School Plans Conferences On Computer Science For High School Math Courses

scheduled three state-wide conferences for teachers as part of a program to incorporate the computer in high school mathematics courses.

The conferences, which will be held in locations throughout the state, will be the second phase in a 20-month program designed to introduce computer science to students in second-year algebra and trigonometry courses. The first conference is scheduled for Sept. 25 in Chesterfield County.

The 35 participating teachers from 22 high schools in Fairfax, Richmond, Henrico and Chesterfield school systems will then take their new teaching skills into the classroom. More than 1,000 students will participate in the implementation of the program.

Directed by Associate Professor of Education Stuart Flanagan, the computer science development program is one of the first of its kind in the nation and has received a \$22,614 grant from the National Science Foundation. The four participating school systems have also committed nearly \$100,000 to the program for

The School of Education has textbooks, computer facilities and teachers' salaries.

The first phase of the program was an 11-day session held at the College in late June. Lectures, group discussions and laboratories trained teachers in the basics of computer modeling processes and how computer science can provide students with a powerful tool for gaining mathematical insights.

The summer training session introduced teachers to the philosophy behind incorporating computer science in high school courses as well as to the actual programming techniques. State Supervisor of Mathematics Edgar Edwards and Mrs. Mary Dodd from the Mathematics and Science Center in Richmond were among the guest lecturers.

IEAHC Books To Be Included In International Bicentennial Exhibit

Eight books published by the Institute of Early American History and Culture have been selected by the United States Information Agency (USIA) for its international Bicentennial book exhibit.

Titled "The American Bicentennial, 1776-1976," the USIA exhibit will tour at least thirty countries around the world, including Argentina, Brazil, Austria, France, Germany, Iran, Israel, India, Japan, Lebanon, Nigeria, the Phillipines, Singapore, Thailand, and the USSR. The exhibit begins in September.

Lake Matoaka Declared **Unsafe For Swimming**

To the members of the College Community:

Last week we were informed by the Williamsburg-James City County Health Department that, because the water does not meet the criteria as established by the State Health Department, Lake Matoaka is unsafe for either swimming or fishing. On the recommendation of the Health-Department swimming and fishing in the Lake have been prohibited until further notice.

Lake Matoaka is an important natural resource for the College and we regret that its use must be restricted to this degree; but health and safety considerations demand it. Boating, in accordance with the rules posted at the College boathouse, will continue.

I have asked the Health Department to conduct further tests in the Lake in order that we may have a better understanding of the extent of its pollution. In the meantime, for the protection of the members of the College Community, the College Police will enforce the swimming and fishing ban. Your co-operation is very much

Coordinator, Private College Services and Special Projects

Salary Range: \$15,675-18,700.

The 1974 session of the General Assembly directed the Council to provide advisory services to private institutions of higher education and to establish a Private College Advisory Committee composed of private college and university representatives. The 1975 session of the Assembly passed legislation permitting private colleges to enter into contract arrangements to provide educational services to public institutions of higher education, stage agencies, and other political subdivisions. The Council was given the responsibility for approving the private college contracts with public institutions and agencies and for monitoring the remaining contracts.

The Coordinator, Private College Services and Special Projects, will coordinate the activities indicated above and serve as the full-time liaison between the private institutions and the Council. In addition to these responsibilities, however, the person in this position will also be responsible for undertaking the administration of several special project activities within the Council.

The Coordinator must be a self-motivated person, capable of functioning with limited supervision. At the same time, he/she must be a team member, able to work productively in groups. In addition, the person must be able to analyze and synthesize information and to express conceptually his/her thoughts in writing.

Research Associate: Health Manpower Study (Restricted)

Salary Range: \$12,000-\$14,328.

Supported by a federal grant, the Council of Higher Education is conducting a study of Virginia's needs for health manpower. The study will assist the Commonwealth and its institutions of higher education to plan educational programs which respond to employment opportunities and needs for services. The project will be concluded by June 30, 1976, at which time funding will be terminated.

The Research Associate reports to the Director of the Health Manpower Study and to the Council's Coordinator of Health Professions and Occupations. He or she will be responsible for assisting in the development and maintenance of an on-going inventory of educational programs in colleges, universities, and health facilities. He or she will also do background research, evaluate potential sources of data, serve as staff to committees put together for the purposes of the study, and assist in the preparation and publication of reports.



Her husband, Robert, is a captain in the transportation corps stationed at Fort Eustis.


