Parents' Day Set for November 11

The newly organized Association of Parents and the Student Association are planning Parents' Day, 1972 on campus the weekend of Nov. 11.

Chairman of the event is Rear Admiral Kenneth L. Woodfin, of Alexandria, vice chairman for freshmen, in the newly organized Association of Parents.

Admiral Woodfin will preside at the general meeting Saturday in William and Mary Hall at 10 a.m.

Alfred W. Kraft, Jr., of Virginia Beach, president of the Association of Parents, and President Thomas A. Graves, Jr., are among those who will speak at that time. Others on the program include Cornell Christianson, president, Student Association; Harold L. Fowler, dean, Faculty of Arts and Sciences; and J. Wilfred Lambert, vice president for student affairs.

Following the general meeting, parents will assemble in groups by class for an exchange of information and a question and answer period. The Parent groups will discuss such topics as employment, graduate school, grading at William and Mary, campus life, military service, academic options, counseling help, college regulations and Project Plus.

That afternoon there will be a President's Open House at 4:30 p.m. following the football game between William and Mary and East Carolina which begins at 1:30 p.m. Fraternities and sororities will also hold open houses that afternoon.

Saturday evening students will present "A Salute to Parents," in William and Mary Hall beginning at 8:30 p.m. This will be a potpourri of entertainment by students.

While the major portion of the program is on Saturday, there are several events scheduled Friday, Nov. 10. These include an 18th century comedy in William and Mary Hall at 7:30 p.m.; followed by a Sinfonicron production of a Gilbert and Sullivan operetta in Phi Beta Kappa Hall, at 8:15 p.m. (also Saturday at 8:15 p.m.) and a Student Association film (The Andromeda Strain) in William and Mary Hall at 8:30 p.m.

Friday's activities begin with registration from noon until 8 p.m. in William and Mary Hall. There will be a basketball practice there at 3 p.m.

Ruth Sheldon Knowles to Speak on Campus

The Campus Environment Committee at the College will sponsor Mrs. Ruth Sheldon Knowles of the American Petroleum Institute in a lecture open to the public, Tuesday, October 31, in Washington Hall, Room 100 at 9:30 a.m. She will speak on "Energy Use and the Environment."

Mrs. Knowles, who has served as a petroleum consultant to the United States, Mexican and Venezuelan governments, has visited major world trouble spots and has made detailed studies of the oil situation throughout the world. She has been a war correspondent four times in South Vietnam from 1965-70, and was made an honorary

member of the U. S. Special Forces' Green Berets. She has interviewed such outstanding world personalities as King Faisal of Saudi Arabia, President Suharto of Indonesia, President Thieu of South Vietnam, Prime Minister Golda Meir of Israel, Prime Minister Fidel Castro and Che Guevarra of Cuba.

The granddaughter and daughter of independent oilmen, Mrs. Knowles is a petroleum specialist, foreign correspondent, lecturer and author of the book, *The Greatest Gamblers: The Epic of American Oil Exploration*. Her current lecture tour is part of the American Petroleum Institute's public affairs and educational program.

Visiting Scholar

Louis I. Kahn, an international architect, will speak on "Architecture and Human Agreement" tomorrow in Andrews Hall, Room 101, at 8 p.m. His lecture is part of the current Visiting Scholars Series on campus, arranged in cooperation with the University Center in Virginia, Inc.

Mr. Kahn is the Paul Philippe Cret professor emeritus at the University of Pennsylvania where he took his bachelor of architecture degree in 1924. Before returning to his alma mater to teach in 1957, his pro-

fessional activities included the post of consultant architect for the United States Housing Authority and faculty positions at Yale University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the American Academy in Rome. He has received honorary fellowships from the Royal Society of Arts in London, the World Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the American Institute of Architects. In 1961 he was awarded the Graham Foundation Fellowship for Advanced Studies in the Fine Arts.

Two Juniors Receive Scholarships

Two juniors, Robert C. Jones and Michael W. Newton, have each been awarded \$350 scholarships by the Sigma Phi Epsilon Education Foundation. Members of Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity, Jones is an economics major from Arlington and Newton, a business

management major from Richmond.

Sigma Phi Epsilon, a national college fraternity founded in 1901, has 188 chapters at colleges and universities in 43 states and the District of Columbia.

Southworth Dies Oct. 19

Shirley Donald Southworth, 78, professor of economics emeritus, of the College, died in a local hospital, Oct. 19.

Mr. Southworth received his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from Princeton University where he was awarded the Porter Ogden Jacobus fellowship, the leading fellowship awarded by the university. He served during World War I in the army at Base Hospital No. 8 in France at Savenay and St. Nazaire. After the war he returned to Princeton where he graduated with highest honors in classics.

He served on the faculty of economics at Princeton, 1922-24. In the fall of 1924, he joined the faculty of the University of Colorado. In 1927 he came to the faculty of the College of William and Mary. Mr. Southworth took a leave of absence from the College, June 1942-August 1945, to serve in the Division of Monetary Research, U.S. Treasury, Washington, D.C.

The Southworths then returned to Williamsburg where Mr. Southworth continued on the faculty of the College until his retirement in 1960, serving the last three years as Chairman of the Department of Economics.

He was the author of a book, *Branch Banking in the United States*, published by McGraw Hill, and collaborated with John M. Chapman of Columbia University in authoring *Banking Facilities for Bankless Towns*.

He was a member of the Williamsburg Church of Christ, Phi Beta Kappa, ODK, American Economics Association and the Virginia Social Science Association.

Funeral services were held at the Williamsburg Church of Christ Saturday, Oct. 21 at 2 p.m. with Bruce Jackson officiating. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, Winifred West Southworth, of Williamsburg; and a brother, Walter Murray Southworth, of Wellsboro, Pa.

The family has asked that expressions of sympathy be in the form of contributions to the Church of Christ or the College library.

Bulletin

Announcements from the Personnel Office will appear in the newly established "Bulletin" section of the News. This section will also carry memoranda pertaining to holidays, formerly sent to deans of schools and department heads.

In November there are two legal holidays for permanent classified State employees; they are General Election Day, and Thanksgiving Day.

Election Day falls on Tuesday, November 7, and Thanksgiving Day on Thursday, November 23.

In accordance with previous holiday notices, Election Day should be given, as far as is practicable, to members of each department. It is recognized that certain services must be maintained in the various departments, but these services should be furnished on the holiday by a minimum number of employees. The responsibility for determining the number of employees rests with the department head. It is not a decision to be made by the employees of the department.

Following the custom of the past years, all administrative offices of the College will be closed on Thursday, November 23, in observance of Thanksgiving Day. A leave slip is not required for the taking of this day as a holiday.

A leave slip should be submitted to the Personnel Office for any permanent classified employee who takes leave on Election Day. Permanent classified employees who are required to work on either of these holidays should take the compensatory leave earned as soon thereafter as possible in order to avoid excessive leave accumulation. Hourly employees who work on either of these two holidays will be paid at their regular hourly rates.

Each year all permanent classified employees at the College who have been employed on or before September 1, receive a service rating. This rating is prepared annually by an appropriate supervisor. Each employee is rated on habits of work, amount of work, quality of work, cooperation, intelligence and initiative. Adjectival ratings are poor, fair, good, very good, and excellent. When an employee's service rating includes more than two appraisals of "fair" or any appraisals of "poor," the employee may not receive a merit increase. The service rating may or may not be discussed with the employee by the supervisor. This is a decision to be made by the rating official. Instructions for preparation of the service ratings for this year will be forwarded to rating officials prior to November 1.

Kerner Lecture
