## PBK To Honor Stockmeyer, Bunting

The award-winning American poet, John Ashbery, has been selected as 1980 Phi Beta Kappa poet and will read from his work at the annual meeting of Alpha of Virginia chapter Friday, Dec. 5, at 8:15 p.m., in Millington auditorium.

Dec. 5 marks the 204th anniversary of the establishment of Phi Beta Kappa by a group of William and Mary students in 1776.

Friday evening's public program will climax a series of initiation ceremonies which will be held earlier in the day for members-elect and their families. It should be noted that this year's meeting is being held in Millington auditorium and not in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall as is the usual practice. The switch is due to a conflict with the concert schedule of the William and Mary choir and chorus, which will be performing one of their Christmas concerts that evening.

As well as the induction of members-in-course, Alpha chapter will also honor Paul K. Stockmeyer, associate professor of mathematics and computer science, as the recipient of its Phi Beta Kappa Award for the Advancement of Scholarship for his work both as a researcher and a classroom teacher.

Josiah Bunting, III, president of Hampden-Sydney College and a Rhodes Scholar will be honoed as an honorary initiate of the Alpha Chapter.

John Ashbery has won the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Award and the National Book Critics Circle Award for the 1975 collection, "Self-Portrait in a Convex Mirror." A prolific author and the recipient of numerous other awards prior to 1975, Asbery has since published "Houseboat Days," (1977) and "As We Know," (1979). He is also a well-known art critic who served from 1966 to 1972 as executive editor of "Art News."

Ashbery holds an A.B. from Harvard and an M.A. from Columbia universities. At present, he is professor of English at Brooklyn College and poetry editor of "Partisan Review."

Stockmeyer, who joined the William and Mary faculty in 1971, holds degrees from Earlham College and the University of Michigan. He began his teaching career at Tuskegee Institute in

1965 and was on the faculty of the University of Michigan from 1965-71 His field of specialization is combina tories and graph theory and the analysis of algorithms. He has published widely and has also been characterized as an accomplished

mathematical expositor as well. In the past year, he has presented lectures at several schools and professional meetings.

President Bunting came to his present position from Briarcliff College. Briarcliff, N.Y., where he was president

from 1973-77. A graduate of VMI, he was a Rhodes Scholar, Christ Church. Oxford University, from 1963-66 and was a John W. Burgess Fellow in history at Columbia University from 1970-72.

## Meeting Planned on Water Pollution

The Marshall-Wythe School of Law will sponsor a conference on water pollution problems in Virginia and how best to solve them. Jan. 10. at the new Law School building.

The day-long meeting is the fourth and last in a special series of conferences funded by a grant to the law school from the multi-million dollar Virginia Environmental Endowment. created by order of Judge Robert R. Merhige, Jr., of the U.S. District Court for Eastern Virginia. The endowment was established as part of the Allied Chemical Company's settlement resulting from the complex Kepone litigation.

The deadline for registration has been extended from Dec. 1 to Dec. 12.

The registration fee is \$25 and should be sent to "208 Conference." P.O. Box 718, Gloucester Point, Va., 23062. The conference will be limited to the first 150 registrants.

The day-long session begins at 9 a.m. with a panel discussion on the status and goals of Section 208 of the Federal Clean Water Act, as applied to Virginia problems. Panel speakers will

be Dale F. Jones, director, Bureau of Water Control Management, State Water Control Board; and Robert J. Blanco, chief, Virginia/West Virginia branch, Water Division. Environmental Protection Agency. Commentators will be Paul E. Fisher, project director, Hampton Roads Water Quality Agency;

and Frank X. Browne, consulting, engineer, F. X. Browne and Associates. Lansdale, Pa.

David E. Evans of the law firm of McGuire, Woods and Battle in Richmond; and Frederick S. Fisher, assistant attorney general, environmental section, will be principal speakers for the second panel on local implementation of the 208 program. Commentators will be Mrs. Nancy O'Brien, former Mayor of Charlottesville; and R. Edward Duncan, executive director, Lord Fairfax Planning Commission.

John Rohr, associate professor at the Center for Public Administration and Policy at Virginia Tech, will speak on "Ethical Considerations in the Formulation of Education Policy, at 2 p.m., Wednesday, December 10, in the Campus Center, room A.

Rohr will be speaking at the monthly meeting of the Tidewater School Division Superintendent's Association meeting. The meeting has been opened to the public because of the wide interest in Rohr's topic.

The superintendents meet monthly on campus to discuss common problems and participate in special workshps and seminars. Royce Chesser of the School of Education serves as local coordinator of the group

Rohr has lectured and published extensively in questions of law and

conscience in general and on the special question of ethics for the career civil servant in particular. While an associate director of the General Management Training Center of the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Rohr designed a training manual on ethics in public management. His most recent book is "Ethics for Bureaucrats; An Essay on Law and Values," published in 1978

Rohr currently serves as managing editor of the scholarly journal. "Administration and Society." In 1975 he was selected as a Fellow by the National Association of Schools of Public Administration and since 1977 he has served as a member of the committee on standards and ethics of the American Society for Public Administration.

to the 208 program and summary comments

John P. Hartigan, Jr., director of regional resources division. Northern Virginia Planning District Commission; and Waldon R. Kerns, associate professor; Virginia Water Resources Research Center, will be afternoon panel speakers. Mrs. Gladys L. Harris. a consultant to the Environmental Protection Agency and Deputy Attorney General Ryan will be commentators.

Summary remarks will be made by William R. Walter, director, Virginia Water Resources Research Center; Alexander Hamilton, director of public affairs, Virginia Farm Bureau; Henry S. Zygmunt water quality management coordinator, Virginia West Virginia Branch. Environmental Protection Agency; and Ms. Elizabeth Sutherland. environmental engineer, Northern Virginia Planning District Commission.

The first conference in this series was held in February 1979 and centered on toxic substances. The second conference in October 1979 was held with the Continuing Legal Education Division of the Virginia State Bar and the Virginia Bar Association.
