

Evening Of Tudor Music, Drama Set

On Tuesday and Thursday nights, April 20 and 22, two performing groups composed of Project Plus students will present "An Evening of Tudor Entertainment: Music and Drama," at 8 p.m. in the Great Hall of the Wren Building.

The program will begin with a selection of Renaissance madrigals sung by the Project Plus Madrigal Singers, directed by James P. Keena. A variety of instrumental pieces of the period will be performed by the Peninsula Recorder Society under the direction of May B. Daw.

After a short intermission, the evening will conclude with its major presentation, the Williamsburg premiere of John Redford's The Play of Wit and Science. This Humanist morality play, written about 1535, provides an amusing and vivid sketch of the student who strives for knowledge. In the play's allegory, the student is represented as a young man, Wit, who seeks marriage with a beautiful young lady, Science, who represents knowledge. In order to win her hand, he must slay her enemy, the terrible giant Tediousness.

The Project Plus performance attempts to preserve most of the early Renaissance flavor of the play. The language has been altered very little, the songs and dances have been adapted from historical models, and the costumes convey both a hint of each character's essential nature and the age in which the play was written. Even in the assignment of roles, the performance follows the Tudor practice of doubling: twenty parts are divided among thirteen actors, some of whom portray as many as three

The students in the play have studied the development of the English morality play this semester in a Project Plus tutorial taught by Carl P. Daw of the English department, who will direct the performance. There will be no admission charge

Downing will discuss "The 200 Mile Limit for Fisheries Jurisdiction" with students in the seminar on the Environment and International Law at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law. Interested persons are cordially invited to attend.

The U.S. Congress passed legislation this year to extend the United States' fishing jurisdiction to 200 miles. Downing was one of the bill's sponsors and is expected to comment both on the legislation and on the problems of fisheries in general.

A reception, sponsored by the International Law Society at Marshall-Wythe, will follow Downing's talk.

Monday's symposium, entitled "Drugs, the Law and Virginia: Where We Are and Where We Are Going," begins at 4 p.m. in the Campus Center Little Theatre. Panelists include Ted Morris of the Virginia House of Delegates; Mary S. Holt, chairman of the Peninsula Drug Abuse Council; Aubrey Davis, Commonwealth's Attorney for Richmond; and Judy Nauman of Bacon Street, the local drug abuse counseling service. Kermit Dunahoo, assistant professor of law at Marshall-Wythe, will moderate.

Among the topics planned for discussion are the evolution of drug laws in Virginia, the current penalties, both criminal and civil, attached to drug offenses and the role of education in curbing drug abuse. The public is invited to attend.

Nigerian Envoy Speaks On Decolonizing South Africa



The College and the Nation Celebrate Together

A delegation from the College that included the William and Mary Choir, 20 students participating in the Washington Program, and President Graves traveled to the nation's capital last Tuesday to take part in a variety of activities.

The choir, which sang during a ceremony at the Jefferson Memorial, received a personal word of approval from the ceremony's special guest speaker--President Gerald Ford. President Graves and a group of alumni were also on hand to present a copy of "Their Majesties' Royall Colledge" to Secretary of the Interior Thomas F. Kleppe. Later in the day, Graves joined participants in the Washington Program at the White House, where he again made a presentation of Jack Morpurgo's new history of the College, this time to the President of the United States.






President Ford Pays Tribute to Thomas Jefferson and his Alma Mater; Graves Presents New Morpurgo History to Ford, Kleppe and Byrd




Members of the choir pay close attention to President Ford's remarks, which paid tribute to Jefferson and the College where he received his



Humphrey and Reston Offer Insights On "American Presidential Leadership"

Humphrey was an impressive speaker who used his hands as well as his words to make a point. Other guest speakers in the Washington Program, including New York Times correspondent James Reston and New Republic Magazine columnist John Osborn, said that Humphrey was one of only a handful of politicians who could express themselves well in almost any situation.

Koto Music Concert Set

On Saturday, April 24, Asia House will present a concert of Koto music by Kyoko Okamoto. Mrs. Okamoto has been teaching the Koto for five years in the Washington area. During 1969-70, she studied under the Japanese koto master, Kazue Ehara of Ashiya, Japan, and achieved the rank of teacher.

The koto is a long zither with movable frets and was introduced into Japan from China in the 8th century. It is about six feet long and one foot wide and has 13 strings which are normally plucked with ivory picks. The instrument has a pleasing, harplike quality

The concert will begin at 8 p.m. at Asia House and will be followed by a reception in Mrs. Okamoto's honor. The performance is free and the public is cordially invited to attend.

College Receives 100th Dissertation

A milestone in the College's graduate program has been reached with the recent submission of the 100th dissertation written by a student enrolled at the College.

Robert W. Virnstein, a student in the School of Marine Science, is the author of the 86-page dissertation entitled "The Effects of Predation by Epibenthic Crabs and Fishes on

Benthic Infauna in Chesapeake Bay." Using manipulative field experiments, Virnstein tested the significance of large mobile predators in controlling the distribution and abundance of fauna in a shallow subtidal sand com-

Before enrolling at VIMS, Virnstein received his B.A. in biophysics from The Johns Hopkins University and his M.A. in zoology from the University of South Florida. He was a research assistant in ecology-pollution at VIMS during 1972-75 and currently holds an assistantship in the Department of Invertebrate Ecology at VIMS.
