N.Y. Lawyer 7th Recipient of Law Medallion

The Marshall-Wythe School of Law honored Whitney North Seymour of New York, a past president of the American Bar Association, at its annual law review banquet Saturday at the Williamsburg Lodge.

Mr. Seymour received the Marshall-Wythe Medallion which was commissioned in 1966 for presentation by the School of Law to leaders of the legal profession in the United States and abroad.

Mr. Seymour, senior partner of the New York law firm of Simpson, Thatcher and Bartlett, was president of the American Bar Foundation from 1960-64; president of the American College of Trial Lawyers, 1963-64; president of the Institute of Judicial Administration, 1968-69; and president and chairman of the American Arbitration Association, 1953-55 and again from 1955-57. He was president of the American Bar Association from 1960-61.

Mr. Seymour serves as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, and during his half century of practice in New York City has had more than 50 cases before the Supreme Court.

He has received many awards during his career in law and in 1971 received the highest award given an attorney, the American Bar Association Medal. He is an honorary bencher of Lincoln's Inn, London, and a member of the Order of the Coif.

Mr. Seymour is the seventh to receive the Marshall-Wythe Medallion.

undertake research on the French legislature. Mr. Damon will be accompanied by his wife, Debby, and daughter, Andrea, age two.



Subject: Revised Salaries for Classified Employees

I am delighted to report that substantial salary increases will be possible later this Spring for members of our classified service at William and Mary. The Governor has approved revised pay ranges for these permanent employees, some of which will be effective June 1 and others July 1, 1973. These salary revisions will be made according to individual job classification title. Selected classifications are being increased one step, and others two steps or more. These increases are contingent upon satisfactory job performance as evidenced by previous service ratings, and current job performance.

Deans of Faculties and Schools, and Department Heads will receive written notification in the near future of those employees under their jurisdiction that are eligible for a salary increase. This information will be forthcoming from the Director of Personnel. They will also be advised of the effective date and the number of salary steps that the employee may be advanced. Recommendations for approval or disapproval of such advancement must be furnished to the College Personnel Office on the notification form.

Every effort will be made by the College Personnel Office and the Division of Personnel in Richmond to expeditiously process the approved salary increases for eligible employees on the earliest pay day possible after the effective date. Employees are advised that questions pertaining to them as individuals must be directed to their supervisors. Employees selected for an increase are advised that any administrative delay in their receiving approved increases will be retroactive and will not result in any net loss of pay.

The action of the Governor and the recent session of the General Assembly in making these revisions possible recognizes the efforts of William and Mary and other institutions and agencies, to bring the salaries of loyal and efficient public employees to levels more in keeping with the value of their services. The increases also take into account continuing inflationary factors.

we are grateful for the assistance of the State government in dealing with this urgent need and know that the action is welcome news to many of our William and Mary families.
