Theologian to Join Summer Faculty

Egil Grislis, theologian and historian, will serve as visiting professor in the Department of Religion for the first session of the forthcoming 1973 summer school. The session starts on June 18 and ends on July 20.

Mr. Grislis, an authority in the history and theology of the Early Christian Church and of the Christian Church during the Reformation, will teach the undergraduate courses regularly offered at the College in Christian Origins and in the Protestant and Catholic Reformations.

A native of Latvia who took his secondary schooling in Germany, Mr. Grislis obtained the B.A. degree from Gettysburg College in 1950, the B.D. degree from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg in 1953, and the Ph.D. degree from Yale University in 1958. He has taken additional graduate study at

Columbia University and at the University of Heidelberg.

From 1959-69 Mr. Grislis was associate professor of historical theology at Duke University. Since 1969 he has been a member of the faculty of The Hartford Seminary Foundation. Currently he is a visiting professor at Yale University.

The author of numerous articles in theological journals, Mr. Grislis has two books, An Introduction to Contemporami Religious Thought and The Theology of Richard Hooker, in the final stages of preparation. He has also been invited to prepare a commentary on the Divine Tractates of Richard Hooker for the Folger Library edition of Hooker's Works, to be published by the Press of Case Western Reserve University.

Both of Mr. Grislis's courses will be open to all students enrolled in the summer session. Information about them may be secured from the College's Department of Religion.

Physicist to Lecture March 19-23

V. L. Telegdi, Enrico Fermi Distinguished Service Professor of Physics at the University of Chicago, will visit the Physics Department, March 19 - 23. There will be informal discussions on various topics in intermediate energy nuclear and particle physics and three scientific lectures in the William Small Physical

The lectures are scheduled as follows: Monday, March 19, "Synthetic Atoms." Wednesday, March 21, "Coulomb is Dead and Dirac is Alive and Well in Florida (Or, Vacuum Polarization Today)." Friday, March 23, "The K° Complex - Quantum Mechanics on a Macroscopic Scale."

Lectures will be at 4:30 p.m. in S-109. Coffee will be served at 4 p.m. in S-126.

Mr. Telegdi was born in Hungary and received his Ph.D. in physics at the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology.

He has made fundamental contributions to both theoretical and experimental physics. His most recent interests have centered around the quest for ever-improving accuracy in the determination of the fundamental constants of nature, the understanding of long-lived strange particles and the unravelling of the properties of exotic atoms. This last topic is of particular interest to physicists at the College who have studied these objects for a number of years.



The Mermettes and their faculty adviser, Jan Tomlinson, covered 88 miles by water recently to raise funds for a trip to the International Aquatic Arts Festival to be held in Winnipeg, Canada, May 3, 4 and 5.

R. Merritt Cox Has Book Published

A controversial eighteenth century Spanish writer, whose work has been long neglected, is the subject of a book recently published by R. Merritt Cox.

In his biography of Tomás De Iriarté, Mr. Cox, associate professor of Spanish, reevaluated the work of the important literary figure whose creative genius won him great heights of favor and disfavor during his lifetime.

"As we look back on the Spanish eighteenth century, which is still so poorly understood,' said Mr. Cox, "we begin to see that Iriarte stands out as a truly brilliant figure in a variety of endeavors. He is a poet above all, but he is also a dramatist and musical composer, aspects of his career that have rarely been studied."

"Iriarte was outspoken against the affectation and pomposity of contemporary literary figures and

is best known for his 'Literary Fables,' which criticizes contemporary literary abuses. These unique fables both teach and entertain," said Mr. Cox.

Iriarte is also credited with the first successful Spanish comedy, entitled The Pampered Youth, noted Mr. Cox.

"It is as an innovative creator that he especially merits a fresh analysis," claimed his biographer.

Mr. Cox, who began work on the book in 1969 and researched it in the libraries at Duke University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, maintains that there is a great deal of interest in as well as a wealth of Spanish literature in the United States. He cited the Hispanic Society of America, of which he is a recently elected member, as the best source of Spanish literature in this country.

A native of Richmond, Mr. Cox received his bachelor's degree from the University of Richmond and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin. He taught at Duke University, where he was voted outstanding professor by the student body in 1972, before joining the William and Mary faculty last fall.
