W&M Leading in Commissioner's Cup Race

William and Mary is well on its way to retaining the Commissioner's Cup for the fourth straight year.

The cup is the Southern Conference Award for total achievement in all sports and is awarded annually to the Southern Conference school with the most outstanding overall athletic award.

The records of all varsity intercollegiate teams contribute to the Tribe's overall point score. These include baseball, basketball, cross country, fencing, football, golf, gymnastics, soccer, indoor track, swimming, tennis, wrestling, and track and field.

In the first year of competition for the cup William and Mary shared the trophy with East Carolina University. During the next two years the Indians won it outright. At the end of the fall sports season, William and Mary is again in the lead with a 3½ point lead over East Carolina for the fourth annual cup competition.

Two Appointed to City Posts

Two members of the College community have been appointed to City posts, according to a recent announcement made by the City Council.

John H. Willis, Jr., assistant vice-president for academic affairs and an associate professor of English, was appointed to the City Planning Commission to fill the unexpired term of J. Wilfred Lambert, retiring vice-president for student affairs.

The Council also announced the appointment of Mrs. Thomas A. Graves, Jr., to the library board.

Graves Meets with N.Y. Alumni

President Graves spoke at a meeting of New York alumni, last Friday at Pemples, 330 East 56th Street. The meeting was informal with President Graves making brief remarks and answering questions.

Thus far this year William and Mary has accumulated 21 points, finishing first in cross country, second in soccer, and third in football. East Carolina has placed first in football, and has two fourth place finishes in cross country and a tie in soccer.

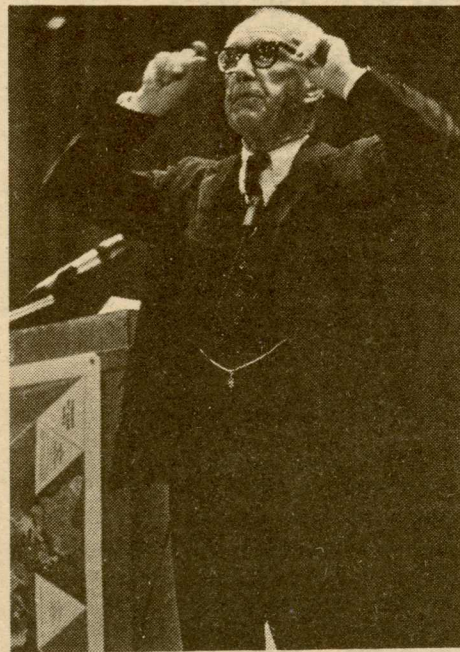

Famous Designer-Engineer to Lecture

The College Wide Reading Program will sponsor a lecture by internationally known designer-engineer R. Buckminster Fuller February 28 in Millington Auditorium at 8 p.m.

Mr. Fuller, who has scored outstanding successes as a scientist, mathematician, engineer, inventor, designer, architect, cartographer, and creator of such principles as synergetics, tensegrity, and ephemeralization, is world-renowned for the design of the geodesic dome, a self-supporting spherical shell, composed of triangles, without formwork. It is the most economical way of enclosing space and a viable solution to the long sought low-cost, self-built housing. He was also the designer of the U.S. Pavilion at Expo '67 in Montreal; the gigantic "skybreak" bubble dome that dominated the fair's profile.

Mr. Fuller holds honorary degrees from numerous colleges and universities and was a Fellow at St. Peter's College at Oxford University, England in 1970. He has received many high-ranking awards including both the 1968 First architectural design award for the Expo '67 Dome and the 1970 Gold Medal from the American Institute of Architects. He holds membership in many academic and professional societies.

Mr. Fuller is the author of 10 books ranging in subject from education to science and industrialization, and is currently Distinguished University Professor at Southern Illinois University and Chief Consultant at Design Science Institute.

'73-'74 Fulbright-Hays Lectureships in U.S.S.R.

Five university lectureships are available under a new exchange agreement between the United States and the Soviet Union, according to a recent announcement by the Committee on International Exchange of Persons in Washington, D. C.

Lectureships available are at: MOSCOW UNIVERSITY - American literature, one semester beginning Feb. 15, 1974; Linguistics (general theoretical), academic year beginning Sept. 1973; American history, specifically the Franklin D. Roosevelt era, one semester during 1973-74; and electrical engineering/physics, specifically electron optics and electron probe and X-ray microanalysis, one semester beginning Sept. 1973.

LENINGRAD POLYTECHNIC INSTITUTE - mechanical/chemical engineering, heat and mass transfer, specifically boiling condensation and two-phase flow, one semester beginning Sept. 1973.

No additional details are yet available as to specific courses to be taught. It is assumed that lecturing is to be in English although this has not been confirmed. Lectureships will carry a stipend based upon salary being earned at the time of application, but not in excess of \$1500 per month. Travel will be provided for the grantee, but not for accompanying dependents.

Applications will be welcomed from senior professors (associate or full) in these fields. No other lectureships are available at present.
