

## Law Tourney Begins Friday

Three third year law students, Barbara Johnson of Hampton, and John D. Epperly and Peter Brodell of Williamsburg, will represent the host school at the annual Marshall-Wythe Invitational Moot Court Tournament at the law school Friday and Saturday.

In the past Marshall-Wythe teams have fared very well at these tournaments. The host teams won their own tournaments in 1970, '80 and '81.

This year teams from the University of Richmond, Washington and Lee University, Wake Forest University, Case Western Reserve University, Southwestern University, Los Angeles, George Mason University, American University, University of Southern California at Los Angeles, New York University, West Virginia University and Brooklyn Law School will compete.

A distinguished panel of jurists including Virginia Supreme Court, Federal District and Circuit Court judges and members of the Virginia Trial Lawyers Association will serve as judges.

The topic teams will debate involves the constitutional rights of a surrogate mother. A hypothetical case has been proposed to decide whether the practice is legal and whether the surrogate mother can get paid for her services.

The general public is invited to attend any or all of the tournament rounds. There is no admission charge. The first round will be held Friday at 7 p.m. There will be a second round at 8:30 p.m.

On Saturday, there will be two morning rounds at 9 and 10:30 a.m. Quarterfinal competition will begin at 1 p.m., and final rounds begin at 3:30 p.m.

Awards will be presented at a banquet to be held Saturday evening for tournament participants only.

## Schub Concert Wednesday

Andre-Michel Schub, a pianist whose artistry has received international acclaim, will perform in concert at 8:15 p.m., Feb. 29 in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall at the College of William and Mary as part of the current Concert Series schedule.

Individual tickets are \$5 for the general public; \$4 for members of the College community. Tickets, if available, will be on sale at the Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall box office the evening of performance and are also available from the office of the Director of the Series, Ken Smith, in the Campus Center, 253-4557.

For his Williamsburg concert Schub will play Sonata in E-flat Major, Hob. XVI/52 by Haydn; Sonata No. 23 in f minor, Op. 57, by Beethoven; four preludes from

Book II by Debussy and Robert Schumann's Carnival Op. 9.

Critics have praised Schub for being "timeless, perfect, imaginative, incisive, authoritative, passionate, spontaneous, dazzling, brilliant and sensitive." The eyes of the music world first focused on Schub when he won the 1981 Van Cliburn International Competition. As well as winning first prize, Schub also won an additional award for the best chamber music performance of the competition.

This season Schub is performing with the National Symphony and Rostropovich; the Chicago Symphony and Leinsdorf; the Houston Symphony and Comissiona at Carnegie Hall, and the

## Brecht Play Opens Feb. 23

Realistically, a little goodness goes a long way. This is one of the messages German dramatist Bertolt Brecht conveys in his play with music, "The Good Woman of Setzuan," which will be presented by the William and Mary Theatre, Feb. 23 - 26.

Performances will be given at 8:15 p.m., Feb. 23, 24, 25 and at 2 p.m., Feb. 26 in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall. Tickets are \$4. The box office in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall is open Monday through Friday from 1 - 6 p.m. Reservations may also be made by calling 253-4272 during box office hours.

The "Good Woman" is Shen Te, a prostitute, who gives shelter to three traveling gods who are looking for a good human being. They decide to repay her kindness by giving her money to start her own tobacco shop. She is successful, but her goodness gets her into trouble. She is almost forced out of business by a bunch of freeloaders who have descended upon her. Shen Te invents a cousin "Shui Ta," a stern man, to run off her tormentors. Shui Ta appears several times to rescue Shen Te and at one point saves her from an unwise marriage.

Because of Shui Ta's frequent appearances and the disappearance of Shen Te, he is hauled into court by the community leaders and charged with her murder. The three gods serve as judges. They are appalled to learn that Shen Te cannot succeed through kindness alone but are resigned to the fact that goodness alone will not prevail.

Brecht uses the stage as a vehicle to express his Marxist views on capitalism and to attack established religions, explains director Bruce McConachie, associate professor of theatre and speech. But you don't have to be a Marxist to get a lot out of the characters and many of the situations are going to ring true, regardless of the political proclivities and values of members of the audience, he adds.

"The author is saying that small acts of kindness are possible but one cannot follow one's natural instincts for goodness for too long before running into trouble," says McConachie.

McConachie says he sees no reason for locating the play in Setzuan but suggests that Brecht was looking for a semi-mythical, far away place and chose China.

"We are not approaching China realistically," he says. Costumes and accents have been designed purposefully to pull the play out of a traditional Chinese setting. Set designer is Jerry Bledsoe and costumes are by theatre designer Patricia Wesp.

The play is set in the 1920's, so Art Deco features will be used to heighten the illusion of wealth in the homes of the rich people of the town. In the poor section the setting will be drab and will include a sewer pipe, the home of Wong the water carrier.

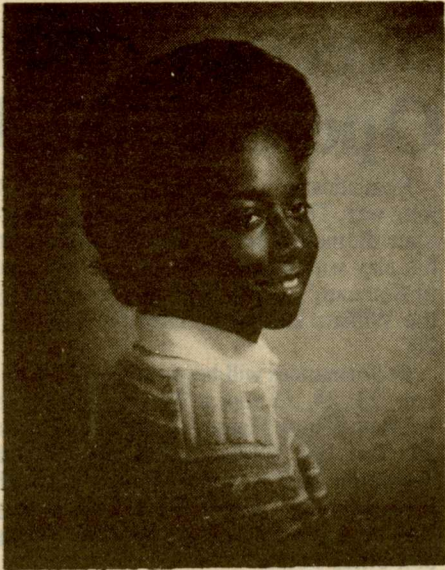

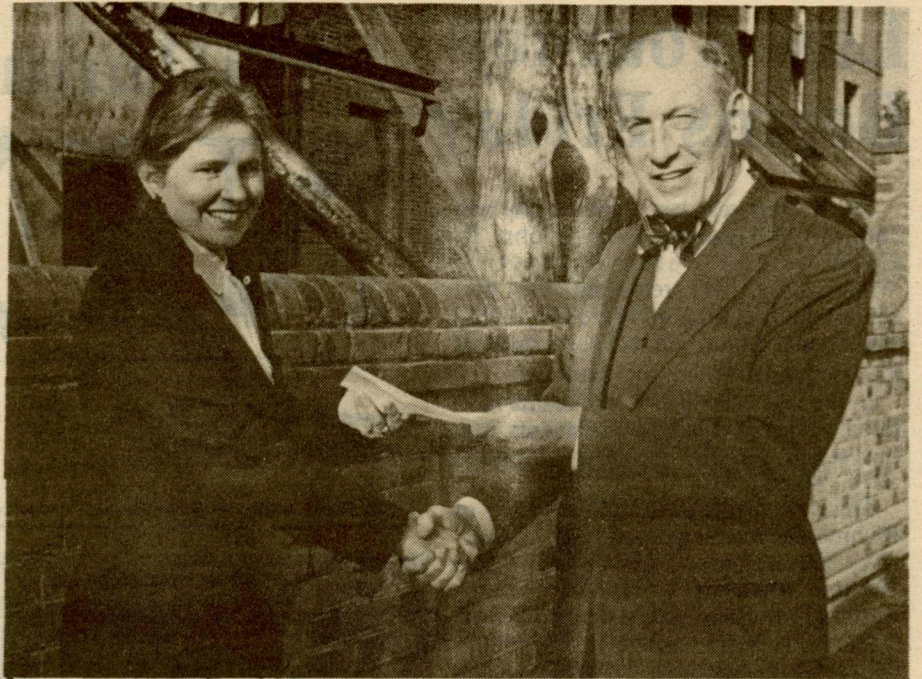
## Sessoms Recital Set In Library

"Massachusetts in 1690 was the first colony to issue paper money . . . In 1755 the Colony of Virginia was the last colony to authorize the emission of paper money of 20,000 pounds . . . In 1764 the King declared all paper money illegal. However, it was not enforced, and the colonies continued issuing paper money on a reduced scale.

"Maryland by its 1733 emission authorized 60,000 pounds to its loan office for paying farmers for burning tobacco crops to increase its price (this was our first government subsidized farm program)."

. . . Over 500 different emissions were authorized from 1690 through 1789 by the 13 original English colonies and the Continental Congress.

## Lanier Concert

Jo Ann Lanier, mezzo-soprano, will present a concert of Afro-American music at 7 p.m., Friday, Feb. 24 in the Campus Center ballroom concluding a series of cultural programs sponsored by the Black Student Organization and the Office of Minority Affairs at the College.

This concert is open to the public. There is no admission charge.

As an ambassador for the black arts, Dr. Lanier will narrate and perform a chronological perspective of American music from 1619 to the present. She will include classical concert music, folk-ethnic, opera, jazz and popular music and will show also how musical themes are also apparent in black art, dance, drama and literature.

## Harold W. Ramsey, Past Board Member, Dies At Age 81

Harold W. Ramsey, 81, superintendent of Franklin County School for 41 years, former member of the State Board of Education and the Board of Visitors of the College, died Feb. 14.

Mr. Ramsey received three degrees from the College, B.A., 1927, M.A., 1940 and LL.D., 1964. He was awarded the Alumni Medallion for service and loyalty to the College by the Society of the Alumni in 1983. Mr. Ramsey was a member of the Board of Visitors from 1946-54. During his term on the Board he served both as Secretary of the Board and Vice Rector.

Mr. Ramsey served as a school teacher and principal before being named superintendent in 1927, a post he held until 1968. He was a member of the State Board of Education from the late 1960's until 1976.

Mr. Ramsey was founder and first president of the Rocky Mount Rotary Club. He was the widower of Kitty Taliaferro Greer Ramsey, and is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Bobbie Ramsey Brooks of Fairfax.

Funeral services were held at Trinity Episcopal Church in Rocky Mount and burial was in High Street Cemetery.

The family has requested that memorial contributions be made to the Harold W. Ramsey Memorial Scholarship to enable a Franklin County student to attend William and Mary. The scholarship is in care of First Federal Savings and Loan Association, P.O. Box 128, Rocky Mount, Va. 24151.

## Law Institute Plans Symposium

The Institute of Bill of Rights Law at the College of William and Mary Marshall-Wythe School of Law and the William and Mary Law Review will co-sponsor a symposium entitled "Defamation and the First Amendment: New Perspectives," April 6 and 7.

The Institute opened the fall of 1983, supported by the largest gift ever received by the law school. A bequest from the Alfred Wilson Lee and Mary I. W. Lee Memorial Trust Fund will provide a grant of \$250,000 per year for the next seven years for a cumulative total of \$1.75 million for the institute.

Principal speakers at the symposium will be David A. Anderson, University of Texas School of Law, who will speak on "Reputation Revisited"; Marc A. Franklin, Stanford University Law School whose topic will be "The New Defamation Action: Facts, Falsity and More Fault"; and Frederick F. Schauer, Marshall-

Wythe School of Law who will speak on "Public Figures."

Daniels, vice president and counsel of Newsweek, Inc.; Alice Neff Lucan, assistant general counsel, Gannett Co., Inc.; Steven H. Shiffrin, UCLA School of Law; Dale R. The three gods who initially set Shen Te up in business will be played by Cara Newman of Fairfax, Va.; Carol Penola of Kinnelon, N.J., and Nancy Lowery of Lexington, Va. McConachie feels women in the roles gives an interesting twist to the play but resulted primarily, he says, because he had a larger pool of good actresses than good actors in auditions. Since the playwright does not specify the exact route of the traveling gods, McConachie locates them in some unlikely places including a New York subway station and in the middle of a fire fight between U.S. forces and Nicaraguan guerillas in 1927.

The difficult dual role of Shen Te and Shui Ta will be played by Janet Rollins, a senior from Hampton, N.J., with a great deal of experience with the William and Mary Theatre. As a freshman she started rehearsals for "Company," almost at the same time as she was beginning classes. She was chosen to compete at the regional level of the Irene Ryan College Drama Competition on the basis of her role in "Tartuffe." She played the leading role of Sally Bowles in "Cabaret."

"She is a very strong actress with a phenomenal voice," says McConachie. "She can make believable the switch from femininity to masculinity which this role requires." McConachie likens her to the actress Ute Hagen who starred in the play during its successful New York run in 1956.

New music for the play is being composed by Robert Amerman of Arlington, Va., a senior who last year composed music for a full-length production "Atalanta," which was presented by the student-run Backdrop Club. McConachie thought the music originally composed for the play was too heavy and drab. He wanted something that was livelier. A small eight-piece orchestra will be placed on two tiers at the right of the stage.
