Swem Library Aids In Genealogical Search

David M. Sullivan of the Capitol Bank and Trust Company of Boston, Mass., is a genealogy buff and he recently got some assistance from the Reference Department at Swem Library which really delighted him.

For the past four years he has been searching Civil War records for some biographical facts on a young man who served in the Confederate Navy.

In the Guide to the Archives of the Government of the Confederate States of America he discovered Swem Library at William and Mary was listed as a depository of "Marine Corps Records in Other Custody." The extent of the library's holdings was not listed.

Mr. Sullivan called the library. Dortha H. Skelton, assistant reference librarian, started the search and found the document with the help of Herbert Ganter, College archivist, and Margaret Cook, curator of manuscripts.

The document was just one page of a roll book, "The Statistical Return of Company B, 1864, Confederate States Marine Corps, Alfred C. Van Benthuysen,

For Mr. Sullivan's inquiry, however, the one page was sufficient. It listed the ancestor he had been tracing, Arthur Hayne Beall, son of Colonel Commandant of G. S. Marine Corps, Lloyd J. Beall. It confirmed for Mr. Sullivan that young Beall had served as a midshipman in the G. S. Navy but had been a marine recruit prior to that for about a month.

Mr. Sullivan wrote to Mrs. Skelton thanking her for the library's efforts on his behalf - "to say that I am merely pleased would be an understate-

Grants to Physics Dept.

The National Science Foundation has awarded two grants totaling \$81,500 to members of the Physics Department for research being undertaken this year at the Brookhaven, Long Island, Laboratory Alternating Gradient Synchrotron.

A grant of \$60,000 for 'Experiments on the Properties of Antiprotonic and Sigma Hyperons" has been awarded to C. R. Cox, M. Eckhause, J. R. Kane and R. E. Welsh of the physics faculty and B. L. Roberts of Williamsburg, a graduate student. Work will be done in collaboration with physicists from Carnegie-Mellon University, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the University of Wyoming, and the California Institute of Technology.

Arden Sher and J. F. Soest have been awarded \$21,500 for research this year on Gallium Arsonide semi-conductors used in many exotic new devices upon which sophisticated technology depends. By studying very low concentrations of defects in these conductors - ten parts per billion - scientists will seek to understand more fully the physical phenomena that tend to limit the performance of devices constructed from

At its meeting on January 11, 1974, the Board of Visitors passed a Resolution authorizing a study of the College athletic policies as follows:

AUTHORIZING A STUDY OF WILLIAM AND MARY ATHLETIC POLICIES Present policy governing intercollegiate athletics at William and Mary was adopted by the Board of Visitors in 1961. Since that time, Board review has been limited largely to consideration of the annual athletic budgets. In 1971 the Faculty Athletic Committee summarized existing practices in a fourteen-point statement that was transmitted via the President to the Board of Visitors for its information and examination, without request for revision or other consideration.

Since enunciation of the policy in 1961, a number of developments have taken place which indicate a thorough review of policies and practices is warranted. These developments include a continuing period of inflation with its eroding effects on all fixed-dollar budgets; major changes in the leadership of the athletic program, including the Director of Athletics and members of the coaching staffs; changes in the rules and membership of athletic conferences; increasing demands for broader support for the women's intercollegiate and intramural athletic programs which serve approximately one-half the student body; and, despite an accelerated volume of support from alumni and friends of the College, a recurring problem of balancing the men's athletic budget.

William and Mary continues to enjoy a high quality program of intercollegiate and intramural athletics, guided by an outstanding men's athletic director and able coaching staffs and by similarly highly qualified leaders in the field of women's athletics. These individuals and members of the faculties, the administration, and the student body recognize that current problems are not likely to diminish in the near future and feel that a comprehensive study of the overall situation is a prerequisite to setting long-term policies. Hopefully, such an examination can identify measures to augment and better distribute revenues so that the quality and scope of programs can be maintained.

RESOLVED, That the Board of Visitors hereby authorizes a comprehensive review of William and Mary Athletic policies, covering both men and women and both intercollegiate and intramural activities, by a special committee to be appointed by the President of the College.

RESOLVED, further, that the findings and recommendations of the Committee be prepared in time for consideration by the President and the Board of Visitors at its November 1974 meeting.

1974 Social Security Deduction

Recently enacted Social Security amendments increased the amount of wages taxable under Social Security in 1974 from \$12,600 (as announced in the *William and Mary News* on December 11, 1973) to \$13,200.
