


Dr. Franklin A. Munsey Joins Dr. Cilley



Dr. Munsey

Dr. Franklin A. Munsey has joined the staff of Student Health Services as assistant director.

A pediatrician in Rockford, Ill., with 24 years of private practice as background, Dr. Munsey has "a special interest in young people--their health as well as their education."

Both he and Dr. Cilley plan to emphasize a program of health education at William and Mary. Health education will probably be on the informal basis of providing students with advice and counsel.

Dr. Munsey's work on an education committee of the Winnebago County Medical Society reflects his interest in health education. He was president of the Society in 1967.

He served as chairman of the Winnebago County Board of Health; vice president of the Child Development Association; and president of the Winnebago County Heart Association.

In 1968 he served two months as a volunteer physician at the civilian hospital in Bac Lieu, in Vietnam.

A native of Massachusetts, Dr. Munsey is a graduate of Dartmouth College. He was an intern in the Gorgas Hospital in the Canal Zone and completed his residency in pediatrics at the Research and Educational Hospital in Chicago. He and his wife, Shirley, have four sons and a daughter.

New Language Houses are Opened

Among the new faces on campus are three European University students who will be program leaders in the recently established Language Houses on campus.

Gerhard Csoma from Germany, Luis Seco Romero from Spain, and Jean Ritter from France will be native speakers in the three houses which have been set up in the residence complex which also includes Project Plus.

The new program, proposed by the College's Committee on Foreign Study, extends the language learning experience beyond the classroom.

A "get acquainted" party will be held for the residents of the Language Houses, Friday, September 14, from 7:30-11 p.m., in units 5-6-9. Members of the Modern Languages Department faculty and their spouses are invited to attend.

In announcing the new program earlier this year, Vice President Healy said, "This pilot project, supportive of the academic program, is aimed at providing students with 'total immersion' in language study by adding the unstructured learning situation of a residence program to the conventional classroom instruction."

\$61,400 NSF Grant Awarded College

A grant of \$61,400 has been made to William and Mary by the National Science Foundation for a program being undertaken by the College's Metropolitan Criminal Justice Center in Norfolk.

The one-year grant is one of two such grants awarded in the nation, the other recipient being the National Council on Crime and Delinquency.

The project is entitled "Evaluation of Policy-Related Research on the Exercise of Discretion by Law Enforcement Officials." This project is under the direction of W. Anthony Fitch, director of the Pilot City Program, which is administered by the Metropolitan Criminal Justice Center.

The program will evaluate all previous research in terms of its internal and external validity, investigate its policy implications and study additional research to be undertaken in the future in the field of discretionary decisions by criminal justice agencies.

According to Mr. Fitch, no comprehensive study of the means by which criminal justice officials make discretionary decisions has been done in the past. Such decisions have a tremendous effect on the crime rate, which is influenced by such factors as the number of accused being arrested and tried, he added.

Woodworking is not only a job for Marvin F. Smither, cabinetmaker, it's a hobby too.

An employee of the College for two years, Mr. Smither explained, "I've been working with wood for over 40 years, ever since my father gave me my first set of tools as a child."

Using mainly white pine and fir for his projects on campus, Mr. Smither has made items including cabinets, bookcases, and counters. He sends them on to the Paint Department for finishing and installation in College buildings.

Prior to moving to Toano in 1967, his woodworking led Mr. Smither to construction of a 1-1/2 story Cape Cod house in his native Kilmarnock. He has constructed most of the furniture for his home in Toano, including end tables, lamps, and numerous other items. His most recent project was building a 24-room birdhouse for purple martins.

A graduate of Lancaster High School in Kilmarnock, Mr. Smither has been a teacher of Industrial Arts at White Stone High School, a maintenance supervisor for the Williamsburg-James City County school system, and a selfemployed cabinetmaker. UDC to Give Award in Southern History

The United Daughters of the Confederacy has announced that its biennial grant in aid of publication, the Mrs. Simon Baruch University Award, will be awarded in 1974.

Offered to encourage research in Southern history, an award of \$1,500 will be made for the best unpublished book or monograph in the field of Southern history in or near the period of the Confederacy or bearing upon the causes that led to secession and the War between the States.

The contest is open to men and women for a period of fifteen years following their graduation with an advanced degree from a university or college in the United States and to graduate students whose theses or dissertations have been accepted for graduation.

In making the Award, the judges will consider the effectiveness of research, originality of thought, accuracy of statement, and excellence of style.

Book-length manuscripts should contain at least 75,000 words; monographs from 25,000 to 50,000 words.

The award, designed to assist younger professional men and women in the publication of their theses, dissertations, and other writings in the periods stated in the rules, was endowed by the late Bernard Baruch as a memorial to his mother who had long been a devoted member of the UDC.


