A Salute To The 20th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition

Once again Cash Box, the International voice of the Coin Machine Industry is proud to publish this special issue in honor of the 20th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition which takes place at the New Royal Horticultural Hall, London, from Tuesday January 28th to Thursday January 30th, 1964.

Five years ago when Cash Box made its A.T.E. debut at the 1960 exhibition the event was already an established highlight of the British Coin Machine year. Nevertheless, few people could have envisaged the rapidity with which it would grow into an event of International and indeed world wide importance.

However, with each advancing year the A.T.E. has been visibly outgrowing its environment and now like many other twenty-year-olds, it has burst its seams.

The problem of finding larger and more adequate accommodations is now a matter of extreme urgency. A solution must be found if the A.T.E., having reached maturity, is to remain Europe's No. 1 Exposition for the Coin Machine Industry.

As we said last year, London is singularly ill-equipped with suitable sites and because the A.T.E. is a social occasion as well as an exhibition it is desirable that the chosen hall should not only be the right size but situated in the right place.

However, the organisers, fully aware of the growing need for expansion, are accelerating their efforts to find a larger venue. They will again be reviewing all the possibilities in the very near future and to assist the board in their deliberations, they will be seeking the views, not only of the exhibitors, but of the visitors to this year's show.

Constructive suggestions will be welcome and visitors are earnestly requested to complete the questionnaires which will be distributed as they enter the hall.

Once inside the exhibition area it is certain that this year's visitor will find a standard of display far exceeding anything seen in previous years.

It is known that despite the limited space available the sixty-eight exhibitors have 'gone to town' and invested more money than ever in making the most of the 145 booths at their disposal.

The importance of showmanship as an adjunct to salesmanship increases with the ever growing status of our business and its final acceptance and recognition as a major and reputable Industry.

The 'get rich quick' merchants who flooded the market with inferior products a few years ago are rapidly on the way out. Established manufacturers and distributors have weathered the storm and the trend towards high class equipment and service has been accelerated over the past twelve months. Today's customer is more selective. He no longer looks simply for equipment, but for equipment of quality. Exhibitors at the A.T.E. able and anxious to meet these demands, expect this year's results to reach an all time high.

Recognising the importance of the A.T.E. as an International shop window several American manufacturers will be introducing brand new equipment: phonographs, amusement games and fruit machines to Europe, the major U.S. export market of the world.

Figures published in the Cash Box third Quarterly Export Edition for the first nine months of 1963 show a considerable increase in the number of phonographs and games imported by the U.K. compared with the previous year. The volume of games units being practically doubled. In the third quarter more than twelve thousand machines both new and used came into the country. Profits made by the relaxation of gaming restrictions in respect of payout machines may be partly responsible for the extra expenditure.

Last year's swing toward the multi-player continues and new machines in this category and of even greater proportions are likely to be seen at this year's show.

This time last year Britain stood on the thresholds of the Common Market and Decimal Coinage. Whilst the first door has been firmly closed the second remains ajar.

The Government's Committee of Enquiry has published its report and recommendations and the final decision which rests with the Government is awaited.

The Government's plan to abolish Retail Price Maintenance without delay is likely to have little effect on the Coin Machine Industry on whom restrictions of this kind have not previously been imposed.

Despite the prospect of a General Election it is hoped that the forward strides made in recent years will be maintained in 1964. When the new Betting and Gaming Act was introduced four years ago it was in the nature of a rather daring experiment, likely to require certain amendments after a suitable period of trial and error. A point to be remembered whatever Government is in power.

In conclusion, Cash Box, on behalf of the trade extends a vote of thanks to the A.T.E. Committee and members of the Amusement Caterers Association and Music Trades Association for their work behind the scenes. We wish the 20th Amusement Trades Exhibition every success.

20th Annual A.T.E. Convention Expects Largest Crowd, Exhibit Space Sold Out, London Is Center Of Industry Jan. 28-30

LONDON—When the doors of the New Royal Horticultural Hall open at 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning January 28th the 20th Amusement Trades Exhibition will be under way... the culmination of months of active preparation.

Right up to the last minute the organizers were being besieged with phone calls and inquiries from would be exhibitors who realized too late the importance of the event and the necessity to be seen there.

Every year despite the certain knowledge that the demand for space exceeds the supply, failure to heed the book early call results in an ever increasing number of disappointed manufacturers and distributors.

Once again all available space was allocated well before Christmas and as in previous years the individual requirements of many applicants had to be drastically restricted.

Several new names are to be found in this year's list of exhibitors. Ditchburn Equipment Ltd are returning after an absence of a couple of years and Peter Simper, a well known personality within the industry, has his own stand for the first time.

A welcome newcomer from overseas is Automatenbau-Forster of Germany. Other companies showing for the first time include Andamuse Ltd, County Auto M/cs Ltd, Golding Automatics Ltd, Nixson (Mfg) Ltd and the Gainsmead Group of Companies, newly appointed importers and distributors for the Eltec products of West Germany.

A considerable amount of new


A considerable amount of new equipment will be on show for the first time and the exhibition is expected to attract a record number of visitors both from at home and over-

seas.
For one reason or another, the American side doesn't play its card until the final minute as evidenced by last minute notifications that many factory representatives will make the trip from Chicago to take part in the exhibit. At first, most manufacturers had resigned this chore to local distribs.

CHICAGO—You could almost smell the success here last week as Music Operators of America execs filed out of a three-day meeting that may have accomplished more to keep this association moving than all the talk that has gone by the boards for the past ten years. The MOA execs know a good thing when they have one, and lost no time in signing up a Manager to keep the wagon rolling onto still another successful convention comes next October.

The Executive Committee and Board of Directors of the Music Operators of America held a three day session, from Thursday through Saturday, January 16-18, in the Sherman House Hotel, in this city, to formulate plans for association activities during 1964, including the annual MOA Convention, which will be held from October 14 thru 16, in the Sherman House. One significant accomplishment was the appointment of a new managing director (see story of Fred Granger's appointment on this page). The meetings were chaired by Lou Casola, president of MOA.

CHICAGO — Frederick M. Granger, Jr. was appointed by the Executive Committee of the Music Operators of America (MOA) to the post of managing director, during a three day meeting of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors, Thursday thru Saturday, January 16-18, in the Sherman House Hotel in this city. The meetings were chaired by Lou Casola, president. He was assisted in screening applicants, prior to the eventual selection of Granger, by MOA Past-President J. Harry Snodgrass, of Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Granger's background includes many years of solid experience and successful management in the trade association field. He is a member of the American Society of Association Executives, and the National Association of Exhibit Managers. He was executive director of the Specialty Advertising Guild International, from April, 1957 to October, 1963.

Prior to that post he was district sales manager for the American Corporation in Washington, D.C., Maryland and Virginia. He also served the advertising field as an account executive for several years.

Granger served on active sea duty with the United States Navy during World War II as a commissioned officer. From 1947 to 1948 he was asigned to the Executive Office of the Secretary of the Navy, after a stint as administrative assistant to the officer-in-charge of the Navy's Advanced Technical Service Schools, in Washington, D.C.

Among his other military assignments he lists such duties as: Assistant public relations officer on the staff of the Commander of U. S. Naval Forces in the European and Mediterranean Areas. During this period he handled news and photo coverage of the crucial Berlin Airlift.

Prior to Granger's retirement from naval duty he was a U. S. Foreign Service Officer in the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, and in France. He retired from the service in 1952.

When Granger was finally proposed as the logical choice to replace Bob Blundred to the executive committee and the board of directors of MOA, by Casola and Snodgrass, there was a spontaneous, unani



signment, Granger replied: "First, it will be a great pleasure and feeling of satisfaction to work with such fine people, as I've met here (the Sherman House) during the past few days. "Also, I greatly appreciate the opportunity to meet the challenge of helping to the best of my ability to further the progress of this association.

"The potential looks very good to me—as I know it does to the music operators of this country. Naturally, I'll do my very best to attain our ultimate goal of maximum membership, very successful conventions and trade show exhibits, and a positive legislative platform."



Among the other tax accountancy specialists on the panel moderated by Millman were: Neil Kaplan, who discussed "Investment Credit"; Harold Minkus, on "Depreciation Methods and Guide Lines"; and David Bramson on "Purchase and Sale of Routes."

This was followed by a lively question and answer period.

Robbins Sees Legislation Harmful To Industry



CHICAGO—Joe Robbins, vice president of Empire Coin Machine Exchange issued an "analysis and prospectus" for the coin machine industry for 1964, last week, in which he pulled all the stoppers in enumerating the thorny problems, along with hopeful signs for the future of coinbiz as he sees it.

He stated that the industry is unquestionably "confronted with several

he sees it.

He stated that the industry is unquestionably "confronted with several diverse and multifold problems," specifically, in the area of legislation and public relations.

"1963 has seen the near culmination of governmental efforts to restrict the amusement games division, in this country at least, to the operation of strictly skill types of amusement games," he said. "The exciting element of chance has all but been eliminated.

"Naturally, this problem is resulting in a marked decrease in earnings for operators, further compounded because it greatly decreases the wholesaler's sales potential in games as well as in phonographs.

"The only optimistic accomplishment these days is brought about by a flurry of diversification into the thriving field of coin-operated automatic merchandising.

"Taking everything into consideration, we strongly uses all of the na-

matic merchandising.

"Taking everything into consideration, we strongly urge all of the nation's operators to resolve this year to be more active in their local, regional, and national trade associations such as MOA," Robbins continued. "Furthermore, the National Coin Machine Distributors Assn. (NCMDA) must have every distributor on its roster for needed strength in 1964.

"If we are to accomplish the at-

"If we are to accomplish the attainment of the proper national image, and impress legislators with the fact that we are not ogres but, rather, hard working businessmen and employees of a fine, vital industry, we are obliged to strive mightily to attain this well deserved status.

"The road ahead in '64 is wide open," Robbins concluded, "All we need do is plunge into the campaign (1964) resolved to do all in our power to improve the lot of everyone who earns his livelihood in the coin machine industry."



NAMA Reports To US Surgeon General On Results Of 6-Step Regulation Program

CHICAGO—Results of a nationwide 6-Step Self-Regulation Program to prevent the illegal sale of cigarettes to minors from vending machines were presented to Dr. Luther L. Terry, Surgeon General of the United States, by the National Automatic Merchandising Association.

"Operators of cigarette machines in every state have ordered more than 260,000 'minors are forbidden' labels for their machines in the past year," Louis J. Risman, chairman of the association's Special Committee on Cigarette Vending, informed the Surgeon General by telegram. "This covers more than twice the 15 per cent of vending machines which were in locations freely accessible to minors when the program began," he said.

In addition to the prominent warn-

In addition to the prominent warn-In addition to the prominent warning labels for machines, the vending industry's Self-Regulation Program provides for "a constant survey of the machines' accessibility to minors, repositioning of machines to assure surveillance, removal where necessary, and close collaboration with local law enforcement officials to prevent vio-

lations."

He pointed out that the majority of cigarette machines have always been located in taverns, cocktail lounges, factories, and offices, where minors do not go.

"Individuals not familiar with the vending industry have at times accused cigarette machines erroneously as the chief purveyor of cigarettes to youngsters," Risman wired Dr. Terry.

He referred to a letter from the association to Dr. Terry last year in which it transmitted the results of a 1963 study by the Gilbert Youth Research organization.

The Gilbert Study, which has been widely quoted by the American Cancer Society, showed that fewer than 5 per cent of all teen-agers purchase cigarettes from vending machines, while 80 per cent of the teen-agers who smoke get their cigarettes from sources other than vending machines. The nationwide youth study also showed that 60 per cent of the teen-age smokers have their parents' permission to smoke.

Risman informed the Surgeon General that "the cigarette vending industry has long been on record in favor of observance of laws and regulations which cover the sale of cigarettes to minors."

W. Va. Ops Ask Increase In Sales Tax Floor

CHICAGO—While in this city last weekend to attend the MOA meetings in the Sherman House Hotel, Bill Anderson, a veteran operator, and a member of the State Legislature in West Virginia; and John "Red" Wallace, prominent in the coin machine business and West Virginia association activities for many years, discussed the recent introduction of a bill in the West Virginia Legislature to raise from six to eleven cents the minimum purchase on which the state consumers sales tax would apply.

The bill was introduced by Delegate Jack R. Nuzum (Dem., Randolph, W. Va.).

Wallace explained that the six cent minimum worked an extreme hardship on coin machine operators in the state for several years.

Anderson stated that the West Virginia operators' association is, of course, solidly behind the new amendment, and striving for early passage in the House of Delegates, of which he is a member.

"A Special Committee on Cigarette Vending was appointed by our Board of Directors two years ago to deal with these matters specifically," Risman said. "We would welcome the opportunity of counseling with your staff if vending machines should come under consideration as part of your under consideration as part of your

Risman told Dr. Terry that his report "is not intended to be the final word."

"We are continuing this Self-Regu-

"We are continuing this Self-Regulation Program vigorously in all parts of the country. Through more than 500 voluntary state and city chairmen, we are extending the control program further and we are maintaining liaison with law enforcement officials to assure compliance," Risman said.

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GIVE TO THE MARCH OF DIMES

First Lady Of The British Music Operating **Industry Reports On A Year Of Events**

The year, from the vantage point of the juke box operator in England, he its ups and downs and alongside each of the members of the Phonograp Operators Association in London, always on call when needed, was like Shaw, who has summarized the industry's progress during the past twel months. Her exclusive report to Cash Box follows:

To use a favourite adjective, 1963 was not a super-colossal year for the jukebox industry in Great Britain. A five per cent all-around rise in wages does not amount to very much when one reflects that in these compact Islands, the amusement trade only gets one-fifth of the contents of the wage packet, and this is a trade that covers an awful lot of ground. Naturally, competition for the one-fifth is frantically keen and the introduction of an exceptionally large number of new or revived attractions has intensified the pressure throughout the year. The full blast of the Legislature's increase in gambling facilities was, for the first time, well and truly felt; thousands of betting shops were opened, all designed to lure the money. No official figures are yet available, but it is reliably estimated that gambling turnover increased in 1963 by more than 50 per cent. 'Fruits,' too, were legalised over the country to the extent of two units per establishment. Other claimants for that one-fifth were the Tenpin saloons, the Pool Halls, the driving ranges and roll curling rinks, while old-timers like cinemas, radio, TV, and bingo flutters continued their struggles. I have named but a few of the channels which have siphoned off a portion of the normal phonographic 'take.'

It must be remembered, however, that while so many attractions have entered the entertainment arena, the simple fact remains that jukeboxes are based on music, which Shakespeare once described as "The Food of Love" and he might have added—for which there is eternal demand in this world, and, who knows, the next? Thus a measure of confidence in the phonograph as a proposition persists. In this connection it is worth noting that the 1963 gramophone record sales in Great Britain attained a peak level, with total sales of \$105 million. The much publicised act known as "The Beatles" was, no doubt, responsible for some of the boom, but trade executives do not foresee any falling off in demand during 1964. off in demand during 1964. If the country's economy remains buoyant, and even of the Beatles fail to monopolise the "Top 20," this year's pattern is likely to be similar to the last-a steady expansion in sales. The query of the moment is the alleged possibility that fixed prices may soon be ended; this would create a situation of complexity to traders and of academic interest to students of market operations. The 1963 "Top Ten Disk" competition established a world record in that the first nine placings carried the label of ONE manufacturer, who thus brought off a ninefold 'accumulator' in a field where normal commercial competition is intensified by the oper-

ations of talent scouts.

Jukebox 1963 cash 'take' shows reduction of 7.5 per cent on that the previous year and approximate 10 per cent of the 1961 figure. Depite this fall in receipts, most distributors and operators face 1964 with the interesting problem of having more cash in the till than they know what to do with. There is an overaflush of liquidity, and the quest invest excess funds profitably of leads to extraordinary situations. The explanation probably lies in the absurd tax system which discourages businessmen from distributing excess funds in high pay to workers or larger dividends shareholders. High company tax with highly progressive personal recome taxation is the main reason for today's embarrassment of riches at the frantic efforts of operators look for new fields to plough.

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
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Cinebox Claims Estey Bankruptcy Has No Bearing On Cinevision Firm

Production Plans Set Through 1965

NEW YORK—An article which appeared in last week's issue (Jan. 25) of Cash Box stated that the Estey Electronic Corporation, of which Cinevision Corporation of America, manufacturers of the "Cinebox" movie-music machine is a subsidiary, had filed a voluntary petition for arrangement under Chapter 11 of the Federal Bankruptcy Law. Last week, Cash Box received notice from the officials of Cinevision which stated that while Estey was in bankruptcy, the bankruptcy did not in any way effect the present status of "Cinebox" and, in fact, that Estey has no bearing on "Cinebox" other than a stock position. It was stated that the "Cinebox" firm is a financially independent entity from Estey. A letter to Cash Box, delivered by hand from the office of Henry A. Schwartz, Executive Vice President of the Cinevision Corporation of America, is reprinted below, in order that the record, as it pertains to the Estey bankruptcy be set straight:
