## **More Commercial Outlets Seen If England's Socialist Govt. Falls**

LONDON — Expectations of a radical change in radio broadcasting if the Socialist Government falls at the next change in radio broadcasting if the Socialist Government falls at the next General Election were strengthened by an unequivocal pledge by Conservative party spokesman Paul Bryan to the effect that his party when in power will set up 100 or more commercial radio stations around the country un-der the general supervision of the In-dependent Television Authority with regard to awarding program contracts and control of material transmitted. Bryan declared that the present Government experiment with local radio stations under the aegis of the BBC was "heading for a totally fore-seeable financial collapse." He stated that local newspapers should be per-mitted a financial interest in the pro-posed commercial stations to offset any loss of advertising revenue and to facilitate good news bulletin coverage. BBC executive Sir Hugh Green has BBC executive Sir Hugh Green has disclosed that no decisions about scrap-ping Radio 3 or other economies have been made yet until the BBC com-mittee and the McKinsey business ef-ficiency organization have completed their studies and reported. We're a little late, folks, but it takes time to gather statistics and the Ger-man recording industry just got around to releasing the count on re-tord sales for 1968. First of all, the total records sold increased by 20% with a 37% increase in LP sales and a 17% increase in single sales. Not bad, huh? Sales are close to the 1/2 billion DM (125 million dollars) mark which is the magic sum for the re-cord industry here. The sales are low-priced items priced from \$1.25 to \$5.0 Exports also rose about 20% due to LP exports. Import is decreasing, Let's check the statistics list compared with 1967.

All of the sales figures mentioned above were sold through record dealers. Additional sales of 8.1 million records were booked compared with 8.7 million in 1967. Again, singles and 12" LP's increased there as well. 14.6 million of the LP's were low-priced and 14.2 million were regular-priced merchandise. Classical records ac-counted for 100,000 singles sales. 1 million BP sales, 200,000 10" LP sales and 8.2 million 12" LP sales. This in-cludes non-retail sales through racks and clubs. This figure was a 4.4% in-crease over the year before with 12" LP's the only catagory where sales rose.

In the pop field, 31.8 million singles In the pop field, 31.8 million singles were sold compared with 27.1 million the year before. LP sales accounted for 2.2 million compared with 3.7 million in 1967. 10" LP's dropped from 500,000 in 1967 to 200,000 in "68" and 12" LP's rose a whopping 47.4% from 17.1 million to 25.2 million. The total increase booked was 22.7%. Exports dropped from 18.4 million records to 16.8 million with LP's marking the only increase with a 20.2% jump. This means that LP sales topped the singles sales in number for the first time in the history of this mar-ket 28% of the sales were classical and 72% pop for a whopping increase in the pop sector. # **COIN MACHINE NEWS**

## EDITORIAL: Junior Fun Centers

Our sincere thanks to those in the coin trade who took the time to write or phone their approval of last week's special section devoted to Family Fun Centers. Preparing the section was something of an education for us, since our principle concentration has always focused on the street location as opposed to the amusement arcade. Once again, thanks to those who contributed articles and to the many who back us in our belief that fun centers, styled for the family clientele, do offer the amusement industry a waiting and lucrative market.

Several comments on the expense of installing and operating such Family Fun Centers are worth detailing, however. It seems in our desire to promote the larger amusement parlor, not enough emphasis was given to the smaller games grouping such as exists in hotels, motels, bowling alleys, snack bars, etc. These "mini-cades", as some prefer to call them, offer the smaller operator his opportunity for entering the arcade business at a price he can afford, a minimum of risk and with a "built-in trade-in value" if he buys new equipment and decides to remove the equipment after six months, should the installation fail to pan out. We say "built-in trade-in value" because it's always wise for a games operator interested in arcade or mini-cade operation to approximate the potential used market value of his machines since it is absolutely essential that new games be rotated into amusement arcades at annual or semi-annual intervals in order to maximize the collection yield.

Operators interested in this so-called "minimum risk" method of entering the arcade business should sit down and chart out the following information:

1. Write down the names of your locations where a minicade could be installed, where floor or room space is available and where sufficient clientele are exposed to it. Think of the spots where you presently have cigarette machines, places other than street locations, for these usually offer the best possibilities.

2. Look down your list and check off those locations where you have the best relations with their owners. Good will is almost essential since many locations harbor an unfavorable image of arcades and your sales resistance will be eased if the guy you're talking to is a friend.

3. Drop into your local distributor, look over the latest games, pick up literature on your favorites and jot down his prices.

4. Visit your "most likely location". Show the color brochures you picked up at the distributor and suggest how they will best fit into the area you select at his establishment. Mini-cades are especially sound ideas at locations which cater more or less to a captive audience and where little or no entertainment exists for its customers. Such an installation at a busy motel can work wonders for you and for the location itself. It's a healthy, fun way to keep the guests entertained.

Truly, mini-cades of the above description offer small operating companies an excellent opportunity to upgrade the profits without too large a capital investment. The writing is already on the wall — "amusement machines are what's happening!"

## **Oregon Assn. Fights Anti-Game Bill**

Anderson, PORTLAND Donald secretary-treasurer of the Oregon Amusement and Music Association said last week that there is a move-ment going on in that state that is drawing operators closer and closer

Anderson said, "This movement is in the form of a bill sponsored by one of our local house representative to out-law pin games and other like games with replay features. In this bill there is also a clause that would make it illegal to place prizes or any other promotional program to increase the play on machines such as bowlers. If this bill is passed it would only al-low the operators here to operate phonographs and pool tables." "Mr. Steelhammer, who has been retained by the association to lobby in their behalf, has asked the associa-tion members to contact each of their local representatives. A draft letter was sent to each of them to use as a guide line in composing their own correspondence." Anderson revealed. "In this draft letter it was pointed over \$160,000 to the state in taxes which would be lost if this bill were passed. It also mentioned the effect on the counties which would lose the revenue from personal property taxes now being paid by the amusement own being paid by the amusement own being paid by the amusement own being paid by the amusement out har association has contacted vari-ous other associations such as the Oregon Restaurant and Beverage As-

sociation asking them for their support in this matter. Since the small tavern owners and cafe owners depend large-ly on the income from these machines

ly on the income from these machines to pay their wages and rent, the as-sociation feels there will be a large response. "If everyone does their part, Mr. Steelhammer feels he will be able to defeat this bill," he further stated. "Mr. Steelhammer has already shown his ability in this field. Last month there was a sales tax proposed to the Oregon legislature that included a \$.01 per pack tax to be levied on all cigarettes sold. This tax would have had to have been absorbed by all had to have been absorbed by all the vending operators. Mr. Steel-hammer was able to bring about the defeat of this portion of the bill, thus saving a considerable amount of money for the vending operators," he said.

## MUSIC OPERATORS OF AMERICA **BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING**



NEW ORLEANS -"I want to thank NEW ORLEANS — "I want to thank all of you for coming to this meeting," said MOA president Howard Ellis in his opening address during the 1969 Board of Directors gathering at the Hotel Monteleone in New Orleans the weekend of March 6, 7, and 8th. "Our association is on as solid as it has ever been ... all departments are healthy and they will stay that way as long as we continue to use our best level of thinking in all areas of our activities."

Ellis elaborated on his ideas for fur-Ellis elaborated on his ideas for fur-ther promotion and expansion of his current public relations program. "I am very pleased with results so far. Ray Barker has made speeches before two groups and reported that he was received very nicely on both occasions, especially the second time because of the questions he was asked the first time out." out

time out." During the discussion it was recom-mended by Barker and Sam Wiseman that members planning to deliver the speech make an attempt to gain invi-tations from local political groups on the basis that, "political groups will get more done for us because they are the ones who make our state laws." The nossibility of making a series get more done for us because they are the ones who make our state laws." The possibility of making a series of slides that could be shown along with the speech was also discussed. Ellis also revealed that a public relations committee consisting of offi-cers, directors and the executive vice president, Fred Granger, would be formed within the next few weeks for the sole purpose of reviewing candi-dates for the MOA Civic Service Award. The award, will be given to members who distinguish themselves in their community through civic con-tributions. MOA will make more in-formation on this subject available in the near future.


On the subject of new nomination and election procedures, Ellis said, "I had asked Fred Granger to make a study of our bylaws with a view to bringing our own nominating and elec-tion precedures, into the with more a study of our bylaws with a view to bringing our own nominating and elec-tion procedures into line with more commonly accepted practices." He went on to say, "on the strength of that study, our directors passed a motion that members will elect direc-tors and directors will elect our offi-cers." Ellis further stated, "Also, the board of directors have agreed that in the future they will be responsible for electing a nominating committee which will consist of one **past presi-dent**, one **vice president**, one **director** from each of the three term categor-ies, two **members** at large and three **alternates** which will consist of two from the board and one from the mem-bership at large. The nominating com-mittee for officers will consist of the same as for directors except that the Past Presidents Council automatically becomes the nominating committee for officers acch year with the im-Past Presidents Council automatically becomes the nominating committee for officers each year with the im-mediate past president as chairman. "The reason for this is that the past presidents are no longer seeking office for themselves whereas some mem-bers of the board serving on this com-mittee might feel that this prevents them from being nominated for office themselves," said Ellis.



Greater Union Operators And Record People



The allocation to reserve may be 5 or 10 percent of the annual income until the total reserve reaches what may be considered a safe amount. A reserve equivalent to one year's income would give an associa-

Monies from this fund may only be withdrawn by a two-thirds vote of the board of directors." Another area that was discussed at this point in the meeting was that of objections on the part of some exhibi-tors about offensive films and drinks served on the floor. It was the opinion of a goodly number of the directors that activities of this nature be con-fined to hospitality suites, on the basis that nine out of ten who attend the conventions attend solely to look over new equipment, see old friends and gather information that might help them out in their business back home. Granger said, "sometime this month we will hold two meetings with ex-hibitors — one with the games fac-tories and one with the games fac-tories and one with the phonograph manufacturers — to review the ground rules and ask their participation in recommendations that will help us to run a better convention. We, at the association, and I feel most of the trade, wants a show that will help everybody." Granger also requested a review of present member classifications and dues categories. 

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



THE CIGARETTE SCENE — A new turn in the smoking and health argu-ment popped up last week when anti-smoking Senator Moss (D.Utah) raised the "sinister" implication that cigarette companies are trying to get smokers hooked harder on the weed by raising the nicotine contents. The tobacco industry termed the accusa-tion "absurd." The argument stemmed from a new Federal Trade Commission report on tar and nicotine content of 126 varieties of smokes. It was the third batch of data from an FTC smoking machine, but the first time the agency compared each brand's score with earlier test results. The FTC reported that 78 of the varieties tested in February showed an in-crease in nicotine content from their scores in a test last October. Moss said he hoped the reason can be found in variations in the tobacco crop of FTC test methods, and then added: "If not, it would be hard to escape the conclusion that the com-panies that produce these brands are deliberately stepping up the nicotine yield. We know that nicotine is close-ly related to the addictive or habit-uating quality of cigarette smoking," he stated. The Senator, currently the most outspoken antismoking critic on Capitol Hill, is sending letters to all the cigarette manufacturers ask-ing them to explain or justify the FTC figures.
