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## Ceremony April 24

# Lecture Hall at Rogers to be Dedicated to Dr. Guy

Dedication of the William George Guy Lecture Hall in the new wing of the William Barton Rogers Chemistry Building at the College of William and Mary at 4:30 p.m., Friday, April 24, will honor an educator whose distinguished career in chemistry spanned more than four decades.

President Thomas A. Graves, Jr., will preside at the dedication, which will include the unveiling of two plaques. One plaque, designed by Carl Roseberg, professor of fine arts, was placed earlier in another part of the building. It will be given a permanent home in the lecture hall along with a plaque designating the name of the new facility in Dr. Guy's honor. The plaques will be unveiled by Alfred R. Armstrong, professor of chemistry emeritus and a 1932 graduate of the College, and Kevin S. Zegel, a junior from Patchogue, N.Y.

George Sands of Williamsburg, a former student of Dr. Guy and a former member of the Board of Visitors of the College, will review the highlights of Professor Guy's life. A NASA scientist, Sands was not only a student under Guy but also served as a member of the chemistry faculty under his former teacher.

The Botetourt Singers of the William and Mary Choir, under the direction of Frank T. Lendrum, professor of music, will sing several madrigal songs during the afternoon program.

The new lecture hall, which seats 184 persons for lecture-demonstrations, was designed by the architectural firm of Wright, Jones and Wilkerson of Richmond. The hall was included in the original plans for the building but not built initially because of lack of funds.

The man for whom the new lecture hall is named was born in Carbonear, Newfoundland, March 17, 1899. He held two degrees from Mount Allison University and an A.B. degree from Oxford University. He earned a doctorate from the University of Chicago.

Professor Guy came to William and Mary as an assistant professor of chemistry in 1925 and was promoted to the rank of professor within five years. He was appointed one of the original Chancellor Professors of the College in 1945. He served as head of the chemistry department from 1946 until his retirement in 1968. Professor Guy died in Jacksonville Beach, Fla., June 14, 1969.

A Queen Victoria Jubilee Scholar for Newfoundland and the 1920 Newfoundland Rhodes Scholar, Professor Guy was a Du Pont Fellow at the University of Chicago where he was elected to Sigma Xi.

Early in his career at William and Mary, he was recognized and honored

by students and colleagues by election to Omicron Delta Kappa and Phi Beta Kappa honorary fraternities. Later he was awarded the Thomas Jefferson Faculty Award and the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award. At the 1969 Charter Day Convocation, he was awarded an honorary doctor of science degree.

In a statement to the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, three members of the chemistry faculty, Armstrong, Edward Katz and Richard L. Kiefer, noted Professor Guy's influence and contributions which extended far beyond the classroom, where he taught general chemistry for 43 sessions and physical chemistry for almost as long.

"He contributed to the governance of the College through membership, at one time or another, on nearly all of its appointed and elective committees, including the Study Committee in 1951 and the Steering Committee for the Self-Study of 1963-64.

"His professional involvement resulted in his election as chairman of the Virginia Section-American Chemical Society for 1951-52 and the conferral of its Distinguished Service Award in 1958. He was president of the Virginia Academy of Science, 1957-58. His service to the community was characterized by membership on the Board of Zoning Appeals and the Board of Trustees of the Williamsburg Community Hospital.

Mrs. Guy has donated the Guy residence on Pollard Park to the College.

## Schauer Lecture Set April 22

Frederick Schauer, Cutler Professor of Law at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law, will speak on "Coherence in Moral Political and Legal Philosophy," at 8 p.m., Wednesday, April 22 in room 310 of the Wren Building.

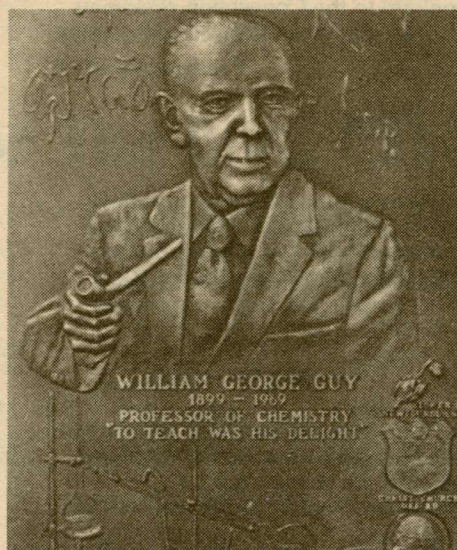
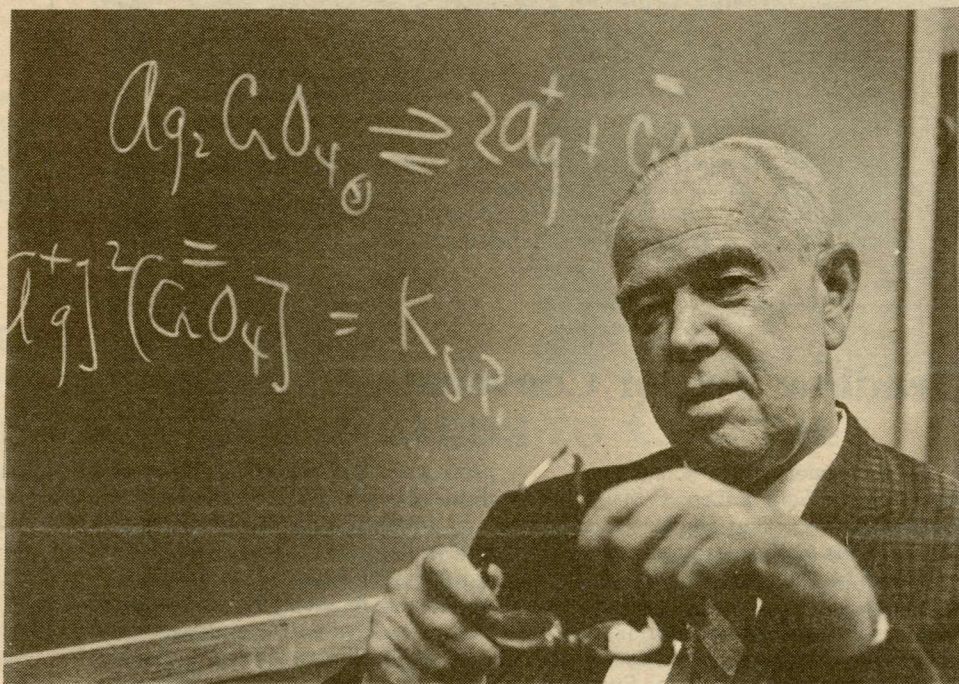
The lecture is sponsored by the Department of Philosophy. Patrons are asked to enter via the North door of the Wren Building facing Richmond Road.

A reception following Schauer's talk will be held in Wren 310.

A graduate of Dartmouth, Schauer has a J.D. degree from Harvard Law School. He joined the faculty of the Law School in 1978. His teaching specialties include constitutional law, jurisprudence and conflict of laws.

Schauer was awarded M.A. status from Cambridge University, England, in 1977. He has served as a visiting

## Business Sponsors Board Adds Four Members to Roster

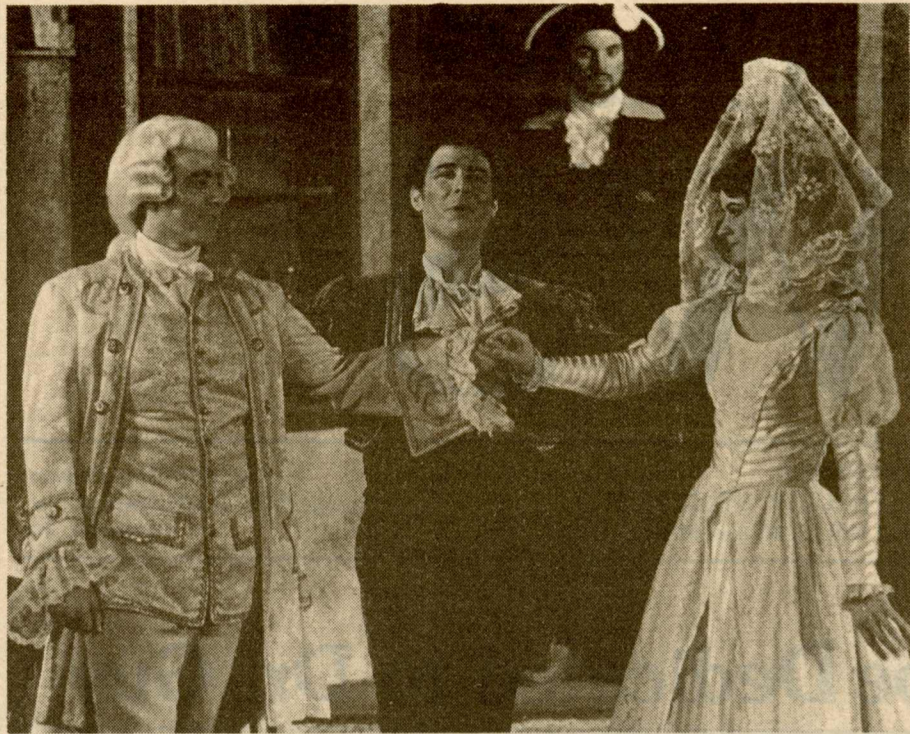
Four new members have been elected to the Board of Directors of the Business School Sponsors, Inc.

## Personnel Notices

### Employee Recognition Award Program

The College of William and Mary initiated a program April 30, 1973, which included the recognition of permanent classified employees who demonstrate outstanding performance and initiative as indicated below:

Members of the College staff who continually perform their duties beyond the normal job requirement as shown by their annual service ratings and other supporting evidence will be recognized. Employees may also be recognized for outstanding performance of a special task beyond normal job expectations. Recommendations should be submitted in writing to the appropriate Dean or Department Head for comments and endorsement. If approval is recommended by all supervisors concerned, the primary recommendation and the endorsements should then be forwarded to the College Personnel Office. Two classified employees were recognized during calendar year 1976, one employee in 1977, one in 1978, five in 1979, and three in 1980, in this manner for their performance.

Employees are also encouraged to recommend ways to save money, improve efficiency and promote safety at the College. Recommendations should be submitted in writing by the employee directly to the College Personnel Office, and should include an outline of current and proposed methods of operations, and how changing them will benefit College operating effectiveness. Recommendations will not be considered for award if a similar suggestion has been accepted or rejected within the past twenty-four months, if it is a personal grievance or request; or if it is a matter not completely controlled by the College of William and Mary. The Personnel Office will provide assistance in preparing such recommendations.

Winners of citations for performance or accepted suggestions will receive a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond. Any employee who receives three or more such citations during the calendar year will receive an additional \$50 Savings Bond and will be named "Employee of the Year."

Supervisors at all levels are encouraged to promote this program within their areas of responsibility.

A Social Security representative is in Council Chambers at the New Courthouse located on Newport Avenue in Williamsburg on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month from 9:00 AM to 3:30 PM to answer questions and assist in filling out forms.

### Telephone Directories

We have on hand a substantial number of new telephone directories, both for Williamsburg and for SCATS.

Please let us know if you require either or both of these directories. The available supply will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis.

### Personnel Records

It is the responsibility of each employee to advise the College Personnel Office whenever a change affecting their personnel records is appropriate. For example, it is extremely important that each member of the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System keep up-to-date the designation of their beneficiary. The beneficiary is the person, or persons, to whom the contributions and interest credited to the member's account, or other benefits in the Retirement System, are to be paid in the event of the member's death. Form VSRS-1, Designation of Beneficiary, is used for changing the designation of beneficiary. This form will also be used to distribute the proceeds from a member's Group Life Insurance Policy.

Other changes such as home address and/or telephone number; attainment of an educational degree or certificate; (or any other evidence that may qualify the employee for promotion) should be reported in writing to the College Personnel Office. Changes in Federal/State tax exemption status or any changes affecting Blue Cross/Blue Shield coverage must be completed by the employee in the College Personnel Office.

Employees, by appointment, may review their personnel files in the Personnel Office to insure that the information contained in the file is current and correct.

## Stousland Designs Silver Pin for The Lord Chamberlain Society

Shakespeare enthusiasts will soon be "flying their colors" as members of a new support group for the Virginia Shakespeare Festival at the College.

The Lord Chamberlain Society, named for the original royal sponsor of Shakespeare's acting company, is currently staging a campaign to enlist charter members. Many will be wearing a special sterling silver pin depicting the tower of the Globe Theatre with its flag flying, indicating that a performance is in progress.

Two of Williamsburg's active civic leaders, Robert and Lois Hornsby, are co-chairpersons of the new organization. They have mailed personal letters to a group of arts enthusiasts throughout Virginia asking them to join together to support the summer festival, which opens its fourth season July 9 with "Julius Caesar."

"We think the future of the Virginia Shakespeare Festival is most promising," said Mrs. Hornsby. "Enthusiasm has grown tremendously over the past year. The Lord Chamberlain Society is being created by a group of individuals who believe the Festival can reach a level of quality that is second to none."

The Festival received much acclaim and ticket sales increased by 50 percent during the 1980 summer season, but there continues to be potential for further artistic growth," said Mrs. Hornsby. Contributions made through

the Lord Chamberlain Society will provide enrichment in a variety of areas. They will enable the Festival to hire its first guest artist, who should be an experienced veteran of the stage.

Although the Festival has been proud of lavish and well-designed costumes during its first three seasons, they have been few in number because of a meager budget. The Lord Chamberlain Society hopes to support changes of costume as needed for each major character in the Festival's productions.

For the first three seasons, a single static set of Tudor design was used for all productions, which have ranged from the thought-provoking "Macbeth" to the rollicking "Comedy of Errors." Artistic director Kent Thompson has pledged to vary the sets to suit the diversity of the three plays in 1981. Budget costs will increase, and private support from the new organization will again be depended upon to fill in the gap.

"We're finding many people who not only want to provide funds, but also look forward to getting together to actively find ways to mount a first-rate Shakespeare Festival in Williamsburg," Mrs. Hornsby said.

A number of benefits have been established for members, depending upon the level of support. Mike Stousland, a William and Mary graduate, a faculty member at the

University of Miami in Oxford, Ohio, and a noted silver craftsman, has designed and produced sterling silver membership lapel pins. The encircled emblem represents the tower of the Globe, London's famous original Shakespeare Theatre.

The organizers of The Lord Chamberlain Society reached back to the youth of William Shakespeare to

discover its name. During its early years, Shakespeare's acting company enjoyed the patronage and protection of The Lord Chamberlain, one of the most favored royal citizens in Queen Elizabeth's court. Members of the company accepted the privilege of wearing The Lord Chamberlain's livery and proudly called themselves The Lord Chamberlain's Men.

## New Traffic Rules Set for May 2

Due to special traffic requirements in two areas of the campus during the visit of Prince Charles, vehicle parking on the following streets will be prohibited from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday, May 2.

On Old Campus Drive from Barrett Hall to the barricades at Landrum Hall, cars will not be permitted to park on either side of the street.

There will be strict enforcement of this stop sign at the intersection.

Chief Richard S. Cumbee has announced that due to changes in safety and liability regulations, the Campus Police will no longer jump-start vehicles with battery problems.
