The William and Mary Theatre will open Moliere's "Tartuffe," at 8:15 p.m., Thursday, Nov. 18 in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall. The director is Jerry Bledsoe, associate professor of theatre and speech.

Tickets are \$4. There will be four performances of the play, including Friday and Saturday Nov. 19 and 20 at 8:15 p.m., and a matinee Sunday, Nov. 21 at 2 p.m.

The box office will be open Monday

through Friday from 1-6 p.m., and from 1-4 p.m. on Saturday. Reservations may be called in to the box office at ext. 4272.

This production will be William and Mary's entry in the American College Theatre Festival at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., next spring.

Set in 17th century Paris, "Tartuffe," is

about the misdeeds of a clever schemer who totally disrupts the entire Orgon family before he is stopped by royal intervention.

The title role is played by Bernard Keavney. Other principals in the cast include Alexander Iden as Orgon; Cara

## Dancers to Perform at Library

"Feels Like Home To Me," danceworks by Marilyn Brda of the dance faculty, will be performed by members of Orchesis and Orchesis Apprentices at 8:15 p.m., Friday and Saturday, Nov. 19 and 20, in the auditorium of the Williamsburg Regional Library's Arts Center at the corner of Scotland and Boundary Streets.

The program takes its name from the major work in the performance which is presented in two parts, one at the beginning and one at the end.

"Feels Like Home To Me," says the choreographer, "is the result of my continuing interest in popular music, rock and blues, and jazz dance.

"In the first part the dancers are sensual and slightly removed in attitude. While there is no message, I hope to convey one aspect of the urban milieu. The second part of the work is a lively, almost frenetic piece with the dancers portraying a slightly cocky, playful attitude.

"At some time, I would like to add a third section--a solo--in a sense, it is a work still in progress."

modern piece entitled "...falling..." which takes its name from a James Joyce passage in "Portrait of an Artist as a Young Man." This is a non-technical, process-oriented dance in which the dancers interpret falling in a variety of ways including tripping, losing control and falling head over heels in love. Music is by Tom Davis, a student at the College who has composed other music for dance.

The two jazz segments in "Feels Like Home To Me," are popularly oriented, says Brda, the other two dances, "Limits," and "...falling..." "represents a dance style local audiences may be unfamiliar with."

Orchesis is the modern dance group at the College and the Orchesis Apprentice program was added in 1978 and is under the direction of Brda. Dancers in the program will include Alison Emory, Leslie Allsopp, James R. Falls, Joan Gavalier, Lynn Balliette, Carol Smith, Lane Nelson, Monique Miller, Mark James, Denise Damon, Nancy Cote and Susanne Storer.

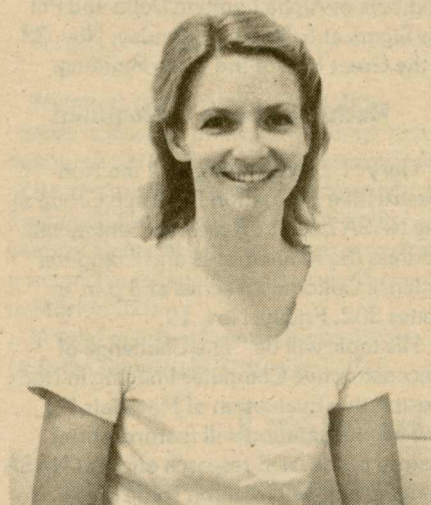
## Emergency Test Held Nov. 10

The College held a Radiological Emergency Response exercise Wednesday, Nov. 10, and according to Police Chief Cumbee, successfully tested the communications procedures under which the College would operate in the event of a real emergency.

This is the third such exercise since the College established a Radiological Emergency Response plan in 1981.

Because of its location, approximately 10 miles from the nuclear power plant in Surry, the College is on a schedule of exercises which have been established by the Office of Emergency Services, a state agency in Richmond.

The sirens were tested on Wednesday and communication links checked. In the event of a real emergency, the campus radio station would issue instructions on emergency procedures. Police cars with loud speakers would crisscross the campus to warn those in academic buildings and Residence Hall Life staff would warn students and personnel in residence halls. The exercise did not go that far on Wednesday, but the communications network is there when needed, said Cumbee.

Dean Spong was recently appointed by Governor Robb to head the Commission on Virginia's Future. The following editorial is reprinted, with permission, from the November 9th edition of the Richmond Times-Dispatch newspaper.

## Spong Commission II

In 1958, when the Commonwealth of Virginia was searching for ways to overhaul its creaking public education system, it turned to a young state senator from Portsmouth, William B. Spong Jr. As chairman of the Commission on Public Education, Mr. Spong was the driving force behind perceptive commission reports that did much to elevate the quality of schooling in the state.

In 1982, searching for astute analysis of the problems the Old Dominion must confront as it approaches the year 2000, Gov. Charles S. Robb has turned again to Mr. Spong, who is now himself a man of education, in his position as dean of the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at the College of William and Mary. Before taking over that venerable law school, which he has led from the doldrums to greater distinction, Mr. Spong served as a United States senator.

Gov. Robb could not have selected a better person to head the Commission on Virginia's Future. We are also mightily impressed with the 36 persons the governor has tapped to serve on Spong Commission II — men and women of

the caliber (to name only some of the most prominent examples) of former Govs. Albertis S. Harrison Jr. and Linwood Holton, former Speaker of the House John Warren Cooke, Newport News Councilwoman Jessie Rattley, retired Norfolk & Western executive John P. Fishwick, Washington & Lee president Robert E. R. Huntley, and James Schlesinger, former energy and defense secretary and CIA director.

Cynicism as to the work of public commissions flows easily. All too many such panels spend vast sums of tax money only to produce ponderous tomes that serve no higher purpose than as dust catchers. But if the design is good, the result can be, too. In this case, much of the expense will be defrayed through staff support from the University of Virginia's Institute of Government; no new state appropriation will be required. And the leadership and composition of the commission could not be improved upon.

We congratulate Gov. Robb for bringing this group together. We look forward to the outcome of its brainstorming.

## Two Physicians Join Staff of Student Health Services Center

Physician William J. Perry, who has joined the Student Health Services staff, says he is impressed by the interest his campus patients show in their illnesses and the courtesies they show him.

Students are inquisitive about the condition of their health, says Perry. When they come to see him they don't want to take things for granted. "It keeps a physician on his toes," says Perry.

Perry says he appreciates the courtesies shown him by students he sees. "They thank me for seeing them," says Perry, who adds that such courtesies are not, in his experience, usual in private practice.

Perry is glad to be back in Virginia. He was in private practice in Alexandria for 17 years and comes to Williamsburg from Hartselle, Ala., where he was also in family practice. He was also vice president of the Alabama Medical Review, Inc., a member of the Quality Assurance Committee for the state, and physician advisor for two Northern Alabama hospitals.

A native of Michigan, Perry received his medical degree from Duke University. He received post-graduate training at the University of London 1952-53, as a part-time exchange fellow. He interned at the U.S. Navy, Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, Washington, D.C., and was a resident at Alexandria Hospital, Alexandria, Va., 1954-55.

During World War II, Perry served in the Pacific Theatre as a member of Admiral Halsey's staff. His Navy duty also included two years as Naval Science Attache, Office of Naval Research, at the U.S. Embassy in London.

Perry has received many honors during his career including five Special Achievement Awards from the American Medical Association, 1969, 1972, 1975, 1979 and 1981. He has contributed many articles to medical journals.

Tawni Frank, an emergency room physician at John Randolph Hospital in Hopewell, Va., is working two days a week at the Student Health Services Center.

A graduate of the University of Buffalo Medical School, Dr. Frank spent three years at the National Health Services Corps site in King William County and one year at Henrico Doctors Hospital.

Dr. Frank was a pre-law student at Radcliffe but decided that she wouldn't be happy in law so switched to medicine. She did a surgical and pediatrics internship at the Medical College of Virginia.

She lives with her husband Dr. Bunell Hawthorne, a dentist with the Newport News Health department, on a farm in Charles City County where they raise show horses and jumpers, and also house half a dozen exotic birds.

## Abramowitz Wins PSA Essay Prize

Alan L. Abramowitz, associate professor of government, has been awarded the Pi Sigma Alpha award for his paper entitled "Party Leadership Realignment, and Nationalization of Southern Politics."

The "best paper" award was presented to Abramowitz at the fall meetings of PSA in Atlanta, Ga.

Abramowitz is currently on leave and is a visiting professor at the State University of New York at Stony Brook for the academic year.

## Perdrisat Returns After Two Weeks With French AEC

Charles F. Perdrisat, professor of physics, recently spent two weeks at the French Atomic Energy Commission research laboratory in Saclay near Paris.

In collaboration with other scientists from the U.S.A., France and Canada, he participated in an investigation of the elastic interaction of tensor polarized deuterons with hydrogen.

This work is a continuation of research Perdrisat started while spending the academic year 81-2 at the nearby Orsay campus of the University of Paris. He went there with a one semester research assignment from the College, completed with a salary from the University of Paris.

Recently Perdrisat has received a new 3-year grant from the National Science Foundation in support of his research in the field of nuclear reactions at high energies. The common theme of these several projects is the search for an understanding of reactions involving nuclear systems consisting of a few nucleons.

This latest NSF award of \$39,000 for 82-3 brings the total amount of support received so far to approximately \$160,000 over a 5 year period. The funds are used to support two physics graduate students, B. Debebe and V. Raghunathan, and to travel to various US and Canadian laboratories to participate in several ongoing experiments.

## Kitchen Fire Closes Wigwam in Campus Center

A grease fire in the kitchen of the Wigwam in the Campus Center during the lunch hour approximately 12:45 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 10, sent curls of black smoke pouring out of the second story vent at that end of the building. The Williamsburg Fire Department responded and the fire was soon extinguished. There were no injuries and except for the Wig, the Campus Center was operating on a regular basis by evening.

According to David Charlton, Director

of Auxiliary Enterprises, cause of the fire may have been due to a malfunctioning thermostat. Although Shamrock Food Service employees used fire extinguishers on the blaze and the automatic sprinkler system in the hood of the unit was responsive, the heat of the fire was too intense for them to handle.

Martin Siegmeister of Shamrock says he plans to have the Wigwam back in business this week. The area of the fire will be

sealed off so food service can be reinstated while repairs are underway.

Charlton said that there was some water damage, plaster to be replaced and new vents to be installed. Chief Bailey of the Williamsburg Fire Department, the day of the fire, estimated damage at \$20,000. Charlton says the damage estimate may be a little high and he hopes to recover the total cost of repairs through insurance.

While the Wig has been closed, Shamrock has been feeding boarding students in the Pub for breakfast, lunch and dinner and has extended the hours of the Commons to accommodate the increased number of students there. Faculty and staff members have been invited to take advantage of the casual meal rate available at the dining hall and at the Pub.
