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## Choir/Chorus open season with Christmas concerts

Christmas concerts by the College of William and Mary Choir and Chorus, which traditionally open the holiday season on campus, will be presented Dec. 5, 6 and 7 at 8:15 p.m., in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

General admission is \$2.50, and tickets are on sale at the Campus Center desk, the music department office in Ewell Hall and will also be available the nights of performances at the PBK box office.

This year, in celebration of the 300th anniversary of the birth of composer J.

S. Bach (1685-1750), the combined choir and chorus will sing "Christians, Be Joyful," from Bach's Christmas Oratorio.

The singers will continue the Christmas tradition of inviting members of the audience to join in a medley of familiar carols to close the program. Several selections will be augmented by instrumental accompaniments.

Both the women's chorus and the choir are under the direction of Frank T. Lendrim, chairman of the music department. Melodic ambassadors for the College, the choir tours in Virginia and along the eastern seaboard each spring and is planning another European tour in 1987. The Botetourt Chamber Singers, an ensemble from the choir, has an active schedule of singing engagements throughout the year. Most recently the group sang at a banquet that was part of the festivities for the prestigious Wightman Cup tennis matches, which were held in William and Mary Hall early in Nov. On alternate years the matches are held at the Albert Hall in London.

Following a prelude of seasonal music by a brass ensemble, the chorus will open the program with "Tyrley, Tyr-low," by Williametta Spencer; "Angelus Ad Pastores Ait," by Daniel Pinkham, sung in Latin; and a selection of carols. Soloists will include Ashley Burt, Wilton, Conn.; Helle Borum, Williamsburg, Va.; Martha Giffen, Sturbridge, Mass.; and Nancy Bowman, Richmond, Va.

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## New policy set on parking fines

Beginning Jan. 1, the College will implement a late fee for overdue parking citations. Unappealed citations not paid within 10 calendar days will result in a \$5 late charge. If a citation appeal is denied, the same fine will go into effect 10 calendar days after the date of the Traffic Appeals Committee decision.

The purpose of the late fee is to encourage prompt payment of parking citations. Currently the Campus Police Department has about \$20,000 due in unpaid parking tickets. Following review by the administration of this proposal, a decision to implement the late fee was approved in an effort to alleviate the substantial losses.

Students should be advised that, beginning with the spring semester, the Registrar's Office will, for the first time, hold student registrations for non-payment of parking fines.

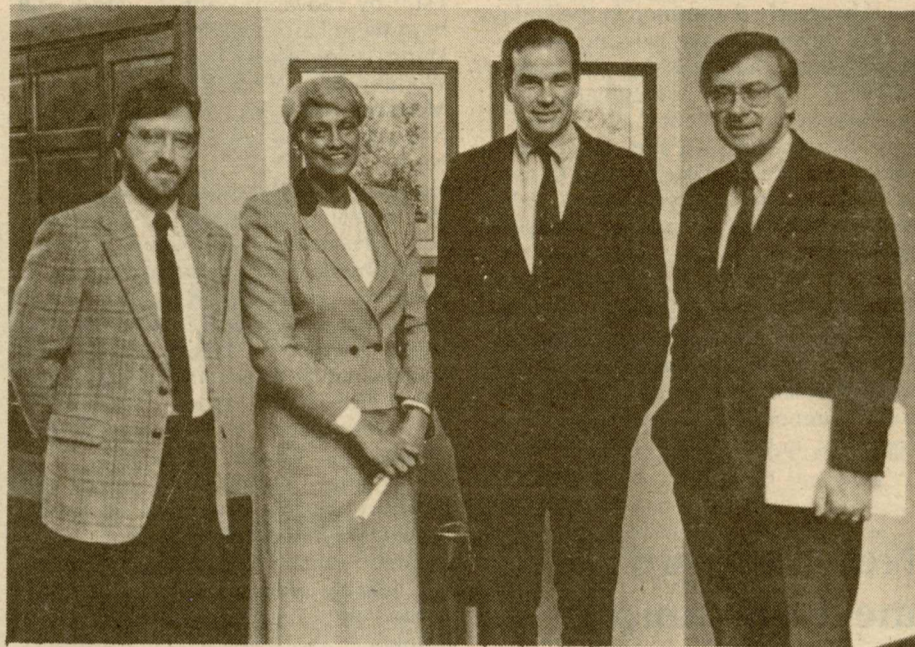
## Nominees sought

## Oak Ridge Fellowships open to faculty, students

Applications are due in January for five fellowship and research participation opportunities that are administered for the U.S. Department of Energy by Oak Ridge Associated Universities.

Faculty members can apply for a summer appointment on the Faculty Research Participation Program by Jan. 20. This program for faculty provides support for collaborative participation in on-going energy research and development at designated DOE facilities. Stipends or salaries are based on the university salary of the applicant.

Undergraduate students in science and engineering who will be college seniors in the fall of 1986 can apply for Student Research Participation summer appointments to participate in on-going energy research at designated DOE facilities. Participants are paid a weekly stipend. Deadline for applications is Jan. 20.

Graduate students have three opportunities with January application deadlines. The Graduate Student Research Participation Program supports summer research in fossil energy technologies at the Pittsburgh, Pa., and Morgantown, W. Va., energy technology centers for beginning graduate students. A weekly

stipend will be provided. Applications are due Jan. 20. Thesis research can also be supported under the Laboratory Graduate Student Program.

The Magnetic Fusion Energy Technology and Magnetic Fusion Science fellowships and the Nuclear Engineering, Health Physics, and Radioactive Waste Management fellowships are competitive fellowships awarded to students for graduate study and research at designated universities in magnetic fusion energy technology, applied plasma physics, nuclear engineering, health physics, and radioactive waste management. The practicum is at a DOE research facility. The basic student stipend for both fellowships is \$12,000 annually plus fees and tuition. The deadline for these fellowships is Jan. 27.

**John Levy**, professor of law at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law, has been awarded a \$4,200 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice for the Post Conviction Legal Assistance Project. Law students perform legal assistance to inmates at the Federal Correctional Institution, Petersburg, Va. The services include interviews, research, investigation, correspondence, referrals to legal aid societies and other attorneys, drafting of briefs, post-conviction motions and petitions.

**Michael L. Goldberg**, Sophia and Nathan S. Gumenick Professor of Judaic Studies, recently visited Duke University. He preached a sermon in the Duke Chapel during Sunday worship service titled "What's the Good News?" He also delivered a lecture, "Forgiveness and the Holocaust: Of Whom? ### News executives meet on campus

Newspaper executives from 24 southern states were on campus last week for a seminar on the First Amendment, which guarantees freedom of the press.

The seminar was co-sponsored by the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association Foundation and the Institute of Bill of Rights Law, which is based at the Marshall-Wythe School of Law.

Nationally recognized authorities on the First Amendment spoke and led discussions.

Robert Palmer, legal historian for the Institute and a professor at Marshall-Wythe, spoke on "The First Amendment." "Freedom of Speech and the Press: The Development of Supreme Court Doctrine," was the topic of a talk by Richard B. Saphire of the University of Dayton law faculty. Stanley Ingber, professor at the University of Florida Law School, spoke on "Freedom of Expression in 1985."

Attorney Arthur D. McKey of the Washington D.C., firm of Hanson, O'Brien & Butler, spoke on "Free Press Issues: A Litigator's Viewpoint."

"First Amendment Protections - An Editor's Perspective," was discussed by Charles Rowe, co-publisher and editor, the *Free-Lance Star of Fredericksburg*.

The seminar was a device used by the Institute to encourage communication between the fields of law and journalism by bringing professionals together to study the Bill of Rights. A similar seminar in July with the American Society of Newspaper Editors brought together some of the nation's leading editors and media law experts for a program titled "Legal Restraints on the Press: An Overview."

The Institute of Bill of Rights Law was founded in 1982 by the Lee Memorial Trust, established by Laura Lee of Washington, D.C., in memory of her parents, Arthur Wilson Lee and Mary I. W. Lee. Mr. Lee was founder and president of Lee Enterprises, Inc., a newspaper chain with headquarters in Davenport, Iowa. The purpose of the Institute is to perpetuate study and knowledge of the first 10 amendments, which became part of the Constitution in 1791.

**William R. Stewart**, Associate Professor of Business Administration, conducted a three-day seminar on operations research fundamentals for AT&T - Bell Laboratories, Oct. 14-16 at the AT&T Education Center.

## W&M debaters sink Richmond

Debate coach Pat Micken took four teams from his debate class to a two-school match hosted by the University of Richmond last week and came home with the lion's share of the awards.

Two seniors, Len Rozamus and Augie Ribeiro had a 3-0 record and were given the top-team award. Rozamus was top speaker for the match. Sayoko Blodgett-Ford, a freshman, teamed with senior Watkins Gray and took second-place honors. The team of Laura Forester, a junior, and Gordon Ward, a senior, tied for third place with a 2-1 record. The fourth team competing was composed of seniors Terry Healy and Brian Bisignani. Bisignani was awarded second-speaker honors.

This was a low-key match for novices, debaters who have not had a lot of experience in tournament debating, explained Micken. It was Micken's suggestion to hold the Richmond-William and Mary match, and he says he hopes to expand it to include more schools in the future. Next year William and Mary will host Richmond in Williamsburg.

Two debate teams competed at Emerson College over the weekend. Tara Fredrickson, a senior, and Scott Stawski, a sophomore, were 4-2 in the preliminaries but were defeated by Cornell in the quarterfinals on a 2-1 decision.

Freshman Douglas Clarke and Senior Scott Ward teamed for a 4-2 score in the preliminaries. They won in the quarterfinals over M.I.T., but were defeated by a second M.I.T. team in the semifinals. There were 26 teams competing.

Rated tops in the region, the debaters were up against challengers like Cornell who vie with W&M in national rankings, said Micken. Micken is taking debaters to the Towson, Md., tournament this weekend.

He is also editor of *Southeast Asian Perspectives*, a bi-annual journal and a book series titled *Culture, Society and Development in the Third World*. He is the author of many papers and several books published in India and abroad and has directed a number of research projects of theoretical and applied importance to India and the Third World. He has been an active member of the Indian delegation to the Permanent Council, International Union of Anthropology and Ethnological Sciences and has participated in many IUAES world congresses.

Previous Mahatma Gandhi Freedom lecturers have included the late Senator Benigno Aquino Jr. of the Philippines; Senator Jovito R. Salonga, the Philippines' foremost international lawyer; K. S. Bajpai and K. R. Narayanan, Indian ambassadors to the U.S.; and H. R. Coudhury who was elevated recently to the post of Minister of Foreign Affairs for Bangladesh and will be president of the United Nations General Assembly following the current session.
