

Conference Emphasizes Women's Achievements

Women with notable careers in education, medicine and religion will be the featured speakers in a special program series emphasizing the achievements of women, beginning April 16.

The 10-day program of events, which is entitled "Emphasis: Women--Achievement with Distinction," is sponsored by the Student Affairs Office of Special Programs "to focus on the changing role of women in today's society." The public is invited to attend.

Guest speakers include Patricia Rueckel, vice president for student development at Georgetown University; the

Reverend Alison Cheek, a practicing psychotherapist; and Estelle R. Ramey, professor of physiology and biophysics at the Georgetown University School of Medicine. The program also includes seven panel discussions and a women's equality "Festival of Arts."

College Administrator

Ms. Rueckel, formerly dean of women at Georgetown, will open the "Emphasis: Women" program at 8 p.m. Wednesday in the Campus Center Ballroom. Her topic will be women in college administration, with particular emphasis on careers in student personnel and guidance. Rueckel holds a master's degree in education from Marquette

University and a doctorate from Pittsburgh University. She has served as president of Jesuit Student Personnel Administrators and the Student Personnel Association.

Controversial Priest

The long-time college administrator will be followed on the program by the Reverend Alison Cheek, who will discuss the changing roles women are playing in organized religion at 2

p.m. Friday, April 18, in the Campus Center Little Theatre. In a controversial ceremony last July, the Rev. Cheek was one of 11 women ordained as priests by Philadelphia bishops.

Women involved in virtually all occupations will gather at 7:30 p.m. Monday, April 21, in the Campus Center for panel discussions and workshops. Topics and chairpersons are as follows: women in business;

First Of 3 Lectures By Visiting Historian Begins Tonight In PBK

Cecelia Marie Kenyon, the James Pinckney Harrison Professor of History for 1974-75, has scheduled three lectures this month concerning "The Political Thought of the American Revolution."

An authority on both American and ancient Greek political thought, Miss Kenyon begins the lecture series tonight with "Deep Roots: Antecedents and Evolution of American Revolutionary Ideology." It will be followed by "The Americanization of John Locke," April 21, and "The Revolutionary Moment: Fate, Fortune, Choice, and Posterity," April 30. All three lectures will be held in the Dodge Room of Phi Beta Kappa Hall at 8 p.m. and will be open to the public without charge.

Miss Kenyon has been the Charles N. Clark Professor of Government at Smith College, Northampton, Mass., since 1969, and was formerly a teaching fellow at Radcliffe College.

The James Pinckney Harrison Chair of History was established at William and Mary in 1969 as a memorial to the late chairman of the board of the Universal Leaf Tobacco Co. of Richmond. A native of Danville, Va., Harrison had been known throughout the state for his civil and philanthropic activities and in 1946 was awarded the Legion of Merit.

Arab Executive To Talk Here

Multi-millionaire Adnan Khashoggi, founder and chairman of the board of Triad Holding Company, will lecture and answer questions in Associate Professor William Warren's business policy class on Thursday morning.

Khashoggi will also be the focus of a special "Meet the Press" style panel discussion with students at 1 p.m. in the Campus Center. The panel discussion is open to the general public.

Warren's business students are accustomed to questioning the tycoons of the business world, but usually the interviews are conducted by way of a special telephone hook up. Khashoggi is the first executive this spring who's decided to put in a personal appearance.

One of the Middle East's most prominent businessmen, Khashoggi controls a \$400 million business empire. Recently he made national headlines when he bought a one-third interest in the First National Bank of San Jose, Calif., for \$14 million.

He is currently working on what executives the world over agree may be a landmark business venture—he's trying to sell Egypt's President Sadat a fourth pyramid. Completely covered by reflective mirrors, the proposed structure is likened by some to a Disneyland in the desert.

Khashoggi's phenomenal financial success hasn't been without controversy. It's no secret that part of his fortune is a result of selling hundreds of millions of dollars of missiles to Saudi Arabia.

Dance Program Concludes Concert Series

The final program in the 1974-75 Concert Series will feature Betty Jones and Fritz Ludin in "Dances We Dance" at 8:15 p.m. April 22 in Phi Beta Kappa Hall.

The two artists will present a six-piece modern dance program which includes "The Warrior and the Widow," two studies based on traditional genres of Japanese dance, and "On Dancing," a humorous look at dance history in conjunction with a view of Jones and Ludin as contemporary dancers.

New Yorker Betty Jones trained at Jacob's Pillow, the dance school founded and directed by Ted Shaw.

Fritz Ludin received his training with Rosalie Chladek at the Tanzakademie Schonbrunn in Vienna, studied classical ballet in Paris and has also studied at Juilliard. The Swiss native came to New York in 1963 when he joined the Jose Limon Dance Company for its Far East tour, sponsored by the Cultural Exchange Program of the State Department.

Since 1964 he and Betty Jones have appeared extensively in concerts and residencies throughout the United States.

They are currently participating in the Dance Touring Program and the Artists-in-Schools Program/Dance Component of the National Endowment for the Arts.

Everyone is invited to bring goods, talents and ideas to Saturday's Bazaarnival. Tables will be available at 10 a.m. for those who need them to set up displays.

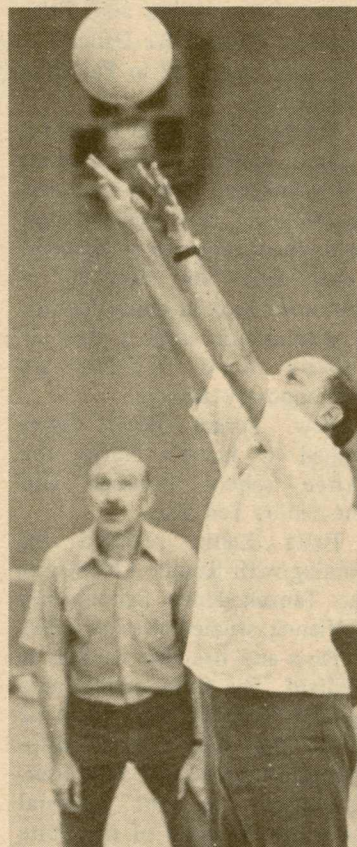
David Rosser, Bus Driver, Dies in Accident

Under the program a student from the College will attend the University of Munster, which is located in northern Germany.
