during the season, the program's best ranking in nearly eight years. W&M posted three wins over top 25 opponents, including a road upset over No. 5 Duke for the school's first win over a top five team in more than six years.

Epley has also led W&M to a multitude of individual honors in just two seasons at the College. For the second straight year he coached a doubles team to the ITA East Region championship and the quarterfinals of the NCAA Indi-

vidual Championships, with Candice Fuchs and Megan Moulton-Levy accomplishing the feat in 2005, after Megan Muth and Amy Wei did the same thing a year earlier. Also for the second year in a row, a W&M player earned CAA Player of the Year honors, with Moulton-Levy getting the nod last season, along with her selection as ITA East Region Rookie of the Year and CAA Tournament MVP. Muth was named the CAA Co-Player of the Year and the ITA East Region Player to Watch as a sophomore in 2004, just missing All-America honors in singles after advancing to the second round of the NCAAs. Four singles players and three doubles teams earned first or second team all-league accolades in 2005, as the Tribe claimed its league-record 18th CAA championship.

While at Fresno State, Epley led the team to the second round of the NCAA Tournament and a final national ranking of 25th or better each year, including a program-high eighth during the 2001 season. The Bulldogs won the Western Athletic Conference championship and Epley was named the WAC Coach of the Year in both 2003 and 2002. There, he coached eight All-Americans, two WAC Players of the Year and a WAC Freshman of the Year. His teams achieved a combined grade point average of 3.6 or higher each year at Fresno State.

Prior to his time at Fresno State, Epley was an assistant coach at the University of Arizona for the 1999-2000 season, helping the Wildcats to a No. 24 final national ranking and a trip to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. He was also an assistant coach at the University of Alabama for the 1998-99 campaign.

Epley has significant experience in coaching some of America's top professional players, including working with legendary Billie Jean King as an assistant coach for the 2000 United States Olympic Women's Tennis Team, helping the U.S. win a gold and bronze medal in singles

and another gold medal in doubles. In the summer of 2001, he was the head coach of the Saint Louis Aces of the World Team Tennis pro league, which included players such as Andy Roddick, Rick Leach, Lindsay Davenport and Jared Palmer. Epley served as an assistant coach on the U.S. Women's Tennis Federation Cup Team from 1996-2002 and also was a personal coach for Davenport and Patty Schnyder.

Epley grew up in the Baltimore area and graduated from Southern Methodist University in 1996 with a degree in finance. He was the team's No. 1 player and captain, and was twice selected to the Commissioner's Honor Roll for Academic and Athletic Excellence.

# Assistant Coach Erica Perkins

Now entering her second season at W&M, assistant coach Erica Perkins brings an impressive array of playing and coaching accomplishments to the College. The head women's tennis coach at Georgia Southern for the two seasons before coming to W&M, she was a standout player at Washington State, where she advanced to the NCAA Individual Tournament three times and is the school's all-time leader in career singles victories.

In her two years at GSU, Perkins led the team to an overall record of 22-21, including a Southern Conference Tournament semifinal appearance in 2003. She coached the conference's freshman of the year and sportsmanship award winner in 2004,

and had four players named ITA Scholar-Athletes. In both years, her teams earned ITA All-Academic team honors, with cumulative grade point averages of over 3.5, the highest for any GSU women's team in each season.

While at WSU, Perkins helped lead her team to the NCAA Tournament four times, while earning spots in the NCAA Individual Tournament in singles three times (1999, 2001 and 2002) and doubles in 2002. A three-time Pacific 10 second team selection, she was nationally ranked as high as 34th in singles and 11th in doubles during her career. The school record-holder with 87 career singles victories, Perkins is the only player in school history to compete in four NCAA Team Tournaments, the only player to compete in the prestigious ITA National Indoor Championships and the only individual to participate in the NCAA Singles Championship. She was selected as a first team CoSIDA Academic All-American in 2002 and earned ITA Scholar-Athlete honors three times.

An outstanding player at University Prep High School in Seattle, Perkins was named her high school's athlete of the year all four years and was a four-time Washington State A/B champion.

Perkins graduated with honors from Washington State in 2001 with a degree in history and a minor in French, before

# 2004-05 Season Review

## William and Mary Wins League Record 18th CAA Championship

Once again, the Tribe established its dominance in the Colonial Athletic Association in 2005, winning the conference championship for the 18th time ... No other CAA school has ever won as many titles in any one sport ... W&M has won 18 of the 21 CAA titles awarded, finishing second the other three seasons ... Since the conference began sponsoring women's tennis in the 1984-85 season, the Tribe has a record of 103-3 (.972) in all dual matches (including postseason) against CAA opponents ... Of teams that have been in the CAA for more than four seasons, W&M's women's tennis team is the only one in conference history to have never lost a home contest to another CAA opponent ... The Tribe men also won the league championship in 2005, just the fourth time that the same school won both titles, and the third time that W&M had accomplished the feat.

## Fuchs and Moulton-Levy Earn All-America Honors

For the second time in the last two seasons, a Tribe doubles team earned All-America honors by advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship ... Current junior **Megan Moulton-Levy** and then senior **Candice Fuchs** won their first and second round matches at the tournament in straight sets, including a come-from-behind victory over the nation's 15th-ranked doubles team in the round of 16 ... Fuchs and Moulton-Levy ended the season ranked 17th in the nation ... In 2004, current senior **Megan Muth** and 2005 graduate **Amy Wei** also won two matches at the national championship, including a win over the No. 1 team in the nation, to earn All-America status.

## Tribe Advances to 14th NCAA Tournament

For the 14th time in school history and the 10th time in the last 11 seasons W&M advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 2005 ... The Tribe won a match in the national postseason for the ninth time, defeating No. 34 Wisconsin, 4-1, in the first round, before falling to eventual semifinalist Clemson, ranked 11th at the time, in the second.

## W&M Individuals Sweep League's Top Honors

For the second straight season, and the seventh time overall, W&M took home the CAA's player and coach of the year honors ... **Kevin Epley** was named coach of the year for the second time in his two seasons at W&M, while **Megan Moulton-Levy** was named player of the year in her first season of college competition ... Moulton-Levy was also named the CAA Tournament MVP and the ITA East Region Rookie of the Year, the first W&M player to earn all three awards in the same season.

## W&M Earns Highest National Ranking in Eight Years

The Tribe was sixth in the ITA National Rankings on March 15 of 2005, the highest ranking for W&M since the Green and Gold was fourth in the nation on March 18, 1997 ... The ranking came 13 days after the College earned its first win over a top five team in more than five years ... W&M defeated No. 5 Duke, 4-3, on the road on March 2 ... The Tribe ended the season ranked 20th in the nation.

## Two Tribe Players Reach the Century Mark in Wins

Last season 2005 graduate **Amy Wei** became just the fourth player in W&M history to compile 100 career doubles victories, while classmate **Lena Sherbakov** became the seventh Tribe player to win 100 singles matches in her career ... Wei ended her career with 103 doubles victories, third in school history ... Sherbakov finished her career seventh in W&M history with 102 singles wins.

## Candice Fuchs Named W&M Senior Female Athlete of the Year

**Candice Fuchs** was named the 2005 W&M Senior Female Athlete of the Year by the Tribe Club, the athletics department's fundraising arm ... A six-time first team All-CAA selection, Fuchs ended the season ranked 11th in the nation in doubles with current junior **Megan Moulton-Levy** ... In addition to earning All-America honors by reaching the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Tournament, the pair won the ITA East Region doubles title in the fall and ended the season as the region's top ranked doubles team.

# NCAA Postseason History

William and Mary's rise to national prominence is due, at least in part, to the team's success at the NCAA Championships. Although the College had previously placed athletes in the NCAA Tournament as individuals or doubles teams, William and Mary first reached the NAAs as a team in 1989. In the spring of 1992 the Tribe achieved its first victory at the NCAA Tournament, defeating 15th-ranked University of Miami in the first round.

Last season, W&M advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 10th time in the last 11 years and the 14th time in school history. The Tribe defeated No. 34 Wisconsin in the first round at Clemson, before falling to the 11th-ranked and eventual NCAA semifinalist Tigers in the second round.

In the spring of 1997 the Tribe earned its first victory in the round of 16. The Green and Gold posted a 5-0 victory over fifth-ranked Georgia to earn a trip to the quarterfinals for the first time in school history. In 1998, the Tribe again advanced to the quarterfinals earning a 5-3 victory over sixth-ranked California in the round of 16.

Although William and Mary can boast of team accomplishments at the NCAA Championships, numerous individuals and doubles teams have also had success at the NAAs. The first individual to represent the Tribe was Namratha Appa-Roa, who qualified in the singles draw in 1986. During the past 18 years, W&M has placed a member of the team in the singles draw of the NAAs 24 times, while 16 teams qualified

for the doubles championship.

Current junior Megan Moulton-Levy and then-senior Candice Fuchs competed in the NCAA Doubles Tournament last season, with Moulton-Levy also earning a berth in the singles tournament. The duo reached the quarterfinals of the event and earned All-American honors. It was the second straight year that a W&M doubles team reached the quarterfinals, as current senior Megan Muth and 2005 graduate Amy Wei also accomplished the feat in 2004.

The Tribe saw its first NCAA All-American in 1991 when Kristine Kurth advanced to the second round. Julie Shiflet would pick up the honor in 1992 when she reached the round of 16. Karen van der Merwe earned two of her three All-America honors in 1992 when she advanced to the round of 16 on the singles side and teamed with Michele Mair to reach the round of 16 on the doubles side. She added her third honor in doubles in 1993 when she teamed with Katrin Guenther to reach the quarterfinals. Guenther would add another All-America honor in 1995 when she teamed with Lauren Nikolaus to reach the quarterfinals at the NAAs. Nikolaus would add a whopping five more All-America honors to the Tribe's trophy case, as she captured the award in singles in 1996, 1997 and 1998 and in doubles with Johanna Sones in 1997 and Michelle O in 1998.

In all, 12 different athletes have captured 21 All-America honors for William and Mary, while 27 different athletes have represented the team in 40 events at the NAAs in either singles or doubles since 1986.

The Hall of Fame aspires to preserve the history and further the development of women's intercollegiate tennis through the collection of printed materials, trophies, photographs, equipment and other significant items.

Each year, the Hall of Fame enshrines exceptional players, coaches and contributors in women's intercollegiate tennis. The ITA Hall of Fame Committee selects inductees from the following categories:

- Outstanding collegiate players
- Players who attended college and had a significant impact on women's tennis
- Outstanding collegiate coaches
- Individuals or corporations playing a major role in the development of women's intercollegiate tennis



Millie West serves as the curator of the ITA Women's Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame. An integral part of William and Mary athletics for more than 40 years, she is currently Director of Special Projects for W&M, after retiring in 1991 as the College's Associate Athletics Director. West also served as Women's Athletics Director and coached both tennis and swimming in her tenure.

A highly successful fundraiser, she has been a key in the success of the four BASF Wightman Cup tennis tournaments held at the College, as well as the annual Joseph J. Plumeri/W&M Pro-Am golf tournament which has reaped great benefits for the Tribe. West coordinated W&M's Indoor Tennis Center Project, which brought the state-of-the-art McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center to the Williamsburg campus. She was inducted into the ITA Women's Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame in 1998, and has also been selected to the William and Mary and Mid-Atlantic Tennis Hall of Fame.

A 1957 graduate of Georgia College, West received that school's Alumni Achievement Award. She serves on executive committees for the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame and Williamsburg Community Health Foundation and is a member of the Old Point National Bank Advisory Board.

## Gene R. Nichol President

Gene Nichol became the College of William and Mary's 26th president on July 1, 2005. A scholar of constitutional and civil rights law, Nichol taught at the William and Mary School of Law from 1985 to 1988 and has served as dean at both the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Law and the law school

### Quoting President Gene Nichol

The College of William and Mary has struggled, endured and prospered, becoming a central part of our culture, because, at heart, it touches the deepest concerns of the human spirit. The need to examine, to explore, to probe, to question, to contribute. The challenge to understand—and to share the fruits of that understanding with our fellows. The powerful, unquenched belief in excellence, in the call to a better future, in the opened door, the extended hand, the brightened lamp. A recurring sense of both blessing and obligation; a belief in the marriage of knowledge and virtue; a determination to become, in Madison's words, beneficiary and benefactor of the commonwealth.

And, this College, distinct, perhaps, from the nation's other great public universities, is committed to pressing these values in the context of a small, life-changing liberal arts experience. Where academic rigor can actually apply as an overarching norm; where an ennobling faculty-student engagement is the hallmark of the institution; and where the most important questions of human existence are repeatedly presented center stage. Insisting that, in a viable democracy, the most powerful and uplifting structures of higher education cannot be relegated to the private sphere.

That is our legacy. It is our challenge as well.

at the University of Colorado. While at William and Mary, Nichol was the Cutler Professor of Law and director of the Institute of Bill of Rights Law. He has also taught at Oxford, Exeter, and the law school of West Virginia University.

Nichol is the co-author of the text *Federal Courts* and has published articles on civil liberties and federal judicial power in a wide variety of journals, including the *Harvard Law Review*, *Yale Law Review*, and the *University of Chicago Law Review*. He contributed articles on civil rights and public law litigation to the *Encyclopedia of the American Constitution*, and one on the civil rights movement to the *Oxford Companion to the United States Supreme Court*. Over the course of his career, Nichol has testified on constitutional matters before committees of the U.S. Congress and various state legislatures. In 2003, he won the American Bar Association's Edward R. Finch Award for delivering the nation's best Law Day Address. He was elected to membership in the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation Fellows.

Nichol attended Oklahoma State University, where he received a degree in philosophy and played quarterback on the varsity football team. In 1976, he graduated from the University of Texas Law School, where he was named to the Order of the Coif.

He is married to Glenn George, and they have three daughters: Jesse, Jenny, and Soren. George, a scholar of labor law and civil procedure, received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina and graduated cum laude from Harvard Law School.

# Athletics Administration



**Terry Driscoll**  
Director of Athletics

With an extensive resumé that includes four years as a student-athlete, a professional playing career and numerous jobs in the athletic business world, Edward C. "Terry" Driscoll is entering his 10th year as the athletics director at the College of William and Mary.

Driscoll's tenure has seen a wealth of improvements across the board in the W&M athletics department, from new facilities to increased fundraising for the Tribe. In addition, the Tribe has reached all-time highs in the annual Director's Cup rankings that summarize excellence in all sports.

Upon the death of legendary Tribe athletics director John Randolph, W&M president Timothy J. Sullivan chose Driscoll to be the new leader of the department, saying "Terry brings outstanding management and leadership skills to the position."

Since Driscoll took over as athletics director, he has overseen the construction of more than \$16 million in facilities, including Plumeri Park (baseball), Albert-Daly Field (soccer, lacrosse) and the Busch Courts (tennis). Driscoll has also increased the annual fundraising totals for non-capital projects from \$1.36 million in 1995 to around \$2.7 million currently. He also has served on numerous conference and NCAA committees, including a stint as president of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

The Tribe has also had outstanding success across the board since Driscoll came to Williamsburg. In 2002-03, W&M had a school-record 10 teams compete in the NCAA Tournament. Four teams won conference titles, while six were in the top 25 at the end of their respective seasons. One of the department's goals each year is to finish in the top 100 in the annual Director's Cup rankings, and that has happened in all but one of the years that Driscoll has been the AD, with a high ranking of 42 occurring in 1997. In addition, W&M had captured 81 CAA Championships coming into the 2005-06 school year, by far the highest total among all conference schools.

Driscoll's leadership skills were developed in his collegiate years. As a student-athlete at Boston College, Driscoll captained the basketball team to the National Invitation Tournament championship game as a senior, and was named the tournament MVP. In addition to being named an All-American, his success in the classroom with a major in biology garnered him an Academic All-America honor.

After graduating from BC, he was the fourth pick of the NBA Draft, selected by the Detroit Pistons, just three picks after the Milwaukee Bucks

chose UCLA's Lew Alcindor, later to be known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Driscoll chose to play a year in Italy first, but then returned to the U.S. to play for the Pistons, Washington Bullets and Milwaukee Bucks before going back to Italy as a player and coach until 1980.

Driscoll then entered the corporate world in 1980, working for Kazmaier Associates, Inc., an international sporting goods sales and sports marketing firm. After Kazmaier purchased Bike Athletic in 1986, KSG Inc. was formed with the objective of becoming the first, and only, national sales agency in the sporting goods industry. By 1987, Driscoll was president of the company and had expanded the agency to all 50 states just two years later. In early 1990, Driscoll's contribution to a marketing research project for the NCAA was the initial step moving him from product marketing and sales to sports marketing and management. The result of the project was a joint venture between Kazmaier Associates and Host Communication - with Driscoll being named managing director and chief operating officer of NCAA International.

In 1993, Driscoll diversified his experience in the athletic world by working as the executive director of the 1994 World Cup site in Boston. In September of that year, Driscoll was again enlisted to launch a new business, Eagle International Group, an event management and services company. As vice president, Driscoll worked with Hawaii Pacific Sports as well as organizing the Women's World Volleyball Grand Prix, a five-week competition in Honolulu.

Driscoll resides in Williamsburg with his wife, Susan. The couple has two children - Keith, 29, a 1997 graduate of Holy Cross and Leslie, 25, a 2001 graduate of William and Mary.



**Barbara Blosser**  
Senior Executive Associate Athletics Director

After serving 12 years as the College's associate athletics director, Barbara Blosser was promoted to her current position of senior associate athletic director in April of 2004. Blosser started her career at William and Mary as the head women's basketball

coach in 1978 and guided the Tribe to a VAIAW crown in her first season with a school-record 16 wins (16-13). Her 1980 Tribe team (11-14) placed third, while the 1981 squad (16-16) was VAIAW runner-up. She was also at the helm during the 1984-85 season when William and Mary made the jump to NCAA Division I. Overall, she finished her coaching career with 115 wins, 84 of which came at William and Mary.

When the College's men's and women's athletic programs merged in May of 1986, she moved to administration, first serving as the Assistant to the Associate Athletics Director. Over the past 16 years, her administrative responsibilities at W&M have included the monitoring of financial aid matters, coordinating the scheduling of athletic facilities, supervision of coaches and staff and, currently, serving as the person primarily responsible for administering the day-to-day operations of the department.

From October 1992 to June 1993 and August 1995 to July 1996, Blosser also served as acting

athletics director in an interim capacity. For her efforts, she was named the first recipient of the John Randolph Inspiration Award. Blosser has served on various committees such as the NCAA Strategic Planning Committee and the Colonial Athletic Association Competition Committee.

Blosser began her coaching career at the helm of the women's basketball program at Ashland College in Ohio. During two seasons there, she led the Eagles to successive 15-7 and 16-8 ledgers. Her 1977 squad won the AIAW Region V Championship, while her 1978 team took the OASW Small College title.

A three-sport standout at Ohio State, Blosser graduated Cum Laude in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education. At OSU, she was selected to both Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She competed in basketball, field hockey and tennis and captained both the basketball and field hockey squads her senior year. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro in 1978.

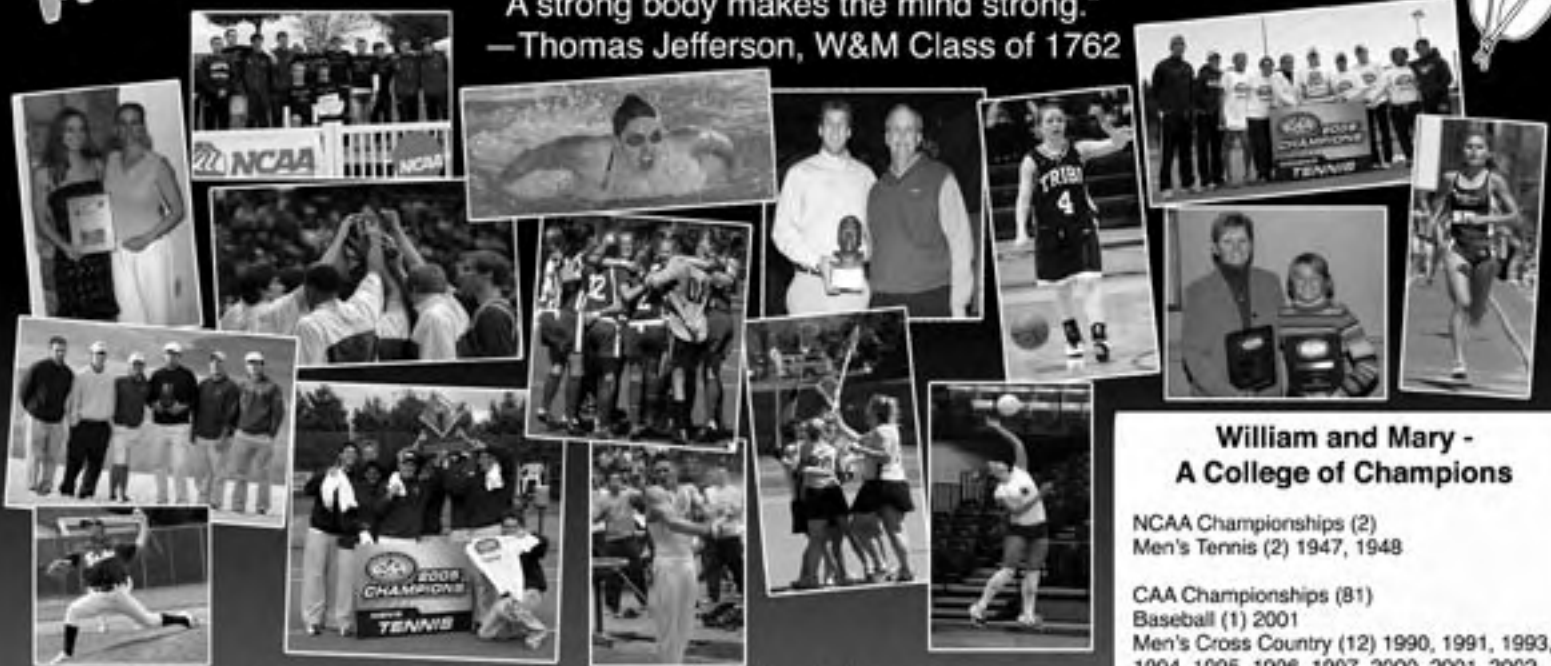

Few colleges in America can boast of the combination of athletic and academic excellence that is found at the College of William and Mary. Each year, more than 500 Tribe student-athletes, competing on 23 Division I teams, prove that it is possible to simultaneously excel at the highest levels of athletics and academics.

## Athletic Excellence

The 2004-05 season was another outstanding year for W&M athletics, as the Tribe added five CAA titles to push its conference-leading total to 81, 30 more than the next closest competitor. Seven teams competed in their respective NCAA Championships, highlighted by the football team's appearance in the I-AA semifinals. It has become typical for W&M to win at least five conference championships and send seven or more teams to the NCAA Championship each season.

Each year the goal of the athletics department is to finish in the top 100 nationally in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings and in recent years W&M has far exceeded that standard. In 2004-2005, the College finished 76th, and was the highest-ranked team in the CAA and was third among all schools in the state of Virginia, making this the ninth time in the 12-year history of the Directors' Cup that the College has finished both in the top four in the state of Virginia and first or second in the CAA.

William and Mary fields Division I teams for both men and women in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. There are also field hockey, lacrosse and volleyball squads for women of the College, while there are two additional sports (baseball and football) for men.

## Academic Success

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its students' academic responsibilities, as W&M has produced 36 Academic All-Americans since 1992.

In the NCAA's inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores for all Division I institutions, William and Mary once again excelled in its mission of fostering true student-athletes. The College boasted the fourth-best APR score (992) among 328 active and provisional institutions, and W&M leads all programs that offer performance-based grants and financial aid to scholar-athletes.

Additionally, W&M had four student-athletes recognized as CAA Scholar-Athletes of the Year in 2004-2005: Pat Comstock (Men's Cross Country), Megan Bishop (Women's Cross Country), Keith Bechtol (Men's Track and Field) and Lena Sherbakov (Women's Tennis).

# STUDENT-ATHLETE SUPPORT

## Goals

We take pride in the many achievements of William and Mary athletes, both in the classroom and on the playing field. These support services and many others are in place to help each student-athlete achieve their goals. It is our hope that at the completion of their undergraduate career they can reflect upon:

1. An academic experience that prepared them for a successful career.
2. An athletic challenge that brought many rewards.
3. A feeling of loyalty and pride in identifying themselves as a varsity athlete with a degree from The College of William and Mary.

## Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and NCAA Division I, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a fulltime Director of Compliance committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor assigned by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

Within the athletic department, the Academic Support Coordinator is a valuable resource for student-athletes serving in a liaison role with the various student service offices throughout the campus community. The College has offices for Volunteer Services, Career Services, a Writing Resource Center and Oral Communication Studio, to name a few.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.



## Sports Psychology

The athletic department has on staff a sports psychologist, who holds a Ph.D. in sports psychology. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance. The sports psychology consultant is considered a member of the Counseling Center and refers individuals to the Center when appropriate.

## Strength, Speed and Conditioning

Tribe athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head and Assistant Strength Coach each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to assure safety at all times.



## Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of a team physician, seven full time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and assure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists. Through a team approach to health care the sports medicine program can offer comprehensive health care services to the student-athletes in a caring and cooperative manner.

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.

William and Mary lost a favorite son on May 16, 2003, with the death of **Mark Hume McCormack**, a 1951 graduate of the College. McCormack had been in coma since January after suffering a heart attack. Named by ESPN as one of the century’s most influential people in the business of sport, he revolutionized the world of sports marketing with the founding of International Management Group (IMG).

A devoted and dedicated supporter of Tribe athletics, he and his wife, Betsy Nagelsen founded W&M’s McCormack-Nagelsen Tennis Center, endowed a tennis scholarship and were continuing sponsors of the ITA Women’s Tennis Hall of Fame. Also a member of W&M’s Board of Visitors, McCormack chaired the College’s fund-raising campaign in 1993 that raised \$153 million and was the honorary chair of the College’s current \$500 million campaign.

“Personally, the area that impressed me most about Mark McCormack was that he always wanted to blend in and not stand out. He came to the tennis center he built for our program and would just want to watch, he wasn’t out to call attention to himself or make himself look impressive. Professionally, he was the W&M men’s tennis program. He donated the money and vision to build the best tennis center in the nation, but he also gave the program much more in terms of his time and interest in its progress and success.”

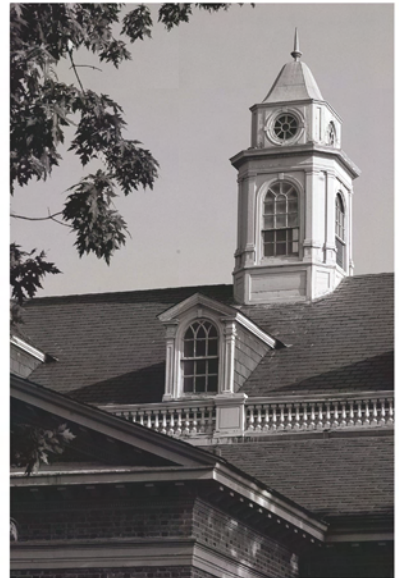
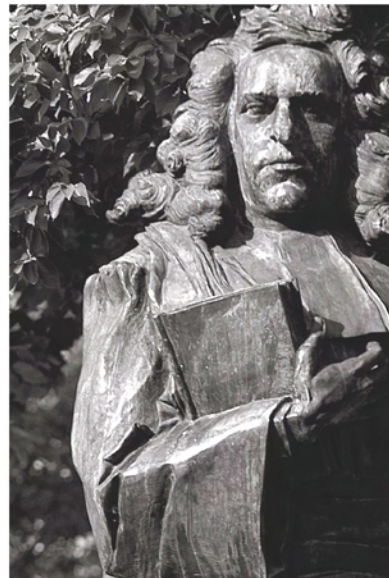
