2006 Season Outlook

The return of the Colonial Athletic Association Rookie of the Year and the Defensive Specialist of the Year, coupled with a talented incoming freshman class, has the 2006 William and Mary Volleyball team looking to build upon the momentum generated from last season's success. In addition to posting an impressive 22-9 record in '05, the squad finished second in the CAA with a 15-3 mark and qualified for the conference tournament for the first time since claiming the championship in 2001. Additionally, the Tribe finished the season on a strong note by winning 15 of the last 17 contests, and head coach Debbie Hill earned CAA Coach of the Year honors for the fifth time in her career.


While only two starters return – sophomore setter **Kim Mount**, the 2005 CAA Rookie of the Year, and senior libero **Kathleen Hawley**, the 2005 CAA Defensive Specialist of the Year – both boast impressive resumes and will be counted on to lead the club this season. Even without a bevy of experienced players, Hill feels her team will be a force within the CAA.

"We had a good spring season," Hill said. "We had an opportunity to see some people do some things that they never had a chance to do. Everyone who started for us this spring really didn't have much experience, with the exception of Kim and Kathleen. We were really pleased with the way we played and the improvement that we made, so we feel like we have some strength returning even though we lost some starters to graduation."

With increased opportunities to get on the court during the spring, most of the younger players showcased their talents.

"I think from what we saw in the spring, we have some people who are ready to step up and carry the load," Hill said. "Sarah Long and Megan McInnes had great springs. We have complete confidence in them and their abilities."

Undoubtedly, the Tribe's biggest strength as the season begins will be the primary ball handlers, Hawley and Mount. Hawley set a school record with 616 digs last season, and Mount shined as a full-

time starter after stepping in for **Natalie King**, who suffered a season-ending knee injury at Northeastern on Sept. 23.

"One of the things we really feel good about going into the season is that we are returning Kim and Kathleen," Hill said. "Those are two really critical positions, and we are going to come in with some stability there, which will help our younger players tremendously."

Those younger players include a fivemember freshman class that has the coaching staff excited. All five have experience playing and starting at a high level.

"Our incoming class has a very high level of experience at the club level for a long time," Hill said. "They are unusually experienced for an incoming class."

Middle Blockers

Perhaps the biggest question mark on the team will come from the middle blocking position, as the Tribe must replace two four-year starters in Caitlin Geraghty and Megan Eisenman, who were both exceptional defensive stoppers at the net, as well as Carly Huffman. Geraghty ended her career with 472 total blocks and holds the school's single-match record with 14 block assists, while Eisenman finished with 325 rejections. Huffman added 322 as the trio combined to block 1,119 balls during their careers. Despite the losses, Hill is confident

that the available players on the roster will pick right back up where they left off last year. It will be a youth movement for the middle blockers, as the group will consist of a junior, a sophomore and a freshman.

McInnes is slated for one of those spots. The junior has appeared in just 15 games during her career and has recorded eight total blocks. Sophomore **Molly Bohman** and freshman **Katie McCarney** will compete for the second spot. Bohman appeared in just three games as a freshman but had a solid spring season, while McCarney comes in with tremendous credentials from the prep and club levels.

Setters

One luxury for the Tribe this season will be the availability of two experienced setters, as Mount will be joined by King, who returns for her senior season after missing much of last year with a knee injury.

Prior to suffering the injury, King was on her way to having a solid season. The Stockton, Calif., native dished out 493 assists and recorded 91 digs in 46 games before her season came to an end.


Fortunately for the Tribe, Mount was more than up for the challenge and ran the offense superbly. The eventual CAA Rookie of the Year earned five CAA Rookie of the Week honors as she posted 938 assists, including a career high of 61 in her first career start, which came at Hofstra one day after King's injury. Enormously talented and extremely athletic, Mount has good hand-eye coordination and a tremendous level of intensity.

King was not cleared to run until late June and missed the entire spring season. She stayed in Williamsburg during the summer, working extremely hard in the rehabilitation program, and is expected to be at full strength when preseason practice begins.

Outside/Opposite Hitters

Another area that was hit hard by graduation was the hitting corps, as Megan Hector, Kate Woffindin and Mandy Mayo

all graduated. However, a solid core of returnees and a strong freshman class should not allow the Tribe to miss a beat.

Long will anchor the hitters, as the senior is the most experienced one on the roster. She has appeared in 214 games during her career and has posted 541 kills, with 261 of those coming as a freshman. She possesses all of the tools to become the squad's top offensive threat, which was illustrated by her play during the spring season. She saw time at opposite hitter as well as her natural outside spot.

Junior **Kelley Kaplan** has battled injuries throughout her career and was injured again on the last play of the last practice in the spring. She registered 12 kills and 22 digs in just 10 games a year ago. Her ability to bounce back from these setbacks will determine her playing time.

Sophomore **Jill Nowadly** will contribute depth to the hitting position. She appeared in just five games last year as she gained comfort with the speed of the game. A Williamsburg product, Nowadly had a strong spring season in which she saw time at both opposite and outside hitter, and that performance has her in the mix to compete for playing time at one of those spots.

Abbi Owens, a transfer from the University of Oklahoma and the younger sister of former Tribe setter Amy Owens (2001-2004), will also be in the mix. Dubbed by

Hill as a "big surprise and a last-minute gift," she was recruited by the Tribe before signing with the Sooners. After a year of collegiate training as a defensive specialist and an outside hitter, she will be ready to compete for a starting spot when practice begins in August.

Four talented freshmen will battle the upperclassmen for playing time. **Jillian Brown** will join the Tribe from suburban Chicago where she had a solid prep career. A walk-on, she will bring great intensity and a great all-around game to the team.

Bryana Carey, from Balboa Island, Calif., has a vast amount of experience at the club and prep levels. She led her club team to two National Volleyball Festival championships. She will compete for a starting outside or opposite hitting position.

Perhaps the most accomplished incoming freshman will be **Lindsey Pflugner**, from Riverview High School in Sarasota, Fla., where she re-wrote the school's record book. She finished her career with 1,083 kills and 772 digs. She has tremendous ball control and is a very explosive player, and she will challenge for a starting outside hitting position.

Another freshman who will compete for time is **Lauren Powell**, from Cascia Hall in Tulsa, Okla. Dubbed a "sleeper" by Hill, she is perhaps the most athletic player in the freshman class. A hardworking athlete, she was the go-to player on her high school team and will battle for a starting outside hitting position.

Libero/Defensive Specialists

There are no worries for the Tribe at the defensive specialist/libero spots, as Hawley returns as the CAA Defensive Specialist of the Year after leading the league with a 5.31 digs per game average, ranking 27th in the NCAA. She shattered the school record with 616 digs, besting the previous record by 193. She returns for her final season determined to lead a young team.

One of three captains, the team has tremendous confidence in her ability, and Hill feels that she has yet to play her best

Sophomore **Jo Sotto** recorded 49 digs in 31 games a year ago, and she will be counted on to provide ball control. She has a very good instinct for the ball, and she worked hard on her range during the spring. She will compete with Nowadly for the defensive specialist spot. Pflugner and Owens could also compete for time in the libero/defensive specialist roles.

The Schedule

The Tribe will play 13 of its 26 matches at home, and the first seven of those will come in two tournaments. W&M will open the season in Greenville, N.C., to play in the East Carolina Tournament and will return home the following weekend to host the annual William and Mary Invitational.

The CAA schedule will feature a double-round robin format, with every team playing each opponent twice, once at home and on the road. The top six teams qualify for the CAA Tournament, which is hosted by the number one seed.

Head Coach Debbie Hill



Debbie Hill Head Coach (29th season) **Houston (1974)**

Debbie Hill begins her 29th season as the head volleyball coach at William and Mary. Such longevity can be attributed to one thing: success on the court and in the classroom.

In 2005, with seven seniors on the roster, Hill guided the Tribe to its finest season in five years as it finished 22-9 overall and earned a second place finish in the CAA with a 15-3 mark. The season included winning streaks of eight and seven matches, and the 15 conference wins were the most since 2001. That success was dutifully rewarded, as Hill picked up the fifth CAA Coach of the Year award of her career, while setter Kim Mount was tabbed the league's best rookie and libero Kathleen Hawley earned Defensive Specialist of the Year honors after recording a school-record 616 digs. It was the 12th time that Hill has led the Tribe to at least 20 wins in a season, including a school record of 34 victories in 1980.

Hill has left her mark on the national level, as only a handful of coaches in the history of the women's college game have amassed 500 career wins. On September 23, 2003, Hill became just the 19th coach in NCAA history to reach the milestone with a 3-0 victory over Norfolk State. Currently, Hill's 542 wins is 23rd among active coaches nationally.

In her illustrious career, all at William and Mary, Hill sports a record of 542-376, good for a .590 winning percentage. A five-time CAA Coach of the Year and 2001 Virginia State Coach of the Year, Hill claimed seven straight league titles from 1985-91 and accumulated 56 consecutive conference wins in the process. Hill's 24th year with the Tribe volleyball program, in 2001, was arguably her most successful, as she guided the team to its first

CAA Championship in a decade and its first trip to the NCAA Tournament after posting a 22-6 record.

Demanding success both on and off the court, Hill and her staff recruit true student-athletes on a national basis. Hill's teams have been ranked as high as 28th on the National Rating Index while meeting the challenging academic standards of the College. Many William and Mary volleyball players (Anna Finley and Anna Agbe-Davies, to name two) stand as a tribute to the total development Hill emphasizes. Both earned Phi Beta Kappa, Academic All-America and all-conference honors, with Agbe-Davies also receiving an NCAA postgraduate scholarship. In 1995, the Tribe was honored with the AVCA Team Academic Award while posting the College's highest cumulative team GPA (3.45).

Hill has coached numerous players who have garnered individual awards, as 29 student-athletes under her watch have been named to all-conference teams, including Caitlin Geraghty, a first-team selection, and Kate Woffindin, a second-team pick last season. She has coached four individuals to seven CAA Player of the Year honors, with Heidi Erpelding taking the award home three straight years and Jennifer Torns winning the award twice. Erpelding was inducted into the William and Mary Hall of Fame in 2002 and is one of the program's finest players. Jane Fanestil-Peterson, a two-time National Coach of the Year at Central Lakes Community College and one of the Tribe's finest players, joined Erpelding-Morse in the Hall of Fame in the spring of 2005.

Hill's senior class of 2001 proved to be a true testament to her recruiting prowess. The class included four student-athletes who started all four years of their undergraduate careers and culminated their tenures with a CAA Championship and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. The class included Tara Tobias, the 2001 CAA Tournament MVP and All-CAA first-team member, and Sarah Gubler, the all-time W&M leader in career assists with

Hill has led William and Mary to postseason competition on three other occasions, with bids to the National Invitational Volleyball Championship. In 1991, the Tribe proudly claimed the Steve Lowe Award at the NIVC for "competitive excellence, inspiration and fair play." Since becoming a Division I program in 1982, W&M has amassed an impressive 455-314 record (.591 winning percentage).

A native of Miami, Fla., Hill is a graduate of Miami Dade Community College-South Campus, where she earned an A.S. in physical education in 1972. At Dade-South, she was a five-sport athlete, leading the volleyball team to a fifth-place finish at the national tournament her freshman year. Hill continued her volleyball career at the University of Houston, where she graduated with a B.S. degree in physical education in 1974. During her junior year, Hill helped lead the Cougars to a sixth-place finish in the national tournament.

A physical education instructor upon her arrival at William and Mary in 1976, Hill earned her master's degree in physical education from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1980.

Hill resides in Williamsburg with her partner of 24 years, Dr. Camilla Buchanan, and their daughter, Camilla Lee Hill, a senior field hockey and soccer athlete at Jamestown High School. Hill and her family enjoy traveling twice a year to Kenya, where they volunteer with a community development project near the Maasai Mara Game

Associate/Assistant Coaches

Ed Jackson begins his fourth year on the William and Mary staff after being promoted from assistant coach to associate head coach in August 2006. Jackson brings a wealth of playing and coaching experience at the collegiate, prep and club levels to Williamsburg with positive results.

Jackson is responsible for all of the technical training for the Tribe, which includes scouting, practice planning, video analysis and in-match strategy.

Prior to joining the Tribe coaching staff, Jackson served as an assistant coach at California-Santa Barbara for one season, where he was responsible for recruiting and video analysis.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Jackson worked with the highly successful Davis (CA) Volleyball Club, coaching its team of 16-year-old girls in 2001-02. He continues to work in the club volleyball ranks and is the director of the Williamsburg Volleyball Club. In this role, he oversees the administration and management of the 11 teams and serves as a liaison between coaches, players and parents. He also serves as the head coach of the 17 Black performance boy's volleyball team.

Before the DVC, he served as a head coach and personal trainer for over five years with High Voltage Volleyball in Sacramento, Calif., qualifying four squads for the U.S. Junior Olympic Volleyball Championships.

Jackson also served as a

physical education teacher and head coach of the varsity team at Sacramento's Rio Americano High School, compiling a combined record of 39-6 in two seasons. Under Jackson, the Raiders won CIF sectional championships both years and advanced to the California State Tournament, reaching the semifinals in 1999 and quarterfinals in 2000.

Jackson also has one season of head coaching experience in the collegiate ranks, guiding the club program at UC Davis in its 1999 campaign. At the Division I level, Jackson spent a year at Eastern Illinois University, serving as a graduate assistant with the Panthers while working toward his master's degree in sport administration.

A 1994 graduate of Sacramento State, Jackson was a collegiate club All-American and national championship MVP as an outside hitter.

A native of San Diego, Calif., Jackson and his wife Alanna, the assistant coach at the College, reside in Williamsburg.

Alanna Jackson begins her fourth year at William and Mary after a stellar club and collegiate playing career.

Jackson works primarily with the setters and is responsible for technical training, which includes scouting, practice planning, video analysis and in-match strategy. Her work with the setters paid dividends last season, as Jackson

mentored freshman Kim Mount to one of the finest freshman campaigns in school history. After Natalie King was injured early in the season, Mount took over the Tribe offense and ended the year leading the league in assists as she earned CAA Rookie of the Year honors, after capturing five Rookie of the Week nods.

In addition to her collegiate responsibilities, Jackson serves as the head coach of the Williamsburg Volleyball Club's 15 Black girls team, which finished tied for third in the Gold bracket of the championship division at Penn State in May of 2005.

As a collegian, Jackson earned a full scholarship to the University of Nevada in 1997 after transferring from De Anza College in San Jose, CA, where she was a two-time captain, two-time Coast Conference MVP and two-time all-state selection from the state of California.

As a senior, Jackson led the Big West Conference in assists per game and was named to the all-conference second team en route to helping the Wolf Pack qualify for the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history.

That same season she also earned Big West All-Academic recognition and Nevada's Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year award. She captained the 1998 Wolf Pack squad that won the Eastern side of the Big West Conference for the first time ever.

After receiving her degree in theatre from Nevada in 2000, the Sacramento, Calif., native coached with the Sierra Nevada and Davis volleyball clubs.

When a student-athlete commits to play volleyball at William and Mary, she becomes part of a very special program. First of all, the College is rich in tradition. For more than 300 years, W&M has been in the business of education and is the second-oldest institution of higher learning in the nation. W&M's noble roots go back to its charter from England.

The volleyball program also boasts a proud past. For the last 28 years, head coach Debbie Hill has guided its fortunes with a record of 542 wins and 376 losses. Hill's greatest achievement, however, is not her winning percentage on the court but her impeccable graduation rate among her student-athletes. Volleyball players who progress through the William and Mary program not only compete in a Division I setting but also receive one of the finest educations in the country. In 1995, the volleyball team ranked No. 1 among all William and Mary teams in GPA with an average above 3.45 for the academic year, winning the AVCA Team Academic Award in the process.



Physicians and archeologists, computer analysts and corporate bankers, lawyers and teachers, veterinarians and business executives, biologists and chemists, coaches and researchers the list is varied, yet they all share a common bond: W&M volleyball.

Life at William and Mary is more than balancing academics and athletics. Tribe athletes also take advantage of numerous volunteer activities, and they have the opportunity to join sororities and participate in intramurals. Many have been active in Housing Partnership projects. Others have helped with the campus day care program, the Muscarelle Museum, or Big Brother/Big Sister programs. Whatever the inclination, the athlete is encouraged to expand her horizons and develop individually. At William and Mary, volleyball is time-consuming and requires dedication but not at the expense of educating the whole person.

W&M volleyball players represent an eclectic blend of talents. Some athletes could have played in top 20 programs but opted to focus on their academic goals. Other players are walk-ons who have passed up scholarship opportunities to attend W&M. Although W&M may not be a top 10 program, that does not eclipse the experience of playing in the "big time."

In addition, the Tribe has been tremendously successful at the conference W&M graduates span the continuum of professions. A glimpse at the roster level as evidenced by eight Colonial Athletic Association championships. The team has also seen time in the national spotlight with its first appearance in the NCAA Volleyball Tournament in 2001.

Individually, women's tennis standout Meaan Moulton-Levy earned All-America honors after advancing to the "Final Four" of the NCAA Singles Tournament.

Academic Excellence

The Tribe's athletic accomplishments do not come at the expense of its student's academic responsibilities, as W&M ranked fourth, the highest of any scholarship-granting school and of any public university, in the nation among institutions with two or more Division I teams when the NCAA released its inaugural Academic Progress Rate scores in March of 2005.

This year, the NCAA specifically listed 18 W&M athletic squads as recipients of its public recognition award for 2005-

Since 1992, 36 Tribe athletes have been designated Academic All-Americans, including Keith Bechtol, who was a third team selection in the spring, and since 1996, 39 student-athletes have been members of Phi Beta Kappa.

In 2002-03, the CAA created a Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award in each of its 21 sports, and not surprisingly, William and Mary has set the pace with 18.

In addition, three of William and Mary's five Rhodes scholars participated in varsity sports.




For more than 300 years, William and Mary has been a symbol of academic distinction in America. Now, in its fourth century, the College is prepared to educate the leaders of the 21st century.

The College of William and Mary was founded in 1693 by King William III and Queen Mary II of England. Four Presidents of the United States received their education at the College - George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe and John Tyler.

William and Mary was the first college to institute an honor code of conduct. The premier academic society, Phi Beta Kappa, was founded by William and Mary students in 1776. The Society of the Alumni, founded in 1842, is the sixth oldest alumni group in the nation. Now the College is designated as a "Public Ivy", and ranks sixth among all public universities (U.S. News and World Report).





Student-Athlete \Support

Sports Psychology

Deidre Connelly, Ph.D., is the College's full-time sports psychologist. All consultations are confidential and all student-athletes, teams or coaches are welcome regardless of the issues they wish to discuss. Consultation is available for sport psychology education, performance enhancement skills training, strategies for dealing with stress or injury, or for personal issues that may affect performance.

Compliance and Academic Support

As members of the Colonial Athletic Association and the NCAA, the College is committed to full compliance with all NCAA and conference regulations. The department has a full-time Director of Compliance, Pamela Mason, who is committed to assisting students, staff and coaches through education and monitoring of compliance issues.

All entering students are assigned to a faculty academic advisor by the director of Academic Advising. Students remain with this advisor until their sophomore year, at which time they select a faculty advisor in their chosen major.

The department offers a variety of study, life and career building skills programs, but holds firm to the concept of self-determination—each student must take responsibility for his or her collegiate experience. Our goal is to assure that there is a support system in place to assist students to make positive and informed decisions.

Speed, Strength and Conditioning

Tribe Athletics is very proud of the Joseph W. Montgomery Strength Training Center, a 5,000 square foot weight training facility. Under the guidance of the Head Speed, Strength and Conditioning Coach John Sauer, each sport is provided with a program designed to enhance individual strength and flexibility development specific to the skills and movements required for their sport. Individuals are educated on proper lifting techniques and workouts are monitored to ensure safety at all times.

The weight room was upgraded in the spring of 2006, primarily with new Power Lift and Sorinex equipment. The room now contains 16,000 pounds of free weights, over 7,000 pounds of dumbbells and 6,000 pounds of rubber bumper plates. In addition, it has 24 custom-built Olympic platforms, 18 multipurpose power racks and a fully-equipped plyometric area.

Sports Medicine

The Division of Sports Medicine provides a comprehensive health care program for the department of intercollegiate athletics. The staff consists of Assistant Athletics Director for Health Services, Steve Cole, a team physician, seven full-time certified athletic trainers, two graduate assistant athletic trainers and medical specialists from the local community. The team physician has overall responsibility for supervision of the sports medicine program. Tribe athletes have the luxury of rehabilitating and treating injuries in a state-of-the-art athletic training facility.

The priority for the athletic training staff is to enhance and ensure lines of communication and cooperation among its staff, student-athletes, parents, coaches, the Student Health Center and involved medical specialists.

The College of William and Mary and its student-athletes take a great deal of pride in the quality of its athletic facilities. Over the last several years, the College has bolstered its lineup of venues to match the success that the Tribe has shown in the athletic arena, which has been unmatched in the Colonial Athletic Association. William and Mary boasts some of the finest athletic arenas in the nation, from its newest venue, Albert-Daly Field, to the oldest, Walter J. Zable Stadium at Cary Field, a campus landmark since 1935. The College is committed to providing the student-athlete the most enjoyable and rewarding atmosphere possible.
