

War Children's Foster
Parents Plan Uses
Spike Jones' "Mommy"

NEW YORK—At the request of the Foster Parents Plan for War Children, RCA Victor and Spike Jones have made their hit waxing of "Mommy, Won't You Buy A Baby Brother (Or Sister For Me)" available to Foster Parents as a medium to acquaint more people in this country with the Plan, which has supported more than 60,000 European war children, in the past 13 years, Paul A. Barkmeier, Vice President and General Manager, RCA Victor Division, has announced.

Americans can contribute \$15 per month to provide food, clothing, shelter and medical care under the plan for one child for one year. The adoption is not legal; the child remains in Europe, but the Foster Parents are supplied with a case history and encouraged to write to him.

When Foster Parents heard the Spike Jones "Mommy" recording, they approached the bandleader and RCA Victor with the request that the Jones recording be tied in with the Plan as part of its campaign to enlist more Foster Parents to aid the warravaged children overseas.

As a result of their plea, Spike himself adopted a 13-year-old Polish war orphan, André Koroshovsky, under the Plan, and Foster Parents recorded a two-way dialogue disc of the youngster talking to Spike, his new American "Poppa," and Spike's answer.

This record, with a script and a personal letter from Edna Blue, International Chairman of Foster Parents, has been shipped to more than 1,000 disc jockies, to be played in conjunction with the recording, "Mommy, Won't You Buy A Baby Brother (Or Sister For Me)," as a means of introducing radio listeners throughout the country to a way in which they can aid personally in the rehabilitation of European war children.



• Here are two sides by a new blues artist which should make quite a splash. Taking two different types of numbers, he goes to work on both of them, turning in a fine job. Ops better get this into their machines for both ends are gonna draw a lot of nickels. The top deck is a fast paced item with a good beat and a better instrumental. It has a pushing sax in it which is something to hear and of course Billy's vocal is the highlight. The second side is a very slow ballad done in a shouting manner with a breaking voice that's very exciting. Some magnificent piano adds to the effect. These are two equally terrific sides. They'll do big things for ops who latch on.

© Cecil Gant puts his voice and piano to work on a couple of numbers here and turns in his usual high class job. The top deck is a jump tune given a gasping vocal by Cecil and featuring some terrific piano work. The lower end is a follow up on a blues number that should have lots of appeal. This one is right.

Smilin' "Smokey" Lynn takes two very different numbers and does an equally good job with each of them. The top deck is a very slow shouting blues item on which Smokey gets some help from Wallace Sandford's orchestra. The bottom half has a driving vocal with some very interesting backing. Both sides should go over big.

• A wonderful song is taken for an easy ride by the King Odum Four on the upper level. Making it sound very soft and pleasant, the group runs through this one in a simple manner. The second side is another soft one, this time with a new ballad. The top deck looks good.

• Some excellent harmony is displayed on this disk by the Three Flames. Working over a ballad on the top deck, the boys are aided by Milt Buckner and the orchestra. The lower half has a good beat and some funny lyrics to recommend it. Ops might listen in.

The great Billie Holiday has a couple of oldies to play with here. The upper half makes for easy listening the way Billie does it. On the lower end, she goes to work on an old Cole Porter number. Both sides feature some good piano. Billie has lots of fans who want to hear everything she does.

Ives' "Little White Duck" Gets Heavy Promotion


NEW YORK—A three pronged promotion tie-up is spear-heading the sales of Burl Ives' first pop recording, "The Little White Duck."

The record was released two months ago on Columbia's children's label. As soon as the children's version was on the market, Burl arranged to send live little white ducks to twenty of the city's leading disc jockeys. The ducks were accompanied by a copy of the record. Response was so enthusiastic that the record received daily plugs and soon appeared on some of the disc best-seller lists.

Next, the Ideal Novelty and Toy Company was approached and arrangements made for a special toy duck to be made for national distribution. This will be packaged as "Burl Ives' Little White Duck," and will be ready for delivery shortly after the first of the year.

Dealers for both Columbia and Ideal will be posted on the tie-up so that maximum exploitation can be developed in the field. Tie-in sales, disc jockey promotion, combination displays and traffic drawing promotion for dealers are all part of the plan.

A third twist on the promotion was developed as the result of previous experience with Burl Ives' recordings when a number of schools spontaneously sent Burl paintings created by their pupils inspired by a Burl Ives recording. Copies of "The Little White Duck" were sent to a number of schools together with toy ducks and special classes were set up. As a result, special exhibitions of some of these paintings are now being arranged through department stores and record shops throughout the country.

EW EOUPT BUYNG RUS

Start Rush to Buy New Equipment. Production Reruns Under Way. Distribs Stock Up Hurriedly.

CHICAGO — Word was received from some of the leading factories here that they are enjoying a sudden buying rush.

Many of the distributors are now stocking up with equipment which they believe will prove extremely dif-ficult to obtain within a few months.

Some of the factories are under way with re-runs of former games which are being demanded by their distribs.

All in all the situation is such that, tho ops haven't been calling around for new machines, distributors have decided that the time is growing very short, and that they had best stock whatever they can.

It is generally believed here that this buying rush will spread out into all the factories and that distribs of all leading manufacturers will store whatever they can.

The average distributor hasn't been buying in quantity ever since this past Fall season, some here report.

This sudden rush, as more controls and restrictions come into being with the national emergency, is in an effort to fill their warehouses with new machines.

"There is no doubt", one leader here said, "that all games will go up in price. Those distributors who are buying now will not only profit greatly, but, will also be in position to help their customers, as play gets going big" going big."

It is also noteworthy that almost all types of games are being grabbed in this buying rush.

The average distrib believes that everything containing critical metals will be extremely difficult to obtain within a few more months.

Some distribs who have been town reported that they have had advance orders from many of their customers, and tho they haven't committed themselves as to obtaining the equipment their customers desire at this time, they are going ahead with purchases of the types of equipment they know will prove most valuable in their areas.

It is also noted that, in addition to purchasing the new machines, distribs are also buying parts that go along with the equipment which they buy as well as with the equipment which is featured in their territories.

Some factories haven't as yet felt this sudden buying surge, but, it is believed, these plants will soon also feel the rush for equipment and will find it difficult to fill the orders.

The big automatic merchandising show will take place on November 12, 13 and 14, 1951, at the Cleveland Public Auditorium, Cleveland, Ohio.

Senate

President Expected To Sign

WASHINGTON, D. C .- The Johnson Bill prohibiting the interstate shipment of slot machines and like gambling devices was passed both by the Senate and the House and the President is expected to sign it before the week is over. The measure would exempt only those states which enacted special laws allowing entry of these machines.

A Senate attempt to pass the measure in September failed when Senator George W. Malone, Republican of Nevada, conducted a one-man filibuster for more than eleven hours. Senator Malone attempted to renew his efforts this week, but was able to talk for only fifty minutes, and this with difficulty, due to a sore throat.

One of the requirements of the bill is that manufacturers and sellers of slot machines must register with the Justice Department and file monthly reports of their sales and deliveries, including names and addresses of

Scarcity Of Parts And **Supplies Becomes** More

Many Seek Old Equipment For Parts. **Tubes** Toughest Of Among AII **Supplies** To Obtain At This

CHICAGO—Parts and supplies are becoming scarcer almost every day, leaders report.

Toughest of all supplies to obtain at this time are tubes for phonos.

These, along with speakers, which are being cut off from further production, because of restriction on cobalt, are causing many juke box ops head-

Some are chasing down very old type machines in an effort to use parts from these for repairs.

Transformers are worth their

weight in gold today. Condensors, resistors and other parts, which can be removed from older machines, will help keep newer equipment working. It is believed that, if present condition continues, every four machines will become only three. One machine will have to be taken apart to keep the other three in operation, which was common practice during World War II.

Even old speakers and parts, which have been found in basements of ops' stores, are now being put into condition for future use.

Arcade Machines Scarce

Many Machines Needed For Camp Locations

CHICAGO — Shortage of arcade equipment is most noticeable at this time as many start out with the intention of buying up sufficient number of machines, well known to arcade field, such as Panoram Peeks and rifle range guns, and then have to ouit.







"We feel," he continued, "that the major share of the service, which the distributor will be able to render the operators in the future, will be converting old equipment.


