

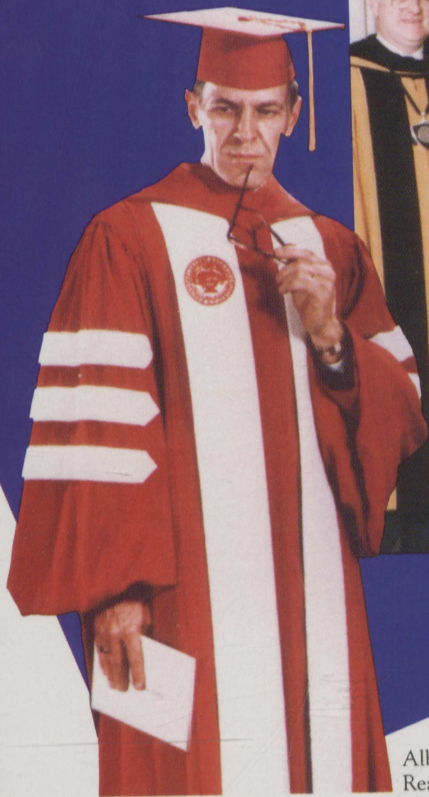



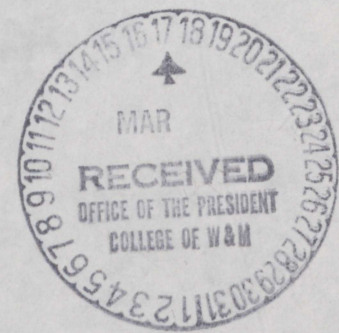

Subject: Academic Regalia Subsidy



Participation at Charter Day and Commencement ceremonies by faculty and faculty administrators while enthusiastic and commendable is often sparse. It has been suggested by a number of individuals that one factor working against such participation is the relatively high cost of purchasing suitable academic regalia (usually \$250-\$300).

During the period of our tercentenary celebrations, the opportunity and desire to participate in such events will likely increase. In order to facilitate and encourage such participation, the university is offering faculty members a \$150 reimbursement towards the purchase of academic regalia.

E. R. Moore Company will be on campus to display their regalia and take orders for one day only on Wednesday, March 22, from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. in Trinkle Hall. The companies will expect payment in full once an order is made. By sending your receipt to my office, you will receive a \$150 reimbursement.



Good morning, Dot:

Ms. Alberta Rains, representing Collegiate Cap and Gown, called on me several days ago and I talked with her briefly about my thoughts concerning academic regalia and the College's 300th anniversary. I still would like to see a very special doctoral robe developed for the College of William and Mary and I would hope that it would be of such quality and distinction that it would indeed be worthy of the name and the heritage we wish to place upon it.

So far I have seen nothing in stock that pleases me. I know that the Board has authorized a green robe to be worn, however, I would like to see some device placed on the front panel that would be distinctively the College's. I think we deserve this after 300 years and I would hope that a very, very small committee could work on this. One last expression of prejudice: I think the robe should be green but I think it should be a very elegant and a very dark green with gold ornamentation and silver trim.

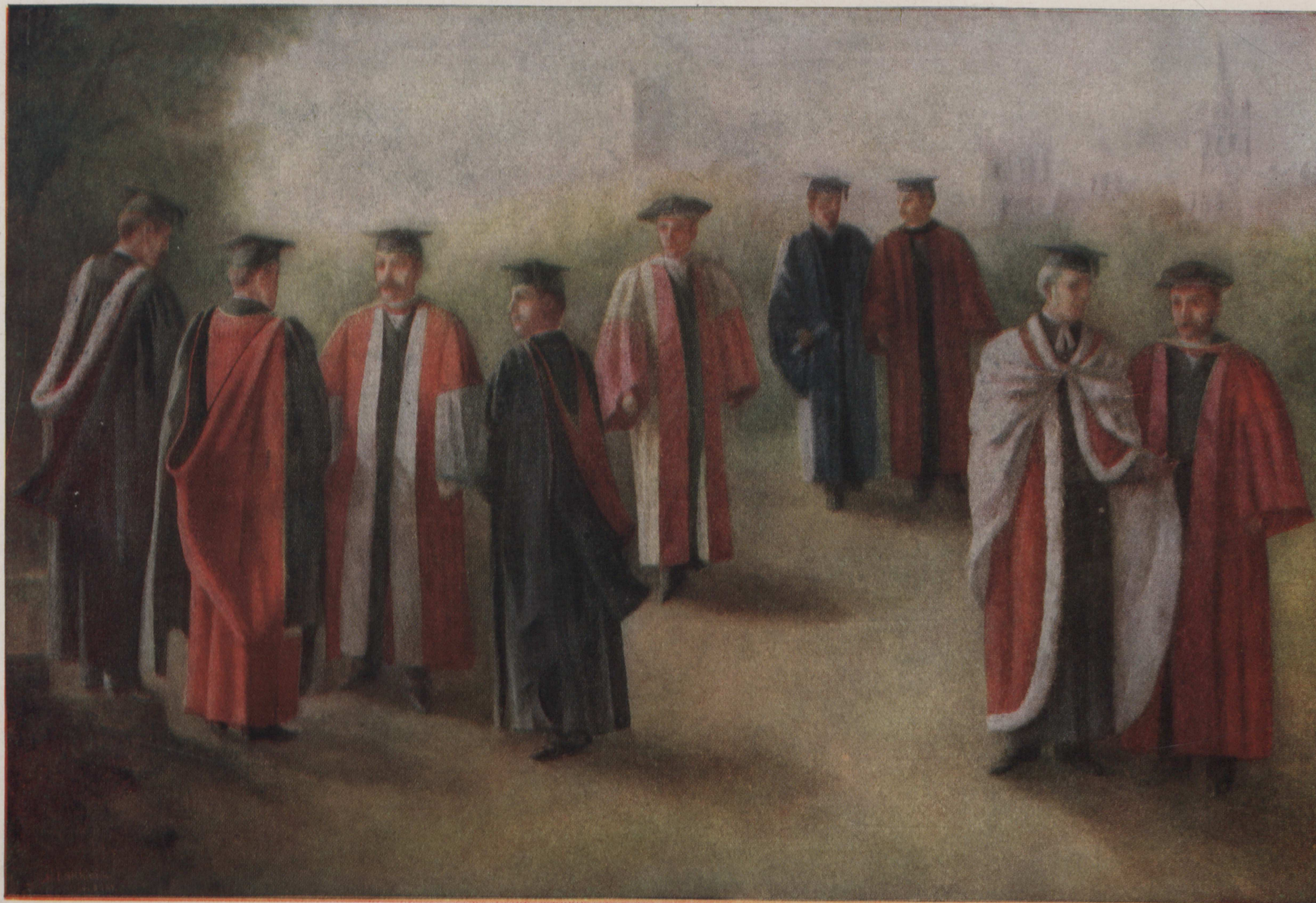
