Michael Grant, a distinguished classical scholar, currently visiting professor of English at Virginia Military Institute, will speak at the annual meeting of Alpha of Virginia Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa at the College.

The meeting will be held December 5 in Phi Beta Kappa Hall at 8:15 p.m.


John Frederick Nims has been selected as Phi Beta Kappa poet and will read from his works at the fraternity's December meeting.

Mr. Grant, who retired from The Queen's University, Belfast, in 1966, holds the Mary Moody Northern Chair in the Arts and Social Sciences at Virginia Military Institute. He received the master of arts and doctor of letters degrees from Cambridge University and has honorary degrees from The Queen's University, and from Dublin University. He has translated into English several Greek and Roman works and has published 20 books. His latest book, The Life Capture Varsity Tourney of Cleopatra, which will be published this spring by Simon and Schuster, will refute several myths about the sultry "Queen of the Nile."

Mr. Nims is visiting professor of English at the University of Florida at Gainsville. Twice visiting professor of English and comparative literature at Harvard University, he has taught at the University of Notre Dame, and Bread Loaf School of Literature and Bread Loaf Writers' Conference. His books of poetry include The Iron Pastoral, A Fountain in Kentucky, Knowledge of the Evening, and Of Flesh and

The team of Gary Lang and Gary Keane, Jr., won all six rounds of debate in the preliminaries and defeated the University of Wisconsin in the finals to take first place. For Lang, a freshman and a former student at Thomas Jefferson High School in Pittsburgh, it was an especially sweet victory in his hometown. Keane, a junior from Houston, Tex., is participating in college debating for the first time this

The team of Joan Harrigan, Staunton, had a 4-2 record for the preliminaries and tied for third place in the overall tournament.

The College sent three teams to the Dixie Classic at Wake Forest University. Only one advanced to the final rounds.

Nancy Dunbar, Lithia, and John Vile, Stanley, won six and lost two in the preliminaries. They advanced to the octo-finals but lost in a split decision to Georgetown University.

Chuck Kennedy, Williamsburg, and Stephen Snoke, Detroit, Mich., were 5-3 in the preliminaries but missed the finals on points. Glen Clatterbuck, Harrisonburg, and Debbie Wood, Gig Harbon, Wash., won three and lost five in the preliminaries.

Postal Station Opens Friday

The College plans to open its campus postal facility Dec. 1. According to Dennis K. Cogle,

assistant to the vice president for business affairs, the new facility in the basement of Old Dominion Hall will be open for general delivery service Dec. 1 although operational hours may be curtailed due to final construction work.

"There will be some construction going on," said Cogle. "We will be getting the boxes in and adding the finishing touches and as a result we will have to operate on a shortened schedule." He added that the new postal station probably would be open initially on an 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. schedule which would be expanded as soon as all work is finished. Specific hours will be designated for the distribution of general delivery mail.

The new facility will be operated by College employees under the direct supervision of J. A. Caldwell, a former assistant postmaster in the Williamsburg Post Office.

It will offer a limited number of rental boxes as well as other services such as postage stamp machines. It will also serve the faculty and staff by incorporating existing mail operations in James Blair Hall. For specialized services such as special delivery and registered mail, it will be necessary for individuals to go to the Williamsburg Post Office.

Extensive renovation of the basement of Old Dominion Hall has been undertaken to accommodate the postal facility, and several administrative offices were moved from the basement to James Blair

The U.S. Postal Service had initially informed the College this year that it would need to abandon general delivery service to students after Oct. 1.

However, it agreed later to extend this service at the Williamsburg Post Office until

The local post office lacks rental boxes in sufficient quantity to serve students and is not permitted by the postal service to expand to meet local

CAMPUS PROFILE/John A. Caldwell

When the new campus postal station opens Friday at 8 a.m., John A. Caldwell will be there to set the wheels in motion.

Realizing that the mail will more than triple, Mr. Caldwell said "service will come first." With the new facility, mail service will improve, he feels. Until construction has been completed the postal station will be open from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8:30 - 11 a.m. Saturday, he added.

Mr. Caldwell came to the campus in July after retiring from the U.S. Post Office in Williamsburg, where he held the position of assistant postmaster. He has accumulated 39 years in postal work, two of which were spent in Navy mail service during World War II.

Tax Conference Set
