## Economist To Talk On Welfare Reform

Noted economist Carolyn Shaw Bell will speak here Nov. 11 on "Welfare Reform - For Whom?" at 11 a.m. in room 220 of Morton Hall.

Katharine Coman Professor of Economics at Wellesley College, Bell has served as an economist in the Office of Price Administration, a research economist for the Social Science Research Council at Harvard University, and an economic consultant to publishers and consumer marketing firms. She has done extensive studies on employment and on problems of the urban poor.

Her visit to campus is being arranged through the University Center in Virginia, and her campus host will be Robert Barry of the department of economics.

Bell is widely known as a professional economist because of her frequent commentaries on current economic problems in the press, at conferences, and on the air. Her criticism of administration policy on unemployment helped produce a change in the official reports issued monthly from the White House. She also worked with the women's caucus of the American Economic Association to persuade that professional group into positive actions to remedy the position of women economists.

Her most recent full-length work is "The Economics of the Ghetto." She is also the author of "Consumer Choice in the American Economy."

## Law Professor, Student In International Conference

Some 5,000 members of the world legal community recently put their stamp of approval on a resolution of purpose which was drafted by a specialist in international law, Walter L. Williams, associate professor of law.

The "Washington Declaration of World Interdependence" was drafted by Williams at the request of conference officials at the seventh World Law Conference held in the Capital in October. The international gathering, which was sponsored by the World Peace Through Law Center, included judges,

attorneys and law professors.

James Dickinson, student representative from the Marshall-Wythe School of Law also had an active part in the October convention. He was invited to act as law clerk to the Chief Justice of Lebanon's highest court to assist in participation of a demonstration world trial. When the Lebanese jurist was unable to attend the demonstration trial Dickinson worked with the Chief Justice of the Sudan who had little time to draft his own opinion and so Dickinson's draft was adopted generally as the opinion of that Justice at the trial.

## Voice, Piano Recital Set

Rodney Godshall, bass, and John Reeves White, pianist, will present a recital in the Campus Center Ballroom on Tuesday, Nov. 11, at 8 p.m.

Sponsored by the music department, the recital is open to the public. There is no admission fee.

Music by Mozart, Wolf, Strauss, Ives and Weill will be featured in the evening performance.

Godshall, who is a lecturer in the music department, was formerly soloist with the New York Pro Musica. He has also

made numerous solo appearances with the Washington Opera Society, Santa Fe Opera and festivals in Caramoor, Spoleto, Bergen and Graz.

White is professor of music at Hunter College in New York City. He is a leading authority on medieval and renaissance music. In 1966 he succeeded the late Noah Greenberg as director of the New York Pro Musica, and with this group premiered two musical dramatic works, "The Play of the Risen Christ" and "An Entertainment for Elizabeth."

His lecture is the second in the current "Our Future in the Cosmos" Series sponsored jointly by NASA and William and Mary.

Cooper, author of "Environmental Quality--Now or Never," will discuss the problem of supporting an ever increasing, affluent population of consumers within the constraints of a finite world.

## M-W Institute Holds Wetlands Conference

Jon Kerner, associate professor of sociology, John E. Donaldson, professor of law, and Gene Silberhorn, associate marine scientist at the Virginia Institute of Marine Science, will be among a group of scientists, sociologists and lawyers who will present a one-day seminar in Fairfax this Friday on the "Dynamics of Wetlands in Northern Virginia."

The seminar, which will be held at George Mason University, is sponsored by the College's Marshall-Wythe Institute for Research in the Social Sciences.

James Moore, assistant attorney general and S.M. Rogers, chief environmental engineer for the Virginia Marine Resources

Commission will join the faculty members in familiarizing seminar participants with wetlands ecosystems, wetlands legislation in the United States and the specifics of the Virginia Wetlands Act of 1972. The program will include both film and slide presentations as well as a discussion of the wetlands application and review process.

Kerner, who is coordinating the seminar, said that this will be the first wetlands program offered in the Northern Virginia area. He added that the "nature of the wetlands ecosystem in Northern Virginia is a bit different than that of the rest of Tidewater due to a greater abundance of tidal freshwater marshes."

Kerner, along with Clyde Haulman, director of the Marshall-Wythe Institute, and Gary Kreps, assistant professor of sociology, are conducting a research project which began this summer on improving environmental decision-making in Virginia's wetlands. In the study phase of the project, researchers are attempting to define the needs of local wetlands boards regarding their decision-making capability.

Friday's seminar is part of the educational phase of the project, which is intended to provide general information about the wetlands and their role in the ecosystem to the citizens of Northern Virginia.

The extent of the educational phase will be determined by the interest and involvement of the Northern Virginia population.

## United Fund Campaign Progress

David Kranbuehl, chairman of the College's United Fund Campaign committee, reports that the campus response to the campaign has been good and is running ahead of last year. The 130 people who have contributed so far have pledged over \$5,500, or 57 percent, of the total \$9,600 goal.

## CHEMISTRY

Professor S.Y. Tyree presided at the 31st meeting of the Council of the Oak Ridge Associated Universities, Oct. 20-21 in Oak Ridge, Tenn. Virginia Commonwealth University, our sister institution, was accepted for membership. Professor Dexter Whitehead, Dean of Arts and Sciences at the University of Virginia, was elected to a three-year term on the Board of Directors of ORAU.

## CLASSICAL STUDIES

Professor J. Ward Jones' book, "A critical Edition of the Commentary on the *Aeneid* Attributed to Bernard Silvester," has been accepted for publication by the University of Nebraska Press.

Two articles by Assistant Professor James R. Baron were recently accepted for publication. Jean Keating, assistant director of Institutional Research, and Judy Ewart, production control supervisor of the Computer Center, attended the 6th Annual Conference of the Virginia Association for Educational Data Systems (VAEDS) held in Roanoke Oct. 16-17. Keating is presently serving on the Board of Directors for VAEDS. Ewart has been a member for the past 3 years.

## ENGLISH

Trudier Harris, assistant professor, will present a paper on Henry "Doc" Billups, who was bellringer at the College for 65 years, at the annual meeting of the Virginia Folklore Society meeting to be held at the University of Virginia, Nov. 8. Miss Harris researched the folklore of Billups and his life in Williamsburg on a faculty research grant this summer.

The day-long meeting will include accounts of folk medicine practices, the sounds of dulcimers, lyrics of folk songs and folk dancing, as well as a discussion of "Folk Etymologies in Virginia Place Names," and a review of the history of the Society since its formation in 1913.

The program will be held at the Wesley Foundation on U.S. 29 and Lewis Mountain Road in Charlottesville and is open to the public.

## INSTITUTE FOR CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Walter Diggles, director of the Institute (formerly the Met-

ropolitan Criminal Justice Center), conducted a two-day workshop entitled "Coalition for Youth," in Richmond, Oct. 29-30, for members of the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs at the Hotel Jefferson. The workshop was aimed at informing club women on juvenile delinquency prevention and control methods within the Commonwealth.

## MARSHALL PAPERS

Herbert A. Johnson, editor of The Papers of John Marshall and lecturer in history, spoke on "Reform and the Judicial Process" as part of the ninth annual History Forum sponsored by Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 29-31.

More than 300 professional historians from across the nation were expected to attend. The Forum has grown from a one-day meeting consisting of just a few sessions to a three-day conference with 46 different sessions.

## MARSHALL-WYTHE SCHOOL OF LAW

William F. Swindler, John Marshall Professor of Law, will deliver a bicentennial lecture today at the University of Missouri. His subject will be "Runnymede Revisited: Bicentennial Reflections on a 750th Anniversary."

Swindler is the author of a three-volume work on "Court and Constitution in the 20th Century," and an earlier book, "Magna Carta: Legend and Legacy." The Magna Carta volume was written in 1965 on the 750th anniversary of the original issuance of the "Great Charter." Swindler's lecture today is based on what the author considers the more important anniversary in constitutional history, the reissue of the Magna Carta in 1225.

He also reported the 1968 Catalogue's advice that, "The college highly approves of regular habits of living, and these include hours of rising and retiring . . .
