## Festival Offers Two Plays Beginning July 5

The Virginia Shakespeare Festival opens its season July 5 in Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall.

The company of 18 actors, 23 staff members, and a number of summer students and local volunteers will present "As You Like It," and "The Merchant of Venice," on a rotating schedule through July 28. The executive director is Jerry Bledsoe, associate professor of theatre and speech.

"As You Like It" will open the festival on July 5, "The Merchant of Venice" on July 12.

Performances will be presented each evening, Tuesday through Saturday, at 8 p.m., and on Sundays at 2 p.m. The festival will be dark on Mondays.

Tickets are \$10 each and may be reserved by calling the box office at Phi Beta Kappa Memorial Hall which is open daily, except Sunday, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. until July 4. After July 4, the box office will extend its hours to 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Sundays.

The cast of "As You Like It" features two theatre students, Beth Zins and Charlie Mercer, as the celebrated lovers, Rosalind and Orlando. Chris Obenchain plays the notoriously obnoxious clown Touchstone; Jordan Matter plays the eccentric and melancholy Jacques. Eileen Talento plays the pretentious shepherdess, Phoebe, and Greg Lombardo is her lovesick suitor, Silvius. The visiting director of the production is James Luse '76 of the Long Wharf Theatre in New Haven, Conn.

Grant Olson of Williamsburg and David Evans of Gloucester Point play the Duke and Merchant of Venice, respectively. Sandra Musick is cast as the famous heroine Portia and Jordan Matter plays her chief suitor Bassanio. Gregory Lombardo plays Shylock, one of Shakespeare's most controversial figures. The director is Jordan Corngold of Los Angeles who has just completed the graduate program in directing at the Yale Drama School.

### VACTE Scholarship Awarded To Emily Ruth Alder

Emily Ruth Alder of Glade Spring, Va., a rising senior and Dean's List student at the College, has been awarded the 1991-92 Virginia Association of College Teacher Education Scholarship.

Alder is majoring in religion and plans a career in elementary education. She plans eventually to teach special education in a location near her hometown. She is a member of the Inter/Varsity Christian Fellowship and Alternatives to Abortion, and has worked as a volunteer at Eastern State Hospital. She worked on campus as a shelver at the university library. She is a member of two freshman honor societies, Alpha Lambda Delta and Phi Eta Sigma, as well as Kappa Delta Pi, education honor society. Alder is also a recipient of the Paul Douglas Teacher Scholarship.

In her scholarship essay, Alder explains that she became interested in teaching exceptional children as a result of her mother's job, which involves train-

ing mentally and emotionally handicapped adults for jobs in the marketplace. Alder has spent time with exceptional children. For two summers she volunteered in a summer enrichment program for mentally and emotionally disturbed children. Last summer she was head counselor at several week-long church camps for children kindergarten through sixth grade. Alder says she was influenced to come to William and Mary by a high school coach, David Crockett, who graduated from William and Mary in 1968.

Each of the 37 colleges and universities in Virginia with approved programs for the training of teachers is invited to nominate one student to receive the \$500 VACTE scholarship. Each candidate was asked to prepare a brief biography and a statement outlining career plans in education. Four finalists were elected for interviews.

### John S. Quinn

John S. Quinn, professor of business administration emeritus, died June 11.

Professor Quinn received his B.S. from State Teachers College in Salem, Mass., an M.C.S. from Boston University and an M.B.A. from Harvard University. In addition, he was a Certified Public Accountant and a member of the Virginia Society of Certified Public Accountants, the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the America Accounting Association.

Professor Quinn joined the faculty of the College in 1949 and retired in 1986. During his tenure he taught virtually every accounting course offered at the College. His reputation and contributions to William and Mary earned him its highest faculty recognition, the Thomas Jefferson Award., which was presented at Charter Day, 1984. Upon his retirement, the Virginia Society of Certified Public Accountants named him as the first recipient of its Distinguished Career in Accounting Education Award.

Survivors include his wife Muriel Quinn; a son, James F. Quinn of Kent, England; a brother, Donald A. Quinn, of Moultonboro, N.H.; and one grandson.

A wake service was conducted Friday, June 14 at Bucktrout Funeral Home. A mass was celebrated at 9 a.m., Saturday, June 15 at St. Bede's Catholic Church. Burial was in Williamsburg Memorial Park.

### Bryne Named Acting Dean/Director At SMS/VIMS

In a recent memo to faculty, staff and students at the School of Marine Science, Virginia Institute of Marine Science, Provost Melvyn D. Schiavelli announced that Frank O. Perkins is returning, effective July 1, to research and teaching after 10 years as dean and director

and will be on leave until June 30.

Schiavelli has named Robert J. Bryne, associate director for research, to serve as acting dean and director. His appointment was effective June 15.

A search committee has been engaged in recommending candidates for a new

dean and director. "President Verkuil and I are optimistic that a nomination will be advanced to the Board of Visitors at its meeting on June 28," said Schiavelli. "However, we expect a period of a few months before a new dean and director arrives on campus."

### Some SMS/VIMS Support Systems Realigned

Vice President for Administration and Finance William F. Merck announced last week the realignment of some support elements at the School of Marine Science/Virginia Institute of Marine Science.

Sponsored Programs at SMS/VIMS will now report through Bert Brummer to the University Comptroller Mary deRegnier on the Williamsburg campus, making available additional resources as needs for support services grow. The SMS/VIMS Sponsored Programs support staff, however, will continue to work with individual faculty at the Gloucester campus.

Other changes are as follows:

Budget and planning functions will

report through Paul Koehly to Sam Jones, director of planning and budget for the university.

The SMS/VIMS purchasing function will work through the university's material management office, giving SMS/VIMS more local authority in purchasing large-ticket items.

Buildings and grounds support functions will be added to the responsibilities of the Director of Facilities Management.

Oversight of the functions related to service centers for vessels, academic computing and aircraft will report to the associate director of research at SMS/VIMS.

"I expect the only visible changes in service will be positive ones," said Merck

of the realignment. "I appreciate the efforts of the many people on both campuses who participated in the numerous meetings and discussions of the last few months."

### Thomas J. Dolan

Thomas J. Dolan of Lottsburg, an adjunct faculty member at the College and professor of mass media at Hampton University from 1974 to 1984, died June 3 in Riverside Regional Medical Center, Newport News. He was 72.

Dolan retired as chief of educational television for the Continental Army Command at Fort Monroe in 1978.

A funeral service was held at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic Church, and burial with military honors was in Peninsula Memorial Park, Newport News. During World War II, Dolan served as a forward artillery observer in Europe and was awarded the Silver Star, the Bronze Star and numerous campaign ribbons.

### Stanfield Selected For AAAS Workshop

John H. Stanfield II, Cummings Professor of American Studies and Sociology, is one of 27 minority scholars who have been selected from a field of over 200 to participate in an American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) workshop of intensive study on the values and ethical issues associated with science and technology, July 28 to Aug. 3 at The Woods, a conference cen-

ter 90 miles from Washington, D.C.

The workshop is being held to develop a network of minority scholars whose intellectual contributions can help inform debate and decision-making with regard to science and application.

This project is funded by the National Science Foundation and the National Institute of Mental Health and co-sponsored by over 20 national organizations.

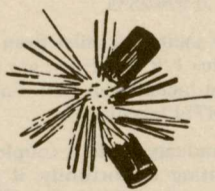

## Groundbreaking Held For College's Child Care Center

"This is a dream come true. ... It took the work of many people, people who kept the faith," said Hans vonBaeyer, co-chair of the William and Mary Child Care Advisory Board, at groundbreaking ceremonies for the Center on June 3.

"With this program the College is building for the future. As more women come into the workplace and want to raise small children and work, there will be a place provided where they can be involved in the care of their children," he said. VonBaeyer also said he saw enormous benefits to the College in the recruiting and retention of women faculty and the retention of employees.

"This program will do more than anything else to build a sense of accomplishment and it will have untold benefits to the community. ... It will rejuvenate us as we approach the 300-year mark," said vonBaeyer. He noted that childcare at the workplace is a concept that is growing and there are successful programs in place at the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, the Department of Transportation and the University of Virginia. He closed his remarks by thanking all who had participated in the preparatory work for the center, including William F. Merck II, vice president for administration and finance; Nancy S. Nash, assistant to Merck; Ann M. Reed, associate professor of English, who served as co-chair of the center's advisory board; and Fran Dorsey, director of the Williamsburg Community Child Care Center. He had a special word of thanks for Mrs. Fran Verkuil, a member of the advisory committee, whose fundraising efforts had brought substantial support to the program.

Other members of the Advisory committee include Tim Cody; Jim Griffith; John McGlennon; Carol Davis; Loretta Early, president of HACE; Edward Irish; and Sandy Ward. The William and Mary Child Care Center is being built behind Bridges House on Jamestown Road. It is expected that construction will be completed in December and the Center will open in January.

The architect is Jane Wright of Hanbury, Evans, Newill, Vlattas and Company; the builder, Armada Hoffer Construction Co. The entire cost of the building is covered by private donations made specifically for this purpose.

The Center will accommodate 21 infants and toddlers and 54 pre-school children of the William and Mary faculty, student and staff community. The fee

## Registration Set For Children's Classes At Muscarelle Museum

The summer art class program at the Muscarelle Museum of Art will be held on consecutive Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning Tuesday, July 9 and ending Thursday, Aug. 1. In-person registration will be held at the museum from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., Thursday, June 27.

If classes are not filled during the initial registration, enrollment will continue through July 5. The cost is \$20 per student with scholarships available in cases of financial need. This program is sponsored, in part, by a grant from the Williamsburg Arts Commission.

Classes will combine the study of original works of art with informal studio sessions and are arranged according to 1991-92 school grade levels. The schedule is as follows:

*Big & Little*, ages 3-4, will meet 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.; ages 5-6 will meet from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Pre-schoolers and parents will share these classes and create art projects together.

*Beasties & Birdies*, grades 1-2, will meet 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. or 1:30 to 3 p.m. Students will study real and imaginary creatures in the museum's collection and create their own menagerie.

*I Love a Collage*, grades 3-4, will meet 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. or 1:30 to 3 p.m. Students will learn how different media can be combined with a variety of collage techniques to produce portraits, landscapes and abstract works of art.

*Wired*, grades 5-6, will meet 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The works of Alexander Calder will be used to encourage students to experiment with wire sculpture, mobiles, stabiles and objects that spin and fly.

*Clothes Encounter*, grades 5-6 will meet 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. After studying examples of different types of clothing depicted in paintings and prints in the museum's collection, students will de-

sign their own costumes.

*Face Off*, grades 7-9, will meet 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Using modern and contemporary works of art to spark ideas, students will explore new and exciting ways to see faces. Creative projects will include drawing, painting, collage and more.

### Half Daze Workshops

Two Museum Half-Daze workshops will be offered in June.

Students in grades three through five are invited to participate in "Animal Funnies" from 1 to 4:30 p.m., Tuesday, June 25.

Students will create humorous works of art with animal characters, based upon a hand-made book in the collection, *Owl Feathers*.

Students in grades K through 2 will participate in "Drip, Spatter and Spill" painting workshop from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Wednesday, June 26.

Classes will work outside and students

are asked to wear old clothes.

## Muscarelle Receives Two Awards In Exhibition Publication Competition

The Muscarelle Museum of Art has received two awards for recent exhibition publications from the American Association of Museums' Publications Competition.

The exhibit publication for "Literacy through Art: A Celebration of the Fine Art of Children's Book Illustration," designed by Rob Carter, won in the exhibition catalog division. The invitation to "An Evening at the Muscarelle," designed by John Malinowski, won in the invitations to events category.

The competition, which rewards and encourages excellence in the graphic design of museum publications, is the only

national, juried event involving publications produced by museums of all kinds and sizes.

In addition to receiving an award certificate, winning entries were also on display at the American Association of Museum's annual meeting held in late May in Denver and will be featured in the September/October issue of AAM's flagship magazine, *Museum News*, and will be displayed in a national touring exhibition.

The 1991 competition drew 1,639 entries, from which 131 were selected for recognition.



## 'Glimpses of Williamsburg' On Display At Zollinger Museum

The new exhibit in the Zollinger Museum of the Earl Gregg Swem Library is "Glimpses of Williamsburg, 1702-1862." The exhibit closes Nov. 1.

Drawing on travelers' accounts in the Library's Manuscripts and Rare Books department, the exhibit depicts word pictures of the colonial capital and the village in the 19th century.

Comments range from lavish praise to gentle criticism. Travelers' accounts have been one of the many documen-

tary sources for the restoration of Williamsburg. After the capital moved to Richmond in 1780, the accounts show the decline of Williamsburg which was once described by an 18th-century traveler as "neat and elegant" with "magnificent public buildings."

The descriptions begin with the account of F. L. Michel, a Swiss traveler to Virginia in 1702, and conclude with the 1862 diary of Harriette Cary lamenting the Federal forces' occupation of Wil-

liamsburg during the Civil War.

The exhibit also includes the "Frenchman's" map of 1782 and several other maps of 18th century Williamsburg in addition to 19th-century watercolors of Bruton Parish Church and the Palace Green by Thomas Charles Millington.

Among the repeated themes in the accounts are the hospitality of the people of Williamsburg, the layout of the city, The College of William and Mary and the statue of Lord Botetourt.

The exhibit showcases the collecting scope of the Manuscripts and Rare Books department which focuses on accounts by 18th- and 19th-century travelers in Virginia. Museum hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., Saturdays. The museum will be closed on two Saturdays, August 10 and 17. Saturday hours during the fall are 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
