Rent Paid with Poetry

Two verses of poetry qualifying as "quit rents", yearly payments as stipulated in the College's ancient charter, were presented to former executive vice-president Carter Lowance, substituting for Governor Godwin at the annual Order of the White Jacket dinner held last Thursday evening.

The poetry was translated and versed by assistant professor James R. Baron of the Classical Studies Department. It was composed by John M. Shelburne, '75, and Harold E. Stark, II, '74.

Governor Godwin is honorary chairman of OWJ which was formed in 1972 and is composed of a group of William and Mary alumni who earned their way through school waiting on tables.

When the College was chartered in 1693, King William and Queen Mary of England granted 20,000 acres of land with the requirement that there was to be paid to them and their successors the annual sum of two latin verses.

The nearly 280-year old document said, "On every fifth day of November, two copies of Latin verses yearly (shall be delivered) at the house of our governor or lieutenant governor of Virginia, for the time being, forever, in full discharge, acquittance and satisfaction of all quit-rent, services, customs, dues and burdens whatsoever, due, or to be due to us or our successors, for the said twenty thousand acres of land by the laws or customs of England or Virginia."

College Hosts EEO Conference

The College will host one of five regional Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Seminars Tuesday - Thursday, Oct. 22 - 24.

The conference, under the auspices of the National Consortium for Black Professional Development, is being held on campus this year for the first time. Similar conferences will be held on campuses at Tuskegee Institute, Washington State University, Iowa State University, and Texas Southern University.

Thomas F. Pettigrew, social psychologist at Harvard University, will be conference keynote speaker at the opening session this evening in the Campus Center Ballroom at 8 p.m. Welcoming conference participants to campus and introducing Pettigrew will be George R. Healy, vice-president for academic affairs. Tonight's session will be the only portion of the conference program open to members of the College and Williamsburg communities.

Cultural attaches from Indonesia, the Philippines, Korea and West Germany and an associate professor of government will speak on the topic "The United Nations on its 29th Anniversary," evaluating the U.N.'s progress and accomplishments to date and taking a look at the U.N.'s future. Chongham Kim, professor of government at the College, will moderate the discussion.

Members of the College and the Williamsburg community are invited to attend. A reception will follow to allow those attending the discussion to meet the attaches.

'Melody' set for October 23-26

The William and Mary Theatre will open its 49th season in Phi Beta Kappa Hall with an original play written by a student in the class of 1975. Michael B. Sullivan from Fredericksburg has entitled his play "Melody" in which he depicts the story of a young girl who is trying to find her own present life by ridding herself of her torments and tortures of the past.

This premiere production will be directed by Louis E. Catron in whose playwrighting class Sullivan wrote the play. "Melody" will be presented on October 23-26 at 8:15 p.m.

The purpose of the conference is three-fold: to provide a clear understanding of existing EEO laws, regulations, and guidelines; to discuss developing attitudinal changes and trends in connection with the employment of minorities and women in the nation's professional community; and to update, and refine techniques for planning, constructing, developing and implementing Affirmative Action/EEO programs for the hiring and promoting of minorities and women.

Minister to Speak

The fifth program in this year's Project PLUS Forum series, "The State of the American Dream," will be on Wednesday, October 23, at 7:30 in Millington Auditorium, when Earl H. Brill, a canon of the Washington Cathedral and coordinator of curriculum and research at the College of Preachers at the Cathedral, will speak on "The Religious Visions and the American Dream."

The lecture and discussion are open to the public.

The Rev. Dr. Brill holds degrees from the University of Pennsylvania, the Philadelphia Divinity School, Princeton Theological Seminary and American University in Washington, D.C. Prior to his present appointment, Brill, whose doctorate is in American History, was chairman of the American Studies Program at American University.

His reviews and articles have appeared in *Christian Century*, *The National Observer*, *The New Republic* and *The New York Times*. He is the author of *The Creative Edge of American Protestantism* (1966), *Sex is Dead-And Other Postmortems* (1967), and *The Future of the American Past* (1974).

Metropolitan Criminal Justice Center

Recent activities and publications of the staff of the Metropolitan Criminal Justice Center include the following:

Walter Diggles, systems projects director, has been selected as an advisor to the Criminal Justice Information System Task Force of the Virginia State Crime Commission. The task force, comprised of representatives from the Assembly, the criminal justice community, other state commissions, municipal government, and the citizenry, has been charged with making a study of all matters relating to the exchange, collection, storage, security, privacy and use of information by the Virginia criminal justice system. It is also required to make recommendations as to the development and implementation of an expanded and integrated system for the collection, storage and exchange of law enforcement and criminal justice information.

Charles Thomas, Research director and adjunct associate professor of sociology, has been asked to serve as a reviewer for new publications in criminology and corrections by the editors of *Sociology: Reviews of New Books*.

"Survey Research," a brief essay on research methodology by Professor **Thomas**, has been accepted for publication in the forthcoming revised edition of *Sociology: Man in Society* by Melvin L. DePue, et al.

Physics

Hans C. von Baeyer, chairman, recently attended a conference on "Tradition and Change in Physics Graduate Education" at Pennsylvania State University.

Stuart Freedman of Princeton University will speak on "Hidden Variables vs. Quantum Mechanics," Friday, October 25, at 4:30 p.m.

Franz Gross, associate professor, attended the "International Conference on Few Body Problems in Nuclear and Particle Physics" held in Quebec City recently. He submitted two papers which will appear in the conference proceedings:

"Radiative Neutron Capture near Threshold" written in collaboration with Edward Dressler of American University, and

"Relativistic Corrections to the Deuteron Magnetic Moment."

The conference included a novel program of organized but informal discussions on current problems in understanding nuclear forces. Mr. Gross acted as rapporteur for the group discussing the nucleon-nucleon interaction at very short distances. He presented a summary of the highlights of this three-hour discussion to the conference, and will also write a summary for the conference proceedings.

E. A. Remler, associate professor, presented an invited seminar on the "Quasi-Classical Scattering Theory and Bound State Production Processes" at the University of Maryland on October 16.

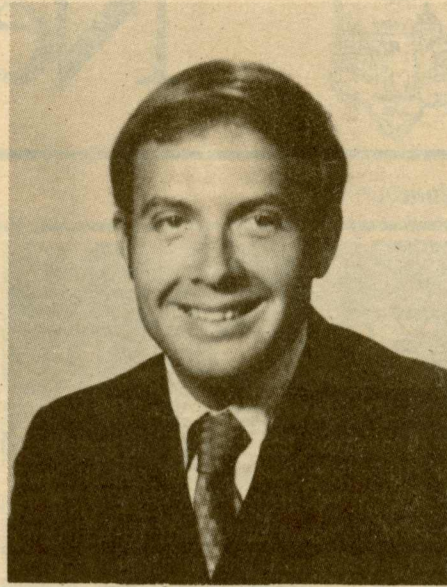
School of Education

The 18th-century Spanish lyric poet Juan Melendez Valdes is the subject of a recently published biography by R. Merritt Cox, associate professor of Spanish.

The book is part of the Twayne World Authors Series and is the second (Twas) book by Cox to deal with an 18th-century Spanish figure. His earlier work dealt with Tomas de Iriarte, an 18th-century neoclassicist.

Melendez (1754-1817) deserves much more acclaim and credit than he has had in the last 150 years; particularly from Hispanists, Cox believes. According to Cox, Melendez was the forerunner of both Spanish and European Romanticism.

R. Merritt Cox is a native of Richmond and holds advanced degrees from the University of Wisconsin. He has taught at Wisconsin and Duke University and joined the William and Mary faculty in 1972.

W&M Little Affected by Council Action

The State Council of Higher Education, at its meeting in Richmond October 14, withdrew approval for the College to initiate a Master of Arts degree program in Philosophy. The Council also removed from its listing eight William and Mary degree programs which are no longer pertinent to the College's academic program.

The action to withdraw approvals affected some 50 programs in state-supported colleges and universities, and was taken under authority granted the Council by the 1974 General Assembly session.

The master's program in Philosophy had been approved several years ago, but never actually initiated at William and Mary and there were no plans at this time to inaugurate it.

The other William and Mary removals were characterized as simply cleaning up existing State Council program lists by eliminating outdated titles. They are: Modern Languages, bachelor's level; Ancient Languages, bachelor's level; Music Education, bachelor's level; Education (General), bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels; Physical Education, master's level; and French, master's level. None of these programs are currently offered by those titles at William and Mary, but similar programs having different titles were not affected by the State Council action.

In a related action, the Council discontinued the master's and doctorate programs in Marine Science at the University of Virginia. The programs, comparable to those at William and Mary, have been offered through the Virginia Institute of Marine Science, like the College's programs in Marine Science.

Under terms of the 1974 legislation, the discontinuances will not become effective until after the 1975 session of the General Assembly.

Sigma Chi Honored

Zeta Upsilon Chapter of Sigma Chi social fraternity at the College was recently presented the Peterson Significant Chapter award for 1973-74.

The award for \$50 was presented to Sigma Chi president Edward Holt, a senior from Fincastle, at a national fraternity banquet at Purdue University. The check in turn was given by Holt to President Thomas A. Graves, Jr., for the general scholarship pool at the College.

The award has been given to the William and Mary Sigma Chi chapter five times over the past six years. In addition to the Peterson Significant Chapter award, a Legion of Honor award was also presented to Holt in recognition of the fraternity's high scholastic achievement last year.

November Holidays

In November, there are three legal holidays for permanent classified State employees: General Election Day, Veterans Day, and Thanksgiving Day.

Election Day falls on Tuesday, November 5, Veterans Day on Monday, November 11, and Thanksgiving Day on Thursday, November 28.

In accordance with previous holiday notices, Election Day and Veterans Day should be given, as far as practicable, to members of each department. It is recognized that certain services must be maintained in the various departments, but these services should be furnished on the holiday by a minimum number of employees. The responsibility for determining the number of employees rests with the department head. It is not a decision to be made by the employees of the department.

Following our custom of past years, all administrative offices of the College will be closed on Thursday, November 28, in observance of Thanksgiving Day. A leave slip is not required for the taking of this day as a holiday.

A leave slip should be submitted to the Personnel Office for any permanent classified employee who takes leave on November 5 or November 11. Permanent classified employees who are required to work on either of these holidays should take the compensatory leave earned as soon thereafter as possible in order to avoid excessive leave accumulation. Hourly employees who work on any of these three holidays will be paid at their regular hourly rates.

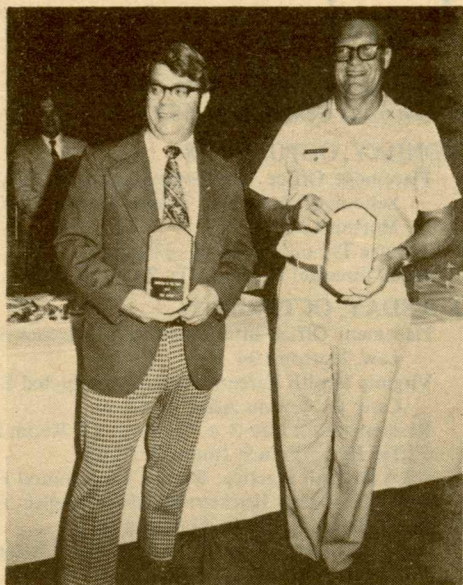

A dark room fully equipped for processing black and white film is now available for student use at the Campus Center.

The dark room is intended primarily for the use of those students who do not otherwise have access to one through the *Flat Hat*, *Colonial Echo* or other publication offices. The room will be open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Students must sign up in advance on the door of the dark room. An I.D. card must be presented at the front desk to obtain the key.

The room is located in the Campus Center basement, directly across from the *Flat Hat* office. All the necessary equipment is furnished, but individuals must apply their own chemicals and

paper. Storage lockers are also furnished for photographic materials, and locks may be obtained free of charge at the front desk.

Dark room equipment was purchased with money donated by the Parents' Fund. An effort is now being made to obtain equipment for processing color film.
