Announcement of the declaration, which was made at the annual stockholders meeting here Wed., Feb. 29, included the information that it "marks the inauguration of a quarterly dividend policy." The action indicates an annual rate of 40 cents.

CHICAGO—Evidently the publicly owned vending machine firms are not immune to harassment by the nemesis of the nation's stockholder meetings, one Eugene Gilbert, who attended the Seeburg meet following a session with Canteen earlier in the week. His barbs were dulled by the deft Del Coleman who may have given Gilbert reason to research his comments more thoroughly for future meets here and elsewhere.

Shareholders were treated to coffee and refreshments in an invitation which advised that Seeburg equip-ment would be on display ready to serve snacks.

ne er serve snacks.

In discussing the European market, coleman told the owners that Seeburg's share of the European mart is growing pointing to the factory's increased number of warehouses and offices on the Continent.

All Seeburg Directors were reserved elected to serve for another year, a stock option for directors and execs was okayed, and the meeting closed on a highly optimistic note, following a report on plans for the coming year.

Seeburg also reported that earnings and sales in the three months ended January 31, 1964, established new hater first quarter records for the company. In all twas the thirteenth consecutive quarter of profit increase over the comparable quarter of the previous year. Net profit was \$634,692, equal to 32 cents per share based on 1,974,504 shares outstanding. This was a gain of 34% over earnings in the comparable 1963 quarter of \$472,850, equal to 25 cents per share based on the 1,891,454 shares then outstanding. Sales during the three months inpar the 1,891,454 shares then outstanding.
Sales during the three months inreased to \$13,856,932 from the \$12,ected 523,258 volume achieved in the core lini 'esponding period a year ago.

Delbert W. Coleman, chairman and resident of Seeburg, a leading manuresident of Seeburg, a leading acturer of vending equipment, hearng aids, electronic organs, and coinperated phonographs, told sharefull olders that all earnings in recent ears had been retained by the comany to finance the growth and de-elopment of its business. 

"We'll benefit from the Report," said O'Malley. He said that where cig sales had fallen off, there was "a substantial sales increase" in chewing gum sales and in chewing gum sales and

o'Malley was voted a stock option O'Malley was voted a stock option for 10,000 shares of Canteen stock, following a move by the Board granting the vending exec the option last year. It is good for five years and permits O'Malley to buy the stock at \$13.50 per share, the price it was quoted at Nov. 20 when the Directors voted the option. The Canteen stock was quoted at 14% early last week.





East Coast Firm Beats Cigs Dip Via New Cigar Pack at 50c Per

HARTFORD, CONN. — Interstate Vendaway, Inc., vending machine operating firm here, moved quickly to keep abreast of the changing demands for cigarettes in many of their Eastern Seaboard industrial locations.

Shortly after the Federal report on cigarettes was issued, Arthur Moss, supervisor for the Fairfield County territory in Connecticut, sensed a possible decline in cigarette vending machine sales, particularly in Avco Corporation's Lycoming Division plant in

Stratford. This plant houses some 7,900 employees and Vendaway keeps 20 cigarette machines operating to

20 cigarette machines operating to service the work force.

Moss immediately modified two National Pastry machines and placed in them pipe tobacco and cigars. He utilized Dutch Master cigars, had his own personnel package three cigars and a package of matches and vended the three for 50 cents.

In the other columns he placed Brindley's Mix, Amphora, Edgeworth, and Half and Half tobacco, each with a package of matches. These machines were above and beyond the standard lower priced cigar units which are located strategically through the 1,600,000 square foot plant.


Employee reaction was instantaneously favorable, according to Moss. The Dutch Master cigars were immediate sellouts while the pipe tobacco moved somewhat slower.

Volume was substantial and doubled in the second week of operation. Each succeeding week saw additional increases culminating in a decision to modify and install additional machines. In addition, Moss has negotiated with Dutch Master and other manufacturers to pre-package the higher priced cigars for installation in his machines.

Cigarette volume did decline as anticipated but a major portion of this sales decline was offset by the increased revenue from the new ma-

Juke Box Ops Program One Million Beatles

NEW YORK—The juke box industry will be responsible for the purchase of no less than one million Beatles singles before the end of this week. A Cash Box survey made amongst juke box ops and one-stops last week indicated that every operator is programming the Beatles, and that most are buying one of each single available for practically every machine (there are five Beatles singles). Based on the 500,000 juke boxes in the country, if half of 'em—250,000—use one of each single available (5) the figure 750,000 would appear to be a conservative one. One-stops, and the labels, contend that juke box sales more than likely will surpass the 1 million mark.

The DuGrenier family will remain in top exec posts while Seeburg handles the reins from Chicago. It is no secret that DuGrenier has long since been a "sale-to-location" firm, and with success. Many an operator has lost a location to an owner who decided to buy his own DuGrenier vendor. Things will change automatically now that Seeburg is calling the shots, and the machines will, through necessity, sell through Seeburg distributors.

The distribs are happy because DuGrenier makes a fine candy and cigarette vendor, and the ops are happy because they may now seek out the locations formerly sold by DuGrenier, and build them into solid income earning outlets. In the words of Seeburg's Del Coleman, "It's another move that will favor the independent encyptor." independent operator.

The darker side of things must fall on those who are not benefiting from the profits to be made from pool tables. One operator we know just placed his third table, and after years of procrastinating, has finally seen the light. If you can't beat 'em, operate 'em.

The Beatles are stirring up much noise in the record and juke box operating business. Operators like Harry Siskind, and Al Miniaci, are programming every Beatles disk they can lay their hands on (and there are five available). Both Master Automatic and Paramount program Beatles material on almost every juke box. A Paramount serviceman told us they're getting calls from Harlem locations, which is unusual.

Eric Bernay of A-1 Records said that for the first time in many years, the ops are replacing the disks because several have literally worn out (!). If quick estimates are accurate, and the information we have received from a quick-quick survey of the juke box industry is authentic, music operators in this country alone should have purchased about 1 million (1,000,000) Beatles disks to date, and they're awaiting the release of a new one soon.

Sad Note: One operator told us that collections just aren't that great because patrons play Beatles records to the detriment of the other records on the machine. "The take is about the same, but the play-meter shows mostly Reatles"

For the benefit of those who can operate Bally 'Spinners' in their territory, the machine referred to in a Feb. 8 editorial which takes in \$12.00 per week on a two-cent play is the 'Spinner,' a Bally game originally released last February, exactly one year ago. If you're up New England way, call Si Redd in Watertown, Mass., and he'll fill you in on the details.

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
