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Poet Snodgrass Here Monday

The Pulitzer Prize winning poet W.D. Snodgrass will open the new series of lectures and workshops sponsored by the Student Association under the title "Talent Americans Series."

Snodgrass will give a lecture at 8 p.m., Monday, Sept. 27 in the Campus Center Ballroom. He will also give a workshop earlier in the day in the Campus Center Little Theatre.

Registration for the workshop is limited to 50 and participants must register at the Campus Center office of the Student Association and purchase a \$5 series season pass. The SA office will be open Monday through Friday from 1-5 p.m. to take reservations.

Individual tickets for the lecture will be on sale at the door Monday evening. The SA has not yet set a ticket price for this lecture.

Sinfonia Opens Sampler Series

The Richmond Sinfonia will open the Symphony Sampler concert series Thursday at 8:15 p.m., in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

Tickets are available from Ken Smith's office in the Campus Center and will be on sale at the PBK box office the evening of the performance.

Thursday night's concert will feature Tom Pixton, harpsichordist, who will play Concerto No. 2 in E for Harpsichord by Bach; and Concert in D for Harpsichord by Manuel de Falla.

Pixton has distinguished himself as a harpsichord craftsman and soloist. He first became interested in the harpsichord when he was 13. Two years later, he made his professional debut at Carnegie Recital Hall. He built his first harpsichord before graduating from high school in 1971.

The new Symphony harpsichord on which Pixton will perform, is a gift of the Morton Wallerstein family.

The Sinfonia will open with Concerto Grosso in B-Flat, Op. 6, No. 7 by Handel. The program will also include Symphony No. 42 in D (1771) by Haydn.

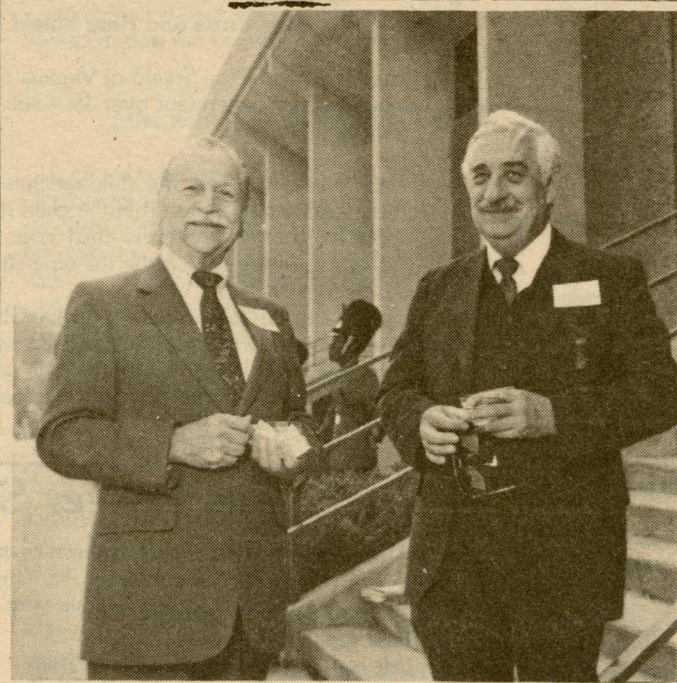
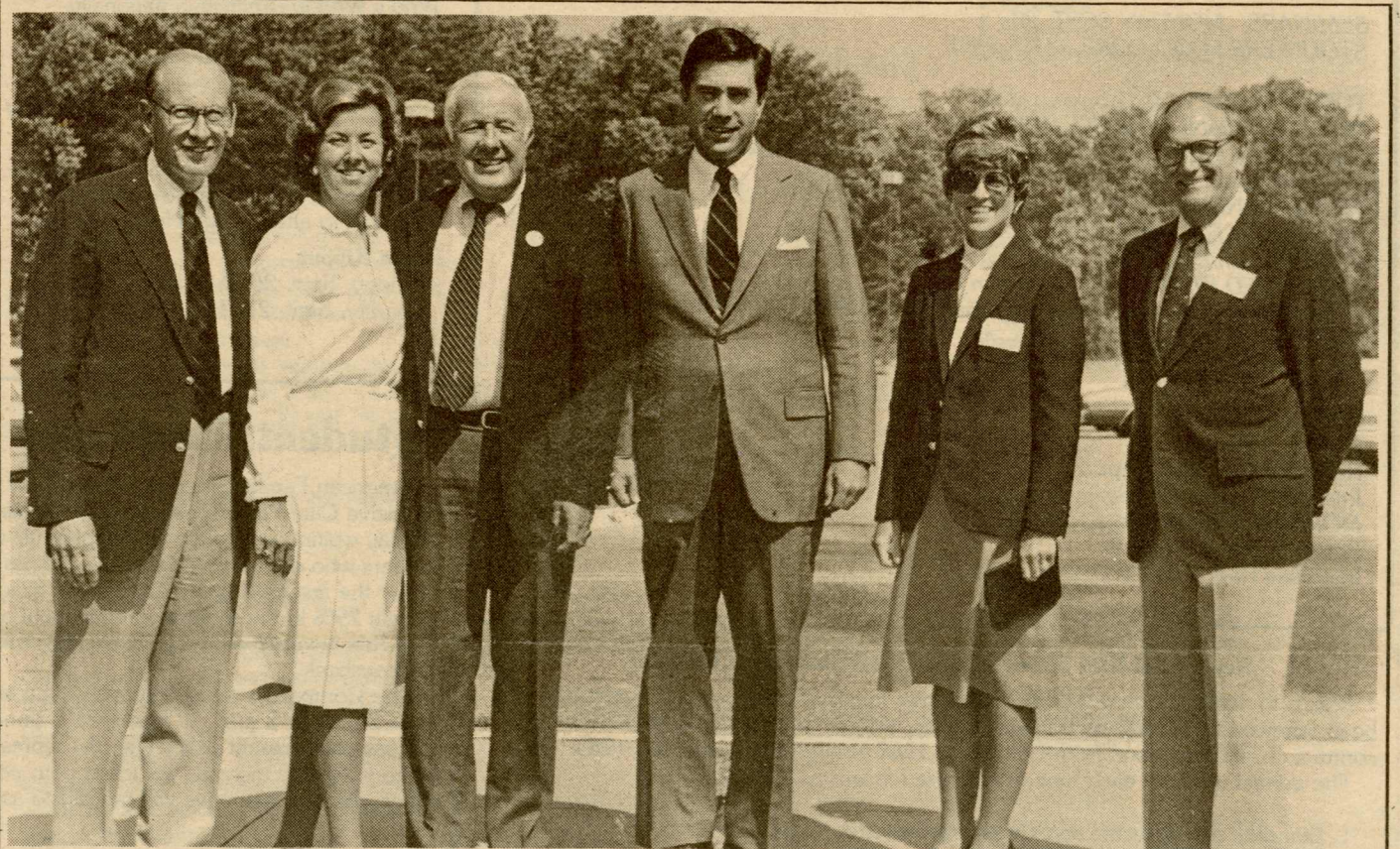
Thursday evenings program is made possible in part by a grant from the Virginia Commission for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Jennifer Montagu of the Warburg Institute, University of London, will initiate the lecture series sponsored by the Department of Fine Arts with a paper on "Bernini and the Decorative Arts," at 8 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 28 in Andrews Hall, room 201.

Professor Montagu is well known in the field of 17th century studies for her numerous publications and proposals on sculpture and painting of the Baroque.

Professor Montague has had a distinguished career beginning in 1953 with a

position as Assistant Regional Director of Warburg Institute where she received her doctorate in 1959.

Professor Montagu is touring this coun-

try briefly to see the "Bernini Drawings from Dresden" exhibition now in Boston and to view Baroque sculpture in regional collections in the United States.

Student, Employee Health Plans

American Family Life now offers a new Cancer Indemnity Plan and updated Intensive Care Plan. These plans are available through payroll deductions. There is a 30-day waiting period for new applicants; however, there is none for current policy holders who desire to update their policies.

For the first time in the Company's history there will be a rate increase of approximately 29% in the monthly premiums of all cancer policies issued prior to May 1980. This rate increase will be effective November 1, 1982, and will show on the October 1st paycheck.

The Company's representative will be at the College on September 23rd and 24th, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., in Room 213, James Blair Hall. You are encouraged to discuss your present policy with the representative in order to receive the full details of how the rate increase will effect your policy. Blue Cross and Blue Shield Notification of Student Status

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Virginia requires written notification of any change of status for any dependent over 19 years of age. Dependent children are eligible for BC/BS benefits until:

- the end of the year the child reaches age 19 if not a full-time student
- the end of the month that the child marries
- the end of the month the child stops going to school full-time if under 23
- the end of the month the full-time student reaches age 23.

Employees with Blue Cross and Blue Shield family coverage who have unmarried children between the ages of 19 and 23 who are full-time students must complete a student status form each fall to continue coverage on the dependent. The appropriate forms are available in the Personnel Office. If an up-to-date student status form is not on file with BC/BS of Virginia claims may be denied on the dependent.
