





Coin Machines Highlight Nat'l **Antique Show**

NEW YORK—A 1904 Caille Brothers' "Jumbo Success" fortune telling machine, a 1912 "Violano Virtuoso" Mills Novelty Co., music machine, and a "Madame X" flip-card viewer, all standing together, might suggest some mad, mechanized peep-show to some people, but to most coinmen it means another Fred Freed exhibit.

The 20th National Antiques Show, which was held at Madison Square Garden Feb. 26 through March 5, was supplied by Freed with these machines and more from his fascinating collection of coin-operated amusement and vending machines. He aptly titled his exhibit, "The Oldest Penny Arcade in the World."

One of the most entertaining of Freed's fifteen displays at the show was the "Violano Virtuoso," released by the Mills Novelty Company in 1912. The music machine console, composed of a mechanized clavicord and violin, played roll-music from opera to jazz. It was invented in 1905 by Henry K. Sandell, and according to Freed, was considered to be one of the ten greatest American inventions in its time. Freed used the music machine to provide background music for the slide presentations which he gave to familiarize patrons of the show with the antique machines in his exhibit.

Another of the exhibit's machines was a 1903 poker card-reel apparatus which if operational would dispense

Another of the exhibit's machines was a 1903 poker card-reel apparatus which, if operational, would dispense cigars to the player according to the size of the poker hand he could rack

Two amusement machines of the Two amusement machines of the more macabre variety were: the "Tingler," which provided the customer with a self-generated electric jolt; and a looking-glass apparatus, which, by the use of mirrors, would show the person looking in how his head would look as a skull. Freed said he had to put this last machine out of operation a few days after the show began, because "it scared the wits out of a kid." A "Mickey Finn" tug-o-war game, the last of an original 200 made by Caille Brothers, was nal 200 made by Caille Brothers, was too valuable to allow the show's visi-

tors to operate it, Freed said. One of Freed's two "Uncle Sam" hand-squeeze games was stuck on its highest possible score by one customer who turned out to be Mr. Universe, according to Freed.

Many visitors told Freed that his exhibit was the best in the entire antique show because the operation of many of the machines, like the flipcard viewer with Charlie Chaplin's "The Tramp," provided more enter-tainment than the mere observation of inanimate objects could give.

Freed has introduced his antique vendors and amusement machines at many shows and to quite a few museums. Of the vendors alone, he says he owns over 120, all unique and different. According to Freed, "these machines are a phase of Americana that can't be ignored." He was assisted at the exhibit by his son Robert and by a young hostess named Gail Fogel.


