Camp Tikonya Set at Waller Mill Park

The School of Education will sponsor an unusual five week summer camp for nine to twelve year old children in the Williamsburg-James City County area this summer.

Camp Tikonya will be conducted by faculty and graduate students of the division of special education in the School of Education, June 19 to July 20. The camp will be held at Waller Mill Park through the cooperation of the Williamsburg Recreation Department.

The camp program has been designed to provide a living-learning experience for children who have exhibited school or home adjustment problems and who have difficulty with peer and adult relationships.

The camp director will be John C. Abbott, assistant professor of education. It will be staffed by 20 graduate students currently completing requirements for the Master of Education degree.

"The idea for the camp," said Mr. Abbott, "was originated by the graduate students who wanted to do something other than the typical paper or project for completion of their degrees. Throughout the program they will work with the children on a one-to-one basis."

"Cooperation from local public schools has been excellent," reported Mr. Abbott. "In addition to recommending the children, the schools are supplying the materials for the arts and crafts sessions." Support on campus has also been high, he said, with the Summer School office supplying swimming instruction and athletic facilities.

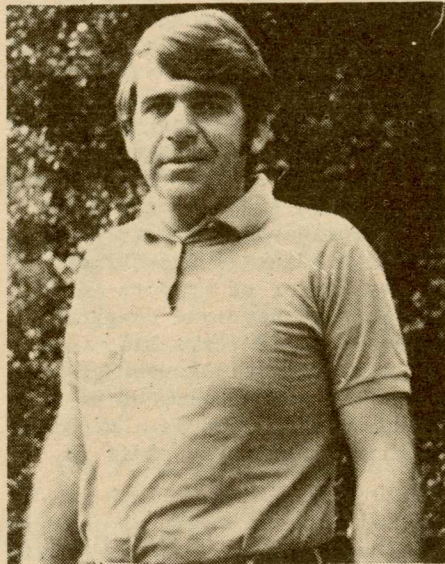
Camp Tikonya will be in session daily, five days a week from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. The "campers" will be picked up at their homes and returned there at the end of each day by camp staff members.

Science Teachers to Meet June 28

A conference on the use of research science in universities as a resource for area high schools will be held at the College, Thursday, June 28.

Public school science curriculum supervisors and science teachers from public and private schools in the Tidewater area have been invited to attend the conference to discuss ways of establishing closer ties between secondary schools and colleges for the enrichment of pre-college science programs.

Herbert O. Funsten, professor of physics at William and Mary, will be conference director.

Graves Attends Institute

President Thomas A. Graves, Jr., will attend the President's Institute, sponsored by the American Council on Education in Lake Placid, N.Y., Sunday, June 24, through Saturday, June 30.

Presidents from top-ranking colleges and universities throughout the nation will attend the conference and be afforded an opportunity to express ideas and learn the techniques of modern education as they relate to presidential leadership in American institutions of higher education.

Summer Registration Today

Over 230 courses will be offered in the Summer Sessions which begin today with registration at William and Mary Hall from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Classes for the first session begin tomorrow and will continue until July 20. The second session opens July 23 and runs through August 24. Commencement will be held August 25.

Students are reminded that classes will be held on Saturday June 23. There will be no break in the class schedule for the July 4 holiday due to the condensed nature of the courses.

Students may change courses before the fifth scheduled class (Saturday, June 23) meeting with the approval of the Director of Summer Sessions. No such changes will be approved after the second class meeting of courses of less than five weeks duration.

Undergraduate students who drop a course or courses after the fifth scheduled class meeting will receive a "no credit" for the course (this includes the School of Business Administration). Graduate students in the Schools of Education and Law may drop a course prior to mid-term with no grade. After mid-term the student must have permission from the instructor to drop the course.

Students enrolling in the second term only must file their applications by Monday, July 2. Registration for these students will be held in the Summer School Office on the main floor of James Blair Hall, Monday, July 23, the first day of classes for the second session.

A collection of slides showing the facilities, resources, and services offered by Swem Library will be shown June 19-21, from 2-4 p.m. in the Reserve Room of Swem Library. The slides, narrated by George Bartlett, a member of the library Audio Visual Department, are intended to facilitate the use of library materials by new students who will enroll for the first session of summer school. All students are invited to see the slides.

This summer the *William and Mary News* will replace the *Mini-Hat* newsletter of the Summer Sessions Office. Information on campus activities, the College calendar and announcements of special interest to summer sessions students will be printed in the forthcoming issues, July 3 and 24 and August 7 and 21.

Copies of the *News* will be distributed on campus and will be available at the Campus Center, the Summer Sessions Office and the College News Office at 125 Richmond Road (across from the President's House.)

Over 600 high school musicians are attending the 21st session of the College's Summer Band School which opened Sunday, June 17.

Established in 1953, the summer program for junior and senior high school students is sponsored by the Department of Music and is under the direction of Charles R. Varner, professor of music.

Biology

C. Richard Terman, professor, is program chairman for the Animal Behavior Society at the 1973 meeting of the American Institute of Biological Sciences, now underway at the University of Massachusetts.

English

Cecil M. McCulley, professor, has been appointed a regional judge in the 1973 Achievement Awards in Writing Program sponsored by the National Council of Teachers of English.

Approximately 850 Achievement Awards in Writing are given annually to high school seniors to encourage students in their writing and to recognize publicly some of the best student writers in the nation. The winners are recommended to colleges and universities as candidates for admission and for financial aid, if needed. The NCTE also honors teachers and schools that have participated in the training of these young men and women.

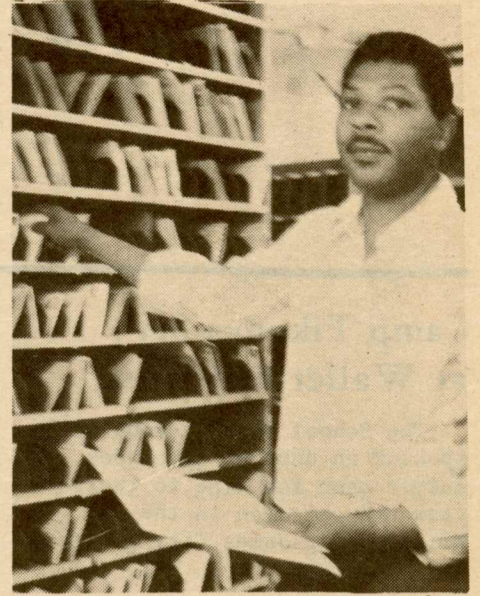

Thelma Miller Retires

"Teaching at William and Mary has been a real pleasure and the students a constant source of inspiration because of their interest and enthusiasm," said Thelma M. Miller, reflecting on her 19 years of teaching at the College.

Mrs. Miller will retire at the end of June as assistant professor and chairman of the Department of Home Economics. Upon her retirement the College will no longer offer courses in home economics.

A native of Rockhold, Ky., Mrs. Miller received her A.B. at Berea College in Kentucky and her M.S. at the University of Tennessee. She has taken summer graduate work at the Universities of Tennessee, Virginia, Illinois, and Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

Prior to joining the William and Mary faculty as an instructor in 1954, she taught in rural Kentucky's public school system, was a high school home economics teacher in Benham, Ky., and manager for ten years at the cafeteria at Berea College.

Among others, Mrs. Miller has taught courses in home management, food purchasing and principles of cooking, home and family living, and fundamentals of nutrition.

Mrs. Miller believes that the knowledge students gather from class should always be put to practical use so that it will be retained once the course is over. This theory was demonstrated by her method of teaching. In her

consumer education classes, for example, students were asked to visit local supermarkets in order to conduct food surveys by comparing prices on household commodities. Local lawyers and judges as well as the area president of the Better Business Bureau were invited to speak to classes on consumerism.

Mrs. Miller feels that efficiency is the most important requirement for becoming a successful homemaker - and the most difficult to learn, she acknowledges. The most common mistakes made by homemakers, she feels, are "not allowing enough time to complete a task and not doing first things first."

Upon her retirement Mrs. Miller plans to move to Williamsburg, Ky., where she has recently built a new home and where she will care for an elderly relative.

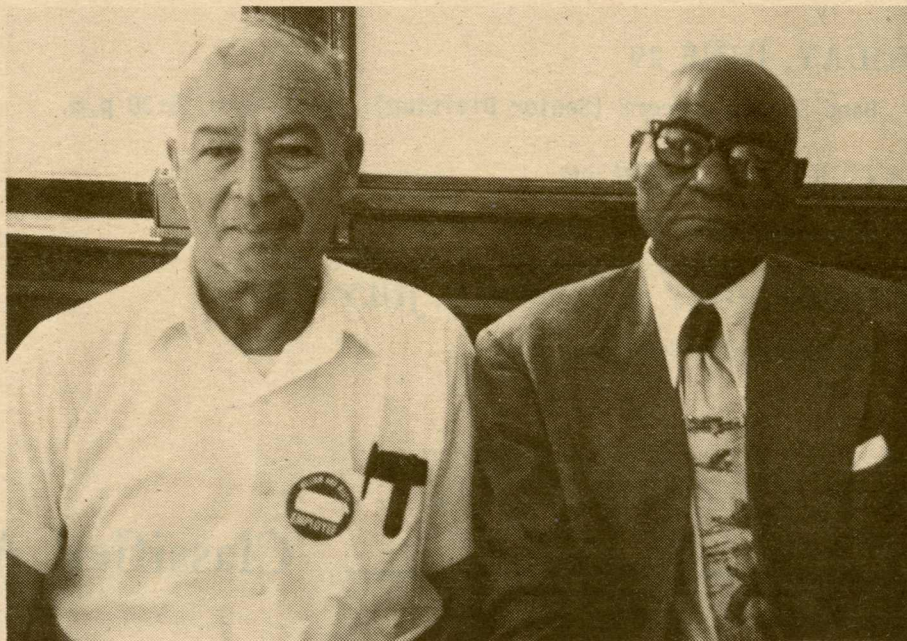
Twelve members of the Women's Residence staff recently completed employment at the College with a total of 67 years of service. They were feted at a luncheon in the Campus Center in late April.
