### Women, Gender, and Television Regional Conference Call for Papers

Women, Gender and Television Regional Conference will be held at The College of William and Mary April 16-17, 2004.

The Women's Studies Program and the Literary and Cultural Studies Program invite proposals from the region's faculty and students for scholarly papers on "Women, Gender, and Television." We are interested in considerations of sexuality, violence, and/or race and ethnicity (among other subjects) in cable as well as network television—dramas, sitcoms, reality television, talk shows, soap operas, news shows, television advertising, music videos, etc.

The conference, which will take place on April 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> at the College of William and Mary, will feature a keynote address by Jane Espenson. Espenson is currently a writer and Co-Executive Producer for the WB's *The Gilmore Girls*. She has written for a number of sitcoms, including *Ellen*, but is best known for her work on *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*.

The College of William and Mary's V-Day 2004's production of "The Vagina Monologues" is having its first meeting on Wednesday, November 5th, at 8pm in the UC lobby. (This is right after the FMLA meeting over in Washington). This meeting is for anyone in the campus community interested in being a part of the production, whether on-stage or behind-the-scenes. Men are welcome! Note: this is an interest meeting, not an audition, but those considering auditioning are encouraged to attend.

V-Day is a worldwide movement to stop sexual violence against women and girls. For the fifth year in a row, the V-Day College Campaign is coming to hundreds of college and university campuses around the world. Eve Ensler's Obie Award-winning play, "The Vagina Monologues" will be performed at William and Mary on March 25, 26, & 28, 2004. All proceeds will benefit local organizations dedicated to ending violence against women.

"The Vagina Monologues" is a work which is inescapably universal for women, and manages to be feminist without being man-hating, entertaining without being trite, and political without being earnest.

### Following Our Graduates

The following is an email received by our director, Leisa Meyer, from Catherine Breen.

"I graduated from W&M in 2000 with a minor in Women's studies. I currently am living in Washington, DC and working at an advertising agency. The reason I am writing is to tell you a little morsel of accomplishment that I am proud of, that I think you might find interesting. Our ad agency is routed in politics, we originally only worked on campaigns. After many years our interests have spread to issues such as tobacco free kids, covering the uninsured, airbag safety, etc. A recent effort we just accomplished was running a series of TV sport and print ads for Command Trust, a group of woman working to keep silicone implants off of the market (http://www.stopsilicone.org).

An article that recently ran in the Washington Post (http://www.washingtonpost.com/wp-dyn/articles/A28374-2003Oct1.html) helped build on the momentum the ads are creating, and the spot itself was featured nationally during a segment on Fox News Channel's "In the Heartland,". The FDA was scheduled to review the implant manufacturer's data on October 15, so the goal of this campaign is to make approval of silicone implants a bad political move for the FDA. We hear that there has been some activity already suggesting that the ads are reaching their target.

I remember a project that I worked on in one of your classes where we picked a topic and reported on it, I selected "The SiliconHolocaust." I have gone from educating myself on an issue, to helping affect the outcome of a political one."
