

Williamsburg, Va., My dear Doctor: -I have your letter of the 28th inst.and in reply would that I can furnish you the information desired, having collected much material along that line for use in "An Historical Sketch of Medicine and Surgery in Virginia," which I am preparing for the State Medical Society.

"Just at present, however, I am unable to transcribe such data as you would want on account of the state of my health. I am suffering very much with a chronic degenerative condition of the appendix, and am sure that I shall not improve until that troublesome organ is removed, and this, I hope to get done very soon.
