Painting Exhibition Honors Thomas Thorne

The Department of Fine Arts will present an exhibition of paintings by Thomas Elston Thorne in Andrews Hall from Friday, November 30 through Sunday, February 3. The gallery will be open from 1-5 p.m. Wednesday through Sunday. It will be closed during the period Dec. 17-Jan. 1.

Retiring Professor Thomas E. Thorne combines the activities of instructor, artist and scholar. In 1940, he joined the faculty of the College as instructor in painting in the Department of Fine Arts. He became an associate professor in 1945 and a full professor twenty years later. As chairman of the Department from 1943 to 1970, he was instrumental in the considerable expansion of the fine arts program at the College.

As instructor of painting, Mr. Thorne gives his students a solid foundation in technique, drawing, design and color, by example as well as by explicit instruction. He aims to impart to his students a genuine feeling for their materials so that they may realize better their intentions.

A native of Lewiston, Maine, Mr. Thorne studied at the Portland School of Fine Arts and Applied Art. The Maine coastline--a recurring theme in his art--and the example of the American Impressionist painter Walter Griffin, whose studio was near Portland, influenced his early and enduring delight in landscape. Mr. Thorne studied at the Yale School of Fine Arts from 1927-30.

Mr. Thorne exhibited in 1935 at the Boston Art Club, at the Boston Society of Independent Artists, and in a one-man show at the Grace Horne Gallery. That same year, he opened a successful studio at Kennebunkport, Maine.

He returned to the Yale School of Fine Arts in 1938. After graduating in 1940 with the degree of bachelor of fine arts, he continued his education by enrolling in the summer of 1941 at the Art Students League.

Mr. Thorne has shown his paintings in numerous personal and joint exhibitions in the State. He also has served as one of the directors and as president of the Virginia Art Alliance and has participated in numerous art commissions, panels and juries.

Mr. Thorne is also an active art historian with a broad knowledge about past artists and with a painter's sensitivity to their styles and methods. He has lectured widely and has written for the press and for scholarly journals as a connoisseur and specialist in the history of Colonial American painting and architecture. Of particular importance is his research on Charles Bridges and other artists active in eighteenth-century Williamsburg.

His interest in colonial architecture led to his saving of Bel-Mede, the plantation house built in Southhampton County in 1770 and moved to Burns Lane in Williamsburg in 1946. The house is furnished with a fine collection of antiques brought together by Mr. Thorne and his wife, Lelia Agry Bancroft, whom he married in 1934.

Mr. Thorne has assembled an impressive collection of seventeenth- and eighteenth-century publications concerning art criticism, biography of artists and artistic instruction. He has donated these volumes as well as a complementary collection of more recent books on art to the Earl Gregg Swem Library where they will be kept as a distinct collection.

CNC, RBC Students Excel as Transfers

Richard Bland College students who transfer to William and Mary have compiled a winning scholastic track record at the College, while students from Christopher Newport College who transfer to William and Mary tend to improve their grades after transferring, a new study has revealed.

The study encompasses a 4-1/2-year period, covering 1,150 transfer students and was conducted by the new Office of Institutional Research as the first in-depth analysis of undergraduate transfer students.

Results of the four-month study were announced by George R. Healy, William and Mary's vice president for academic affairs. The investigation covered the records of transfer students from September, 1968, until the end of the last academic year. It was designed to show the number, fields of concentration and academic characteristics of transfer students.

Academic records were compiled in terms of quality point average, or QPA, in which "A" grades earn three points per semester hour, "B" grades earn two points, and "C" grades earn one. Lower grades earn no points, but the credit hours are used in determining the QPA.

Richard Bland transfers, according to the study, earned a 1.9076 QPA at William and Mary, the highest of the 19 colleges and universities which sent 10 or more transfers to the College during the period covered by the study. In all, 56 Richard Bland transfers were included.

According to the compilation, the average QPA of Christopher Newport College students before transferring was 1.6718 on a scale of 3.0. Their average performance at William and Mary rose to 1.6753. The overall average performance of all transfer students was 1.5751, lower than the CNC transfers.

William and Mary accepted more CNC transfers than from any other college during the period of the study. In all, 98 CNC students transferred, followed by 56 from Richard Bland College in Petersburg, William and Mary's other branch college. Third was Mary Washington College, with 31 transfers.

The overall average of transfer students at William and Mary was shown to be 1.4644, significantly below the Richard Bland record. The study also showed that women transfers from Richard Bland College to William and Mary earned a QPA of 1.9325, better than women transfers from the other 19 institutions; and men transfers earned a QPA of 1.8808, also better than those from other colleges and universities.

PBK Speaker, Poet Set for December 5 Meeting

O. B. Hardison, Jr., director of the Folger Shakespeare Library, Washington, D.C., will give the annual lecture at the public meeting of Alpha of Virginia Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, December 5 at 8:15 p.m. in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

Wednesday evening's program will also include a poetry reading by Daniel Hoffman, designated Phi Beta Kappa poet for 1973.

Mr. Hardison will speak on "Attempting the Impossible and Accomplishing the Unbelievable: Thoughts on Two American Revolutions." His major field of scholarly research has been Renaissance studies. His published works include *Christian Rite and Christian Drama in the Middle Ages*, *Practical Rhetoric*, and *The Quest for Imagination*.

At the Folger Library he has been active in encouraging the production of experimental plays and has written several film scripts himself. He has taught at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the University of Tennessee and Princeton.

Mr. Hoffman is consultant in poetry for the Library of Congress and chancellor of the Academy of American

poets. He is also professor of English at the University of Pennsylvania and is well known as both a critic and a poet. He has published five books of verse. His first volume won the Yale Series of Younger Poets award. His most recent works include *Broken Laws*, and a critical work, *Poe Poe Poe...*

The December 5 meeting will mark the 197th anniversary of the founding of Phi Beta Kappa at William and Mary. It is believed that the initial meeting was held by five students at the Raleigh Tavern on Duke of Gloucester Street.

Men's P. E. Dominates Faculty Tennis Matches

Steve Haynie, men's tennis coach, repeated as champion in the William and Mary faculty tennis tournament, defeating his doubles partner, Ed Christman, in the finals, 6-0, 7-5. The two made it a sweep for Men's Physical Education by annexing the doubles title as well with a 6-1, 7-6 conquest of Alan Fuchs and Ron Brown.

En route to the singles finals, Haynie disposed of Lew Foster, 6-2, 6-4, and Fuchs, 6-2, 7-6. Christman advanced in a series of close calls over last year's runnerup, Betty Brown, 7-5, 7-6; Armand Galfo, 7-6, 7-5; and Scott Donaldson, 6-3, 7-5. In other quarter-final contests Fuchs edged Millie West, 6-3, 6-4 and Donaldson put out Peter Wiggins, 6-2, 6-2.

In the doubles semi-finals, Fuchs and Brown went three sets to defeat the defending champions, Peter Wiggins and Wayne Kernodle, 6-3, 4-6, 6-3, while Haynie and Christman survived two set points in upending Donaldson and John Conlee, 6-4, 7-6.

Scholar Speaks on U. N. Theatre Will Produce 'House of Bernarda Alba'

John G. Stoessinger, director of the political affairs division of the United Nations, will speak Wednesday, December 12.

He will speak on "The United Nations: Breakdown or Breakthrough" at 8 p.m. in the Campus Center Little Theatre. His lecture is part of the current Visiting Scholars Series on campus arranged in cooperation with the University Center in Virginia, Inc.

Mr. Stoessinger is professor of political science at the City University of New York, Hunter College. He is the author of *The Might of Nations*, *World Politics in our Times*, and *Nations in Darkness: China, Russia and America*.

Mr. Stoessinger received the B.A. from Grinnell College in 1950 and the Ph.D. from Harvard in 1954. He has taught at Harvard, Wellesley College, Columbia University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Collegium Musicum

The Department of Music Collegium Musicum Series, under the direction of F. Donald Truesdell, will present for the second program Henri Honegger playing three suites for solo cello by Johann Sebastian Bach, Sunday, December 2, 4 p.m. at the Campus Center Ballroom. The public is invited to attend.

Solo music for violoncello is comparatively rare. As he did for violin, Bach wrote six suites all in the chamber sonata (suite) form. Honegger will play the first, third and fifth, the latter of particular interest because of what is known as "scordatura" tuning. The "A" string is tuned to "G". All of the suites have the standard stylized dances, Allemande, Courante, Sarabande and Gigue. In addition, they all begin with a Prelude and have an optional movement preceding the Gigue.

Henri Honegger was born in Geneva where he began his musical studies at the Conservatoire. He has appeared in festivals in Edinburgh, Venice, Frankfurt and Paris in addition to playing with the best known orchestras in Europe, North and South America, and Africa.

Israeli Folk Dance

Temple Beth El Hillel will sponsor the Israeli Folk Dance on Sunday at 7 p.m. Instructors will be present. Refreshments will be served at a cost of 50¢ per person.

"The House of Bernarda Alba" will be the second William and Mary Theatre production this year and the first time a Federico Garcia Lorca play has been done in Williamsburg.

A three-act play subtitled "a drama about women in the villages of Spain," it will be presented at 8:15 p.m. in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Dec. 4, 6, 7 and 8. There will be no performance on Wednesday, Dec. 5.

Louis E. Catron, William and Mary Theatre playwright, directs the production.

In "The House of Bernarda Alba," Garcia Lorca shows the frightening effects of outmoded social customs influencing the lives of vibrant young women.

The play is described by Tom F. Driever in his book, "History of the Modern Theatre."

"Lorca's greatest work is 'The House of Bernarda Alba' which takes place in the house of a widow who has five daughters. The mystique of virginity hangs over this play even more than over Shakespeare's 'Measure for Measure' and without any of the latter play's suggestion of forgiving grace. By Spanish custom, the eldest of the daughters should be the first to marry, but in Lorca's play the youngest is in love with the fiancée of the eldest and does not restrain herself from making tryst with him."

Mr. Catron says he has wanted to direct "The House of Bernarda Alba" for many years. He thinks it ought to be presented because "it is simply a magnificent poetic tragedy, one of the very few such plays in the modern theatre, and it is a tremendous challenge for any theatre group. It speaks to our souls and spirits about freedom to live and love."

Mr. Catron has directed for the William and Mary Theatre such plays as "The Trial of the Catonsville Nine," "A Cry of Players," and a bill of six one-act plays which included authors Pinter, Williams, Genet, Beckett and Fry.

The William and Mary Theatre's box office will be open for tickets for "Bernarda Alba" between 3-5:30 p.m. Monday-Friday, Dec. 3-7, and it opens again at 7 p.m. the four nights of performance. During those box office hours, telephone reservations are accepted at 229-3000, Ext. 272 or 469. All seats are reserved at \$2.
