## Board's Executive Committee Holds Meeting in Richmond

The Executive Committee of the Board of Visitors met last Wednesday to act on several personnel matters.

### Student Affairs Appointments

Susan J. Albert, consultant to the University of Virginia Counselor Education extension program in Windsor and Kitcheners, Canada, has been appointed Associate Dean of Students for Student Development, effective July 1.

Miss Albert earned the B.A. degree in psychology and sociology from Lycoming College in 1969, the M.Ed. in guidance and counseling from William and Mary in 1970, and is a candidate for the Ed.D. in counselor education at the University of Virginia in August.

While at U.Va., she served as graduate assistant in the Counselor Education Department, administered national professional and graduate school admissions tests; and conducted extensive and intensive individual and group counseling sessions as part of advanced practicum experience in the Student Counseling Center.

From 1970-72 Miss Albert served as assistant dean of students at Lycoming College, with particular responsibility in the area of special program administration.

John D. Morgan, who will receive the Ed.D. degree at Pennsylvania State University in August, has been appointed Associate Dean of Students for Residence Hall Life, effective July 1.

Mr. Morgan served as assistant dean of men at Villanova from 1968-71, during which time he was also part-time counselor in the University Counseling Center and in charge of men's residence.

In 1971 Mr. Morgan served as associate coordinator for the dean of students at Pennsylvania State University, where he managed a residence complex of 4,000 with a staff of 70. From 1966-68, he was head resident at Florence (Ala.) State College.

Mr. Morgan is a member of Kappa Delta Pi (academic) and Phi Delta Kappa (academic and leadership) education honoraries. He has published in the *Journal of College and University Student Housing* and *The Journal of College Student Personnel*.

## First Summer Session Begins Today

Registration for the summer session is being held today in William and Mary Hall from 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Over 220 courses will be offered.

### Orientation Program

An orientation program for all students new to the College, pre-freshmen and transfer, will be held in Rooms A&B in the Campus Center tonight at 7 p.m. Participants will tour the campus by bus and meet briefly in an informal session. Refreshments will be served later.

### Classes

Classes for the first session begin tomorrow and will continue until July 19. The second session opens July 22 and runs through August 23. Commencement will be held August 24.

All classes will meet Saturday, June 22, and Thursday, July 4.

### Course Changes

Students may change courses before the fourth scheduled class (Friday, June 21) meeting with the approval of the director of the summer sessions. No such changes will be approved after the second class meeting of courses of less than a five week duration.

Undergraduate students who drop a course or courses after the fifth scheduled class meeting will receive a "no credit" for the course (this includes the School of Business Administration). Graduate students in the Schools of Education and Law may drop a course prior to mid-term with no grade. After mid-term the student must have permission from the instructor to drop the course.

### Second Term Applications

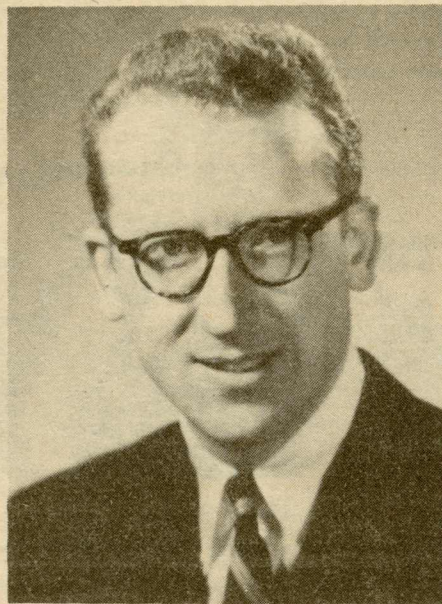

## O'Connell Named Associate Dean

William E. O'Connell has been appointed Associate Dean for Graduate Studies of the School of Business Administration, effective July 1. He succeeds Marvin M. Stanley, who requested the opportunity to return to fulltime teaching status in the school.

Mr. Stanley, who was Associate Dean for Undergraduate Studies when the Bachelor of Business Administration degree program was professionally accredited in 1972, became head of the M.B.A. program and oversaw its move to professional accreditation in April, 1974.

In addition to teaching, Mr. Stanley will conduct research in his primary interest areas of long-range corporate

planning and transportation management and economics. Through a combined research-consulting project with Chessie System, Inc. and the railroad's Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, Hays T. Watkins, Mr. Stanley will investigate the implications of the Rail Services Act of 1973 and the impact on the competitive relationships of a quasi-governmental railroad competing against a privately-owned, though extensively regulated, railroad system in the northwest and midwest regions.

During the last year, Mr. Stanley has also been active as a consultant to a consortium headed by Coca-Cola and Anheuser Busch in developing environmental improvement programs for the beverage and container industries. He also prepared an article, "Just What Sort of M.B.A. . . .?" which will be published in the fall in *Collegiate News and Views*.

Mr. O'Connell, who holds degrees from Manhattan College, Columbia and Indiana Universities, was awarded the J.D. degree in June by the Marshall-Wythe School of Law. He joined the faculty in 1969 after teaching at the University of Connecticut. He was promoted to associate professor in 1971. His teaching and research field is financial management. Mr. O'Connell is a former head of the School of Business Administration's Department of Management.

The appointment was made by Dean Charles L. Quittmeyer.

## W and M Hall Undergoes Changes

William and Mary Hall will have a new fulltime Assistant Director, effective July 1. At the same time, the William and Mary Athletic Association will begin operating with a new promotional program.

The new Assistant Director is Bettie Adams, who will report to H. Lester Hooker, Jr., Director of the Hall. Mrs. Adams has served as Athletic Ticket Manager for several years and also as Mr. Hooker's secretary when he was Director of Athletics.

Athletic ticket sales to individuals and groups will be reassigned to Barry Fratkin, who on July 1 becomes Director of Promotion for the athletic program. Fratkin has been Sports Information Director for 13 years, and in addition became Executive Director of the William and Mary Educational Foundation more than a year ago. In his new position, Fratkin will be responsible for a ticket marketing program, for program sales and promotions, for the William and Mary Sports Radio Network, the Hall of Fame, and other promotional and income-producing activities including the Educational Foundation.

Robert Sheeran, Assistant Sports Information Director, will become Sports Information Director as part of the reorganization. He will be assisted by graduate and undergraduate student assistants in his work, according to the announcement by Ben Carnevale, Director of Athletics.

## CLEO Program Underway

One of seven summer institutes across the country, sponsored by the Council on Legal Education Opportunity (CLEO), began today at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law.

Approximately 30 men and women will participate in the six-week program designed to provide economically disadvantaged students, many with marginal or less than conventional admission credentials, an opportunity to attend an accredited law school.

Richard Williamson, associate dean of the Law School, will serve as director of the CLEO program on campus. The institute, said Mr. Williamson, will offer a modified law school curriculum with particular emphasis given to the development of analytical and written skills necessary for a successful study of law.

Full-time instructors in the summer institute will include Robert Scott, a new member of the law faculty at the University of Virginia School of Law; B. J. Brabham, a member of the law faculty at the University of Richmond's T. C. Williams School of Law; and James Robertson of the Howard University Law School. Monrad G. Paulsen, dean of the University of Virginia School of Law, will teach part-time in the program.

Five student teaching assistants will also participate in the program. These include: Latricia J. Cunningham, Johnnie E. Mizelle, and Perry F. Tucker, students at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law; Albert Knight of Newport News, a student at the University of Michigan School of Law; and John Barnes, a graduate law student at the Georgetown University Law Center.

The Council on Legal Education Opportunity is a federally funded program which operates, with the cooperation of several accredited law schools, six-week summer institutes to provide selected students a means of identifying their capacity for law study as well as an opportunity to acclimate to that process. The organization is jointly sponsored by the American Bar Association, the Association of American Law Schools, La Raza National Lawyers Association, the Law School Admission Council, and the National Bar Association.

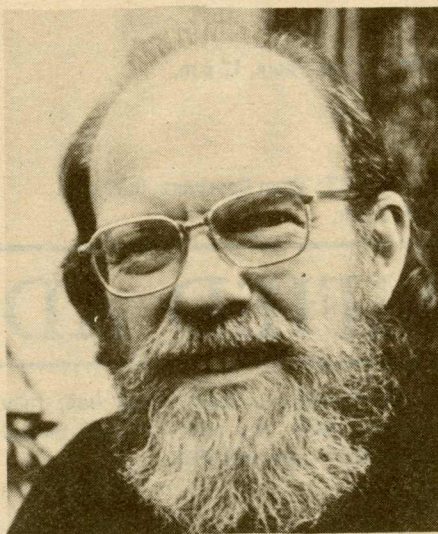

## COMPUTER SYSTEMS

### CONFERENCE

The National Science Foundation and the Conference Board of the Mathematical Sciences is sponsoring a Regional Conference on Measurement and Evaluation of Computer Systems on campus, July 15 - 19.

Funds provided by the National Science Foundation will be used to defray all or most of the expenses incurred by the 25 persons selected to participate in the conference. The conference is open to all persons who are actively engaged in measurement and evaluation of computer systems. There is no fee for the conference.

The conference is designed to bring together investigators active in developing techniques for the measurement and analysis of computer systems performance.

The principle lecturer for this conference will be Saul Rosen, professor of mathematics and computer science and the director of the computing center at Purdue University. Rosen's research has been in the areas of programming systems and languages, theoretical and practical aspects of producing very general programs for multiprogramming and multicomputer control, and measurement and evaluation of computing systems.

Subject: Energy Conservation During the Summer Session

The State Division of Engineering and Buildings and the State Central Car Pool have reminded us that the need to continue the Energy Conservation Program at the College is still critically necessary. Demands for electric power during the summer are the highest of the entire year. Savings realized in the amount of fuel conserved during the past winter have been offset by the increased cost of fuel oil and have severely taxed the operating budget. If we are to realize our objective of minimizing operating costs so that the primary objective of the College -- the effectiveness of the instructional program -- continues to receive the essential level of support it deserves, all of us must work together.

In this regard, all buildings equipped with central air conditioning or cooling devices will have thermostats set to begin cooling cycles when inside temperatures reach 77 degrees Fahrenheit. Once set, thermostats are not to be readjusted except by authorized maintenance personnel. The recent costly experience during the last heating season of replacing thermostats damaged as a result of unauthorized personnel tampering with them certainly should demonstrate this need to all of us.

Where window units are used for air conditioning, we are asking that everyone use thermostatic controls rather than "constant cold" setting and to turn the air conditioners off when not needed.

Requests for lower minimum temperatures required for laboratory or clinical conditions will be honored where such requests are submitted in writing, with full justification to the Director of Buildings and Grounds.

During the summer, an important measure that should be followed is the maximum use of window coverings (shades, venetian blinds, drapes, etc.) to prevent transmission of solar heat into interior space.

Additional suggestions as to how savings might be effected in electrical energy and operating costs include:

### Electricity:

- a. Turn off lights in offices and classrooms when not in use.
- b. Reduce lighting levels in corridors and peripheral areas of buildings where appropriate.
- c. Turn off all appliances and instruments when not in use.

### Transportation:

- a. Do not exceed 55 mph speed limit on interstates and highways.
- b. Do not leave car engine running (burns gas unnecessarily).
- c. Avoid long warm ups (late model engines do not require long warm ups).
- d. Use air conditioners moderately and only under hot weather conditions.
- e. Consolidation of trips should be considered whenever possible.
- f. State employees using State-owned vehicles should pool riders whenever possible.
- g. Use smaller engines and cars (4 and 6 cylinder engines burn less gasoline).
- h. Avoid "jack rabbit" starts.
- i. Keep engines tuned for peak performance.

The Full Conservation Sub-Committee of the Campus Environment Committee will be working with the Department of Buildings and Grounds on a continuing program of conservation and economy. We certainly are counting on your usual fine support to help control our operating costs, which are mounting at an alarming rate.
