

Women, Gender, and Television Regional Conference

The College of William and Mary April 16-17, 2004

The Women's Studies Program and the Literary and Cultural Studies Program at the College of William and Mary will be hosting a regional conference on "Women, Gender, and Television" on April 16th and 17th, 2004. Conference panels will include scholarly papers from the region's faculty and students (graduate and undergraduate). The papers explore considerations of sexuality, violence, and race and ethnicity (among other subjects) in cable as well as network television—dramas, sitcoms, reality television, talk shows, soap operas, news shows, and television advertising.

The conference will feature two keynote speakers. The first will be Jane Espenson, currently a writer and Co-Executive Producer for the WB's The Gilmore Girls. She has written for a number of sitcoms, including Ellen, but is best known for her work as writer and co-producer on Buffy the Vampire Slayer. Jane Espenson will be speaking on Friday, April 16, at 6:00 in the Tucker Theater. Our second keynote speaker is Heather Hendershot, Associate Professor of Media Studies at CUNY-Oueen's College. Hendershot is the author of Saturday Morning Censors: Television Regulation Before the V-Chip (Duke University Press, 1998), and Shaking the World for Jesus: Media and Conservative Evangelical Culture (University of Chicago Press, 2004); she also recently edited a collection titled Nickelodeon Nation: The History, Politics, and Economics of America's Only TV Channel for Kids (NYU Press, 2003). Professor Hendershot will be speaking on Saturday, April 17, at 6:30 in the Tucker Theater.

William and Mary Anime Society

The William and Mary Anime Society (WMAS) is a six-year-old student organization, which meets every Friday night in James Blair 205. The club usually has a line up of five or six different anime programs in which three are democratically voted on to be seen that very night. In addition to the weekly meetings, we participate in two annually held Anime Conventions, Nekocon and Katsucon. Nekocon has been in existence for six years and is located in the Virginia Beach area. Katsucon has been running for ten years and is located in Northern Virginia, In both of these conventions we have participated in the cos-play contest that is a competition where a skit is presented in costumes modeled after anime characters. They are judged on craftsmanship of the costumes, stage presence, and creativity in skit. At Katsucon 10, we brought home best in show in our cos-play act which included thirteen men and women in handmade costumes singing and dancing in a four minute musical number in parody of Chicago's "Cell Block Tango." To many of the active members of our group, WMAS has been a catalyst for discussion about anime as a medium. Although anime has become increasingly popular in America, many still regard it as a literary genre. Usually limiting anime as merely childish entertainment or perverse titillation. This unfortunately does not represent the full spectrum of flexibility that anime can be used for. It is able to have as much storyline. depth, and critical content as the writers, producers, musicians, and voice actors are willing to put into the work. Anime is able to express serious social concerns as well as any other literary art form. For instance the animated movie, "Perfect Blue" portrays a young female actress and the choices she has to make to advance her career within a patriarchally driven market that defines what kind of woman the public wants her to be. The movie "Princess Mononoke", which will be showing on April 16th for Earth week, addresses serious ecological issues of violence and deforestation. Anime has the capacity for intellectual thought and criticism, and hopefully through our latest program we will address that anime can reflect lesbian, gay, bisexual and transsexual issues as well.

Adolescence Mokushiroku Utena is a highly artistic and metaphorical story of the fight of two girls to preserve their love for each other in a storybook like world of prince and princesses. During LBGT awareness week we hope through the showing of this movie followed by a panel discussion, those who are not familiar with anime can get a glimpse of complexity this medium is capable of.
