

Philip Morris Commits \$90,000 To Phase II Of Museum

Philip Morris, Inc., has made a commitment of \$90,000 to the College toward Phase II construction of the Muscarelle Museum of Art.

The three-year corporate pledge will help the College meet two separate challenge grants--\$200,000 from The Kresge Foundation of Troy, Mich., and \$150,000 from Joseph and Margaret Muscarelle--for the two-story, 11,000-square-foot addition to the Museum.

"This grant helps reaffirm Philip Morris' longstanding commitment to the fine arts in Virginia," said Glenn Lowry, museum director. "Their generous com-

mitment goes a long way toward helping fund the completion of construction, which is crucial to the overall mission of the museum."

Phase II of the Muscarelle Museum of Art will include 7,800 square feet of new exhibition space consisting of a second large gallery for temporary exhibitions; three galleries for exhibitions from the College's permanent collection, -- including two for paintings and sculpture and one for decorative arts; and a graphic arts complex composed of a gallery, and study and storage rooms. A seminar room and

expanded climatically controlled storage areas for the care of the College's art collection will complete the addition.

The Philip Morris commitment brings to \$632,000 the total pledged to Phase II construction. An additional \$372,000 must be raised to meet the March 15 deadline imposed by the Kresge Foundation and the Muscarelles to qualify for the \$350,000 in challenge monies which will fully fund the facility. With working drawings by Carlton S. Abbott & Associates nearing completion, construction could begin as early as this year.

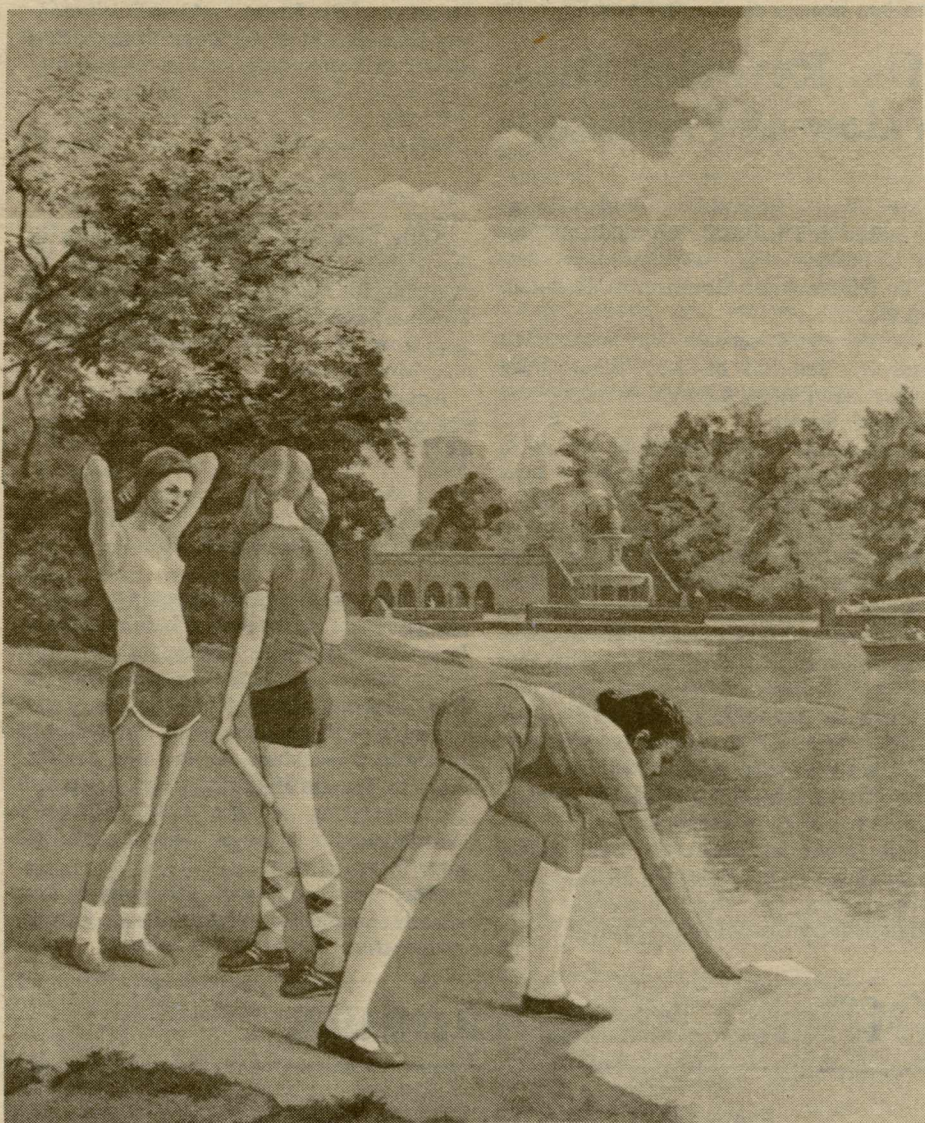

Faculty Support Endowment Tops One Million Mark

The \$4.4 million effort for faculty support endowment, started in the summer of 1982 at the College of William and Mary, has reached its first \$1 million milestone.

In a January 4 memorandum to Melvyn D. Schiavelli, chairman of the advisory committee on faculty support endowment, Duane A. Dittman, Vice President for University Advancement, reported that \$1,006,479 in gifts and pledges qualifying toward the \$4.4 million effort has been received. He also included the following summary:

An additional \$292,791 was received during fiscal 1982-83 for endowment for faculty support which did not qualify toward the \$4.4 effort by an understanding with Provost Healy and Comptroller Whitaker. The funds are, nonetheless, in place, yielding new support for faculty compensation.

Encouraged by the progress report and the ongoing fund-raising efforts, Schiavelli said that every time one million dollars is added to the College's endowment, it adds approximately \$55,000 in new funds each year for faculty compensation excluding additional monies generated through the Commonwealth of Virginia's Eminent Scholars program. Schiavelli added that the funds derived from the \$4.4 million effort will be used primarily to strengthen the level of present faculty salaries, rather than to fund new faculty positions.

Schiavelli says he is optimistic that the first million will be doubled within a year or more. There are a number of proposals that have been made to foundations, corporations, and individuals where responses are pending and more are currently "in the works" he says. While Schiavelli is enthusiastic about the work of the University Advancement staff, he is equally vigorous about the need for more private funds. "Efforts for faculty endowment will, without question, form a major component of any major comprehensive capital campaign effort the College may launch in the next few years."

When measured against the national average for salaries at schools in Category I (an accepted AAUP rating for schools according to number of degree programs and graduate students), William and Mary falls between 10 and 13 per cent below the national average. To get William and Mary salaries up to the national average for Category I schools would require an additional \$1.6 million in endowment income or state funds in the salary pool.

"We have raised that pool by approximately \$55,000, but there's a long way to go," says Schiavelli. "The \$1.6 million sounds like a huge amount and it is a lot of money, but it represents less than three per cent of the total expenditures of the College in one year."

A more detailed story about the \$4.4 effort will be contained in the next Investors Report from the Office of University Advancement scheduled for April 1984.

Schiavelli recently announced his resignation as chairman of the Advisory Committee on the Faculty Support Endowment to accept an appointment as chairman of the College's Long Range Planning Commission. The new chairman of the Advisory Committee is Vinson Sutlive, professor of anthropology.

Food Preparation, Shopping

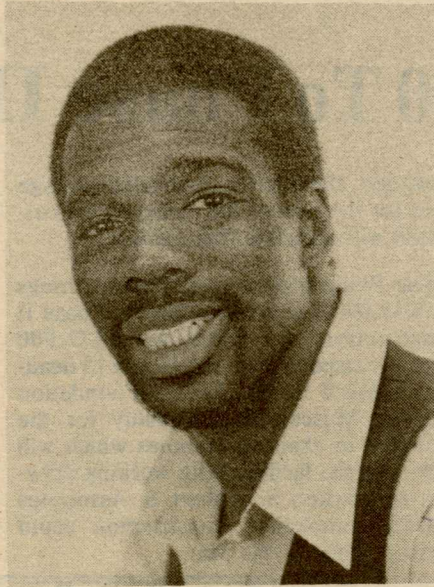

Reduction in Mileage Rate For Official Vehicle Use

Effective January 1, 1984, the user rate per mile for state-owned pool vehicles was reduced as indicated by the type of vehicles.

This reduction in mileage rate for state-owned vehicles was directed by Mr. Andrew B. Forgarty, Secretary of Transportation in his memorandum dated December 19, 1983. He cited Executive Order number thirty (82) as the authority for the above rate reduction. The change is necessary to more closely align projected revenue and expenditures of the Central Garage per mile operation costs.

This new rate reduction is proportioned to the depreciation and replacement cost of various pool vehicles.
