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Colgate Darden is Principal Speaker for Charter Day

The Honorable Colgate W. Darden, Jr., former Governor of Virginia and Chancellor of the College, cited the importance of a liberal education and the necessity for self-discipline in his Charter Day address Saturday at Phi Beta Kappa Hall.

The ceremonies also the awarding of the Thomas Jefferson and the Thomas Jefferson Teaching awards.

The traditional reading from the Royal Charter was made by Harold L. Fowler, dean of the faculty of arts and sciences. Dean James P. Whyte, Jr., of the Marshall-Wythe School of Law read from the Royal Proclamation.

The invocation and benediction were given by the Rev. Cotesworth P. Lewis, rector of Bruton Parish Church. The William and Mary Choir was directed by Carl A. Fehr.

At a luncheon at the Commons following the ceremonies, two seniors, Christopher J. Schreck, Savannah, Ga., and Robert W. Storm, Jr., Vienna, read two Latin verses they had composed to be presented to Governor Holton as traditional payment of "college rent."

The two verses were translated and versed by Linda Collins Reilly of the Department of Classical Studies and handed by President Graves to Delegate Russell Carneal of Williamsburg for delivery to the Governor.

At ceremonies commemorating the College's 280th anniversary, Darden rapped revamping of educational emphasis following the Russian launch of Sputnik in 1957.

"We plunged full speed into science and technology. . . However, with this new emphasis we tended to neglect what for want of a better description we refer to as general education. . . We hastened to revamp our educational system to make it more closely resemble that of the nation which had so shocked us by producing this scientific marvel. Whatever the cause it was a mistake of the first order," he asserted.

"The Russian educational system with its emphasis on science and technology," continued Darden, "was designed to serve a rigid authoritarian order, and this it does quite well. However, it is not able to nourish and sustain the relatively free political institutions which constitute the framework of our society. By diminishing the vigorous support of general education, which is, in truth, the life blood of our political institutions, we gravely impair the structure of our government."

Darden went on to assert that this redirection of educational emphasis "made some contribution to the violence and bigotry which swept many of our institutions

of higher learning in the 1960's. . . This violence made it appear, at least for a time, that the long struggle to substitute reason for force, which is why colleges and universities were founded, had ended in failure."

"We must take care therefore," he said, "that in the future we do not neglect the support of good general education for all who are found competent, because there can be no over-supply of those who can profit from this, and who will in turn be more useful citizens."

Turning to the second theme of his address, self-discipline, Governor Darden said this "one indispensable element in our government" is presently "solely lacking."

"Without self-discipline," he said, "we cannot achieve the restraint necessary to manage properly our affairs, and no amount of money, no amount of good intentions, and no amount of beguiling political oratory can save from grave difficulties what Lord Bryce described, not too many years ago, as a superb political system."

Thomas Jefferson Award Recipients

The Jefferson awards at Charter Day Saturday were awarded to J. Wilfred Lambert, a member of the faculty for more than 40 years and Hans C. von Baeyer, chairman of the Department of Physics.

Mr. Lambert, who is vice president for student affairs and professor of psychology, was cited as a "man for all seasons," and in his varying roles with the College through the years, and his participation in community affairs, as recipient of the Thomas Jefferson award.

The citation, read by R. Harvey Chappell, rector of the Board of Visitors, noted that Lambert was versed in both ancient and modern traditions of the College.

"He has kept a close watch on students as they have entered and departed for four decades, and he remembers them all. Rare is the alumnus of the past forty years who does not have vividly implanted in his memory the figure of Dean Lambert as he admonished across his desk, as he meted out deserved discipline, or as he walked about the campus with his ever observant eyes. But he would also remember that when trouble came, he always had a friend and counselor in Dean Lambert."

The Thomas Jefferson Teaching award was presented to Mr. von Baeyer who was cited for "excellence in classroom teaching" and campus-wide activities through which "he has spread his influence beyond the bounds of his own discipline to the student body as a whole."

He was particularly cited for his work in Physics 103-104, which is designed primarily for non-science concentrators.

Students will hold a referendum on the College Assembly Proposal February 22.

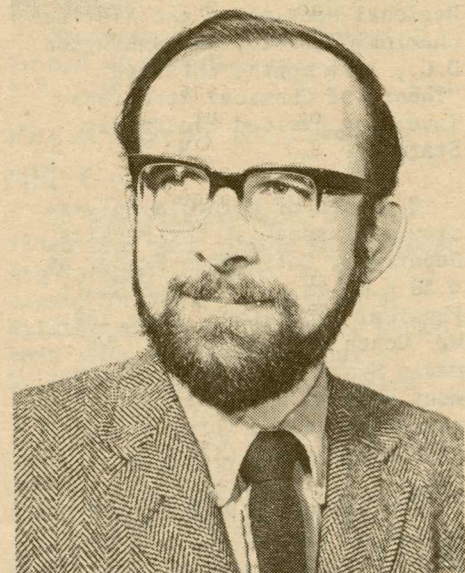
Open hearings at individual dorms, sponsored by the SA Senate Committee on the College Assembly have been held since February 4 and will conclude tomorrow.

Space Assignment Procedures

The question of College space assignment has been under study by members of the administration for the past year. After thorough review of present practices and alternatives, it has become apparent we need an orderly and responsive system of dealing on a College-wide basis with space requirements -- instructional, departmental and administrative. Accordingly, after substantial discussions, the following plan has been developed, effective with the publication of this memorandum:

The Committee on Space Assignment is hereby appointed, composed of the Executive Vice President, Chairman; the Vice President for Academic Affairs; the Vice President for Business Affairs; and the Director of Institutional Research, ex officio.

The Committee is charged with the responsibility of assigning, on as equitable a basis as possible, space in College structures for instructional, departmental and administrative purposes.

Subject to modification by the Committee on the basis of experience during this initial year of operation, the following procedure will be followed:

1. All departments, schools, administrative officers and recognized faculty and student groups are invited to identify their space needs and submit them in writing to the Chairman of the Committee prior to March 15, 1973.
2. The needs should be described in terms of types of space (classroom, office, laboratory, etc.) and in square feet, if such calculations are available. The requests should represent a projection of needs for at least one year ahead.
3. Justifications should include numbers of users, increases in enrollment or personnel, and all other factors indicating space requirements beyond that now in use.
4. The Committee will consider the merits of the several requests in relation to space available for assignment, make such inquiries as it deems necessary, conduct hearings if such be needed, and reach its decisions by April 15, 1973.
5. The Committee will advise applicants of its conclusions and the reasons therefor and make public its decisions, after reporting same to the President.
6. The Committee is authorized to call on any agency of the College for information or advice and to use the Office of Institutional Research as its primary data-collecting arm. It may present matters to the Administrative Council for discussion and advice, but the decision authority shall rest solely with the Committee, subject to review by the President.
7. The space assignment functions of the Committee shall not extend to student housing, which remains with Student Affairs, nor to promulgating class schedules, which remains at this time with the Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences.
8. The Committee should approach its assignment with the view of reaching basic decisions by the specified date each year and thereby enhance its ability to view the College-wide situation at one time, rather than to make piecemeal decisions at varying times during the year.

Associate Dean Robert Johnston of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences single-handedly has carried the burden of instructional space assignment for a number of years, and I take this means of officially recognizing his important service and expressing, on behalf of the College, our sincere appreciation.

Physics Dept. Receives NSF Grant

An opportunity will be provided for four junior and senior high school students to participate in physics research at William and Mary for eight weeks this summer. The National Science Foundation has granted \$2,100 for a Student Science Training Program to be directed by H. O. Funsten. This grant will be supplemented with departmental resources so that the students can work in the areas of plasma physics, nuclear studies with mesons, and molecular-ion physics; and participants will come primarily from high schools within commuting distance of the College. In addition meetings are planned with interested high school science faculty to explore possible use of this research in the high school science programs.

Four Physics Department faculty members will serve as advisors to the students. They are: Roy L. Champion, associate professor; Frederic R. Crownfield, Jr., professor; Lynn D. Doverspike, professor; and William J. Kossler, associate professor.
