# Madrigal Singers Perform

The Williamsburg Madrigal Singers will perform in the Campus Center Ballroom on December 8.

The concert, the third in the William and Mary Sunday Series, begins at 4 p.m.

Though the name implies music of 17th and 18th century America, the Williamsburg Madrigal Singers have a virtually unlimited repertoire. Sunday's concert program features music ranging from William Byrd's "I will Not Leave You Comfortless," to Claude Debussy's "Dieu Qu'il La Fait Bon Regarder," to Duke Ellington's "Mood Indigo." Christmas music will also be included in the program.

The group is composed of Mary Deppe and Marion Wilson, sopranos, Beverly Kelly, alto, Robin Roark, tenor, and Herbert Deppe, bass.

Audiences from the world over have acclaimed the Williamsburg Madrigal Singers as versatile and articulate entertainers. Their recordings demonstrate the consummate artistry which places them in the fore-front of vocal music interpreters. Their music was

featured in a Christmas CBS special and they have produced recordings for Colonial Williamsburg and recorded background music for the Virginia Bicentennial film.

# GAY'S 'BEGGAR'S OPERA' OPENS NEXT WEEK

Faculty members from three departments are combining talents to produce "The Beggar's Opera," the next William and Mary Theatre production which will be presented Dec. 11-14, in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

Curtain time is 8:15 for the John Gay musical satire known as the world's first ballad opera.

Directing "The Beggar's Opera" is Jerry Bledsoe, associate professor of theatre and designer for the William and Mary Theatre. Musical director is J. S. Darling, lecturer in music, and organist and choirmaster at Bruton Parish Church. The choreographer is Shirley Roby, associate professor of dance. Albert Haak, professor of theatre, is technical director. Arthur Roach, a William and Mary alumnus who now teaches at Tabb High School, is assistant vocal director and harpsichordist.

"The Beggar's Opera" was first produced in 1728 by John Rich of the Theatre Royal in Lincoln's Inn Fields, at the request of John Gay's patroness, the Duchess of Queensbury. One humorist observed that the ballad opera "made Rich gay and Gay rich" because the work was performed an unprecedented 62 times during the first season alone, and became a staple of the English theatre.

Director Bledsoe describes the appeal of "The Beggar's Opera" this way: "It evokes the warm sensation and high spirit of eighteenth century London and is the world's best—loved musical play."

The box office, in the foyer of Phi Beta Kappa, will be open 3 to 5:30, Dec. 9-13, and 7 to 8:15, Dec. 11-14. During those hours only telephone reservations will be accepted at 229-3000, ext. 272 or 469. As always, the first day of box office operations (Monday, Dec. 9) is reserved for Season Ticket Patrons only, General admission for "The Beggar's Opera" is \$3.00. All seats are reserved.

"The Beggar's Opera" is the second William and Mary Theatre production this season. "Angel Street (Gaslight)" will be presented Feb. 26-March 1, and "Much Ado About Nothing" is scheduled for production April 16-19.

Associate Professor of Anthropology Vinson H. Sutlive, Jr. will be awarded the Phi Beta Kappa Faculty Award for the Advancement of Scholarship at the annual public meeting of Alpha of Virginia Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa Thursday night.

Bernard C. Mikula, a Professor in the Natural Systems Department at Defiance College in Ohio, and Thomas Dunaway Willett, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for International Affairs, will be honored with alumni memberships in the nation's first chapter of Phi Beta Kappa.

Hall, will feature speaker John Ratte, Professor of History at Amherst College, and Stanley Kunitz, Consultant in Poetry to the Library of Congress. Parents and friends of the new members are invited to the initiation ceremonies in the Dodge Room at 4:30 p.m., followed by a sherry party at the Alumni House and a dinner for both new and old members at the Hospitality House.

The public is invited to attend a reception for new members in the Dodge Room immediately following the evening meeting.

#### Award Recipient

Dr. Sutlive came to the College from the anthropology department at the University of Pittsburgh where he received his doctorate degree in 1972.

During his two years of teaching and research at William and Mary, he has edited two issues of *Studies in Third World Societies*, an international anthropology journal, and written *The Iban of Sarawak*, a book currently in publication.

A recognized expert in the study of the language, culture and social organization of the Iban tribe of Southeast Asia, Dr. Sutlive will receive the faculty award in recognition of his achievements as both a distinguished scholar and dedicated teacher.

#### Alumni Membership

Dr. Mikula, a 1951 graduate of the College, is a highly respected figure in the field of plant genetics. He is the author of countless articles concerning environmental effects upon plant hereditary factors.

The husband of Phi Beta Kappa alumnus Betty Pace, Dr. Mikula was nominated for alumni membership by the late Dr. J. T. Baldwin, Jr. The long—time professor of biology at the College described Dr. Mikula as "among the most significant students that I have known at William and Mary."

During his years at the College, Dr. Mikula collected approximately 9,000 specimens of Virginia plants currently being prepared for inclusion in *Flora of Virginia*, a detailed study of plant—life throughout the state.

# Amount Taxed For Soc. Security

Effective January 1, 1975, employees will contribute 5.85% on the first \$14,100 of their gross annual salary to the Social Security Administration, instead of on the first \$13,200, as was done in 1974. This change will be noted beginning with employee paychecks distributed on and after January 16, 1975.

## New Minimum For Hourly Rate

Effective January 1, 1975, the minimum wage for hourly employees is \$2 per hour. Payrolls submitted to the College Payroll Office showing a lower rate for work performed on or after January 1 will be changed to reflect the new minimum wage.

The only exception to the above minimum rate applies to students, who may be paid not less than 85% of the minimum. Undergraduate and graduate student employees will continue to be paid \$1.75 per hour until further notice.

The \$2 per hour minimum base rate will continue through December 31, 1975, and under the present law, it will increase to \$2.20 on January 1, 1976, and to \$2.30 on January 1, 1977.

NDEA VI International Studies Program

The undergraduate program, entitled Strengthening International Dimensions of Undergraduate Education, provides up to \$30,000 for a one-year program to develop new courses, revise courses, faculty retooling, library purchases, and some administrative expenses. Grants will cover the academic year 1975-76 with the probability of a one year extension.

National Humanities Institute

The first of several humanities institutes was established in New Haven, Conn., in May 1974, by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The purpose of these institutes is to "encourage excellence in teaching and to promote serious interdisciplinary attention to central issues in the humanities by bringing into residence a year at a time a number of distinguished senior Fellows and promising junior Fellows for intensive discussion and curriculum planning."

The Institute at Yale, directed by Maynard Mack, will make appointments of Senior Fellows and accept nominations for Junior Fellows for the academic year 1976-1977 during the period *January 1-February 15*, 1975. Nominations for the latter are made by the Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences.

# Kranbuehl Awarded NASA Grant

David E. Kranbuehl, associate professor of chemistry, has been awarded a grant of \$15,000 by the National Aeronautics- and Space Administration.

The grant will provide funds for research on maximizing the potential uses polyimide materials as structural composities, adhesives, elastomers and protection coating. Polyimide materials, high performance plastics, have been synthesized by NASA at Langley Research Center during the past several

The grant is part of a joint interest in the development of synthetic high performance materials by Mr. Kranbuehl, by Associate Professors of Chemistry Robert A. Orwoll and David W. Thompson, and by Dr. Norman Johnston, head of the Polymer Division, Materials Division, at the NASA Langley Research

A native of Lancaster, Pa., Mrs. Fruitman attended Millersville State College in Pennsylvania and has also studied art in New York. Mr. and Mrs.

Fruitman and their two daughters moved to Williamsburg three years ago when Mr. Fruitman entered law school.


