

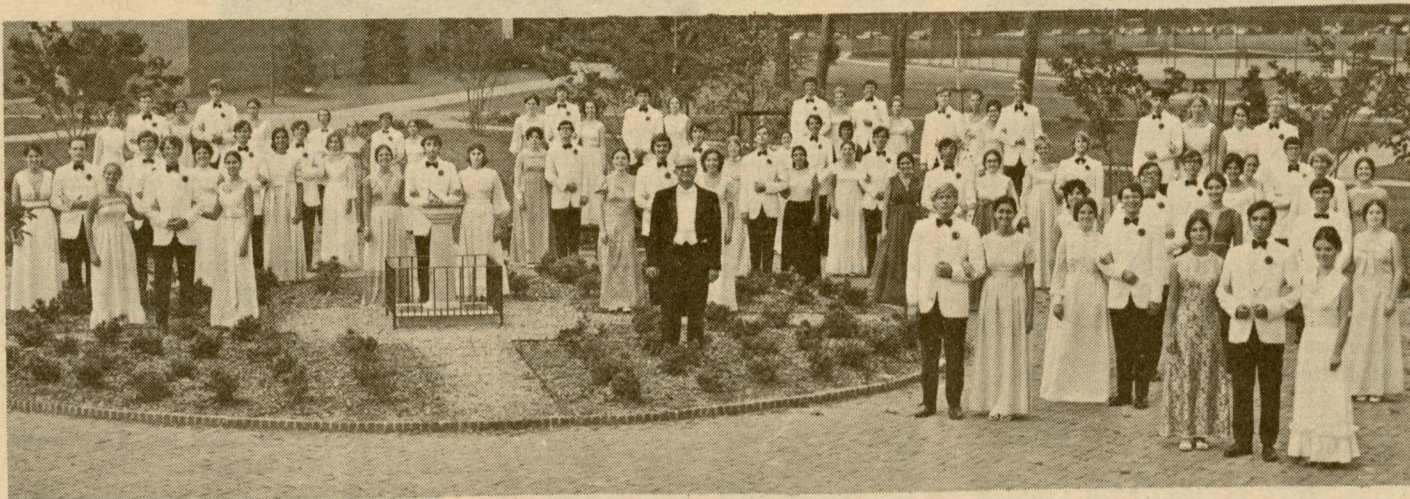

Christmas Concerts December 12-14



The Choir



The Chorus

The College choir and chorus will present their annual Christmas Concerts Dec. 12, 13 and 14 in Phi Beta Kappa Hall at 8:15 p.m. Admission will be \$1.50.

Under the direction of Carl A. Fehr, the program will include carols representing many foreign countries as well as a variety of instruments to accompany them. The first number, "Make We Joy In This Feast," was written by Merritt Lerley, a former member of the choir and a 1958 graduate of the College.

Kathleen Jones, of Falls Church, accompanied by Cabot Wade, of Williamsburg, will be the soloist with the choir for "Jesus, Jesus Rest Your Head," an American Christmas carol.

Following a procession of lights, the choir and the chorus will alternate selections. They will join to sing "Gatumba," an Andalusian carol; "To Bethlehem, Singing," a Puerto Rican carol; "Christians, Be Joyful" from the "Christmas Oratorio," by Bach; and a medley of Christmas carols arranged by Mr. Fehr.

Augmenting the chorus will be Carlyn Ewald, of New Shrewsbury, N.J., at the piano, and Gail Wisler, of Lorton, on the celeste for "Twas in the Moon of Wintertime," a Canadian tune. A choir selection, "Laud to the Nativity," by Respighi, will feature Virginia Carr, of Delmar, N.Y., as the Angel; Cheryl Bull, of McLean, as Mary; Jeffrey Mincks, of Bloomfield Hills, Mich., as the Shepherd; and a woodwind ensemble.

Technical advisors for the production will be Albert Haak and Roger Sherman. Wilford Kale will write and edit the narration and Susan Dandridge will provide special lighting for the concert.

Yuletide Season Begins in Colonial Williamsburg on Dec. 15

The Yuletide season will be ushered into the colonial capital Friday with the annual "Grand Illumination" of the old City.

The program will be held only on Market Square Green and will begin at 5:30 p.m.

In previous years, the "white lighting" of the historic area was introduced with a large parade down Duke of Gloucester street, but this year, the parade was eliminated because of the potential hazards to children posed by the thousands of people who annually attend the event.

The newly arranged program will include greetings by the "royal governor," tolling of the bells, bonfires, caroling, dancing, and music by the Colonial Williamsburg Fife and Drum Corps.

The annual illumination of the Wren Building and the old College yard will be held on Dec. 26 at 6 p.m.

Another favorite Williamsburg event--the annual fireworks display on New Year's Eve--also has been eliminated from this year's holiday program. A special music program, however, has been added and will include music by the Fife and Drum Corps and the Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, Drum & Bugle Unit. The Military Tattoo ceremony will take place on Market Square at 4 p.m. on Dec. 31.

Colonial Williamsburg events will continue throughout the holiday weeks and information regarding the activities can be obtained in the calendar of events in "How to See Williamsburg This Week."

Feldman String Quartet in Christmas Concert

The Department of Music, with the assistance of the Williamsburg Arts Council, Inc., will present a special program by the Feldman String Quartet at the Wren Chapel Sunday, Dec. 17 at 4:30 p.m. The public is cordially invited at no charge.

The Feldman String Quartet has appeared on the Collegium Musicum Series and annually presents a series of concerts in Norfolk under the auspices of the Feldman Chamber Music Society, Inc. They have won high praise wherever they perform, eliciting such comments as "one of the most exciting chamber music concerts in the 14 years of music at the National Gallery" (Richard Bales, assistant director, National Gallery of Arts, Washington, D.C.), and "among the best in

the country's young string quartets" (Irving Lowens, *Washington Evening Star*). One of its members will have made her debut at Town Hall, New York City, the week before her performance here.

The Feldman String Quartet will play Cherubini's Quartet in E-flat Major, Glazunov's Interludium in Modo Antico, and the Allegretto Scherzando from Dvorak's Quartet in D Minor, Opus 34.

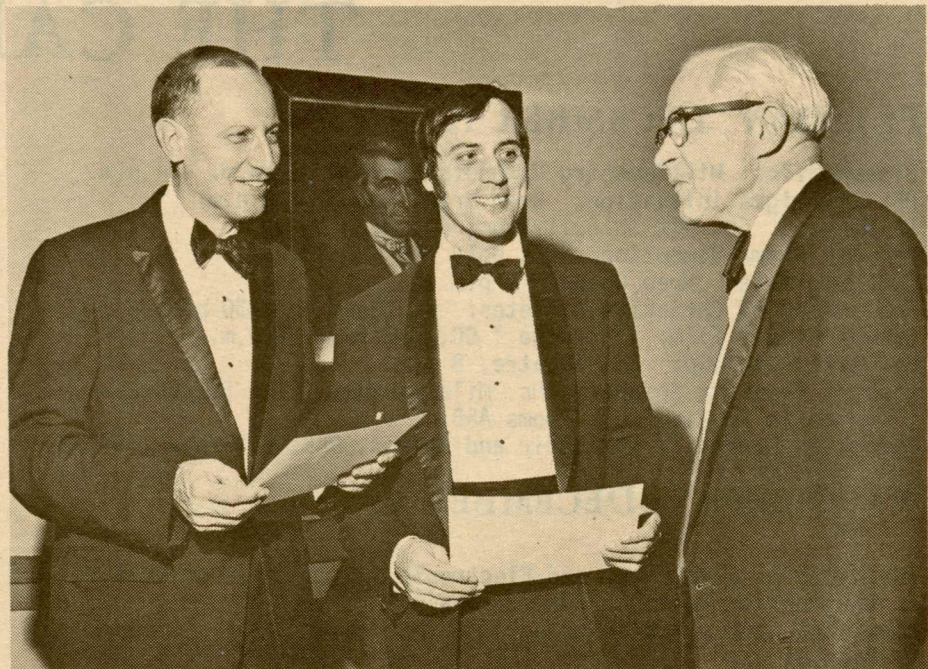
Four Law Profs to Conduct Courses in England

Four members of the Marshall-Wythe School of Law faculty will be among those conducting courses in the seventh annual Summer School of Law in England for American law students, offered on the campus of the University of Exeter by the College. The program since its inauguration in 1967 has attracted more than 350 students from more than 50 American law schools.

Among those on the 1973 faculty are Emeric Fischer, William F. Swindler and W. Scott Whitney, professors, and Tom Collins, associate professor. Among the Exeter faculty in the summer program will be Dominik Lasok, formerly exchange professor of law at William and Mary (1966-67). The session will run from July 2 to August 11, 1973.

A new feature of the coming session is the introduction of two seminars in common market law, to be taught by English faculty specialists. Most of the offerings will concentrate on international and comparative law, supplemented by courses introductory to the English legal system and the civil law of Continental Europe.
