

The College of William and Mary April 16-17, 2004

The Women's Studies Program and the Literary and Cultural Studies Program invite proposals from the region's faculty and students for scholarly papers on "Women, Gender, and Television." We are interested in considerations of sexuality, violence, and/or race and ethnicity (among other subjects) in cable as well as network television—dramas, sitcoms, reality television, talk shows, soap operas, news shows, television advertising, music videos, etc.

The conference, which will take place on April 16th and 17th at the College of William and Mary, will feature a keynote address by Jane Espenson. Espenson is currently a writer and Co-Executive Producer for the WB's *The Gilmore Girls*. She has written for a number of sitcoms, including *Ellen*, but is best known for her work on *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*.

Call For Papers

2005 Berkshire Conference on the History of Women

The 13th Berkshire Conference on the History of Women, "Sin Fronteras: Women's Histories, Global Conversations," will be held **June 2-5, 2005** at Scripps College, Claremont, California, USA. The Program Committee welcomes proposals that cross geographical, cultural, and disciplinary borders, and especially those which address the plurality of histories of transnational encounters and empires.

The Committee prefers complete panels, normally three papers, a comment, and a chair; one person should *not* assume the task of chair and comment.

The Committee also seeks workshops, roundtables, teaching sessions (both college and K-12), and presentations that depart from the traditional conference format. Individual papers will also be considered, lease submit three (3) copies of your proposal, postmarked by December 15, 2003 to one of the addresses listed below. Each paper must include a cover sheet, downloadable from our website, listing panel title or roundtable theme and full contact information (address, phone, fax, and e-mail) for panel organizer and all participants. It must also include a title, and one-page abstract for each paper or presentation; a one-page curriculum vitae/résumé for each participant (including chair and comment); and a self-addressed, stamped postcard. 

"I Followed Close Behind Her"

Congratulations goes out to Professor Darlene O'Dell, who had her book "I Followed Close Behind Her" published this Spring. This book is very compelling as it is about incest, loyalty and friendship, poverty, suicide, racism, Patsy Cline, the Great Smoky Mountains—the background of Susan Smith. Annie Rosewood, the protagonist says "I want to tell my story and how it relates to the drowning of those children. Had I told it earlier, the children Smith drove into the lake on that October night might still be alive."

America's south is still a dark and mysterious place; 150 years after the Emancipation Proclamation, southerners haven't gotten over losing the Civil War. This grief has honed people to the bone, made survivors out of them, and taught them how to live on both subsistence farming and subsistence self-image. They bear the imprint of poverty of spirit, land and soul, and what happens as a result is often a shock, a horror to the outsider.
