New Chemistry Building Under Construction



An artist's rendering of the new chemistry building, designed by Wright, Jones & Wilkerson, Richmond architects, which is currently under construction.

Work on the \$2.4 million building was started October 22, 1973, and is scheduled for completion March 25, 1975. The new building will have two floors, approximately 37,369 square feet of space, and will house the Chemistry and Philosophy Departments.

The building, located just east of John Millington Hall of Life Sciences, is expected to be ready for use in September, 1975. Funds for the structure were included in the 1972-74 capital outlay budget of the College. Contractor for the building is Cochran Construction Company of Hampton.

Miss Townes is responsible for the processing, study, and analysis of artifacts and the laboratory instruction of students involved with the Flowerdew project.

Agnes Mongan, Martin A. Ryerson Lecturer on the Fine Arts, Harvard University, will speak Wednesday, April 3, at 8:30 p.m. in Andrews Hall, Room 101.

Miss Mongan will speak on "Rembrandt: The Painter and the Draughtsman." Her visit has been arranged by the College Fine Arts Department in cooperation with the University Center in Virginia, Inc. It is part of the current Visiting Scholars

An authority on the master drawings of Italy and France, Miss Mongan is director and curator of drawings of the William Hayes Fogg Art Museum in Boston and holds the distinction of being the only woman in the United States to head a major museum.

She is the editor of One Hundred Master Drawings and The Heart of Spain, and prepared a major study of *Drawings* in the Fogg Museum of Art with Paul J. Sachs. She has published the volume on French painting in the Frick Collection in New York City and the volume of French drawings in the four-volume work, Great Drawings of All Times. In 1967 she published Ingres in American Collections with Hans Naef.

Miss Mongan holds honorary degrees from Smith and Wheaton Colleges.

The National Endowment for the Humanities

This agency is in the process of developing a new program of fellowships in the humanities for faculty of four year colleges and universities. While details have not yet been finalized, it is expected the program will be modeled on the Fellowships for Younger Humanists Program. Guidelines and application forms should be available early in April, with the first two deadlines tentatively set for June and September 1974. The program's scope is expected to cover the full range of humanistic disciplines funded by NEH, and the stipend range should parallel the current Younger Humanist program, with a maximum of \$1,250 per month for six to nine months of full-time study.

Social Security Representative Available

The Social Security representative is at the Williamsburg-James City County Court House on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month from 9:30 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 3 p.m. to answer questions and assist in filling out application forms.

Virginia Supplemental Retirement System

The 1974 General Assembly approved the following major changes to the Virginia Supplemental Retirement Act to be effective July 1, 1974:

- (1) Increased benefits by using employees' highest three consecutive, rather than five, years of salary to calculate benefits.
- (2) Increased benefits by changing formula to 1.5 percent of total salary. This removes the \$1,200 deduction factor. Since this change would decrease the benefit for an employee whose final average salary is greater than \$13,200, an employee with a salary of \$13,200 or greater will have his benefit calculation based on the present formula which is 1.65 percent times final average salary in excess of \$1,200. (See example shown below)
- (3) Established a maximum benefit for state sponsored retirement benefits equal to 100 percent of final average salary measured against VSRS benefits and one-half of social security. This will not affect any person retiring in the next few years.
- (4) Provides a new, reasonable minimum guarantee for retirement benefits to alleviate hardship cases resulting from past low salaries. This provision affects approximately 1,200 present annuitants.
- (5) Permits employees entitled to purchase credit for past service to purchase a portion as well as all of the credit available to them.
- (6) Improves the minimum guarantee for work-related disability benefits by guaranteeing two-thirds of average final salary offset by one-half, rather than all, of the primary social security benefit.
- (7) Permits member, who has elected to have his retirement allowance paid on a reduced basis to himself and continued to a designated beneficiary after his death, to receive his full benefit if his designee predeceases him.

The final improvement to the Act adjusts the employee contribution rate to 5 percent of full salary. THIS PROVISION BECOMES EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 1, 1974. (This delay is for administrative reasons.)

A more complete discussion of these changes will be included in a newsletter to be prepared and distributed within the next few months to all employees contributing to the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System.

To: Deans, Department Heads and Supervisors

Subject: Final submission date for requisitions and purchase orders

Requisitions for purchases, except for those involving metal office furniture, should be submitted to the College Purchasing Office no later than April 15. Hopefully, this will provide the Purchasing Office with sufficient time in which to solicit bids and award purchase orders so as to insure delivery prior to July 1.

Urgent purchases of day-to-day supplies, involving small dollar value, will be processed as necessary through June 15, if delivery is assured before July 1.

With regard to metal office furniture, as excepted in the first paragraph, notice has just been received from the Department of Purchases and Supply in Richmond that all requisitions for such items must be received in that office on or before March 29. Accordingly, any such requisitions should be in the College Purchasing Office before March 22, in order to allow the necessary processing before the March 29 deadline.

We are hopeful that the schedules noted above will relieve a "log-jam" of requisitions at the end of the biennium and help prevent a reversion of funds because of undelivered orders.
