

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Required Roadwork

The music promo or sales man who is elevated to a national position usually leaves behind a long trail of roadwork, if not one-nighters. His promotion to national status may well engender the feeling that he has paid his dues and is entitled to the respite from the grind of generating action on a record or song based on arduous contact in the field. In directing a network of local promo and sales forces, he may feel that his primary functions are telephone contact and various administrative functions required to analyze and define field reports.

Such home-office procedures are certain to preclude a national man's return to the road on a continuous basis. Yet, in the performance of his duties, is the national man exempt from occassional road trips? We think not. For, as a national man recently pointed out to us, much of the nittygritty of getting a record or song or artist on the road to success still remains in the hands of city-by-city contact. As any promo man knows, there are many changes that take place on the local music scene. There is a high-rate of deejay turnover; distrib promo and sales personnel are themselves possibilities for national jobs; new record outlets and talent show cases emerge.

The local scene, then, is in constant flux. And the people and places

the national man knew so well during his stint as a local man may no longer be around, with a new generation of important contacts in their place. Even if there is little change in an area, the national man should realize that the written word or the telephone contact is merely a good substitute for personal meet-and-greet contact. Bringing in one's staff to the home office is a good idea, of course, but what about getting together with local people on their homeground? The national man can get a truer firsthand view of the market when he makes the scene himself and is filled in by the rep there without the competition of other reps. And it's also a matter of displaying the importance of each and every market when a national man takes the time to drop-

The first vocational home for a national man is, obviously, the home-office. He has been situated there to perform vital tasks, including an involvement in important policy decisions that can effect the entire scope of a music operation. He must, however, make it his business to take some time off away from the home-office and reacquaint himself from time-to-time with what's happening in the field — first hand. Only then can he have a meaningful rapport with the total national picture for which he has been given the responsibility.

It is presently receiving coast-to-coast airtime.

Artie Ripp, president of Buddah Records, heard the record while on a tour of Frisco and brought it to the attention of his partners. Neil Bogart, vice president and general manager of Buddah, and Art Kass, executive vice president of Buddah, flew to San Francisco over the weekend of April 5-6, and concluded the distribution arrangement.

The gospel group was formed in May, 1967 by Edwin Hawkins and Betty Watson with the concept of inspiring . "religious feeling in young people." To this end, Hawkins explains, "we presented these songs with the inspirational feeling that people all over the world would be able to identify with.

NEW YORK — The Association of the Record Dealers of N.Y. and N.J. has embarked on a major advertising campaign. A.R.D., through its N.Y. based advertising agency, Aladdin Advertising Service, is hitting the major consumer market place with the cooperation of record manufacturers and distributors. The first to participate in this program was Decca Records, with 21 members with store names and addresses listed below the advertised album. The 400 line ad was placed in the N.Y. Daily News Sunday Edition on March 23. The next ad for A.R.D. was also in the Sunday Daily News on March 30 from Skye Records and had a total of 25 dealers listed. Prior to the adsappearing in the news, each participating dealer stocked up the advertised merchandise. When the adbroke, window displays were put up and records were played in stores. The ads were paid for by the manufacturer with the monies accumulated for individual dealer advertising. "In the past, a single dealer could not buy a major consumer market but in a group the avenues are open to them," A.R.D. noted. There is a drive to recruit at least 100 members, thus bringing the cost of advertising down to the label or distributor, on the agenda of the next A.R.D. meeting on April 15. A decision will be made as to whether advertised discount prices are to continue with institutional advertising. Bourne publishes dozens of other Chaplin pieces that graced such films as "The Great Dictator," "King in New York," "City Lights" and "Chaplin Revue." Chaplin's last success, "This is My Song," is not a Bourne copyright. For its Chaplin catalog, Bourne will seek additional disk coverage of his songs and arrange for airtime tributes.

RCA Obtains Poppy's World Rights

NEW YORK — RCA Records will distribute records produced by Poppy Industries, Inc. throughout the world. Announcement was made jointly by Harry Jenkins, RCA vice president of record operations, and Kevin Eggers, founder and president of Poppy Industries. Under the agreement, effective immediately, the Poppy Records logo will be merchandised through RCA, with the first three LPs to be released in April and May.

One of the initial releases under the long-term pact includes Poppy's first package by Dick Gregory. A two-record set entitled "Dick Gregory: The Light Side, The Dark Side," the album will mark Gregory's first record appearance in a number of years, and is the first of three releases Gregory, will record for Poppy, this and is the first of three releases Gregory will record for Poppy this

year.
Also included in the April-May release will be a deck by poet-singer Townes Van Zandt, entitled "Our Mother The Mountain" and the second Poppy LP of Philadelphia's top progressive group, The Mandrake Memorial, entitled "Medium."

Basically an album line, Poppy's promotional push will be directed mainly at underground and college media. Poppy's operation will be on an independent basis, with full artistic control over its product. Poppy will provide finished product to RCA for distribution. Art work for the Poppy label and Poppy album covers will be by Milton Glaser, director of New York's Push Pin Studios. Studios.

RCA presently manufacturers and distributes two other labels, Colgems, from Columbia Pictures, and Chart Records, a country marketed label. A domestic deal for Request Records, an international line, was recently terminated.

NY A Summer Fest Of Series For Top-Drawer Talent Shows

NEW YORK — Summer music festivals in New York have been gaining in popularity over the last few years, as more and more acts developed into high-draw attractions, and 1969 into high-draw attractions, and 1969 could be the moment of truth for such events, as six summer-long weekend series are on the drawing boards for the New York area. In addition, several other showplaces will be scheduling shows on a sporadic basis, and at least two major music festivals are planned.

least two major music lestivals are planned.

Heading the list of concert series are the long-running Central Park Schaeffer Music Festival and the Forest Hills Music Fest. The Schaeffer series, with a probable price raise to \$1.50 per ticket, will run from June 25 to Aug. 27, and will feature such acts as Canned Heat; Blood, Sweat & Tears; the Beach Boys, Creedence Clearwater Revival; Led Zeppelin; Tom Paxton; Rhinoceros; Ten Years After and many others. The Forest Hills series resumes its Saturday night schedule on June 21 with the Monkees. Other possible acts include Dionne Warwick; Janis Joplin; Steve Lawrence & Eydie Gorme; the 5th Dimension; Peter, Paul & Mary; Blood, Sweat & Tears; and Sam & Dave.

A series of dance/concerts, featuring four name disk acts each Friday & Saturday, kicks off May 2 (no Saturday show opening week) at Madison Square Garden's Felt Forum. The town of Mt. Vernon will hold an every Saturday night series of shows, with Blood, Sweat & Tears; the Brooklyn Bridge; Jerry Vale: Pat Cooper; Joni Mitchell; Tim Hardin; the James Cotton Blues Band; O.C. Smith; Buddy Rich; the Checkmates LTD; Ella Fitzgerald; Stevie Wonder; and James Brown set so far.

Cash Box has learned of two possible series being planned for the old World's Fair site. One, similar to the Forest Hills concerts, will mix rock, underground and good music attractions. The other is said to be an outdoor, San Francisco-styled ballroom, complete with light show and top underground acts.

Roosevelt Raceway will probably be the site for a July 4th weekend rock spectacular, with possible participation by Blood, Sweat & Tears, Jeff Beck and Led Zeppelin among many others. Also in the works is a Monterey-styled festival in Woodstock, N.Y. (home of Bob Dylan, Tim Hardin and others), probably in August, with Tim Hardin, Richie Havens, Creedence Clearwater, Steppenwolf & BS&T being mentioned as possible participants.

Bill Graham's Fillmore East has not set its summer plans, but according to manager Kip Cohen, last summer's policy of opening only with first-rate shows is likely to be continued. Current bookings run into June, with one show booked for July and one for August. The 1969 Harlem Cultural Festival, sponsored by the Maxwell House Coffee Division of General Foods, will also be using music acts.

Dodd (D-Conn), Vance Hartke (D-Ind.), Hugh Scott (R-Pa.), Claiborne Pell (D-R.I.) and Stephen M. Young (D-O.).

Under the terms of the amendment, radio stations and others would have to be licensed and pay royalties that would be shared by record companies and performers.

In offering the amendment, Senator Williams declared that the present copyright law as well as the pending revision bill do not protect the creative work of record companies and performers. He noted that authors and composers receive royalties from the commercial play of recordings while record companies and performers do not. January's Pulse Survey tells us that rock outlet KHJ again leads the pack with a resounding 14% overall share of the L.A. audience. Prompting p.d. Ron Jacobs' quote, "If AM tops 40's dying, I can't wait for the resurrection." Pulse charts 29 local stations including 4 FM'ers. Of the top ten rated only three may be considered top 40 (allowing R&B outlet KGFJ which boasts a very healthy 7% share of the local audience). All formula top 40's combined add up to about 30% of the L.A. radio market, which means that the rest of L.A. is hearing news, MOR, classical, foreign language, semi-classical, jazz, talk and country. It also means about 70% of L.A. is NOT listening to top 40.

Picks of the Week

TOMMY ROE (ABC 11211)
Heather Honey (2:52) (Low-Twi, BMI — Roe)
Regaining his equilibrium, Tommy Roe settles down on his "Dizzy" follow-up serving a ballad to change the pace. The smooth vocal surface is juxtaposed on a jangling rock instrumental foundation which gives the side a heavy teen attraction to spark yet another Roe sales storm. Flip: "Money is My Pay" (2:35) (Low-Twi, BMI — Roe, Weller)

Too Busy Thinking About My Baby (2:57) (Jobete, BMI — Whitfield, Bradford) Fine new solo from Marvin Gaye on his latest which has him perking with a medium paced rock effort. Solid vocal, and good material is heightened by a phenomenal production using tom-tom effectiveness to stoke up dance fan fires. Total pop and r&b standout. Flip: "Wherever I Lay My Hat" (2:18) (Jobete, BMI — Gaye, Whitfield, Strong)

JOSE FELICIANO (RCA 9739)
Marley Purt Drive (3:49) (Casserole, BMI — B, R & M Gibb)
Bee Gees' song, Big Pink sound and a little more that is strictly Feliciano give this side a powerhouse drive which should bring Jose home with his biggest since (and maybe including) "Light My Fire." Slow, muscular pop-blues blend carrying immediate impact and dynamite potential. Flip: "Old Turkey Buzzard" (1:53) (Colgems, ASCAP — Jones, Douglas)

PEGGY SCOTT & JO JO BENSON (SSS Int'l 769)
I Want to Love You Baby (2:33) (Green Owl, ASCAP — Hill)
Slowing the pace a bit, Peggy Scott and Jo Jo Benson add vocal impact to make up for this new sound that takes them out of their "Mountain Berries" bag. Track is loaded with dynamite instrumental support from brass and bass lines that should wrap up a solid programming and sales showing for this effort. Flip info not included.

MONGO SANTAMARIA (Columbia 44812)
The Now Generation (2:24) (Mongo, BMI — Allen)
Floating down from his "Cloud Nine" breakout, Mongo Santamaria goes with an original side this time, and a powerful one it turns out to be. Track is a Latin/Soul set with the flair to capture instant teen and blues market airplay, and a possible spread into young-sounding MOR formats. Wild side with flying sparks. Flip: "Where We Are" (3:31) (Mongo, BMI — Grant)

WILLIE MITCHELL (Hi 2158)
Young People (2:17) (Jec, BMI — Love, Jackson)
Intense instrumental atmosphere is created by some heavy bass work and a low-keyed song that is headed for strong blues market showings and a solid start for top forty showings. The Memphis team takes a larger share of the spotlight on Willie Mitchell's new side, but it's the Mitchell break that puts it out of sight. Flip: "Kitten Korner" (2:17) (Jec, BMI — Mitchell, Hodges)

OTIS & CARLA (Atco 6665) When Something Is Wrong With My Baby (3:02) (East/Memphis/Pronto, BMI—

Hayes, Porter)
The magic that is generated in Otis Redding/Carla Thomas duets is reled into a solid old side with the effectiveness to attract immediate r&b action. Fine blues performance sets the side for added impact with top forty programmers to spark an overall breakout. Flip: "Ooh Carla, Ooh Otis" (2:33) (East/Memphis/Time/Redwal, BMI — Redding, Isbell)

BOBBY DARIN (Direction 351)

Me & Mr. Hohner (3:15) (Argent, BMI — Darin)

Darin goes Dylan in this saga of police brutality which, aside from a few up to date touches, could have been based on the "Subterranean Homesick Blues." Some brilliant lyrical lines aim this track at the progressive FM audience with the topical strength that brough in "Long Line Rider" action last time out. Word of mouth and the likely underground action should prove forceful in alerting AM programming. Flip: "Song for a Dollar" (3:15) (Same credits) Less controversy and more of the "Long Line" sytle.

WILLIAM BELL (Stax 0032

My Whole World Is Falling Down (3:05) (East/Memphis, BMI Coming on with a snappier side and less lamenting feel this time, William Bell broadens his commercial prospect in the follow up to "I Forgot to Be Your Lover." Side is a slow-to-medium effort which should see action with blues spinners and even more pop stations this time. Flip: No info supplied.

THE MILLS BROTHERS (Dot 17235)
What Have I Done for Her Lately (2:57) (BNP, ASCAP — Blair, Kay)
Beautiful ballad side in the "Little Green Apples" vein offers the Mills Brothers a lyrical, sentimental winner that shows off their team's style to advantage. Certain to attract easy listening attention, the song is solid enough to connect in MOR locations and possibly spread pop. Flip: "Guy on the Go" (2:48) (Geo. Pincus & Sons, ASCAP — Shuman, Carr)

PATTI AUSTIN (United Artists 50520)
The Family Tree (3:11) (Sunbeam, BMI — Nissenson, DeFran)
Society girl breaks the class barrier in this song, but it's the Patti Austin performance that gives this unusual narrative side a TNT whallop. Slow soul backup is all but eclipsed by the outstanding vocal that makes this a side with blistering intensity and the power to net explosive sales and r&b/pop play. Flip: "Magical Boy" (3:05) (Blackwood, BMI — Stroll, Weinstein)

THE HESITATIONS (GWP 504

Is This The Way to Treat a Girl (2:47) (Millbridge, BMI — Hopson)

Doing an original song for the first time in their singles career, the Hesitations come up with a whole new thing. Sporting a new flourish and even greater rhythmic emphasis than before, the team has come up with a side that should have them coming back into the action with r&b fans and a chunk of the top forty public. Flip: "Yes I'm Ready" (2:50) (Stilran/Dandelion, BMI — Mason)

BOBBY FREEMAN (Double Shot 139)

Everybody's Got a Hangup (2:49) (Big Shot, ASCAP — Rodgers, Winn)

Long time gone, but Bobby "Do You Wanna Dance" Freeman is back with a near-novelty side that should see plenty of teen and blues action. Peculiar approach for a love song gives the side a unique listener attention-grabber and the lid's rhythmic jabs are bound to prove the extra plus that nets breakouts for the outing. Flip: "Oughta Be a Law" (2:24) (Hot Shot, "BMI — Rodgers)

ELVIS PRESLEY (RCA 0130)
How Great Thou Art (2:58) (Manna, BMI — Hine)
Airplay prior to the Easter weekend has forced a new single release of this inspirational LP track by Elvis. The artist's heavy resurgence and his fine performance of this religious standard should draw solid sales activity for the issue. Flip: "His Hand in Mine" (3:12) (Bregman, Vocco & Conn, ASCAP — Lister)

JOHNNY MATHIS (Columbia 44837)
I'll Never Fall in Love Again (2:58) (Blue Seas/Jac/E.H. Morris, ASCAP — Bacharach, David)
One of Mathis' most delightful performances in quite some time, with a younger lilt and the charm of a sparkling song from "Promises, Promises." The especially captivating lyric and sweet arrangement gives this side a heavy prospect for the easy/MOR listening market; and it could break open from there. OLA & THE JANGLERS (GNP Crescendo 423)
What a Way to Die (2:59) (Geo. Pincus, ASCAP — Weiss, Schlaks)
An established continental act, Ola & the Janglers make a strong bid for stateside recognition with this fine ballad almost on the lines of "Gotta Get a Message to You." Stunningly produced with an appeal for rock and semi-soft play, the track is a potent left-field choice. Flip: "Let's Dance" (2:22) (Tamerlane/Rondell, BMI — Lee) Rock favorite with beat magnetism.

PEGGY LIPTON (Ode 118)
Red Clay County Line (2:47) (Canopy, ASCAP — Webb)
The haunting Webb Trademark is etched into a song that sounds more like a slice of Laura Nyro material here. In any event, this off-beat love ballad is splendidly handled by Mod-Squadess Peggy Lipton as a stunning single which could establish her on the teen musical platform. Flip: "Just a Little Lovin' " (2:30) (Screen Gems/Columbia, BMI — Mann, Weil)

HAL FRAZIER (VMC 742)
Didn't We (2:43) (Ja-Ma, ASCAP — Webb)
Business insiders have become familiar with this Jim Webb song that is almost a standard despite the fact that nobody has hit with it yet. Now, backed by recent television exposure and LP track play, Hal Frazier delivers a brilliant single of the ballad to knock teen and adult admirers on their ears. THE EDDY JACOBS EXCHANGE (Columbia 44821)




