## Barry Adams is Alumni VP

W. Barry Adams, alumni relations director from Ohio University in Athens, has been named executive vice president of the Society of the Alumni at the College of William and Mary.

Adams, 39, has been director of alumni relations and executive director of the Ohio University Alumni Association since 1977. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Adams of Circleville, Ohio.

A graduate of Ohio University, where he received an undergraduate degree in journalism and a master of arts degree in international affairs, Adams has extensive experience in public relations, management, program planning and administration. His programs at Ohio have won five awards from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE), including two Grand Gold awards, one for overall improvement in alumni programs and one for the total alumni relations program.

A member of the American Society of Association Executives as well as the Public Relations Society of America and CASE, Adams serves as a consultant to alumni programs. As a member of the CASE evaluation team for alumni programs, he was a member of a committee which evaluated the alumni program at the University of Louisville during the past year and will participate in an evaluation of the Marshall University alumni program during the coming year.

Adams, who will also oversee the publishing of the *Alumni Gazette* and the *William and Mary Magazine*, majored in public relations with concentrations in advertising, business and sociology at Ohio University. In addition to his other duties at Ohio, he has twice served as a visiting lecturer in the School of Journalism. In his master's studies, his major was Southeast Asia Studies with additional work in international communications and anthropology. He has studied both the Chinese and Japanese languages.

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## Burger heads Tercentenary Commission

To insure that the 300th anniversary of the founding of the second oldest college in America is appropriately commemorated, Governor Gerald L. Baliles, by Executive Order No. 50, has established the Commission on the Tercentenary Observances of The College of William and Mary in Virginia.

In a ceremonial signing on campus last Tuesday, the Governor established a 34-member commission, headed by retired U.S. Chief Justice Warren E. Burger who is also Chancellor of the College, and Harvard University economics professor Henry Rosovsky, former Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences and currently Lewis P. and Linda L. Geyser University Professor at Harvard, as chairman. H. Westcott Cunningham, who will retire later this year as executive vice president of the Society of the Alumni, will serve as vice chairman. Membership of the commission will include former governors of Virginia, and outstanding individuals from the arts, business, international affairs, as well as representatives of the alumni, parents and student body of the College.

The range of the commission's work will cover events being planned for the period 1988 through the college's 300th anniversary in 1993, according to President Verkuil, an ex officio member of the group. He said planning is well underway for events commemorating the tricentennial of the "Glorious Revolution," which brought William III and Mary II to the throne of England from the Netherlands in 1688-89. The college was designated by Congress last year as the official American representative to the international planning of those commemorations, which is being done by groups in England and the Netherlands, as well as by a committee at the College.

"We are thrilled to have such a distinguished group of men and women working on our behalf at this important time in the life of William and Mary," said President Paul R. Verkuil. "The Governor's recognition of these events through his executive order helps ensure that our celebrations will attract significant national and international attention."

Governor Baliles, in his executive order, hailed the College for its service to the state and the nation "throughout its existence by its unflinching commitment to excellence in education."

"William and Mary is recognized today as an undergraduate institution of outstanding quality with a deep commitment to the value of education in the liberal arts," he said. "It is also a full university offering outstanding graduate and professional programs."

The first meeting of the Commission has been scheduled for Sept. 25 on campus. Among the first items of conservation said Verkuil, will be the appointment of an operations committee consisting of faculty, alumni, and staff, and the adoption of a mission statement.

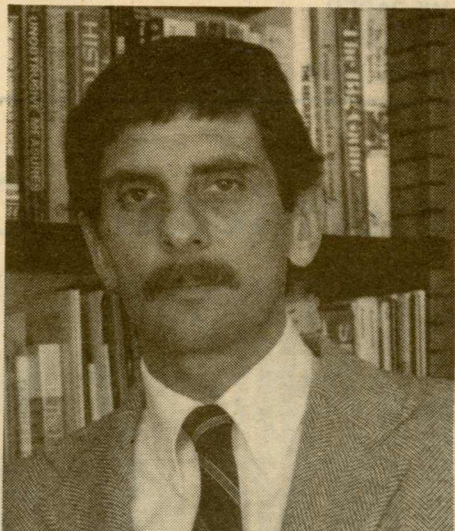
### Theelin lecture opens series

John R. Theelin, Chancellor Professor of Education, will inaugurate the Distinguished Lecture Series at the School of Education at 8 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 29 in the Dodge Room of Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall. His topic will be: "High Education and History."

This lecture series, which is open to the public, is supported by contributions from School of Education alumni. A reception will be held in the Muscarelle Museum immediately following Theelin's lecture.

Theelin, coordinator of the School of Education's program in higher education, is a historian who has made higher education the focus of his teaching, research and scholarship. A noted scholar and prolific author, Theelin is also editor of *The Review of Higher Education*. He was awarded a semester research leave for Spring 1988.

Through this lecture series the School of Education will provide a forum for the exchange of important ideas about education. Future lectures will address issues in elementary and secondary school education as well as those of higher education.

Thoney also presented a paper, "Effects of host size on development of *Heteraxinoides xanthophilis* (Monogenea)" at the 62nd annual meeting of the American Society of Parasitologists in Lincoln, Neb.

Professor William J. Hargis, Jr., attended an international conference on coastal resource management on shellfishing: a global perspective, held at Hofstra University. He presented a paper titled "The Troubled oyster industry of the lower Chesapeake Bay," written by Hargis and Dexter S. Haven. The paper described the history and problems of the Virginia oyster industry and provided specific recommendations for the Bay's renewal to its former levels of productivity.

Professor Robert J. Orth and Kenneth Moore, instructor, attended two meetings this summer in Europe: At a seagrass workshop held at the Delta Institute of Hydrobiological Research in Yerseke, the Netherlands, they presented summaries of ongoing seagrass research at VIMS including work being funded under the Chesapeake Bay Initiatives.

The scientists also attended the 14th International Botanical Congress held in West Berlin. Orth co-chaired a special symposium on seagrass ecology and Moore presented a co-authored paper, "Seagrass distribution shifts in the Chesapeake Bay: Influence of water quality on plant growth and production," by Kenneth Moore, Robert Orth, Hilary Nickles and Richard Wetzel.

## Muscarelle to open three exhibits

Exhibits of contemporary art from the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts and figure drawings by 20th-century American artists from the Frederick and Lucy S. Herman Foundation Collection will open Sept. 26 at the Muscarelle Museum of Art at the College of William and Mary.

With expanded exhibit space in its new wing now available, the museum will also open an exhibit of ceramics from the Kassebaum Collection on Oct. 1.

The exhibition of works from the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts contains 24 pieces, most of which were given to the Virginia Museum by Sydney and Frances Lewis. It includes a variety of styles and media from the late 1950s to the present. Among the artists represented are John Chamberlain, Willem de Kooning, Duane Hanson, Alex Katz, Franz Kline, Roy Lichtenstein, Jim Nutt and Edward Paschke. Frederick R. Brant, curator of the Virginia Museum, will present a gallery talk at 1 p.m., Oct. 4. The exhibition will close Nov. 15.

The exhibition of works from the Herman Foundation will display items by approximately 25 artists including George Bellows, Arthur Davies, Robert Henri, Eugene Higgins, A. B. Jackson, Reginald Marsh and John Singer Sargent. This exhibit will also close Nov. 15.

Renaissance-period ceramics are spotlighted in the exhibit from the Kassebaum Collection. These pieces represent the style of lead and tin-glazed earthenware of Persia, Spain, Italy, France, Germany, the Netherlands and England. Items range from 11th- and 12th-century work, including a Persian bowl with sgraffiato designs, to a pair of 16th-century Spanish gallipots from the Royal Monastery of San Lorenzo. This exhibit will close Nov. 22.

This collection has been formed over a span of three decades by John Philip Kassebaum, a lawyer. Kassebaum says that he is attracted to the more primitive forms of earthenware because "there is a sense of honesty and unpretentiousness about them which, in many cases, amounts to an air of sophistication." In addition to their visual appeal, the Kassebaum ceramics are interesting because of their historical importance in the development of European ceramic art.

A gallery talk on the exhibit will be presented at 1 p.m., Nov. 1.

An opening reception for these exhibitions

will be held at the museum on Wednesday, Sept. 30 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

There is no admission charge for the museum, the gallery talks or receptions. All are open to the public.

The Muscarelle Museum galleries are open Monday through Friday 10 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Saturday and Sunday, noon to 4 p.m. For further information, call ext. 4650.

## History scholar to speak Sept. 21

Norman Jones, Professor of History at Utah State University, will lecture on "The Death of Usury: Religion and the Rise of Capitalism in Elizabethan England" at 4 p.m. on Sept. 21 in Tucker Hall, Room 120 (Old Moot Court Room).

Professor Jones is the prize-winning author of *Faith By Statute*, a study of the Elizabethan religious settlement of 1558-59. By overturning the views of the late Sir John Neal, Jones research paved the way for a new understanding of the Elizabethan Reformation.

He is the author of numerous articles and a second book, now in press, on usury in Elizabethan England. Jones' latest work holds wide implications for the familiar debate on the relationship between religion and the development of capitalism in early modern England.

served as chairman of the review committee for the search, said, that from the beginning, "our committee agreed to look for the best candidate we could find, regardless of college affiliation."

"It is exciting to have such an experienced person on board to lead the Society of the Alumni at this particular period in the history of the College as we approach our 300th anniversary," said Entwisle.

A native of Circleville, Ohio, Adams joined the Navy after high school and served for four years as a cryptologist with Naval Security, including two and one-half years in the Far East. He served for a year as the personal cryptologist for the admiral in command of amphibious forces in the Pacific, traveling to countries throughout the Pacific, including the Philippines, Hong Kong, Vietnam and Thailand. Entering the Navy as an enlisted man, he is currently a lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve.

At Ohio, he administers an office of nine employees, including three assistant directors, who serve 55 alumni chapters around the United States. Ohio University is a state-supported school with 16,000 students on the main campus, 23,000 in the system-wide university and a total of five branch campuses. The university has nine colleges and 110,000 alumni.

Adams will assume his new post around Nov. 1.
