

Much has been written over the years, and a great deal more has been left unwritten, on the subject of "sounds" needed to produce hit records. We've been reading some interesting literature on the subject recently from Canada—and it seems the position there is much the same as in Australia. Everyone is running around with "advice" on what is required of a single if it is to be a success; the strange part is that many people here are inclined to "knock" our local sounds. Some record companies here are under fire because they don't provide "big" backings; some are being condemned because their "big" sounds are too "cluttered-up." Cash Box examined the position closely recently and while we cannot offer a definite formula for producing hit records, we can report that there is no permanent formula and there probably never will be. If there was a set pattern for producing hits everyone in the business would be a millionaire; unfortunately, the record industry produces very few millionaires. Right at this moment, those in favor of big lush backings on singles are being set back severely by the resounding success of The Beatles. Record executives are saying that big backings don't make hit records, and right now they are correct. Let's take a look at some of the records that have topped our best-seller list over the past few months: "I Saw Her Standing There"; "I Want To Hold Your Hand"; "Dominique"; "Memphis Tennessee"; some of those close up were: "You Don't Own Me"; "The Harem"; "Glad All Over"; "Royal Telephone"; "Secret Love"; "Do You Love Me"; "Sugar Shack"; "Don't Talk To Him"; and "Maria Elena." In the main, most of these records have small backings and they've all been successful in the sales department.

One very noticeable feature about the local products is that they come in for much closer examination and criticism than the ready-made chart hits from overseas. This approach has probably been the cause of the failure of more local records than any other single factor. While the trade acceptance of the loca

"death" rate of the local product would fall-off to a large degree.

On a comparison basis, there isn't much lacking in the local record these days—except the equal chance to prove themselves in a market that is dominated by overseas records.

One other important factor in this matter involves the economics of the business. The local industry (due to our small consumer market) just cannot afford to continue to put up huge orchestras and choruses unless there is at least a high percentage of sales success, and this hasn't been the case of late. And it hardly seems necessary to go to this great expense on record sessions when a whole host of overseas records are making the grade in a big way with backings that are more in line with what is realistic to our conditions.

All that the local industry expects is an equal chance to prove its products alongside imported competitors. No special favors—just an equal chance. The same exposure, the same dealer support, the same overall attention that seems to be reserved for the overseas singles that come to Australia with chart ratings. The local industry has the potential to grow into an exciting business whereby everyone could benefit, so why don't we all get together and consolidate our efforts to achieve this end? It doesn't call for any super-human performances on the part of any individual. Let's start with just a little more action on the part of these people in a position to exert influence in favor of the local record; and then watch the effect it has. But it must be a consolidated drive, there's no point to having a few people doing all the work and the rest sitting back waiting to reap the benefits.

Three Topics Of Discussion

Discussions among coin machine and vending operators oftentimes bridge the local scene with the national picture. There is little that happens in a locale today that does not have some bearing on every operator in the country. Among the more important topics of this industry were three subjects which were receiving more than the usual amount of attention from operators last week, and each one was of interest both from the local and the national viewpoint.

The Veto

as exercised by New York State's Governor Nelson Rockefeller on two separate bills concerning the coin machine operator and his amusement machine equipment, came as a surprise to many operators in the State who had expected that the \$100 "substantial alteration" fee in the present law would exclude amusement equipment. Too, many ops had expected to become licensed by another amendment which would also have permitted the operation of free-play pinball machines. None of the legislation as approved by a favorable Assembly and Senate was signed by the Governor. One of the reasons given for the veto, was that a license would furnish a cloak of respectability for the very few whose practices it seeks to curb, and lulls the public into a false sense of security. Upstate operators who are in a position to operate pinball machines were dismayed by the news. City operators saw it as an avoidance of having to pay a license fee without being in a position to take advantage of the free-play clause. But all of the operators were talking about the veto and the interest spread across the nation to associations in other sections of the country who were already at work writing similar legislation for their own state. Another bill which effects operators is the recently passed Speno Bill, a New York State law which requires

A Sticker

on every cigarette vending machine in the State, effective July 1st, which states that the sale of cigarettes to persons under 18 years of age is prohibited by law. Similar legislation is on the books of 48 states but it has not been enforced over the years. Since the Tobacco-Health Reports, legislation such as this is common, and the progressive vending operator has already heeded the advice of the Operation Alert Program of two years ago. However, while operators talk of this new law, many machines stand on location without the sticker and conscientious association leaders scour the State preaching the gospel of no-sales-to-minors before the effective date when \$50 fines will be meted out to offenders. The third topic,

centered on record companies, who shied away from participation in MOA Conventions after several bad shows but began to trickle back last year. At the close of the '63 Convention it was apparent that the MOA Show would attract more record firms than last year. After three days of calling on record company execs in New York, Fred Granger, MOA's man-with-a-mission was more optimistic than ever. Major labels were giving the project serious consideration, while at least one agreed to exhibit. Some of the large independents were optimistic about their participation at MOA, and by the end of the week Granger's score was 1.000. He didn't hear a 'no' all week.

Belgian-US Pact Set

BRUSSELS—Various circumstances, complicated by misunderstandings created by several articles printed in foreign coin magazines (Cash Box, March 14) had created the belief that Morris B. Nahum, VP or R. H. Belam Company of New York, planned to intervene and influence various decisions concerning taxation of coinoperated machines in Belgium.

During his stay in Brussels, Nahum was able to exchange his views with Mr. De Vroey, national president of the UBA (Belgian Union of the Automatic Trade), thus eliminating what were thought to be contradicting points of view. BRUSSELS-Various

matic Trade), thus eliminating what were thought to be contradicting points of view.

Within the frame of a general agreement between his views and those of the U.B.A., Nahum emphasized the great need for a constant and close relationship with the Belgian operators in order to insure a healthy and prosperous future for the automatic market in Belgium.

On the other hand, Mr. De Vroey approved Mr. Nahum's position concerning pinball machines, which were the main subject of differences between the two parties, and assured that he would defend the principle of a substantially lower taxation, in proportion to their earning power. This will therefore allow the creation of appropriate outlets for this type of machine, by encouraging operators to put them on their routes at this low rate of taxation, according to release issued by R. H. Belam last week.

During their meeting, Nahum recognized that it would be senseless to defend the principle of taxing machines in proportion to their vintage, as these older machines, while costing less at their importation, could still be operated profitably.

Nahum, whose company represents, through their Belgian agents, several

American manufacturers of amusement games, has promised Mr. De Vroey all the backing of his company, as well as his agents. "In order to strengthen the policy of the U.B.A. we will put at the disposal of this organization every prototype of machine manufactured and intended for export, so that members of this organization can see, try, and appreciate these particular machines, said Nahum. "Furthermore, these machines will be put at the disposal of the authorities, in order to back the policy of lower taxation," he added. It has also been decided after this first joint agreement, that a continuous exchange of views between U.S. and Belgian coin men will allow a just and fair policy of exportation from the United States toward the Belgian market, stated Nahum in an interview with Cash Box last week.

Messrs. Nahum and De Vroey, wishing to make public their jointagreement, signed a protocol in Brussels on Tuesday, April 21, 1964, and authorized its release to all European trade magazines (see pictures).

Rockefeller Vetoes Licensing Measure As Not In Public Interest

Also Rejects Alteration Proposal

NEW YORK—Two major coin machine bills—the alteration bill and the licensing bill—were vetoed by Governor Nelson Rockefeller in Albany after both bills had been approved by the Assembly and the Senate. The legislation, which was practically handwritten by Mrs. Millie McCarthy of Hurleyville, was introduced by Senator Thomas Laverne and Assemblyman Richard Lounsberry. Text of both bills appeared in the April 11 issue of Cash Box pages 58 and 59.

In summary, the alteration bill would have amended the alcoholic beverage control law to exclude amusement devices from having to file an application with \$100 fee, as long as the game installation did not alter the seating capacity of the location.

capacity of the location.

The licensing bill was a two-pronged affair calling for owners of one or more machines (thereby including liquor dealers and locations who own their own amusement machine) to pay a license fee of \$600 every two years. The program would have been carried out under the supervision of the Secretary of State's office. It would have also amended section 982 of the penal law exempting free-play pinball machines from the law which prohibits certain types of equipment. Reaction from operators outside of the City was stronger than from within the City ops who cannot operate pinball machines anyway. Following is the official release from the Governor's office which accompanied the veto on the licensing bill:

Convinced It Was A Good Bill: Mrs. McCarthy

HURLEYVILLE, N.Y.—There may have been mixed emotions over Governor Rockefeller's two-pronged veto last week, but there was no doubt as to the feelings of Mrs. Millie McCarthy, the one-woman army who brought the Assembly and the Senate onto her side, almost singlehandedly, only to watch the fruits of her labor defeated by a veto. "I am now more convinced that ever that the Laverne-Lounsberry Licensing Bill contained the formula which would have cured our ills," said Mrs. McCarthy following word that her legislation was not accepted. She claims that the bill would have closed the door on the past and afforded every operator the opportunity to "build on a solid foundation." "What was sad," continued the lady operator," was that the most vehement objections were from our own industry and the liquor dealers, the very two it was designed to benefit." Mrs. McCarthy, sticking to her guns, insists that all it not lost. "The bill is written. The anguish, sweat and anxiety to mould it properly is behind us now."

In vetoing the bill, the Governor stated that a licensing bill with a clause excluding those in the business five years or more, would furnish a cloak of respectability to the few whose practices it seeks to curb. "It is depressing for me to realize that we are too low to be licensed, and according to SLA rule, to even own a bar," said the Hurleyville operator. She said that should this section be relaxed, next year's chances of passage would be good.

In Mrs. McCarthy's opinion, the bill contained fourteen good points. She had said that the bill governed the man, not the machine, as a per-machine-tax would do. Mrs. McCarthy stated for the record that she was grateful to Senator Thomas Laverne, Assemblyman Lounsberry, his assistant Georg Montgomery, and to Jack Shawcross, Rex-Bilotta Corporation manager. Bucky Van Wyck, head of Nyack Slate Co.; Mike Mulqueen, President of the NYS Guild and the association members; and those in other states who offered help. "As for me," stated Mrs. McCarthy, "I did this selfishly

MEMORANDUM filed with Senate Bill, Introductory Number 3569, Print Number 4579, entitled: "AN ACT to amend the general business law and the penal law, in relation to coin-operated amusement machines, and making an appropriation therefor" NOT APPROVED This bill would add a new article to the Penal Law authorizing the Secretary of State to license and regulaw owners and lessors of coin-operated amusement machines, some of which are commonly known as "pinball" machines.

This bill would weaken State and local efforts to curb illegal gambling devices and is not in the public interest. First-Quarter Cig Sales Dip **More Drastic Than Expected**

Tobacco Institute Adopts New Ad Code

NEW YORK—As first-quarter sales figures trickled from some of the nation's tobacco companies like the early returns in an election, it appeared as though the sales dip which resulted from the Surgeon General's December report was more drastic than had first appeared. Many of the companies reported recuperative upswings, however, in late March and early April.

companies reported recuperative upswings, however, in late March and early April.

During the three months succeeding the report, which linked smoking with cancer and other diseases, it was obvious that smokers were shying away from cigarettes in large numbers. The hardest hit company was P. Lorillard, who reported a first-quarter sales drop of 50%. Other companies which reported a dip for the first three months were: R. J. Reynolds with a 6.6% drop, the American Tobacco Company with 1.8%, and Liggett & Myers with a 2.3% drop.

Meanwhile, the Tobacco Institute, representing most of the tobacco

representing most of the tobacco manufacturers, announced that it had drawn up a new advertising code which would rigidly guide future cigarette advertising. The new code, which was formulated more or less

under indirect pressure from official U.S. health organizations, is primarily designed to prevent advertising which would tend to motivate young people into becoming cigarette smokers.

The strict new code was voluntarily agreed upon by the tabases companies

The strict new code was voluntarily agreed upon by the tobacco companies. To prevent the creation of young smokers, the companies have agreed to prohibit: all cigarette advertising in high school and college newspapers; any athlete, and all persons having special appeal to those under 21 years of age, from endorsing cigarettes; the appearance of cigarette advertising in media specifically directed at young people; all promotion of this product on school and college campuses; and ads which might infer that cigarettes have a beneficial effect on health, unless such is scientifically

cigarettes have a beneficial effect on health, unless such is scientifically proven.

The code, which is still subject to the approval of the U.S. Justice Dept., will probably mean a substantial loss in income to many athletes and celebrities. A paid administrator will be appointed by the Institute to enforce the code. He will have the power to fine violators up to \$100,000 and to make public the infractions which incurred the fine.

Service School Sessions Seen As **Essential To Rowe AC Sales Program**

CHICAGO—A continuing program of service schools for vending machine distributors and operators is "basic" to Rowe AC Manufacturing's over-all sales and merchandising program, according to Jack Harper, Rowe AC President.

Harper said that Rowe AC's field service program, under the direction of James S. Abato, Director of Service Engineering, will continue to expand in 1964 to cover as many distributors and operators as possible in all parts of the country.

"There's no such thing as knowing

"There's no such thing as knowing a piece of equipment perfectly," Abato said. "For this reason, we want to help all service personnel understand their equipment better. Each school session covers one or two pieces of equipment at a time, giving concentrated demonstration and instruction which will remain with the men on

trated demonstration and instruction which will remain with the men on the job," he stated.

High on Abato's list of service "rules" is preventive maintenance. "It's easier and more profitable to keep a machine in working order rather than forget it until it needs servicing," he advised.

A continuing service schedule as

A continuing service schedule according to Abato, also should include: service to improve machine's appearance, to keep it attracting customers

longer; properly serviced drink and coffee machines to keep taste and aroma high; and regular service attention to sanitation procedures maintaining high product quality and health safeguards.

Abato stated that Rowe AC is now regularly scheduling "scores" of service schools throughout the courtry. 


