Graves Is Interviewer For Internship Program

President Thomas A. Graves, Jr., will serve as an interviewer for the Academic Administration Internship Program of the American Council on Education (ACE) to be held Feb. 27-28 in Washington, D.C.

The purpose of the program is to strengthen leadership in American higher education and to identify and train junior faculty and staff members who have demonstrated leadership potential.

The program further encourages those chosen as ACE Fellows to make careers in administration by providing them with opportunities for "planned observation and experience in academic decision making."

Deadline Extended

According to A. Z. Freeman, professor of history, the application deadline for the General Douglas MacArthur Scholarships has been extended from Friday, March 1, to Thursday, March 7.

Information supplied by the *William and Mary News* last week incorrectly stated that scholarship essays, rather than applications, were due March 1.

Self-Improvement Programs Planned

Plans are currently being made to initiate volunteer self-improvement programs for members of the College community, according to Irving H. Robitshek, director of personnel.

"Hopefully, employees participating in these programs will be our most promising candidates for positions of greater responsibility," Mr. Robitshek stated.

In order to provide assistance to employees who are interested in improving their reading and writing abilities, the Personnel Office is working with the School of Education in setting up the first program.

Richard B. Brooks, dean, School of Education, has made tentative arrangements for several students in advanced reading courses to work with the participants during the fall semester of the 1974-75 academic year, according to Mr. Robitshek.

A survey to determine the number of employees interested in such a program will be conducted in the near future. Each class will be limited to 20 persons and no fees will be charged.

1974 Self-Study Report

The 1974 Report of the Self-Study, published last week by the College, has been distributed to several hundred persons on campus and other interested individuals. Copies are also available at the Library Reserve Room.

Copies were given to all members of the faculty and all administrators, as well as to a list of student leaders and student members of Self-Study committees developed by the Dean of Students' Office.

Off-campus recipients included members of the Board of Visitors, the Board of the Society of the Alumni, the Endowment Association Trustees, the President's Council, and the officers of the Law School Association, Parents Association, Educational Foundation and School of Business Sponsors. Copies were also given to Williamsburg Mayor Vernon M. Geddy and Colonial Williamsburg President Carlisle H. Humelsine.

The Self-Study Steering Committee had 1,000 copies of the 486-page report printed.

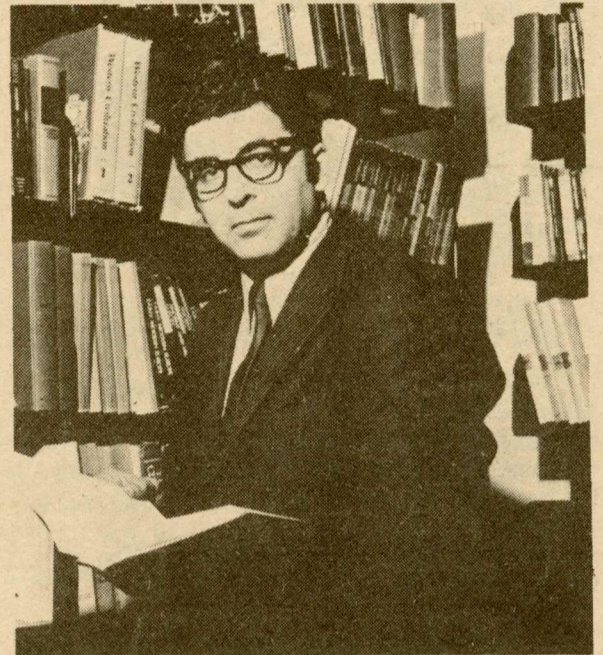

Equal Opportunity Employment Plan

On February 6, 1974, the Governor of Virginia, by Executive Order #1, promulgated the Virginia Affirmative Action Plan for Equal Opportunity Employment. This supersedes Executive Order #29 of January 1, 1973, which was the original Commonwealth of Virginia Equal Employment Opportunity Plan. The Equal Employment Opportunity Policy of the new plan states:

"The Commonwealth of Virginia shall provide equal employment opportunity to its employees and applicants for employment on the basis of fitness and merit without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, political affiliation, sex or age (except where sex or age is a bona fide occupational qualification). This policy shall be followed in recruiting, hiring, promotion into all position classifications, compensation, benefits, transfers, layoffs, returns from layoff, demotions, terminations, State sponsored training programs, educational leave, social and recreational programs and use of State facilities. Any person employed by the Commonwealth of Virginia who fails to comply with this policy is subject to disciplinary action."

Copies of this latest plan will be available for all permanent employees on March 7, 1974, at the College Payroll Office. Additional copies will be furnished to all deans and department heads for permanent posting in their respective areas of responsibility. Additional copies may be obtained by applying in person at the Personnel Office in James Blair Hall after March 7, 1974.

State Gasoline Sale Provisions Announced

Executive Order No. Two

By virtue of the authority vested in me by Section 44-146.17 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended by an Act of the General Assembly signed into law on February 15, 1974, and in force from its passage as emergency legislation of the General Assembly, I hereby issue Executive Order No. Two which shall have the force and effect of law.

I. From and after the effective date of this order, no gasoline retailer doing business in Virginia shall sell or deliver to any person any gasoline except as provided below:

- (a) No gasoline shall be placed in the tank of any motor vehicle unless such tank is less than one-half full as shown by the gasoline gauge on the vehicle, and such gasoline gauge is operating.
- (b) No gasoline in excess of two gallons, except for agricultural or commercial purposes, shall be placed in any container other than a tank designed for and affixed to a motor vehicle, boat or aircraft.
- (c) On the odd numbered calendar days of any month, no gasoline shall be placed in the tank of any motor vehicle having a Virginia license plate unless the only or last digit on such license plate is 1, 3, 5, 7, or 9. On the even numbered calendar days of any month, no gasoline shall be placed in the tank of any motor vehicle bearing a Virginia license plate unless the only or last digit on such license plate is 2, 4, 6, 8, 0.
- (d) The provisions of subparagraph (c) shall not apply on the 31st day of any month, on which day motor vehicles having less than one-half tank of gasoline as shown by an operating gasoline gauge on the motor vehicle may be supplied without regard to license plate numbers.

II. The provisions of Paragraph I of this order shall not apply to the following:

- (a) Motor vehicles owned or leased by the United States, the Commonwealth of Virginia, any political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia or any department or agency thereof.
- (b) Emergency vehicles owned or leased by volunteer rescue squads and volunteer fire departments.
- (c) Privately owned or leased ambulances.
- (d) Motor vehicles actually and exclusively used in agriculture or in any trade or business.

III. The maximum amount of gasoline supplied to any motor vehicle, including those listed in Paragraph II, may be determined by each retailer. No minimum amount of gasoline which must be purchased shall be required by any retailer.

IV. Motor vehicles bearing out-of-state license plates and registered to a person not currently living in Virginia may be supplied gasoline without regard to the provisions of Paragraph I(c), except in those counties and cities in Virginia having a territorial boundary contiguous with the states of Kentucky, Maryland, North Carolina, Tennessee, West Virginia or the District of Columbia. In such counties and cities (and in any town or city lying wholly or partially within or adjacent to any such county) motor vehicles bearing out-of-state license plates and registered to a person not currently living in Virginia shall be supplied gasoline only in accordance with the limitations specified in Paragraph I.

V. Motor vehicles bearing out-of-state license plates and registered to military personnel, students, or any other person currently living in Virginia shall be supplied gasoline only in accordance with the limitations set out in Paragraph I.

VI. The necessity or desirability of arranging the hours of operation of individual gasoline retailers on a voluntary basis may be ascertained by local governing bodies, which governing bodies are hereby authorized to arrange voluntary programs covering such hours of operation. Appropriate information programs enlisting the support of the news media are also authorized.

VII. This order shall become effective at midnight on Wednesday, February 20, 1974.

VIII. This order shall remain in full force and effect until supplemented, amended or rescinded by further executive order.
