Cornerstone Laying April 28

Chief Justice To Attend Law Day

Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court Warren E. Burger will join hundreds of other judges, lawyers, legislators and other guests Saturday, April 28, in placing the cornerstone of the new building for the Marshall-Wythe School of Law.

The ceremony to lay the cornerstone of the new building, which is scheduled to be completed around the first of next year, will be one of the highlights of a full day of activities commemorating Law Day 1979. The events also commemorate the 200th anniversary of the founding of the nation's first chair of law at the College in 1779.

Chief Justice Burger will deliver remarks at the cornerstone-laying ceremony, as will Lawrence I'Anson, Chief Justice of the Virginia Supreme Court and a 1928 graduate. The ceremony is scheduled to begin at 3:30 p.m., and a reception at the site will follow.

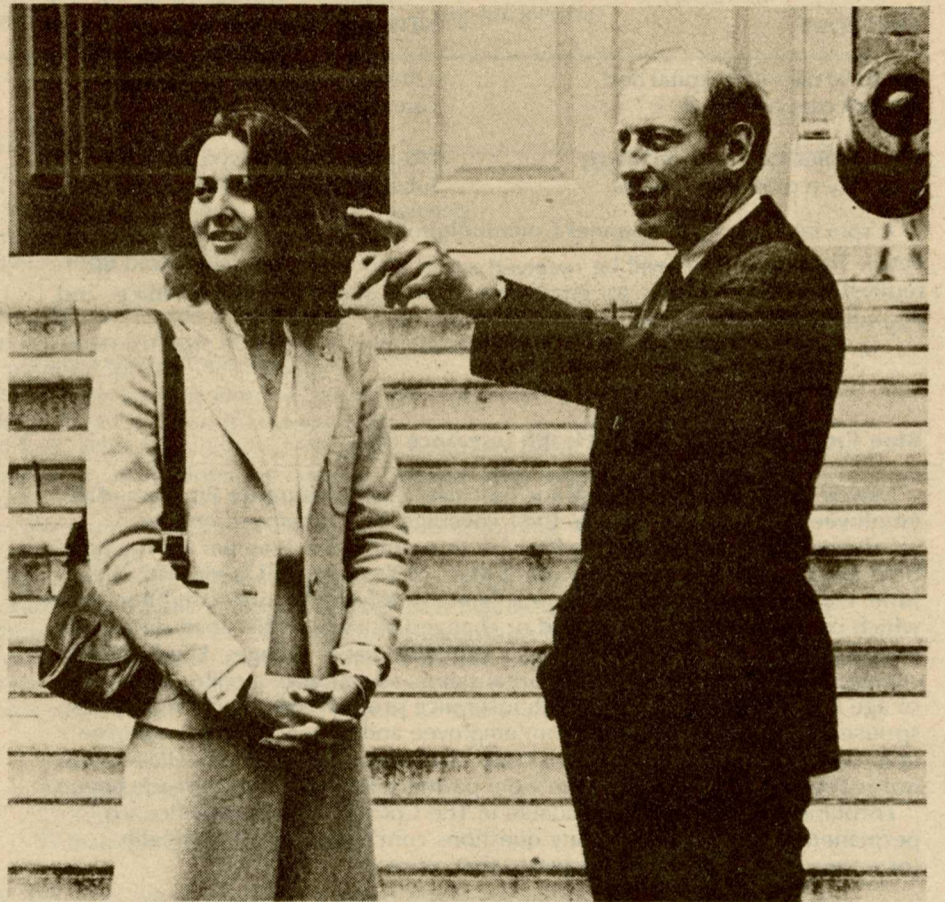
Earlier in the afternoon, Marshall-Wythe will co-sponsor a special Law Day program with the Virginia State Bar and the Virginia Bar Association. The address will be delivered by S. Shepherd Tate, president of the American Bar Association. The program, which is open to the public, is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m. in Phi

Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

During the law faculty dinner scheduled for Saturday night, Chief Justice Burger will receive the Marshall-Wythe Medallion, the most prestigious honor bestowed by the Law School faculty. Burger, who was appointed chief justice in 1969 and received an honorary degree from the College in 1973, has been a frequent visitor to the Williamsburg area. He was instrumental in helping to support the creation of the new National Center for State Courts, which is located on land adjacent to the new Law School building.

Dean William B. Spong, Jr., who recently completed a five-city tour of alumni meetings across the state, has invited all alumni of the Law School to attend both the Law Day program and the ceremony to lay the cornerstone. Members of the General Assembly and government officials have also been invited.

The new Law School building, which was a part of the bond referendum package approved by voters in November 1977, will include a larger library and one of the most technically advanced moot courtrooms in the nation.

President Named To Founders Board

President Thomas A. Graves, Jr., has been appointed a member of the Founders Board of Transylvania University, Lexington, Ky.

The Board has been created by the university to prepare for its 200th anniversary, to occur in 1980. Its chairman is David Mathews, president of the University of Alabama and former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

Transylvania is the oldest college west of the Allegheny Mountains and the nation's 15th oldest. President Graves served on the university's Board of Curators, its governing board, until 1974. Members of the Founders Board will serve as visiting lecturers and resource persons during the 1979-80 academic session when Transylvania observes its bicentennial.

Other members include Douglass Cater; former Senator John Sherman Cooper; Hedley Donovan, editor of *Time Magazine*; Governor James B. Edwards of South Carolina; Ms. Frances T. Farenthold, president of Wells College; L. H. Foster, president of Tuskegee Institute; John W. Gardner, founder of Common Cause; Attorney Leonard A. Marks of Washington; former Senator Thruston B. Morton; Mrs. Charles S. Robb, wife of Virginia's Lieutenant Governor; Jonas Salk, director of the Salk Institute; Terry Sanford, president of Duke University; and Harland Sanders, founder of the Kentucky Fried Chicken firm, among others.

Choir, Chorus Spring Concerts To Highlight Mass in G.

The annual spring concert of the Choir and Chorus will be held at 8:15 p.m., Friday and Saturday, April 20 and 21, in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

General admission tickets are \$1.50 and may be purchased at the Campus Center desk, the switchboard in James Blair Hall and the music department office. Tickets will also be available at the PBK box office the evenings of performance.

The Chorus will perform Pergolesi's "Stabat Mater," with accompaniment by a string ensemble. The Chorus will also sing "Songs of Innocence," by the contemporary American composer Karl Korte. These songs are based on a poem by William Blake.

The featured work of the Choir will be Poulenc's Mass in G. The Poulenc composition is his only mass and was written in memory of his father. Soloists will be Ellen Bathe, a sophomore from McLean; Lynn Eklund, a sophomore from Fairfax; and Kevin Perlowski, a sophomore from Pittsford, N.Y.

The Botetourt Chamber Singers will sing a series of selections by Jean Berger entitled "Who's Who in the Zoo," based on poems by Ogden Nash. The Men of the Choir will also be featured in the concert. All musical groups will be under the direction of Frank T. Lendrim, chairman of the music department and choir director.

Listed below is an outline of some important changes that will improve Maternity Benefits and Health Care Benefits for State Employee and/or spouses to take effect April 29.

MATERNITY BENEFITS

OLD PLAN

Maternity benefits available only under Employee-Dependent Contract.

7 days of hospital confinement paid for.

Diagnostic tests related to pregnancy *not* covered.

Pre- and post-natal care *not* covered under Major Medical.

Drugs prescribed for maternity cases *not* covered under Major Medical.

NEW PLAN

Maternity benefits available to all program participants, regardless of type of contract, except dependent children.

120 days of hospital confinement paid for.

Diagnostic tests covered.

Pre- and post-natal care covered under Major Medical.

Drugs prescribed for maternity cases covered under Major Medical.

HEALTH CARE BENEFITS FOR ACTIVE EMPLOYEES AND/OR SPOUSES OVER AGE 65

OLD PLAN

Up to 90 days of hospital bed patient care provided.

No hospital care for psychiatric and tuberculosis conditions.

NEW PLAN

120 days of hospital bed patient care provided.

Hospital care for psychiatric and tuberculosis conditions provided for.

A special issue of "Personnel Communique" will explain the above changes in detail. This publication will be received on or about April 16, 1979, and upon request it will be available for employees at the College Personnel Office, and Payroll Office.

Blue Cross-Blue Shield State Health Insurance Plan

May is the annual enrollment for the State Health Insurance Program. Any employees who wish to change their coverage from employee only to employee and dependents or who wish to enroll in the Program for the first time must do so during the month of May. Deductions will begin with the June 1-16 pay period and coverage is effective July 1. The only condition under which coverage can be purchased or changed at a time other than during the month of May is when an employee's eligibility status changes. Eligibility status changes result from changes in marital status, adoption of a child, attainment of age 65 or a change in the health insurance program where an employee's spouse is enrolled. (A change from employee and dependents to employee only coverage can be made at any time.) However, notice of cancellation will not relieve a member of the plan from payment for any month already begun.

Enrollment information is available in The College Personnel Office for permanent State employees. Any questions concerning the State Health Insurance Plan should be directed to that office.

Designation of Beneficiary (VSRS)

It is extremely important that each member of the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System keep up-to-date the designation of their beneficiary. The beneficiary is the person, or persons, to whom the contributions and interest credited to the member's account, or other benefits in the Retirement System, are to be paid in the event of the member's death. Form VSRS-1, Designation of Beneficiary, is used for changing the designation of beneficiary. This form will also be used to distribute the proceeds from a member's Group Life Insurance Policy. The form and assistance in its completion are available in the College Personnel Office.

Galt Papers On Exhibit

The Galt Family papers, which were acquired by the College last year, are currently on exhibit in the Zollinger Museum in Swem Library.

The Galts were a prominent Williamsburg family, beginning with the arrival of Samuel Galt in the capitol of Virginia in the mid-eighteenth century. His son James Galt in 1773 began a Galt family association with Eastern State Hospital in an official capacity which lasted about 100 years. A grandson of Samuel Galt settled in Norfolk and produced a line of distinguished Virginians in medicine, education, the military and the arts.

The exhibit, which will be on display until June 2, focuses on these two branches of the family.

The family papers, dating from the mid-eighteenth century to the early twentieth century, document several generations of family life in Virginia.

The Zollinger Museum is open to the public weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., and on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 12:45 p.m.

Items on display were selected by Ron Colvin and Myra Curtis, graduate history students and archival apprentices with Swem Library and the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation.

Subject: **College Calendar**

The Academic Calendar Committee, chaired by Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs Linda Collins Reilly, was appointed in October, 1978, for the first time, with the specific charge of recommending to the President a calendar for the College (except the Law School) for the three consecutive years ahead.

On March 1, 1979, this Committee recommended to me a calendar which included a Fall Break of two days in October. Following further discussion in the President's Advisory Committee, this suggested calendar was then submitted to the academic deans so that they could obtain reactions from the several faculties.

On April 3, strong support for this calendar and the Fall Break was expressed at the regular meeting of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences. I have also consulted with and received the views of the deans of the Schools of Education and Business Administration.

Now I am pleased to approve the attached calendar as the calendar for the College of William and Mary (except the Marshall-Wythe School of Law) for the academic year 1979-80. It contains a Fall Break on Monday and Tuesday, October 15 and 16.

Subject: **Post Office Service**

In order to provide a more efficient and effective mail service to all students who reside in College housing, certain changes of which you should be aware are planned for the 1979-80 year.

During the coming summer, additional mail boxes will be installed at the College Post Office so that every dormitory room on campus will have its own mail box. With this addition, the general delivery service will be discontinued. (Any mail addressed General Delivery after August 25, shall be returned to the sender as undeliverable.) All mail will be delivered to a mail box, the number of which will be assigned according to your individual dormitory room.

This service will be provided only for on-campus resident students. Off-campus students either must have their mail delivered to their off-campus address or to post office boxes at the Williamsburg Post Office. There will be no direct charge to on-campus students for this expanded service, as the costs will be covered by rental payment for your room.

Your mail for the 1979-80 year should be addressed in the following manner:

At this time, we are unable to assign box numbers for your room, but by no later than your arrival on campus in the fall, you will be informed as to this number. If you should change your room after assignment of your box number, be sure to notify your correspondents, and the College Post Office, of the address change from your old room to the new one so that your mail box assignment may be changed.

This plan should provide a better mail service to you, and eliminate the long lines, as well as some of the other problems we all have experienced in the past. If you have any questions on this matter, please contact either the Post Office (Ext. 4491) or my office (Ext. 4203).

We would appreciate your understanding cooperation in helping us make this new system work in the way we are sure it can work.
