

It is dedicated to Ormandy and the orchestra. Also on the program and to be re-corded are "A Portrait of the Bea-tles," "Strings on Fire," "Music from Hollywood," and "Music by Mancini," the latter to include some of his most popular songs.

1969 got off to a good start in the British record industry, according to Board of Trade statistics for the month of January issued by the Ministry of Technology. Production of all types of disks for the month totalled 10.051,000, 6% higher than for January, 1968, and the highest level achieved since Nov-ember, 1967. Albums took the limelight again, showing an increase of 28% over last year at 5,456,000, while 45 r.p.m. disks dipped once more by 13% to 4,578,000. Exports rose by 10% to attain a value of £395,000, and the total sales value for the month was £2,619-000, the export gain being offset by a small drop in home sales. **Douglas Muggeridge**, controller of BBC's Radio 1 and 2, announced summer scheduling plans April 17th. The format shows little change apart from some reshuffling in timings for existing series, and a greater separa-tion between the two services towards the attainment of a pop image for Radio 1 and sweet music for Radio 2 and less sharing of programs. Mug-geridge emphasized that this factor applied to the summer months only and was not necessarily an indication of what would happen beyond that period. The eventual pattern depended

of the various enquiries in progress on broadcasting. A new series which began April 26th is "Stage One" which is intended as a showcase for new disk jockeys and acts. Aspiring disk jockeys in the show who drew favorable listener reaction would be offered other BBC radio spots. Ed "Stewpot" Stewart, who has built the "Junior Choice" request program listening figures into six figures sec-ond only to "World Wide Family Favor-ites" over the past fifteen months, is being dropped from the series at the end of this month. He may be brought back in the fall if the show is still running then. The Association of Broad-casting Staff, which represents most of the BBC's radio and TV production personnel, has called for an increase in the radio license fee to prevent any reduction in services. A radio only license at present costs twenty-five shillings per year. As an alternative to an increase, the ABS suggested that the BBC should accept advertisements on Radio 1. Their manager Robert Stigwood says guarantees for the sixteen-concert tour are around half a million dollars. It is not clear at present whether Robin Gibb will make the tour or not. He has stated he will never appear with the group again, and Stigwood has issued writs against him and former Bee Gee press agent Chris Hutchins claiming damages and restraining them from attempting to break exist-ing contracts binding the singer to the Bee Gees for the next three years. Stigwood declares the tour will take place with or without Robin Gibb. Ken Howard and Alan Blaikley are the authors once again of the new Fontana single by Dave Dee, Dozy, Beaky, Mick and Tich called "Snake In The Grass" and published by Lynn Music. The twosome have also joined forces with songwriter Barry Mason to pen "Alcock And Brown" which has been recorded by the Balloon Busters for Pye release here and on the Chess label in the States. 

EDITORIAL: Putting Money Back Into The Industry

"Operators are a funny breed," say more than a few manufacturers, distributors and even some operators themselves. "They'll spend more time trying to jump someone else's location than taking care of their own; they don't support their associations unless their own particular business is threatened by a piece of legislation, a direct seller or some other immediate danger; they don't care a hoot about the industry they're part of, just the dollars and cents they can squeeze out of the route." These and other indictments have been leveled against the music and games operator over the years, and with no small degree of truth.

The operator, who stands at the front line of this trade, is a hard-nosed character . . . but, for good reason. Who else takes knocks at the location, puts up with breakin's, makes midnight service calls, has to watch every dollar spent for new machines and generally protect a hard-built investment from a hundred other assorted dangers? He might be reluctant to try new ideas because he doesn't want to be used as a testing ground for unproven merchandise or operating techniques. In short, he's quick to say "no" to any-thing that doesn't look like it will immediately turn into additional dollars on the route.

The attitude might be understandable but any operator who doesn't put some of those dollars back into the industry responsible for his success is way out of line. Many operators will freely admit that the coin machine industry has been very good to them, that they're glad they decided to try it years back and have absolutely no regrets today. But how many of these "honest" operators, we wonder, have paid part of that reward back to the industry.

What does that mean, to pay money back to the industry. It simply means supporting all the activities that are designed to protect or enhance the general welfare of the trade at large. This means joining local, state, national associations, even where no pressing legislative matter threatens at the moment. Putting money back into the industry means paying better salaries to the help, who, after all, are also part of the trade and deserve a decent shake. It also means spending time at various civic and charitable affairs and functions where the presence of the concerned music operator can enhance the public image of the industry. It means attending local and national trade conventions, even in cases where the operator might think there's not enough to see and hear that he hasn't seen and heard before.

Plain and simple, if the music and games business has been good to you, be good to the industry in return. Support its collective activities; start some of your own. Rembember, you may not think you have to belong to an association, attend a trade show or get involved in public relations activity, but if nobody did, three-quarters of the money-making ideas that have worked for you would never have been born at all.



Ross Takes Limited Vacation From Wurl. Service School Trail



MAYNARD C. HOPKINS ___ ABOUT MUSIC

GALION, OHIO — Maynard C. Hop-kins, owner of Hopkins Music & Ven-ding of Galion, Ohio, and a director of Music Operators of America, is a soft-spoken Midwesterner with some very definite and no-nonsense opinions **About Music**.

About Music. Maynard admits he knows very lit-tle about music styles and what a potential hit is sup-posed to sound like. But he is in the music business and knows that if his music boxes are going to show "We Have Fewer Location Complaints Than

his music boxes are going to show a good record of collections, they have to be proper-ly programmed. That's why he leaves record selection for individual locations entirely up to lectors are closer to the location and know better than anyone what style of music they require. Therefore, it's pretty much up to them. Naturally, prequests which we honor'', said Hop-kins.

kins. Hopkins' collectors hit each spot every two weeks and change between 5 and 6 records. He says, 'we use the trade charts extensively in record se-lection.' As far as merchandising at the location goes, Hopkins limits it to colored title strips and the dollar bill accepter. 'Some of the collectors will promote play by picking two or three tunes, assign them to the bartenders and waitresses' and whichever one

gets the most play in any given time wins a dinner, courtesy of collector." the

wins a dinner, courtesy of the collector." Hopkins thinks it doesn't really make much difference if a record is in stereo or not. "It's very difficult to achieve a stereo effect in a tavern location with all the noise that goes on. Even if you did manage to achieve true stereo, hardly anyone would notice the difference," he said. Most of the requests from patrons and location owners are in the 'old time favorite' category. "We have nev-er experienced any trouble getting the oldes. It's as simple as placing the order with our one-stop. They do a nice job for us", related Hopkins. Several years ago, Maynard had a special department that did all the programming duties. "Today, we have so many individually different loca-tions. It became a real job deciding what to use in each location, so I gave the collectors more responsibil-ity and authority. They've come through beautifully and now we enjoy a better relationship with our custom-ers. There's fewer complaints than ever before."

ever before." Maynard Hopkins might not be able to predict a number one record and he isn't planning to sit around trying to figure out what the secret is (if there is one). He is a man who de-votes a great deal of time to his business, which is a fact acknowl-edged by his very success. If there was ever a song recorded for soft-spoken Maynard C. Hopkins, you can bet a bushel basket of Ohio Buckeyes it was Ray Stevens' "Hey Mr. Busi-nessman" on Monument records.
